"He that lacketh these things is blind." Unless transformed in character, from grace to grace, there are many who will be unable to discern the needs of a dying world. May God help those who are now indifferent, to be reconverted, and to realize their responsibilities in these times of well-nigh universal apostasy, when so many know that the time of their visitation is near.

Brethren and sisters, Christ is soon coming in the clouds of heaven, with power and great glory. He desires us to act our part faithfully in the closing work of warning the world. But unbelief is heavy; it presses upon the soul; and having been received and cherished, it is revealed in our apathy and indifference toward those who are as yet unwarned.

Let us put away our unbelief. Let us humble ourselves before God, and with sanctified tongue begin to witness for him wherever we are. Thus we shall give proof to the world that we are indeed followers of Jesus. Our words and actions should be of a character that will win souls to the One whom we have professed to love and obey. Oh, we must have more of the love of Jesus in the soul. We must dwell more on the things that have to do with our eternal destiny and the salvation of precious souls all about us. We must seek to come into harmony with the mind of God, as revealed in his Word. We need to feel intensely over these matters, and look constantly to Jesus, the author and finisher of our faith.

"I wish I could tell all my experiences since I have been in Taylor County. Here is one. I went to a large house; no one was at home, but two large dogs seemed ready to attack me; but I think the Lord protected me as he did Daniel in the lions' den, for the people around there said a stranger never went into that yard without being bitten. This is not my work, but the Lord's, and it is none of my choosing, but I thank him that he does watch and care for me and gives me success. Enclosed you will find my report for week ending March 19, for \$38. I put in hard work, sixty-three hours' time."

This is his first experience in the field. He is one of the young men that thought he could do nothing at the canvassing work. This is another report for the same week: "I was very glad to hear from you. Your letters are very encouraging to us workers. I am encouraged in the work. The Lord has given me many blessings this last week, and helped me in taking orders and finding a suitable place to stay over night. I am of good courage, and expect to stick to the work. I put in 40 hours and my orders amount to \$22.50."

Another faithful canvasser writes: "The Lord has been with me this week and given me success in taking orders. We are sowing the seed. Let us pray that the Lord will send more laborers forth to the work."

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### TRAINING SCHOOL ITEMS

THE annual meeting of the Southern Training School board was held according to appointment, at Graysville, March 6 and 7. The board gave considerable time to the study of the problems of the school. It was voted to establish several industries, and to strengthen those we already have.

The annual report of the principal showed that the school was holding its own, although it had not grown much in the way of increased enrolment.

A careful consideration of our needs led the board to vote to build a boys' dormitory capable of rooming from twenty-five to thirty boys. The school already owns about seven hundred dollars worth of lumber. Work will be commenced on the dormitory in the near future.

The class in botany, which was organized about six weeks ago, is doing excellent work. Just now the agricultural department of the school is quite alive preparing ground, and getting in the crops for another year.

SUMMER SCHOOL FOR WHITE TEACHERS

According to vote of the Southern and Southeastern Union Conferences, a summer school for white teachers will be held at Graysville, beginning June 13, and lasting four weeks. At the close of the school, two days will be set aside for examinations.

It is very much desired that all educational superintendents in both unions be present the entire time. Plans are being matured so that expenses for board will be very light. All who are recommended by their conference president will receive tuition free; bring your recommendation with you.

## THE NEW SELF-DENIAL BOX

For several years the Southern Missionary Society has been putting out a Self-denial Box for the purpose of securing funds for the work among the colored people of the South.

This is in harmony with the light God has given us through his servant, Sister White. I quote only a few statements from the great amount that has been given on this subject.

"I present to you this portion of the Master's vineyard, which has been neglected, but which must be worked. I make an earnest appeal to all who love the Lord Jesus to do all they can to help at this important time.

"The Lord instructed me that much could be accomplished by placing Self-denial Boxes in the homes of our people. I acted upon the light given. I am glad to learn that the love of Christ has moved many hearts, and that so large a number have responded. My heart says: Thank God for the good results seen. The money sent in from these Self-denial Boxes helps in the accomplishment of the great and good work that we desire to see done.

"Many should become interested in the work of placing these boxes in homes. Ask old and young to aid the work for the colored people by placing these boxes in every home possible. A blessing will surely follow the gifts of self-denial thus brought to the Master.

"Tell the little ones about the work that is being done for the colored children who have been so greatly neglected. Tell them that the money they put into the Self-denial Boxes is used in giving colored children some of the blessings which white children are so abundantly provided with."

"My brethren and sisters everywhere: I wish to ask if you would not regard it a privilege to lay aside a certain sum weekly for the Southern field. Will you not put in a prominent place in your home a box with the inscription, 'For the work among the colored people of the South?' Will you not ask your children to put into this box the money that they would otherwise spend for candy and other needless things? When visitors come to your home they will see the box, and will ask in regard to it. Let the children tell the story of their effort to help a needy missionary field by denying self."

"Every church-member should cherish a spirit of sacrifice. In every home there should be taught lessons of self-denial. Keep in your homes a Self-denial Box into which you can put the money saved by little acts of self-denial."

"Invite those not of our faith to do all they can for the advancement of this work. The Lord has placed the responsibility upon them. He expects them to act their part. As they have received so they are to impart.
