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Plan to Provide Workers

Last week's issue of the SOUTHERN UNION WORKER we trust was read with especial interest. This number was intended to create an interest in educational lines. It will now only be a few months until all our schools will open their doors for the beginning of another year's work, and then it will be too late with many to prepare. Every church elder should study his church with the view of securing to each young person in his organization the privilege of a Christian education.

We are soon to be plunged into the experiences of our brethren in the old world, and when that time comes, it will be very difficult, and probably more so than it is for them, to do the work that can be done today. The privileges of this day should be appreciated and improved by every believer in the prophecies. Will it not be possible for every church elder to create a desire in his church for education? We ought to see every young man and woman who has ability in the field earning a scholarship in some way. Our publishing houses, tract societies, and schools offer large inducements for scholarships by the sale of books. When there is a will there is always a way, and we are told by the spirit of prophecy that all our young people can secure an education if the proper effort is put forth. All our schools should be crowded to their utmost capacity, and not a young person in all this field should be deprived of the privilege of entering into the work and doing his part in the spread of the great message that means so much to the world. The Lord has promised to use the young people who prepare for this work, and we as guardians of the flock, ministers, elders of churches, and parents, are responsible for the training of the youth; for God cannot use them unless they have the proper preparation. The children are to be used, but they cannot be used unless they have Christ-like characteristics.

Let us now rally to this work, and when the summer of 1916 is ended, may it be found that we have done well our work, and God will bless abundantly every individual who perseveres to this end. S. E. 

The Lord has given a work to his people in which all can have a part. We are told by the spirit of prophecy that, "If there is one work more important than another, it is that of getting our publications before the public, thus leading them to search the Scriptures."— Vol. IV, page 390.

There is a great work to be done in scattering our publications. All should feel that they can do something in this line of God's work. Again we read, in Vol. IV, page 600, "Our publications should have a wide circulation; for they are doing a great work." The products of our presses will become as great factors in the finishing of this message, as the printing-press did in the Reformation. This cannot be accomplished unless our books and pamphlets are placed in the hands of the people. God has spoken definitely upon this. "The press is a power, but if its products fall dead for want of men who will execute plans to widely circulate them, its power is lost." "Hundreds of men should be engaged in carrying the light all through our cities, villages, and towns."— Vol. IV, page 389.

We hope to see a large number of our people entering the canvassing work this summer. What greater and more noble occupation could one wish to be engaged in? The work of the Christian colporteur is that in which all heaven is interested, the salvation of precious souls, and will succeed. I again quote from the Testimonies. "The work of the colporteur is elevated and will prove a success, if he is honest, earnest, and patient, steadily pursuing the work he has undertaken. His heart must be in the work." "We must carry the publications to the people, and urge them to accept, showing them that they will receive much more than their money's worth. Exalt the value of the books you offer. You cannot exalt them too highly." — Vol. IV, pages, 603, 392.

We hope our ministers and elders of our churches will become burdened over the canvassing work, and do all in their power to interest such persons as should enter this line of God's work. We know that this work will succeed, for God has said through the spirit of prophecy, "*There is no such thing as failure in this work.*" Certainly this should not only be an encouragement to all, but an incentive for a large number in our conference to enlist in it this summer.
