Home Office News

Sales report for week ending June 13, 1913: Total number bound volumes, 1,366; Watchman, 6,570.

We were glad to have with us in our chapel service Bro. C. D. Wolff, field agent of the Southern Union Conference. and Eld. E. A. Curtis, president of the Western Colorado Conference, who is in Nashville visiting his son, Mr. G. H. Curtis, our cashier.

We are glad to have Brother Eastman with us again after an absence of nearly four weeks attending the General Conference. We are sorry to learn, however, that the North American Division Conference has extended a call for Brother Eastman to become secretary of the Publishing Department of that Division. We knew this matter had been under consideration by the nominating committee for several weeks, but the Southern Publishing Association board were unanimous in urging Brother Eastman to remain in his present work. We did not feel that we could spare his services at this time, but in the providence of God it seems that it is his duty to accept this call and he has tendered his resignation to be accepted when he leaves Nashville to report for duty in his new office. The prayers and best wishes of the office family go with him. He has been a great help

to us in the work here and we dislike very much to have him depart so soon after connecting with the office. However, he has surely been called to a very important position and we shall wish him Godspeed in his new work.

Orders are beginning to come in again which indicates that the work is picking up and that our field men are getting back into the harness. The work is onward and we are of good courage. What we need most at the present time is more canvassers in the field. The harvest truly is great, but the laborers are few.

The Office family enjoyed a treat Monday morning in listening to a stirring talk by Bro. A. F. Harrison, field agent of the Southwestern Union Conference. As usual, Brother Harrison is full of courage and enthusiasm and I believe he left an inspiration with the office workers that will make them better fitted for the work in which they are engaged.

The following are a few of the thoughts he presented:--

"As I came into the new building, my mind could not help but go back to how things looked in the beginning of this work. In a few months it will be twenty-five years since I landed in Shreveport, La., to begin work in this field. I remember that there was a goodly number of States in these two unions where there wasn't a single worker. Hundreds of the countries in the union had never been touched by a single worker, and not a page had been sold. On one occasion I was appointed treasurer for three different States, and did not receive over \$600 in tithe during the whole year. I simply mention these facts to show you how the work has grown.

"A text now comes to my mind, which I wish to read. Isaiah 8:18. 'Behold, I and the children whom the Lord hath given me are for signs and for wonders in Israel from the Lord of hosts, which dwelleth in mount Zion.' The greatest sign to me, brethren, is the children of Israel, the children of God. We are the children of Israel! we are the signs! The world is watching these signs. Whether we realize it or not, we are being watched, every one of us, as to whether we believe and are living out the message that we profess.

"I want to show you what the Lord is doing in the book work with only a few hundred colporteurs in the field. During the first ten years of this work \$2,500 worth of books were given away; during the next ten years \$17,000 worth were sold and given away; \$73,000 worth were sold during the next decade, and \$371,000 worth in the next decade. During the first forty-five years, \$1,346,000 worth of books were sold. Last year, 1912, we sold and gave away \$1,836,000 worth, or \$490,000 more than in the first forty-five years of this message. We haven't yet reached the climax in regard to this book work. The work is going, and this message is rapidly being carried to all the world. Out in the field we set our stake and then pull for it. I want to see the time when we will reach the quarter of a million mark.

"I want to read a little from a report I have here from North Texas. We have forty-three workers in the field there now. Since the institute one worker sold \$1,120 worth, and another worker was only \$1.40 behind him. We have set our stakes for the \$100,000 mark.

"Our union voted that all our field men should go to the General Conference. Many told us that this was a dangerous thing to do, to take all of our field men out of the field at once, but when the time came for us to go, we all went. We had been planning it for a year, and we had our field prepared for it. Last year in the month of May we sold \$21,500 worth of books. I have received reports from four States, which amount to \$20,359, and two more to hear from, so we will go beyond what we did in May last year. We have about 150 colporteurs in the field. For the first few months of this year we doubled our amount of deliveries every month and still held good on our orders. Last year our office sales for the first three months were \$6,000; this year they were \$12,000.

"God is going to finish the work soon. May he help us every one to be faithful and earnest and zealous and give ourselves that he may use us to help finish this work."

Brother Wolff: "It is an inspiration to me to be here. It was an inspiration to me to be at the General Conference and hear the reports of the progress of the work. There is an inspiration in looking back over the time that I have spent in the Southern field, and I feel that I have had a great blessing in being connected with this work."

Brother Eastman: "What Brother Harrison has said this morning is to me more than poetry, it is facts. There is nothing that gives us such an inspiration as to go from door to door selling our books. There is a time coming when we will be tested. I want to be willing to go to the front. I want to be willing to say "Lord, here am I, send me."

Elder Curtis: "I can truly say it is very interesting and encouraging to me to be present in this meeting this morning. It is the first time I have ever had the pleasure of being present in a Publishing House meeting of this nature. I can surely say 'Amen' to the words that have been spoken in our hearing this morning. They have the ring of the message in them. It is true that in every line of this work we want men that are consecrated. I have been connected with this work nearly forty years. I have seen its growth from the stump up, almost. I was thinking, as Brother Harrison was speaking of the finishing of the work, that it would take a long time if we had only the facilities that we had in the beginning of the work, but with every passing year the facilities are increasing. Our army of workers is growing larger. As I visit our schools from time to time now and see the army of young men and women who are taking training, and many more who are getting ready as others step out, I think, What are the possibilities of this work in a few years to come? O, that God would bless every one of us with his Spirit and his power so that we will have a sense of the sacredness and importance of this work and be filled with it.

"I have always felt a deep interest in the work in the Southern field, in fact our people do all through the North. I have watched the growth of the Publishing House and have felt the keenest interest in it. The appeal that has been made to these young men and women, to say in their hearts 'Here am I, Lord, send me', means advancement, means growth to the work."

The following quotation is taken from a personal letter from V. L. Mann M. D., written April 30, which we believe will be interesting to the readers:-

"Some years have passed since we have had the opportunity of coming in contact with each other. Many changes have taken place in our lives since we first met; this was about ten years ago. At that time I hardly think that we could have predicted what was in store for us.

"By the time you receive this letter the grandest meeting in the history of our people will be almost finished. The extent of this meeting shows the progress of the third angel's message during the last four years; but what about the next four years before us? This we will have to leave to the wisdom of God, but in the face of our looking for a sooncoming Saviour, greater achievements must be accomplished by this people. India, China, and Africa are still before us with their unwarned millions.

"We feel that our medical work in the foreign field, if properly organized, will be one great factor in bringing this work to a close. One of our dispensaries will come in contact with 15.000 to 25,000 souls a year. This is quite small when compared to India's total population, but a number of dispensaries in a number of years will make quite a show-

"Twenty thousand dollars of the \$300,000 fund was to go to our medical work in India, but unfortunately for India this fund was cut short before our \$20,000 dollars came in. To make up for this disappointment the General Conference has set apart the donations of the Sabbath-schools on the thirteenth Sabbath of the second quarter of this year. The plans outlined for the use of this money are set forth in the Review and local papers. They are for a medical training-school We are nearing the time for this offering which comes June 28th. We are looking to the Sabbath-schools in America to give us a good donation on that day."
