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The Secret of Victorious Living

When Jesus spoke with Nicodemus about being born again, He touched a sensitive spiritual nerve. No veneered religion, however attractive, will do. Real faith has to plunge deep beneath the surface, so deep beneath the surface, so deep that Jesus spoke of an entirely new life, one built upon a new birth.

Notice how this conflicts with contemporary values. Today's seeker is told that within one's self resides a vast storehouse of capacity waiting eagerly to be released. All sorts of systems are promoted to liberate the "real" us, including positive thinking, transcendental meditation, cosmic self-discovery, spiritual power pointing, horoscopic channelling, and a grab of psychological techniques touted by celebrities and the lesser known.

At the core of it all is a premise as old as a perilridden tree in Eden: that happiness and success, to say nothing of self-esteem, can be acquired and made to flow from within.

The Bible confirms the value of every person on the basis of a cosmos-wide status conferred by the Creator. The way God looks at us was confirmed by Jesus' coming among us at unthinkable sacrifice. "Every good endowment and every perfect gift is from above," wrote the apostle James, "coming down from the Father of lights with whom there is no variation or shadow due to change" (James 1:17, RSV). The point? Personal worth is real, but it rests not in self, but from how our Creator values us. It's shown in how He made us and what He has done to rescue us--both Eden and Calvary. We are God's treasured creatures, destined to be heirs of His kingdom.

Victorious living is found only in a shift of spiritual paradigms, from rule-based spiritual service to a new walk in love, infinitely intimate, profoundly powerful. Like the unfettered wind moving its way through newly open chambers of the heart, God's Spirit occupies the lives of willing believers, taking command. At last Jesus is Lord.

How different the Christian life looks from the surrendered side. No longer driven by multiplied rules, obligations, opinions of others, or self-forgiving greed, now we walk hand in hand with Jesus. He is tender, yet infinitely strong. Old guilt sloughs away in the presence of His grace. In response to our appeal, He steps in to become the master of all our lives, anointing us with His own righteousness, the same that restores us to fellowship with Him.

Old struggles lose their grip as they come under His power. Daily refreshed with prayer and Bible study, the believer grows ever more Christlike.

Grasp the picture: we the creatures of His hand, long runaways and aliens, now returned--not into some shallow, sentimental harmony, but for real, welcomed back into the kingdom of God. Now of grace, soon in glory.

Jesus assured Nicodemus that this alone leads to eternal life. The old battles of trying and failing to make oneself good are things past. The war that arose in heaven continues on earth, but now on the turf of the triumphant Jesus.

So does this mean temptation has been disarmed? No, but Someone else joins us in battle, One who has met the test and overcome every temptation. To the degree that we stay at His side we are victors.

Human frailty is still ours, and we are still less than we ought to be. But we have given Christ the wheel of our lives, and at every moment He retrieves us. Lapses may trouble us and provide Satan an opening to discourage us. But we will not accept them as normal, sheltering them with an excuse, for they are not normal. "If we confess our sins, he is faithful and just to forgive us our sins, and to cleanse us from all unrighteousness" (1 John 1:9).

But doesn't each mistake in some way unravel the cord of acceptance by Christ? In the little book *Steps to Christ* Ellen White took on that question directly: "The character is revealed, not by occasional good deeds and occasional misdeeds, but by the tendency of the habitual words and acts" (pp. 57, 58).

What is the direction of our lives? Are we with Jesus? Then we are on the way to victorious living.

An SAUM SS/LA Advisory was held in Kuching, Sarawak, Sept. 9-11, 1997. One of the major decisions made during the advisory was to train 2000 lay leaders by the year 2000. The breakdown of the number of laypersons trained by Missions is as follows:

The SAUM SS/LA Advisory was followed by a Congress from Sept. 11 to 14, 1997. A total of 330 registered delegates from all over the Union territory attended. On Sabbath, Sept. 13, the total attendance exceeded 1,000 because members of the nearby churches came to participate.

