"The World's Crisis"

ACCORDING to the information obtainable at this writing, considerably over 100,000 copies of the new book, "The World's Crisis," have been sold in two months by our three publishing houses. This seems the more remarkable in view of the fact that but a comparatively small number were sold by our regular colporteurs, as the book is hardly appropriate to be used as a "help" inasmuch as it makes prominent certain doctrinal features. It therefore means that these books have been disposed of by our ministers, Bible workers, and the lay members of our churches.

The Lord has said that the work "in this earth can never be finished until the men and women comprising our churchmembership rally to the work, and unite their efforts with those of ministers and church officers." The above report indicates that a goodly number of our people are beginning to realize this, and are therefore taking an active part in helping to give the message at this time. May it inspire still others to delay no longer, for it becomes more and more evident from the events now transpiring that what is done, must be done quickly.

For home workers, ministers, Bible workers, and the lay members of our churches, as well as our isolated brethren and sisters, there is no better small book with which to do aggressive missionary work at this particular time than "The World's Crisis." It meets the present situation, and shows the meaning of the events which are now taking place with such rapidity that it is difficult to keep up with them. The book contains 128 pages, and is well illustrated. The paper covers are printed in two colors. As this is a photograph of Turkish cavalry on the march, it is all the more attractive just now in view of the effort that is being made on the part of the allies to take the Dardanelles and Constantinople. From the reports and letters that are being received, it would seem that the book has only gotten nicely started. Some who only ordered a few copies at first, have found that they were so easily disposed of that they are sending in their orders for much larger quantities.

This little book gives the message, and now is the time to circulate it. While our colporteurs are selling the larger books, "The World's Crisis" affords opportunity for all to have a part in the blessed work of scattering the printed page.

True Sabbath Observance

1. WHAT does the Bible say God did at the close of creation week? Ex. 31: 17. "He rested, and was refreshed."

2. Does God become weary and need physical rest? Isa. 40: 28. It follows then that his must have been a spiritual rest and refreshing.

3. What did God do after his rest upon the seventh day was finished? Gen. 2: 3, and Ex. 20: 11. "Blessed, hallowed, and sanctified" it. Blessed -- "Bestowed a blessing upon," "Made or declared to be holy; appropriated to sacred uses, consecrated; as, God blessed the Sabbath."- Standard Dictionary. God bestowed a blessing upon the seventh day, declared it to be holy, appropriated it to sacred uses, and consecrated it, at the close of creation week.

The words "sanctified" and "hallowed" have practically the same meaning.

4. When God blesses anything, for how long a time is it blessed? I Chron. 17:27.

5. Could not the apostles change the Sabbath? Num. 24: 20. In this instance a prophet of God tried to reverse God's blessing, but after exhausting all his resources in the effort, he acknowledged that it could not be done.

Since God placed no limitation on his blessing, and no man can reverse it, it follows that as often as this earth measures off seven revolutions, so often will it bring a day on which rests God's special blessing.

6. For whom was the Sabbath made? Mark 2:27. Since it was made at the close of creation week, as the above scriptures show. it is evident that it was made for man in his sinless state, while he was yet in Eden.

7. Will it be observed in the earth made new, when Eden is restored? Isa. 66: 22, 23.

8. Will the redeemed in the new earth need physical rest? Isa. 40:31; "Great Controversy," page 676, third paragraph, "None will need or desire repose."

It follows, therefore, that while the element of physical rest enters into Sabbath-keeping, the physical rest is not the primary element, but it is the spiritual refreshing.

9. What preparation should be made for the Sabbath before it comes? Ex. 16:23.

"All through the week we are to have the Sabbath in mind, and be making preparation to keep it according to the commandment."-" Testimonies," Vol. VI, p. 353.

"On Friday let the preparation for the Sabbath be completed. See that all the clothing is in readiness, and that all the cooking is done. Let the boots be blacked, and the baths be taken.

. . Before the setting of the sun, let all secular work be laid aside, and all secular papers be put out of sight. . . . We should jealously guard the edges of the Sabbath. . . .

"There is another work that should receive attention on the preparation day. On this day all differences between brethren, whether in the family or in the church, should be put away.

