

Of Interest to Our People Especially in Mississippi

For the benefit of those living in the State of Mississippi who have property and money willed to the cause, we are publishing the statute of that State and the opinion of C. J. Cooper, a judge of that State.

\$5,384.00 to Missions in June—Shall We Do It?

It will be readily understood, after reading the statute and the opinion, that no individual can make a will to a church and have it probated in that State.

It is far better for an individual to give all property as far as possible while living in any State, even though the law does not prevent them giving it at death. There are those who grasp after money, and at one's death they have no conscience whatever in the matter, but will go to any extreme to secure the same.

The following is the statute and opinion above referred to:—

"STATUTE OF MORTMAIN: SEC. 5090, CODE 1906"

"Every devise or bequest of land, tenements or hereditaments, or any interest thereon, or free-hold or less than free-hold, either present or future, vested or contingent, or of any money directed to be raised by the sale thereof, contained in any last will and testament, or codicil, or other testamentary writing in favor of any religious or ecclesiastical corporation, sole or aggregate, or any religious or ecclesiastical, or to any religious denomination or association of persons, or to any person or body politic, in trust, either express or implied, secret or resulting, either for the use and benefit of such religious corporation, society, denomination, or association, or for the purpose of being given or appropriated to charitable uses or purposes, shall be null and void, and the heirs at law shall take the property so devised or bequeathed, as though no testamentary disposition had been made."

"The constitutional provisions have no relation to the intention of the testator, nor do they regulate the manner in which he may make and publish his will. The question is,

not what was his will, but it is, what is the will of the people of the State. Manifestly, the purpose of the constitution is to prevent one who will not be charitable at his own expense from being so at the expense of his heir at law. One may yet "sell all that he hath, and give to the poor," but he may not keep his grip on his estate until death relaxes his grasp, and then, at the expense of wife and child, devote it to religious uses.

"Opinion delivered by C. J. Cooper, of Mississippi."

On page 154 of "Testimonies for the Church," Vol. 5, we find the following paragraph, which taken with the above is very suggestive:—

"I saw that many withhold from the cause while they live, quieting their consciences that they will be charitable at death; they hardly dare exercise faith and trust in God to give anything while living. But this death-bed charity is not what Christ requires of his followers; it can not excuse the selfishness of the living. Those who hold fast their property until the last moment, surrender it to death rather than to the

cause. Losses are occurring continually. Banks fail, and property is consumed in very many ways. Many purpose to do something, but they delay the matter, and Satan works to prevent the means from coming into the treasury at all. It is lost before it is returned to God, and Satan exults that it is so."

A Temperance Campaign Item

THE old proverb "Strike while the iron is hot" fits at the present time in the temperance campaign. Our people are doing something in that direction we are glad to say, but are we doing all that we can? So far as activities are concerned we ought to be "the head and not the tail" by virtue of the message we are commissioned to give to the world.

An interesting item comes to this office from a sister living in Oil City, Pa. In a letter she says, "I think you will be interested to hear that a large roll of petitions will be sent to Washington in behalf of the passage of resolutions proposing nation-wide prohibition. I obtained about 300 names. An evangelist held some meetings here in a large tabernacle and presented strong temperance sermons. I called upon him and explained the work I was doing and asked him if he would like to cooperate in the work and present my petition to his congregation. My sister attended one of the meetings and she informed me that a minister read the national prohibition petition and said he hoped all would sign it. Hundreds were circulated to the congregation of about five thousand. She said it read the same as mine, so I presume

copies were made of it. I have sold eighty-seven *Instructors* while securing names, and distributed Doctor Ruble's tract on "Liquor, Poverty, and Crime."

SEND IN PETITIONS

We desire to again urge that our people send in letters and petitions to the Senate and House of Representatives favoring the passage of the joint resolutions providing for national prohibition. As stated in another article, address the Senate letter or petition to Honorable Lee S. Overman, acting chairman of the Judiciary Committee of the Senate; and send the petition or letter intended for the House to Honorable Henry D. Clayton, House of Representatives, both Washington, D. C.

many souls will be saved in the kingdom of God as the result of the efforts put forth by these young men and women this summer.


THE SALE OF OUR LARGE BOOKS

The following paper was written for a bookmen's convention by Brother N. H. Conway, one of our most successful field agents, and who has had a long experience in handling the larger books. As we have never seen better territory for our large books than is to be found in the Southern and Southeastern Union Conferences, we believe that Brother Conway's article, especially the instruction it contains from the spirit of prophecy, will be of timely help and interest and that it is worthy of our most careful consideration.

"THE OBJECT"

"The object of their sale is of the greatest importance in this world, and that is leading souls into a full knowledge of the great truths held by us as a people, constituting the last warning message to the earth before the coming of our Saviour, and which will save souls from sin and eternal death.

