
#### The Jackson Church

As we leave the work in Jackson to go to Paducah, our new field of labor, our minds naturally run back over the past two years that we have labored in this field. While we do not see as much accomplished as we would like, yet the Lord has blessed us in many ways and we give him all the praise for what has been done. As we go to labor in other parts of the field our earren and sisters throughout the conference for help in this time of need.

Now, brethren and sisters, this is a worthy cause, and money invested in the Jackson church will be treasure stored up in heaven as verily as if sent to a foreign field. This church stands as a monument to the third angel's message, and will be a factor in bringing into the truth people who will be saved in the king-

nest prayer is that the Lord's blessings will continue to be with the brethren and sisters in Jackson, and that many of our friends, who h a v e learned to know a nd believe the truth, will yet see the importance of obedience to all the commandments of God.

As a direct result of the efforts put forth the churchmembership has grown from seven to twenty, the Sabbath School from thirteen to thirtyeight, and the place of worship from a small room in Brother T. J. Frye's home to a commodious little

church as shown by the accompanying cut. The church is located in one of the best parts of the city, on the corner of Deaderick Avenue and Long Street, two blocks from the West Jackson car-line. The building consists of an auditorium 24x34 feet and a church school room 16x20 feet. These rooms are connected by folding doors 7x12 feet, and when thrown together give a seating capacity of one hundred and fifty people. This property has cost approximately \$1,250. Many of our friends will remember that the first call for money was made the latter part of July, 1914, and we wish to take this opportunity to thank those who responded so liberally to this worthy cause. The Lord also blessed our efforts beyond our expectations in raising money in the city of Jackson. As a result the larger part of the cost has been paid, but there still remains an indebtedness of \$450. The brethren and sisters in Jackson are moving out by faith and are doing all within their power to raise this money. Every one can readily see that it will be hard for a small church to raise this amount in territory that has already been worked. Therefore I am sending an appeal to the breth-

### What It Means

THE writer, in company with Brother Ernest Lloyd, is spending some time on the coast in the interest of the home missionary work. We are visiting the larger churches and institutions in the Pacific Union, and, according to present plans, will hold services in some one of the churches every evening for several weeks Already we have visited Fresno, Bakersfield, Redlands, Loma Linda, Riverside, Pomona, Pasadena, and Long Beach.

We find our people ready for service; all they need is to be shown how. The simplest kinds of work must be devised and set in operation. We are delighted to meet with our people in their home churches, and speak with them, but we feel we must engage them in service, enlarge previous plans, lengthen the cords and strengthen the stakes. We believe the greatest good that can be done our churches is to set them to work. A careful districting of territory is necessary. Every member is to be shown how to work and assigned a responsibility. Every heart is to be consecrated, every hand filled with literature, and we know of nothing better to work with than our good old pioneer missionary paper, the Signs of the Times. Two copies a member is the goal, and surely every one can handle that many. Just think what it would mean to this division if this goal were reached. We would appeal to every loyal heart to enter heartily into the plan and do at least this much. Five cents a week will pay for these two copies, and there will be a margin of profit at the close of the year for foreign missions.

## Of General Interest

#### Report of Sister White's Condition

DURING the past two weeks there has been but very little change in mother's condition. She continues to say that she has but little suffering, and when told of the messages of love from many friends, she says, "Tell them I am doing well."

Last Sabbath she was too weak for any conversation until evening. Then, when I told her of the blessing bestowed upon the meetings held at the sanitarium by Elder MacGuire, she said, "Thank the Lord for his blessing." When I asked if she was comfortable she said, "I am not suffering very much. I am thankful that things are as well as they are."

Sunday evening, April 18, mother was sitting in her big bay window, with a copy of "Desire of Ages" in her hands. I sat down beside her and spoke of the precious truths which the book contains, and of the good that is being accomplished by it and her other books in bringing souls to Christ. I told her that her books are being circulated more and more. To this she replied:

"Keep it up, keep it up. Do not be discouraged. Do what you know to be right, though others may object.

"I want the truth to stand out in its beauty. I get extremely tired of nonentities. Let us not serve the devil in that way.

"I do not say that I am perfect, but I am trying to be perfect. I do not expect others to be perfect; and if I could not associate with my brethren and sisters who are not perfect, I do not know what I should do.

"I try to treat the matter the best that I can, and am thankful that I have a spirit of uplifting and not a spirit of crushing down. Yes, I am going to make that appear just as much as possible. No one is perfect. If one were perfect, he would be prepared for heaven. As long as we are not perfect, we have a work to do to get ready to be perfect. We have a mighty Saviour."

