Charles Creacy lost his job. A supermarket chain executive told him that if he would not work on Saturday, he would be fired.

Charles was manager of the meat department in a large supermarket in Lawton, Oklahoma, and was required to work every Saturday. When he decided to make a stand for the Sabbath, he arranged his work schedule so he would have the day off. Saturdays had always been the busiest day for the grocery store, but within two weeks of Charles' taking the Sabbath off, meat sales began to go up. He would work late on Friday afternoon and go in early on Sunday morning to make sure the cases were filled.

The sales kept getting better and this brought some attention to Charles' department. The executive heard what was happening and when he learned that Charles was an Adventist and didn't work on Saturday, he went down to check it out. When challenged on his Sabbath keeping, Charles tried to defend his position, but he made it clear that he would not work on Saturday.

Thus he lost his family's only source of income. But he and his wife, Stacy, had something else—faith. They had Jesus on their side and were filled with peace.

When Stacy saw Charles Creacy three years ago, it was love at first sight. They met in the store (a different one) where Charles worked as a meat cutter. Stacy held a position as executive vice president for a general contracting company in Oklahoma City. Seven days later they were married.

They had everything they could ever want: high-paying jobs, a big beautiful home, two new cars, a jet boat, vacations, and lots of parties. Three months after they were married they were thrilled to find that Stacy was expecting a child.

Stacy already had a daughter, Stephanie, from a previous marriage.

Then a week later came the bad news. Stacy lost her \$50,000-a-year job when the company went bankrupt as a result of the decline in the petroleum industry. She could find no other work. Charles' salary alone could not pay their bills. So they had no choice but to file for bankruptcy.

Stacy had grown up an Adventist, but when she started making it big with her career, religion was given a back seat. Although the Lord had been speaking to her heart all along, it was only in the crisis that she decided to listen. She turned to the Bible and found answers, and reassured Charles that God was in control.

Charles was promoted and moved to Lawton. This helped them to leave their embarrassing financial experience behind. Stacy began taking Jazek and Stephanie to Sabbath school. When a Revelation Seminar was scheduled, Stacy told Charles that if he would go to the seminar with her, it would be the best birthday present he could give her. He did so, and attended faithfully. After additional studies with the pastor, Don Fortner, he took his stand, which was followed so quickly by the loss of his job.

Failing to find work in Lawton, Charles knew they could not go for long without any income. They loaded up their children and their belongings and headed for Fort Worth, Texas, where Stacy's mother lived. An old friend told Charles about an advertisement he had seen of a job opening at Keene Distributors. He drove over and was hired as a truck driver.

They are now settled in Cleburne, Texas. They don't have a big house or fancy cars, but Jesus is a part of their lives. God continued to do marvelous things for them.

One Sabbath they were invited to give their testimony in the young adult Sabbath School. recently started at the Keene church. They felt impressed to pray before leaving home that they would make it safely there. Their car had some serious problems and they knew it was only a matter of time until it would stop running. They made it to Sabbath School and gave their testimony of how Christ has led them. It was an inspiration to those present. On the way home from church the breakdown came. As they called a friend for help they could only laugh, realizing that God had helped them make it to the church to meet their appointment.

They claim the promise, "Thou wilt keep him in perfect peace, whose mind is stayed on thee: because he trusteth in thee." Isaiah 26:3. Stacy says, "If you ask the Lord for faith, you'd better be ready for what He will do in your life." ●

Unemployment in southeast Louisiana has hovered around the 20percent mark since the plunge of OPEC oil prices sent the domestic oil industry into a tailspin. With lost jobs came poverty, hunger, and loss of homes.

Sister Miriam Mitchell, Catholic Social Services director, envisioned a cooperative effort among the churches of Terrebonne Parish (county) to help those in need. In her soft Irish accent she asked the pastors attending the ministerial association to invite lay persons to attend an organizational meeting.

William and Sharon Burchard and Roger Fitch, of the Houma church, were the Adventist delegates. William was surprised when he was selected as chairman of the board of what was to become Terrebonne

While food is distributed to meet emergency needs, William says that one of the goals of the organization is to ensure that the needy do not become dependent on the free food. Counsel and guidance are given to help people, as far as possible, to become self-reliant.

#### Champion to be Featured At Camp Yorktown Bay

Scott Green, an Adventist Christian water skier and a national champion, will be a special guest at the Camp Yorktown Bay Waterskiing Camp, July 26-31, 1987.

Scott began water skiing at four years of age, and eight years later he started training seriously for tour-





nament and show skiing. This brought problems because of his strong personal religious convictions.

"I've never been on water skis on Saturday," he says. "I was brought up a Seventh-day Adventist, and as I grew up I came to the personal conclusion that I was going to stick to those beliefs."

In 1978 Scott participated in the Midwest Regionals in Minneapolis. On Thursday his points for the trick skiing were far beyond his nearest competitor. On Friday he was again ahead in the slalom competition. Then his jump was scheduled for Sabbath!

The temptation was strong, but he petitioned the judges to schedule his jump for Sunday or waive this event, allowing him to progress toward his goal of the U.S. Nationals. The judges proposed a compromise: "Put on your skiis at the starting dock on Saturday and let the boat pull you out of the water; then throw the handle, and we'll mark you as if you had jumped."

What to do? Scott had put all his energy, emotion, and extra money into this sport, and the Nationals were within his grasp—if it weren't for the Sabbath! Scott decided not to ski on the Sabbath.

As a result of a massive letterwriting campaign to the American Water Skiing Association, Saturday events were waived for Scott's benefit. Consequently Scott Green holds many national and regional title championships.

Scott runs his own concrete business in Orlando, Florida, and is a design and test consultant for Connally Skis. He is employed also at Orlando Sea World, and services all of the professional Connally skiers.



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# Medical Van Visits Muskogee

When the Muskogee church was notified that the Southwest Region Medical-Dental Van was available to them, they went into action.

Ira Gilliam, Muskogee personal ministries leader, began making phone calls. Instructions from Vera Wolfe, Oklahoma Conference Community Services director and John Hope, director of the van, led to more phoning to schedule physicians, dentists, and nurses.

Eight local dentists and many more physicians offered their services. Martha Mathis, a nurse at Hastings Indian Hospital in Tahlequah brought six other nurses.

On opening day at 9 a.m. the big white van with its sign advertising Seventh-day Adventist Community Services Health Screening was parked at the front door of Wal-Mart. Already a line had formed—a line that continued for two days. Periodically, registration had to be stopped until the people inside could be cared for. People from six states, ranging in age from 5 to 89 years, availed themselves of the services. They were so impressed that many volunteered offerings to help with the expenses. One man gave a \$20 bill.

More than 50 stores placed posters in their windows advertising the van's presence. Both local radio stations repeatedly broadcast its servi-