"Our large books consist of such books as 'Daniel and the Revelation,' 'Great Controversy,' 'Bible Readings,' 'Desire of Ages,' 'Patriarchs and Prophets,' and others. Almost all these books contain the message in its fulness, at least to such an extent that they develop converts to the message. In

This was a splendid class of young people, and we understand the largest ever sent out from Graysville into the colporteur field. According to the best information we have been able to obtain up to this writing, there will be nearly one hundred and fifty student colporteurs at work during the next few days in the territory of the Southern Publishing Association. This large number will be, indeed, a strong reinforcement to our colporteur ranks; and we shall pray that

some instances people have been found in full harmony with the truths that we hold, having been developed through reading one of our large books.

"We have other large books that should be sold; also our small books have their place in giving this message, and should be sold; but the books mentioned above bear the more important place, in that they contain the message in its fulness.

"FINANCIAL RETURNS"

"Financial returns are needed for our colporteurs' support. It is important that our colporteurs make a financial suc-

cess of their work; and for this reason it is essential that they sell our large books, as the returns from the sale of the large books is much greater than from the small books. Those who make a study of the large books, and have learned to sell them, find it as easy to sell a three- or five-dollar book as it is to sell one for seventy-five cents, a dollar, or a dollar and a half, and the returns to the colporteurs are oftentimes more than twice as much. If the colporteur fails to get returns enough from his work, he will be a failure, must desert the field and take up some other line of work for a livelihood. That is, his work is a failure as far as finances are concerned, and his work must stop. It is much easier to make expenses in a field with the large book while out taking orders before the delivery comes, as many times he can make a profit on his expense with the large book, when he can not in placing one of the small books, for many times we find people who want the books but do not feel able to pay the full price for them. But the colporteur can tactfully offer to help them by staying all night or taking dinner with them, and allowing them a discount on the order. By doing this he can pay his way and place a book in a home that otherwise would be left without the message. They never charge as much for these accommodations as the profit on a large book would be, so you can see how the plan of making a profit on the expense in the field works out; if he were selling a small book it would take all his profit to pay these bills.

"Financial returns are needed by the tract societies for aggressive work. Were it not for the returns from the sale of our large books coming into our tract societies in an almost constant stream, some of them would soon have to close their doors; but as it is now, many of our tract societies are able to help many of our faithful colporteurs over hard places until they can make successful deliveries, and in many cases they turn over to the conference treasury large sums at the end of the year to be turned into the tithe fund, and thus help to spread the message by the living preacher.

"Every tract society should be allowed enough of its net earnings to carry on its work successfully, and to do this it must have funds at its command to help workers in the field just at the time they need it. Many a good colporteur can be saved to the work if he can be carried over some of the hard places that come in the experience of most every one, by receiving a little financial help.

"The returns to the publishing house are greater on most of our large books in proportion to the cost of production and price, than on the small books, and I think all are aware of the great need of our publishing houses — of finances to maintain their work and pay off large debts incurred because of publishing so much of our literature at a loss, and other causes.

"The sale of our large books is urged by the spirit of prophecy. In Testimonies, Vol. 7, p. 138, we find these words:—

"“Ye are my witnesses, saith the Lord,” “to proclaim liberty to the captives, and the opening of the prison to them that are bound; to proclaim the acceptable year of the Lord, and the day of vengeance of our God.”

"Our publishing work was established by the direction of God and under his special supervision. It was designed to accomplish a specific purpose. Seventh-day Adventists have been chosen by God as a peculiar people, separate from the world. By the great cleaver of truth he has cut them out from the quarry of the world, and brought them into connection with himself. He has made them his representatives, and has called them to be ambassadors for him in the last work of salvation.

"Our publications have a most sacred work to do in making clear, simple and plain, the spiritual basis of our faith. Everywhere the people are taking sides; all are ranging themselves either under the banner of truth and righteousness or under the banner of the apostate powers that are contending for the supremacy at this time. . . . God's message to the world is to be given with such prominence and power that the people will be brought face to face, mind to mind, heart to heart, with truth. They must be brought to see its superiority over the multitudinous errors that are pushing their way into notice, to supplant, if possible, the Word of God for this solemn time. The great object of our publications is to exalt God, to call men's attention to the living truths of his Word.

"Let more time be given to the publication and circulation of books containing present truth. Call attention to books dwelling on practical faith and godliness and to those that treat on the prophetic Word. The people are to be educated to read the sure word of prophecy in the light of the living oracles. They need to know that the signs of the times are fulfilling.

"Let our publishing houses do all in their power to diffuse to the world the light of heaven. . . . Instruction has been given to me that the important books containing the light that God has given regarding Satan's apostasy in heaven, should be given a wide circulation just now; for through them the truth will reach many minds. "Patriarchs and Prophets," "Daniel and the Revelation," and "Great Controversy" are needed now as never before; they should be widely circulated because the truths they emphasize will open many eyes. Many of our people have been blinded to the importance of the very books that were most needed. Had tact and skill been shown in the sale of these books, the Sunday movement would not be where it is to-day.

