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EDITORIAL

JOINING THE SEVENTH-DAY ADVENTIST CHURCH. WHY?

Recently I was asked by someone "Why did you join the Adventist Church?" I gave him the following four reasons for joining the SDA Church:

 The Adventist Church is the last-day remnant church of God.

It has the two identifying marks of the remnant church stated in Revelation 12:17: keeping the commandments of God (the Ten Commandments) and having the testimony of Jesus which is the Spirit of Prophecy (Rev. 19:10). The Church believes that "one of the gifts of the Holy Spirit is prophecy. This gift is an identifying mark of the remnant church and was manifested in the life and ministry of Ellen G White." (SDA Fundamental Beliefs, No. 17).

The Adventist Church is a world church with a global mission.

In just a short 150 plus years the Church has grown from an obscure beginning (officially registered in 1863) to a world church which is now working in 204 countries of the world (230 in total). It is using 725 languages and dialects to proclaim the last warning message to those who live in the earth-to every nation, tribe, language and people. (Rev. 14:6-12). The message is to warn and prepare the world ready for the return of Jesus.

The Church has adopted an effective system of organization (4 constituent levels: Local Church, Mission, Union and General Conference with Divisions), a unified system of beliefs (27 Fundamental Beliefs), and a sound biblical financial support system (tithe and offerings).

 The Adventist Church is the heir to the reformation, restoring and teaching the full and complete gospel truths.

During the Dark Ages, some truths of the Bible were lost and were being replaced by errors like the immortality of the soul, justification by works, Sunday sacredness, etc. Reformation movement was able to restore truths like "sola scriptura" (Bible only as sole authority for doctrines and beliefs) and justification by faith. It was in this last days (since 1798–Dan.12:4) that God raise up the Advent Movement (SDA Church was born out of this movement) to restore fully and completely the truth on the Sanctuary, the Seventh-day Sabbath, the State of the Dead, the Second Coming of Christ, the Great Controversy Theme, etc.

4. The Adventist Church is practicing and promoting a unique and distinctive Christian lifestyle.

Jesus promised to give His followers a more abundant life (Jn 10:10). God wants to establish His remnant people a happy, healthy, and holy people (Ev 696). As citizens of heaven (Phil. 3:20), God has given us a fitness program (2 Pet. 3:11-14; Titus 2:11-14) to train and prepare us fit for heaven when Jesus returns. We should not let the world squeeze us into its mold (Rom 12:2); instead we should change the world by a lifestyle transformed by the power of the Holy Spirit. Research studies have shown that Adventist men in California at age live 8.9 years longer than the average Californian.

The mortality rate of Adventists from all diseases combined is approximately half that of the general population. Lung cancer rates among Adventist men are only 17.21% of the general population. This is because they do not smoke, get more vitamin A in their diet, and eat more fruits and vegetables, and less saturated fat and cholesterol. God wants His last-days obedient people to enjoy good physical health (3 Jn 2) as a strong witness to the world of His mighty power to save and bless.

Yes, I am proud and privileged to be a Seventhday Adventist Christian. How about you?

But crammed in with 25 other people in the back of a pick-up truck taxi, she could hardly keep her arms around the crying baby on her lap much less get her finger to her nose.

The wife of Pastor Hy Vannarith was taking a taxi from Phnom Penh 250 kilometers north to visit her parents in Sisaphon with her first son. As the truck was approaching Battambang city, the three month old Sin Daniel began to cry.

Socun Ngek did everything she could think of to quiet the fussy baby. She offered him milk, soft toy, and even tickled his belly. She sang his favorite song to him and he started screaming.

She looked around at the other passengers in desperation. What could she do?

Then the driver, who himself was squashed with four passengers in the front seat of the truck, shouted over the baby's wail, "Lady, why don't you sit in the front seat? The baby can look out the window!"

He pulled over and the embarrassed woman carried the screaming child to the front seat. Thankfully, the baby settled down and they proceeded in silence.

Half an hour later, the truck hit an ox standing in the middle of the road. The truck flipped and rolled several times. Several of the people in the back near her former seat were seriously injured. And the man who had taken her place in the back of the truck was dead. But Soeun Ngek and her son were alive and unhurt.

After the accident, several of the passengers found her and asked, "Before you got into the taxi in Takeo, we saw your mouth moving like you were talking to someone. What were you doing?"

She answered, "I prayed to the God of heaven to protect me and my baby on this journey."

EXTENSION SCHOOL FOR CAMBODIAN TEACHERS

An extension school class on the *Philosophy of Adventist Education* for 17 Adventist teachers in Cambodia was conducted on August 24-28 by Dr Edmund Siagian at the premises of the Cambodia Adventist Primary School, Phnom Penh. Eight of the teachers are regular teachers of CAPS, while the other nine are Adventist teachers currently teaching in government or public schools. This course was especially felt necessary to be taught because of the need of the Mission for more Adventist teachers for its expanding educational work--as CAPS will be upgraded yearly to offer successive higher secondary school grades until the 12th year is reached, and as new elementary schools may sprout at many of the towns where there



is a strong Adventist presence. Four new teachers will be taken in for the 1998-99 school year, while the others may be recruited as the need arises. For those who qualify, it is

hoped that a three (3) quarterhour college credits will be gained, besides the knowledge of Adventist principles and concepts of education for practical application.

A CHALLENGE AND OPPORTUNITY FOR YOUNG PEOPLE IN THE SAUM

What is This? This is an endeavor to train selected young people to go out and witness as real missionaries within the boundaries of this Union for twelve months. Remuneration? These missionaries will be selfsupporting. They will be provided with a room where possible and transportation to their territory. They will also receive training and support in selling truthfilled books wherever they go. This should provide them with sufficient funds to live comfortably.

Lecturers?Lecturers for the first intake will be: Ps. Dan Walter, Lawrence Banyie, Samuel Money, Tommy Golotoh, Braam Oberholster.

MISS ROSY LINDANG PASSED AWAY

Miss Rosy Lindang, a pioneer worker for Sarawak Mission passed away on July 24, 1998 after a short illness. Her widowed mother accepted the Adventist faith when Rosy was at a tender age. Believing in Christian education her mother sent her children to an Adventist school. Upon completing high school Rosy began her career as a teacher at Ayer Manis School in 1947. In 1948 she went to the Malayan Union Seminary in Singapore for one year upgrading and later in 1958 to Batu Lintang Teachers' College in Kuching for a twoyear training course. She continued to teach at Sunny Hill School, Bunga School, Bukit Nyala School and Keniong Church School till 1973. From 1974 to 1976 she served as the Director of Children Evangelism for Sarawak Mission. In 1977 she went back to teaching until her retirement in December 1981 after serving the church for a total of thirtythree years.

Rosy was well loved by her students who remember her as a dedicated and patient teacher and "Mama."
