SELECTED FROM PUBLISHED TESTIMONIES BY MRS. E. G. WHITE

I AM filled with sadness when I think of our condition as a people. The Lord has not closed heaven to us, but our own course of continual backsliding has separated us from God. Pride, covetousness, and love of the world have lived in the heart without fear of banishment or condemnation. Grievous and presumptuous sins have dwelt among us. And yet the general opinion is that the church is flourishing, and that peace and spiritual prosperity are in all her borders.

Yet few are alarmed or astonished at their want of spiritual power. . . . Let each put the question to his own heart: "How have we fallen into this state of spiritual feebleness and dissension? Have we not brought upon ourselves the frown of God because our actions do not correspond with our faith? Have we not been seeking the friendship and the applause of the world rather than the presence of Christ and a deeper knowledge of his will?" Examine your own hearts, judge your own course. Consider what associates you are choosing. Do you seek the company of the wise, or are you willing to choose worldly associates, companions who fear not God, and obey not the gospel?

Are your recreations such as to impart moral and spiritual vigor? Will they lead to purity of thought Impurity is to-day wide-spread, even and action? among the professed followers of Christ. Passion is unrestrained; the animal propensities are gaining strength by indulgence, while the moral powers are constantly becoming weaker. Many are eagerly participating in worldly, demoralizing amusements, which God's Word forbids. Thus they sever their connection with God and rank themselves with the pleasure-lovers of the world. The sins that destroyed the antediluvians and the cities of the plain exist to-day — not merely in heathen lands, not only among popular professors of Christianity, but with some who profess to be looking for the coming of the Son of man. should present these sins before you as they appear in his sight, you would be filled with shame and terror.

And what has caused this alarming condition? Many have accepted the theory of the truth, who have had no true conversion. I know whereof I speak. When these little fellows planned to help the cause in this way it seemed that somebody had told them about our work in other lands. little church gave \$170.50 or about its full quota. the close of the meeting Brother Kilgore came in for counsel, and it was arranged for him to return here March the 4th and begin a few days' meetings. are praying that God will bless his effort to the salvation of souls. 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SELECTION TAKEN FROM THE PRESIDENT'S AD-DRESS AT THE LAKE UNION CONFER-ENCE, HELD FEBRUARY 6, 1910

The Union Paper

Ar the fourth biennial session of the Lake Union Conference there was passed a recommendation instructing the committee of the union to begin the publication of a union conference paper. The committee therefore took the matter up, and after securing estimates and advice from various sources, the work was undertaken in connection with the printing department of Emmanuel Missionary College, and the first issue bore the date of November 4, 1908. All conferences in the union received due notice of the opening of the enterprise, but up to the present time a majority of the conferences have not adopted the paper, and the support received from the minority has fallen far short of making the paper self-supporting, and a large deficit

has resulted, as will appear from the report. If the Lake Union Herald had a subscription list equal to its present list, combined with the lists of all local conference papers, the receipts would have met the entire cost of its publication; then if the conferences had decided to make use of the union paper for their local work, the entire deficit would have been wiped out. I would recommend that careful consideration be given to the question of a medium in the union, by this conference, and a plan devised that will be accepted by all. To conduct a union paper at a loss of \$1,600, and several local papers at a loss of \$800, is a waste of means that ought not by any means to be continued.