William Ch'ng, from Singapore, has supported God's work with his time, talents and business resources. He was influencial in establishing the "Van Ministry" in Singapore. He is active in the Health and Community Services. He was also the prime mover in the building of a 2 million-dollar church in Jurong, western part of Singapore. Recently he was appointed the president of the ASI chapter in the SSD territories.

Ee Kim, age 42, from Cambodia, was chosen as the most outstanding layman from Cambodia. He lives in Takeo, 70 kilometres from Phnom Penh. He has brought 20 people to Christ during the past years. In addition, he worked with Sunday church groups and led 15 of them to the Adventist truth. Dr. Chen Yu Ghee, from Kulim, Peninsular Malaysia, is the prime leader in establishing two churches--the Penang Adventist Hospital and the other is the Kulim, where he has his private clinic.

Abong Ganing, a church elder from the Ng Ejit Church in Julau, Sarawak, has led 80 people to baptism

during the past two years.

Jackson Minda, a church elder from the Pasir Nanga Church, Sarawak, was instrumental in pioneering new work in two new territories in his area. He has won 60 souls to Christ during the past two years.

Rodney Ranyis, is an elder from the Kg. Pasir Church, Serian, Sarawak. As school teacher at the Government aided school, he uses the VOP lessons to give Bible studies. He has led 40 students to Christ during the past two years.

Mr. Gideon Gumar was chosen as the most outstanding layman from Sabah Mission. It is reported he has led about 120 people to Christ during the past

years.

Not Clear! Not Clear!

"Ot ch'bah! Ot ch'bah!" Not clear! Not clear! How I hated hearing those words. They were worst than useless. But many of the Khmer people had never had vision care before and in their innocence they supposed that the first lenses I put in front of their eyes would give them perfect vision. "Not clear! Not clear!" was the natural response. What I needed to hear was a simple "Yes" or "No" to my simple question, "Is this better?"

We were working in a beautiful rural setting shaded by banana trees with the lovely Elephant Mountains as a backdrop. As a retired optometrist, I had collected about 1500 pair of used eyeglasses and had come with my wife to this troubled country. Carol is working full time developing a Khmer-English hymnal and on weekends comes with me to the villages to dispense the glasses that I prescribe.

At best it is a primitive examination. My teachers in optometry school would be shocked if they could see how crude the tests are, but their faces would light up as ours do when some see clearly for the first time in their lives.

This Sunday, we had worked all morning in the little village of Kampong Spue, then ridden for two dreadful hours in a tough little Toyota pickup over unbelievably bumpy roads to a second village where we had been told there would be four or five more people needing vision care. When we arrived late in the afternoon there were fifty people waiting for us! How graciously they greeted us with cool water and freshly picked coconuts.

I knew it would be impossible to see all of these people. We had to get back to Phnom Penh before dark. As we hurried, frustration and fatigue suddenly overwhelmed me and when I heard those counterproductive words of the hundredth time, "Ot ch'bah!" I said in my heart, "Sweetie, I'll show you 'Not clear!" And I put a powerful minus lens in front of her eyes!

Suddenly her face lit with surprise and joy and she exclaimed, "Ch'bah, Ch'bah!" For the fist time in her life she could see! God had somehow worked a little miracle for both of us and led me to an impossible lens that was a miracle of sight for her.

As Carol searched for a pair of eyeglasses with the woman's strong prescription and placed them on her face, she stood and marvelled at the sight. In all of her 50 years she had not known that it was possible to see like this: individual leaves on trees, faces of friends and loved ones in all their beauty and expression, and the clouds in the sky, not just white blobs but lovely fleecy things with definite shapes. She stood still with hands clasped and looked and looked.

As we said good-bye, we thanked God that we are able to help some people see a little better. Pray with us that we can not only give people better physical vision buy give them also a glimpse of a God who loves and cares for each one.

"Pa! Pa!" the little girl shouted when she finally spotted her father in the crowd and, beaming, she broke into a run which carried her into his open arms.

