Hats Off!

There are some people in the common walks of life (not too many) who believe that conditions in the world would be much better if each individual would take care of what is under his own hat. Sometimes this doctrine makes its presence felt in the church by such familiar terms as: "Her plight has been brought about by mismanagement."

While it may be true that there are millions of people who cannot care for themselves --- babies, old folks, invalids, orphans, widows, and outcasts. These individuals, children of God, cannot care for what is under their personal hat. Immediately society, either church, state, or neighborhood must provide a hat.

"I was shown that God requires His people to be far more pitiful and considerate of the unfortunate than they are. 'Pure religion and undefiled before God and the Father is this, to visit the fatherless and widows in their affliction, and to keep himself unspotted from the world.' Here genuine religion is defined. God requires that the same consideration which should be given to the widow and fatherless be given to the blind, and to those suffering under the affliction of other physical infirmatives. Disinterested benevolence is very rare in this age of the world." 3T, 516.

A passing glance in the newspaper reveals that there are those who

WILL NOT look after their own affairs. Their interests will not stay neglected under their inhospitable hats but come creeping under their neighbors' hats, causing trouble and demanding attention. They spread disease. They endanger their fellowworkmen in factories by incompetence and carelessness. They jeopardize their neighbors by drunken driving. For the sake of what is under their own hats, we must look after these incompetents and criminals also. The personal hat perforce must be stretched into a civic hat also, and this transition is offtimes cared for by our Dorcas Welfare Societies.

It is also strangely true that our own affairs have a way of getting out from under our own hats. We have so many interests that we cannot care for alone. "It is not good for man to be alone." Only in cooperation with organized society can we protect our property, secure peace, and provide for the health, education, and religious nurture of our children. Civilization comes only through cooperation - by taking one's own hat off.

The pioneer family lived pretty much to himself. But it had to be content with tallow candles, sundials, and oxcarts. The doctrine of looking after only that which is under your own hat is a harmful survival of pioneer life. By looking after that (To page 6)

On the contrary, it will bring life, spirit, and blessing to the church, as well as to the neighborhood.

"Religion does not consist merely in a system of dry doctrines, but in practical faith, which sanctifies the life and corrects the conduct in the family circle and in the church." 4T, 337. The Dorcas societies within the Texico Conference are following this instruction.

One of the Dorcas projects sponsored by the Albuquerque English Church was to furnish new clothing, toilet articles, and school supplies for orphans. Surely the lives of these little ones have been brightened by gifts of love which demonstrated that someone did care for them.