In answer to the question if she had had a comfortable day, she said, "I cannot say that I have been uncomfortable. I am very thankful that the day has passed so pleasantly.

"I am going to keep my mind as much as ever I can on the prominent things of eternal life. They are not dwelt upon enough. I rejoice that I have that faith that takes hold of the promises of God, that works by love and sanctifies the soul. A sanctified soul will not blunder a great deal. It will not keep talking, talking, talking about what this one should do, and what that one should do. The Lord wants us each to do all we possibly can, and fight the good fight of faith. That is what I mean to do. I will not give up to a mind of despondency."

After prayer she said, "I try to keep my eyes fixed upon the blessings, fixed upon that to which I wish to be conformed. Let us think and talk more of the things that pertain to salvation. Thus we can be a help and a blessing to others."

Those who know her experience feel that the Lord is very merciful to mother, in that she suffers so little, and in that her courage and faith are steadfast.

#### Report of the Fireside Correspondence School for 1914

THE Fireside Correspondence School sends greetings to its many friends and patrons throughout the world, and hopes they will be interested in the following report of its work for the year ending December 31, 1914, in comparison with former years:

*Enrolment.* The number of new students enrolled for 1910 was 175; for 1911, 162; for 1912, 125; for 1913, 229; for 1914, 215. Total, 906.

*Field.* Our field is the world. Besides the United States and Canada, we have students in Africa, Argentina, Brazil, Central America, China, England, Egypt, Friendly Islands, Hawaii, Java, Korea, and Scotland.

Finances. The receipts and expenditures year by year since the school began are given below:

Excess of expenditures over receipts during the five years of the school's existence, \$790.58.

Excess of receipts over expenditures for 1914, \$442.55.

Lessons Corrected. During the year 3,473 lessons were corrected, of which 720 were in Bible Doctrines, 336 in Grammar, 312 in Literature, 234 in Composition-Rhetoric, 194 in Church History, 155 in Algebra, 149 in New Testament Greek, 136 in Public Speaking, 119 in College Rhetoric, 123 in General History, 126 in Latin I, and 139 in Bookkeeping. Lower numbers not enumerated. We have no records for comparison with previous years.

Certificates Issued. It takes considerable grit and perseverence to push steadily through to the end of a course of study of forty, or even twenty, lessons. So it does to make a success of anything. Where is the army of students who enter the academic grades as compared with the few who finish a college course? They have fallen out by the way. So with many who begin work in the Correspondence School. The majority do not complete the subjects they begin; but we are glad to note a steady increase in the numbers of the faithful few, as shown by the following record of certificates issued for subjects satisfactorily completed: For 1910, 3; 1911, 24; 1912, 34; 1913, 46; 1914, 52. Total, 159, or about seventeen and one-half per cent of the total enrolment.

#### **Being Lights**

"YE ARE the light of the world." Matt. 5: 14. Simply the fact of our being lighted is not the end of the Christian's life - not even our being lighted from above. Our being "lights" - that is the end. In every age God has had his children in the world as "lights." But today he designs that they should shine brighter than at any previous time. "In a special sense Seventh-day Adventists have been set in the world as watchmen and light-bearers. To them has been entrusted the last warning for a perishing world. On them is shining wonderful light from the Word of God. They have been given a work of the most solemn import - the proclamation of the first, second, and third angels' messages. There is no other work of so great importance. They are to allow nothing else to absorb their attention."—"Testimonies for the Church," Vol. IX, p. 19. Truly it is a wonderful privilege to occupy such a position in the plan of God.

Now, in order that we may be bright and shining lights, it is necessary that we be closely connected with the great Source of all light. The moon shines with the borrowed light of the sun. It shines brightly when in the right place; however, when the earth comes in between it and the sun, it becomes dark. Likewise, we have some moonlit Christians, who are bright enough when lighted by some special favor from God, but if the darkness of earth — a trial, sorrow, or burden — comes in between them and God, everything becomes dark, and they sink into despair. Those who have been buried with Christ in baptism are to rise to newness of life, giving a living representation of the life of Christ. Upon us is laid a sacred charge. The commission has been given us: 'Go ye therefore, and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Ghost: teaching them to observe all things whatsoever I have commanded you: and, lo, I am with you alway, even unto the end of the world!' Matt. 28: 19, 20, margin."—" Testimonies for the Church," Vol. IX, p. 20.

Thus we are dedicated to the work of God, of making known to others the plan of salvation, of being true lights in this dark world of sin. The perfection of heaven is to be our power. Listen to our Lord: "All power is given unto me in heaven and in earth." That is your power; and it is heaven's own. "Go ye therefore, and make disciples." (Margin.)