"“Daniel and the Revelation,” “Great Controversy,” and “Patriarchs and Prophets” will make their way; they contain the very best message that the people must have, and special light God has given his people. The angels of God prepare the way for these books in the hearts of the people. Of all the books that have come from the press, those mentioned have been of greatest consequence in the past and are at the present time.”

"The larger books should be sold everywhere. These books contain present truth, truth that is to be proclaimed to all parts of the world. Our colporteurs are to circulate the books that give definite instructions regarding the testing messages that are to prepare a people to stand on the platform of eternal truth, holding aloft the banner on which is inscribed the commandments of God and the faith of Jesus.

"DEVELOPS STRONG MEN"

"The fact that the sale of our large books develops strong men is evident by the results we see to-day, as most of the men in responsible positions in this cause have at some time been salesmen for our large books, and most of them had their beginning in the work in this way.

"One can not become a successful salesman for our large books unless he studies them carefully and gets the truths they contain woven into his life, and made a part of him; and when he does this he is bound to become strong in the faith and will have power with God and man.

"So I hope to see more of those who think they can not sell our large books because of the high price, consecrate themselves to the Lord and his work, study these books, make the truths they contain a part of their lives, and when they do this they will be well able to sell them to the people."

As many, many of our colporteurs can testify, the angels of God do prepare the way for the sale of our large books,

and thus success is attained which would otherwise be impossible. Although some have said in the past that the large books could not be sold in this field, yet splendid results are being obtained at the present time by those who are taking up their sale. We trust it will not be long until many others will unite with us in this good work.

We see this scripture being fulfilled to-day. When God's people pray, souls are saved. When they pray, colporteurs have success in placing our literature in the homes of the people. So we earnestly beseech our brethren to pray for us.

The workers are having wonderful experiences. Brother Rowe writes from Allen County: "I spent the Sabbath with Brother Williams at Scottsville. I will start out here in the morning. Pray God to bless in our work here. I had to walk eighty miles to get with him. When I reached Green River I was O, so tired, and my feet were blistered. The bank of the river for one hundred feet on both sides, was from four to six inches deep in mud. I had to take off my shoes and roll up my trousers to my knees and wade the mud, and when I got across I had to walk a quarter of a mile on rocks before I could wash my feet. So I struck some sharp ones, cutting my feet, and the blood was running out. I said, 'Praise God, this is nothing to compare with the blood running down from the thorns on the Saviour's head.' I am glad I am here with Brother Williams."

The next letter brought this report: "I gave this county a good test this week, and God has been with me. He has given me some wonderful experiences, and \$154.90 worth of orders."

The Lord is blessing all the workers, and we are expecting blessings from him in the weeks to come. Courage is expressed in every letter, and we are going to finish the work one of these days. Let others join us.

Brother Reichenbach is now locating his family here at Nicholasville. He will canvass Bourbon County. Sister Reichenbach will handle magazines in the surrounding towns. His oldest daughter will canvass for "Easy Steps" to earn

He averaged \$4.18 per day for the time put in. His part from the sale of the books amounted to \$1.99 for each hour put in. What do you think about it, dear reader? If every Sabbath-keeper in the Georgia Conference would do as Brother Smith did last year, at the end of 1914 our sales would amount to \$108,750, counting five hundred Sabbath-keepers in the Georgia Conference.

This amount would almost be equal to what the union sold during 1913.

Are You Using Acid-raised Crackers?

SOME weeks ago under "Some Food Facts," we stated that practically all the common crackers sold in the stores contained bi-carbonate of soda and muriatic (hydrochloric) acid. Our statement was not denied, nor can it be; but it has been said that as bi-carbonate of soda and hydrochloric acid make only common salt, they are harmless when used in raising crackers and other bread. To those who hold this opinion, the following from "The Complete Bread, Cake and Cracker Baker," a standard authority with bakers, will be of interest:—

"The class of substances thus introduced into bread, etc., are not nutritious; they rather exert a disturbing action upon the healthy organism, and although their use may be tolerated for convenience, yet they should in all cases be used with great judgment, and in the least possible quantities that will effect the objects in view, either to produce a proper lightness or to neutralize and remove acidity. This is the best that can be said of the chemical substances used in raising bread and cakes, even when pure; but as commonly obtained, they are apt to be contaminated with impurities still more objectionable than themselves. For example, the commercial muriatic acid which is commonly employed along with bi-carbonate of soda, is almost always impure, often containing chlorine, chloride of iron, sulphurous acid, and even arsenic, so that the chemist never uses it without a tedious process of purification for his purposes, which are of far less importance than its employment in the diet. While common hydrochloric acid sells for three cents per pound wholesale, the pure article is sold for thirty-five cents.

"It will thus be seen that the chemical substances employed by the baker to give lightness to his products are not only liable to injure by ingredients which they conceal, but by their irregular composition must often more or less defeat the ends for which they are intended."

Our food factories are not operated for the purpose of making money, but to place within the reach of our people foods free from the objectionable things used so freely in commercial breads.