"Before the Sabbath begins, the mind as well as the body should be withdrawn from worldly business."- Pages 355, 356.

10. When should we begin and end the Sabbath? Lev. 23: 32; Neh. 13: 19; Mark 1: 32. God began the work of creation while darkness covered the earth, so the dark part of the first day came before the light part. And when the darkness came again, the second day began, and so on; so the first chapter of Genesis says, "The evening and the morning were the . . . day." This same order must be observed in keeping the Sabbath.

11. How should the Sabbath be ushered in? "Before the setting of the sun, let the members of the family assemble to read God's word, to sing and pray." Vol. VI, page 356.

12. Is it proper to make purchases on the Sabbath? Neh. 13: 15-18.

13. What is the Sabbath declared to be? Lev. 23: 3. "Convocation," "Religious assembly"- Smith's Bible Dictionary. Thus it is seen that the Sabbath is to be closely associated with "a religious assembly." In this our duty to attend religious service on the Sabbath is clearly indicated.

14. Besides the time occupied in the religious assembly, how should the remainder of the Sabbath be spent? Isa. 58: 13.

'Let not the precious hours of the Sabbath be wasted in bed. On Sabbath morning the family should be astir early. . . . The Sabbath School and the meeting for worship occupy only a part of the Sabbath. The portion remaining to the family may be made the most sacred and precious season of all the Sabbath hours. Much of this time parents shouldspend with their children. In many families the younger children are left to themselves, to find entertainment as best they can. Left alone, the children soon become restless, and begin to play, or engage in some kind of mischief. Thus the Sabbath has to them no sacred significance. In pleasant weather let parents walk with their children in the fields and groves. Amid the beautiful things of nature tell them the reason for the institution of the Sabbath."- Vol. VI, pages 357, 358.

15. Are works of necessity and mercy lawful on the Sabbath days? Matt. 12: 1-12.

16. What does it mean to do unnecessary work on the Sabbath? Num. 15: 30, 31. The one so doing reproaches the Lord. 17. Give an example. Verses 32-36.

18. Is God as particular now, and will the transgressor be

eventually punished? 2 Peter 2:9.

It becomes evident then that everything of a secular nature, even to thinking our own thoughts, unless it be a work of necessity or mercy should be laid aside on the Sabbath, that the time may be spent in serious meditation, prayer, talking of the things pertaining to the kingdom of God, and in religious worship.

19. In what way should we part with the Sabbath hours? "As the sun goes down, let the voice of prayer and the hymn of praise mark the close of the sacred hours, and invite God's presence through the cares of the week of labor.

"Thus parents can make the Sabbath as it should be, the most joyful day of the week. They can lead their children to regard it as a delight, the day of days, the holy of the Lord, honorable.

"I counsel you, my brethren and sisters, 'Remember the Sabbath day, to keep it holy.' If you desire your children to observe the Sabbath according to the commandment, you must teach them by both precept and example. The deep engraving of truth in the heart is never wholly effaced. It may be obscured, but can never be obliterated. The impressions made in early life will be seen in after years. Circumstances may occur to separate the children from their parents and their home, but as long as they live the instruction given in childhood and youth will be a blessing."— Vol. VI, page 359.

Colored Institute at Greenville

THE colored institute that has just closed was enjoyed by each one who had the privilege of attending. Twelve took the drill and expect to at once enter the work. The burden of the institute fell upon Brother J. W. Davis. My wife had just passed through a very severe operation and was dangerously ill and I could not be present until the institute was almost half over.

Brother D. V. Barnes conducted the morning worship, assisted by others a few times. Many helpful lessons were brought out. All manifested a real spirit of consecration, feeling that the love God bestows upon us is to help us in our greatest trials and difficulties. "If thou hast run with the footmen, and they have wearied thee, then how canst thou contend with horses?" or "how wilt thou do in the swelling of Jordan?" The Lord has made a promise to fit every trial and to cover every difficulty and sealed it with an oath. We dishonor him by doubting his word and limiting his power.

The last day was a good day to all. As each one told of how the truth came to him the tender Spirit of God was present in a very marked manner.