On Monday, July 21, 1997, 9-year-old Yuri was reunited with her parents on the Thai/Cambodian border. The little girl was attending primary school in the capital when the fighting broke out in Phnom Penh so could not return to her home in the northern town of Samrong.

Several Cambodia and Thailand SDA Mission staff members drove nearly six hours from Bangkok to the border, planning to meet her father, Pastor Chhum Samithy, stranded in Samrong about 23 miles from Thailand. However, he did not reach the border as planned so the group returned to Bangkok.

The following day, the team contacted Pastor Samithy and learned the CPP troops had surrounded Samrong. He could not leave his house, even to receive medicine for his son who was suffering from dengue fever, because of the chaos and confusion.

One day later, Pastor Samithy evacuated 18 children from the ICC (International Children's Care) orphanage he worked for, his family members, and 5 church builders. The group fled to the border in the Mission's pickup truck and trailer which Gary Rogers (church builder for the Mission) left behind when he went to the Thai border several weeks earlier. With funding provided by Denzil McNelius, he had just completed building a new church in Samrong and also added a new classroom for the orphanage.

Because fighting divided the country and planes were not flying to nearby cities, young Yuri flew to Bangkok with a Mission staff member. At midnight, on hearing that the orphans and crew were out of Samrong and waiting at the border, the Mission team in Bangkok sped back to Osmach, a border town, this time with Yuri in the vehicle. Early the next morning, they met with the Thai/Khmer Cooperation officers and other border officials who pitied the little girl being separated from her family and allowed her to be reunited with them. At the same time, through the officer's cooperation, the team was able to hand over medicine for the son, very weak now, as well as food supplies, canvas for tents, ground sheets, mats, and mosquito nets.

Several days later, the Thai government opened the border and allowed this group to cross into Thailand to a refugee camp several kilometres from the fighting in Osmach. After a week in the camp, the group finally received permission from the Ministry of Foreign Affairs of both the Thai and Cambodian governments to return to Cambodia through Poipet, a border crossing to the south. After reentering their homeland at Poipet, the 30 people continued the 12-hour drive down to Phnom Penh. They travelled perched on top of a tarp covering the back of the pickup and trailer which carried all their earthly belongings and several sacks of rice.

On Tuesday, September 9, 1997, the 18 orphans

journeyed to their new home in Kampong Thom, accompanied by Don Beveridge, from ICC-Asia Pacific. Pastor Samithy and his family have returned north in an attempt to reestablish their home and orphanage in Samrong.

Praise God, this story has a happy ending. But military forces are still battling in the northwestern section of Cambodia. Please continue to pray for the 22,000 refugees waiting in the camps, exposed daily to malaria and other diseases.

The offset press has:


- 1. a maximum image area of 454 x 345 mm.

This press can print, number and perforate simultaneously. This means that printing will be faster and cost reduced.

She attended Sheyenne River Academy and continued up the educational ladder with the completion of a Ph.D. from the University of Santa Barbara. While a senior student at Glendale Adventist Hospital School of Nursing, she met and later married Reuben A. Sprengel, MD. They have two married daughters, Kaye Whitney, R.P.T. and Jean Rogers, MD.

Dr. Helen's career had taken her to many parts of the world and had occasioned many diverse and creative contributions from her energetic mind. In 1958 the Sprengels accepted a call to Bangkok Adventist Hospital where for eight years Dr. Reuben served as Chief of OB/GYN services and Dr. Helen as Director of Nursing Service and instructor in the School of Nursing. During this time she also pioneered and directed the School of Practical Nursing. She was credited with raising over \$3,000,000 for the College.

Dr. Helen also taught classes at the College in addition to her many other duties. She would leave Bangkok Adventist Hospital at 4:00 a.m. arriving at Mission College, Muak Lek, in time for class at 8:00 p.m. by using taxis, public bus or train, and even motorcycles.

She was asked to add to her duties the position of Education Superintendent of SDA schools for Thailand. This involved over a dozen schools with nearly 5,000 students enrolled, all designed to meet government standards. The English Language Schools of Thailand were lacking a director. To keep them functioning until a director could be found, Dr. Helen added that to her responsibility for many months.

