
Work which has been somewhat slack in the press-room since the holidays, is "picking up" somewhat.

Our picture this week shows the Publishing House chapel, a room 30x40 feet, with seating capacity of one hundred people as now furnished. Probably however in case of necessity a hundred and fifty persons could be seated in this room.

The view in this picture is from rear to front, the narrow way of the room, the greater length being across from side to side. The platform and speakers stand show quite plainly, but the motto, "What Hath God Wrought!" neatly painted in two colors upon the wall shows too faintly in this picture to be read.

At half past six o'clock one morning each week all the employees of the Southern Publishing Association assemble in this room for roll-call and a short devotional service. Upon

other days the employees meet in their respective departments for a fifteen-minute period of worship before entering upon the work of the day. Thus the work of each day is begun with prayer.

FROM ONE OF OUR CORRESPONDENTS

Writing from Oklahoma City under date of January 9, C. L. Collison, field agent, says:—

"Your kind letter of the 1st was received by me in the field. Thank you very much for the kind wishes for the coming year. I felt thankful to the Lord when I read of the large gain that had been made in sales during 1912, and I with you hope for further advances during 1913.

"I left for the field before daylight on the morning of January 3rd, and reached the German brother who was expecting to start out in the colporteur work, shortly after noon, studied together until Monday morning, when we went to work in a blizzard. They tell me it was zero weather and I do not doubt it by the way it felt, but we had asked the Lord to prepare the way and believed that he had taken this way to do We put in ten hours, gave ten exhibitions and received from the Lord a blessing. We were enabled to sell to nine of the families visited and received a total of \$26.25 worth of business during the day, of which \$4 was cash sales of helps. We again studied that night, and the next morning the weather was as bad as ever, but before train time we were enabled to visit five more families and received five orders and sold \$1.50 worth of helps. This was a total of \$19.50 worth of business for four hours.

"Several others have started the year's work already and we expect, with the Lord's help, to have a good report for every week of the year."

New Orleans Sabbath-School

Knowing that the readers of the Southern Union Worker are always interested in the progress that is being made in any department of the work, I thought I would write and tell about the good year we have had in our Sabbath-school work in New Orleans.

At the beginning of the year 1912 we had a Sabbath-school membership of seventy-five. The question was put to the school, "How much shall we raise for missions this year?" We had raised during 1911 nine dollars more than anticipated, amounting to \$259.95. And as we always want our standard high the school with one voice answered the question with the words, "A Dollar a Day For Missions," or \$366 for the Leap Year. This amount would be \$106.05 over the previous But by the help of the Lord and the faithful year, 1911. co-operation of the entire school we were able to pass our mark, and raised \$402.77. This, as you will note, is a gain of \$36.77 over what we had hoped to raise, and an increase over the year 1911 of \$142.82.

The Thirteenth Sabbath offerings have been large also, the last one amounting to over \$19.

One thing very interesting in the history of our Sabbathschool is that ever since we took action, in 1909, to give all our donations to missions, there has been a continual increase in both membership and offerings.

Our aim for 1913 is "Five Hundred Dollars For Missions."
Our present membership is eighty-five. Our prayer is that
we may continue to grow and prosper.

Forward Movement in New Orleans

WE are glad to report that the forward movement is stirring the company of Sabbath-keepers in the city of New Orleans to action. The message that has repeatedly come to God's people "that now is the time to work the cities, and that the laymen are to act a part in this closing work," is being responded to by many earnest souls, each seeking to find his or her place in which to work.

The plan to organize bands, or companies for this work is under way. The main part of the city being divided into five sections and a leader chosen for the management of the work in each section to do aggressive and systematic work with Bible workers, magazine and tract workers, and Christian help workers.

Sunday morning, the 12th, eight volunteers went out in the city from home to home with gospel literature, distributing 1,289 pages of tracts and 199 periodicals. Of this number eighty-two papers were given away and 117 magazines and two "Gospel Primers" sold for cash, also one yearly subscription taken for a magazine; thus demonstrating that Sunday may be used as a day for missionary work.

The success attending this effort has given an inspiration to

the church to be up and doing. The Word says, "Be ye doers of the word, and not hearers only." The doers of the work will receive much of the blessing of God. Let us be faithful workers.

Bible Workers' Training Course

In all lines of the work of the Seventh-day Adventist denomination there is a great dearth of laborers. Our work has expanded so rapidly that we have been unable to recruit our ranks of workers fast enough.

There is in this denomination yet a large amount of talent that should be utilized. Many of our young people are finding their way into the world because they have felt it impossible for them to prepare for the work of the Lord.

To supply this great lack of workers in our own State, as well as to assist our young people in finding a place in the work of this fast-closing message, the Louisiana Conference Committee has planned for a special course of Bible training to be held in New Orleans, from March 2 to May 2, 1913. It is hoped that many will avail themselves of this opportunity, and that many of those who do respond will become real burden bearers in this cause, though the committee does not guarantee employment to any when the course is finished.

STUDIES

The studies that will be pursued during this course will include the following: Bible Doctrines, Methods of Work, Hydrotherapy, with demonstrations, Hygienic Cookery, and practical field work.

A series of meetings will be held in the Seventh-day Adventist church building, in which it is expected that all attending this course will take an active part.

EXPENSES

For such as are recommended for the course by their church elder and by at least one member of the Conference Committee, room rent in the mission will be furnished free.

Board will be furnished on the club plan, the cost of which should not exceed fifteen cents a meal, and at two meals a day, this would make a total expense of \$18.30. Opportunity will be given those in attendance to sell our literature in the city from which they will be able to realize some thing with which to meet this expense. The tuition will be free.

${\tt PROGRAM}$

The program will be about as follows: Recitation periods 8:30 A. M. to 12 M. Field work 2 to 5 P. M., Workers' Council and preparation for night service at the church 5:30.

Should the committees of any of the other conferences composing the Southern Union wish to recommend students to this course they will be made welcome, and will be given the same consideration as those from the Louisiana Conference, except in the matter of room rent.

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A New Sunday Bill for the District of Columbia

It is stated from Washington that Dr. W. G. Grannis, the president of the Lord's Day Alliance, has prepared a bill, requiring the observance of Sunday in the District of Columbia, which, with the consent of Senator Johnston, is to be substituted for the Johnston Sunday Bill. This measure is said to be more drastic in its provisions, and does not contain any exemption clause in favor of those who observe another day than Sunday as the Sabbath.

A public meeting was held Sunday evening, January 12, in one of the leading churches of Washington, at which this question was considered.

This latest development indicates that a vigorous effort will be made to secure the passage of a drastic Sunday law for the District of Columbia before the present session of Congress expires, and emphasizes the need of great activity on the part of the friends of liberty everywhere. Let all our people be up and doing now while there is still opportunity to do effective work.