Sister Murphy: "The truth came to me under quite trying circumstances. The white workers had been driven out of town, the church closed, and the meetings stopped. We were fearful of our lives. Meeting one another on the streets we would whisper where the meetings would be held the next Sabbath, as we passed each other, not daring to stop and talk.

One Sabbath several policemen came along the streets telling the people to go down to the Adventist church and get their people out as they were going down to hang those who were left. The meeting was broken up. During the many years of my colporteur experience the Lord has allowed me to see some fruit of my labors. My zeal and courage is good, and I return to work with a greater determination to do more for my Master than ever before."

Sister Billups: "The Lord has given me good health for which I am thankful. I don't want any one to meet the Saviour in the clouds before I do. I am glad I can return to the field and do something for Jesus. You wouldn't think I could go so fast but often when I am going along the road in a deep study, some one will call out, 'Good lady, why are you going so fast?' I wouldn't know I was going so fast until my attention was called to it. I mean to go out in the field and do all I can for Jesus so that when he comes in the clouds I can look up and say 'Lo, this is my God; I have waited for him and he will save me.' ''

Sister Johnson: "One day a man came to our house and tried to sell me a harp. He played a few sweet melodies and asked me if I wouldn't like to buy. I did wish to but he wouldn't sell me the harp. He showed me "Gospel Primer" and "Story of Joseph" and I bought them. He came back and gave us readings and I accepted the truth. Desiring to work for the little books I made a trial of ten. These were quickly sold. Another ten, and still another ten, were just as quickly sold, and in a short time three hundred were disposed of for cash. Then followed my experience with the large book. Last fall I was out early one morning delivering. I tried at several houses to get something to eat and was despairing of getting anything when on reaching a house where I had sold a book, I was offered something by the man of the house.

"Fearing it might consist of pork and coffee I asked for other things. This created an inquiry as to why I did not eat these things. I let the Bible answer their questions and read them the texts. They were surprised that the Bible taught this and decided to obey at once. Later other studies and readings were held with them and now eight are keeping the Sabbath. Heretofore my husband has stayed at home but this year he plans to go with me. I want to stay in the work until the Lord says it is enough."

Sister Jacob: "A family of Adventists lived near us but their strange way of keeping the Sabbath was looked upon and talked about by all as though they were infidels or heathens. One day my husband was given a tract. He brought it home and I put it up behind a picture over the mantle. One day while dusting I took it down and read it. I became interested. Later this man's wife visited me and explained why she kept Saturday for Sunday. I began a diligent study of the Bible and saw they were right. Almost half the afternoon and night was spent in making preparation to keep my first Sabbath. I soon learned when to begin keeping it. I was baptized and, like our blessed Saviour who was bruised for our iniquities, I too have been made to drink from the same bitter cup but none of these things move me." .

Sister McElroy: "I found the truth upon the picnic ground in the southern part of the State. Our tent was shot into, later cut down, and we were warned to leave. My husband left me, my friends forsook me, and my home was broken up but through it all the Lord has cared for me and I rejoice to be counted worthy of a part in his work."

Space will not permit of my telling how others were led to keep the Sabbath through the efforts of the colporteurs. The institute closed with the following resolutions:

Recognizing our Heavenly Father's care over us during the past year and in bringing us together in another institute, we, the colporteurs of the Mississippi Mission, offer the following vote of thanks to the Mississippi Tract Society for their cruse of oil and barrel of meal in bringing us to this meeting. May it never slacken nor fail as we shall need to come again another year. We thank our instructors for the patient and valuable instruction they gave us, as it will encourage us to press on and do our part in the finishing of the work.

We extend our thanks to Brother and Sister Barnes for the excellent table they spread for us. When out on the battle field of life, hungry and weak, our memories will go back to their dear home with its sweet, quiet, Christian influence.

A little lunch was served, before we separated, of fruits and

drink which brought forcibly to all our minds the time when the Saviour will cause us to sit down to that table spread with the bounties of heaven and he himself will serve us. All felt that that time was near at hand and returned to their fields of labor determined to do all they could to interest others in that great feast. With such an experience and spirit of consecration we look for good results from each of these workers during the year 1915. VIRGIL SMITH.