Hats off to an outstanding person! What a credit she has been to what Adventist women can accomplish when they give themselves unreservedly in the hands of God for unselfish service.

Gertrude Green has capably and enthusiastically served in mission service for 52 years, ten in China and 42 in Bangkok, Thailand. She began her life in Rochester, New York and her education as a nurse at the New England Sanatorium. She continued studying at Columbia University, New York, and Boston University, Boston, where she completed her MS in Nursing, followed by postgraduate work in Midwifery.

In 1941, Dr. Harry Miller invited Miss Green to join the work in Yeng Cheng, North Central China. She began with one year of language study. The first five years were troubled dodging the Japanese, even though they had many, many students to teach. They tried to escape the country. Most of the railroads had been destroyed, as were their belongings, so they travelled by boat and overland carriage.

In spite of the turmoil, they were allowed to continue their work for another five years during which time Dr. Miller opened another hospital which ultimately became the second largest in China. Miss Green was in charge of the nursing service. She said: "It was terrible! But we had one miracle after another from God!"

Following the ten years of war and escape, Miss Green was called to Bangkok Adventist Hospital to become the Director of the School of Nursing and Nursing Service. Since Thailand required its graduate nurses to also be educated in Midwifery, Miss Green then became the Director of Midwifery. Altogether, she served Thailand for 42 years!

On June 12, 1997, the Midwifery Department Building was named "The Gertrude Green Building" in honour of Miss Green. She also has been named Honoured Alumna of Atlantic Union College, Columbia Union College, and listed in the Hall of Fame for the Adventist Nurses' Association.

The missionaries who worked with Gertrude Green

Mrs. Salinee Navamaratna

Mrs. Salinee Navamaratna was one of the students in the first graduating class of Bangkok Adventist Hospital School of Nursing in 1950. She has worked in the same hospital and the School of Nursing until her retirement in 1995. Mrs. Salinee received her BS degree from Philippine Union College, and her MS degree from Loma Linda University.

Mrs. Salinee was a nurse par excellence, and was the Director/President of the School of Nursing, now known as Mission College Faculty of Nursing, from 1963 to 1995. She led, developed, and nurtured the School of Nursing to become one of the best educational institutions in Thailand, offering a Bachelor of Science in Nursing. The graduates, well accepted wherever they go, holding leadership positions in the organizations wherever they serve, are testimonies to the excellent leadership Mrs. Salinee had manifested to the college.

In 1988, Mrs. Salinee engineered the conversion of the diploma program to baccalaureate program, thus, the establishing the Mission College. With her foresight, she obtained the license to operate a multifaculty college. She envisioned that in the near future, Mission College would be able to offer many other courses other than Nursing, where our young people could be trained for denominational work. Her dream became a reality in 1990, when the establishment of Mission College Muak Lek Campus, was approved by the Ministry of University Affairs, and had the programs accredited a few years later.

In 1993, Mrs. Salinee Navamaratna received three awards for her outstanding achievements, as follows:

- Nurse of the Year Award in Nursing Education from the Nursing Council of Thailand.
- Meritorious Award from the Bangkok Adventist Hospital.
- Educator of the Year Award from the Thailand Mission.

In 1995, Mission College was given the coveted "College of the Year" award for academic excellence by the National Academic Council of Thailand

In 1989, she received an honour pin and citation from the Ministry of Social Welfare of Thailand for her contributions to the community.

Her contribution to the nursing profession in Thailand has brought

honours not only to Mission College, but also to the Seventh-day Adventist Church as a whole

After serving the denomination for 50 years, Mrs. Salinee retired in July 1995, leaving a legacy that the next generation of leaders can well emulate.

As a tribute to the self-sacrificing spirit, manifested by Mrs. Salinee Navamaratna, and for her dedication to the medical work in Thailand, the Administration of the Mission College named the auditorium in the college as
