The apostle exhorts, "Bear ye one another's burdens, and so fulfil the law of Christ." Gal. 6:2.

Christ is the great Burdenbearer. The prophet says of Him: "Surely He hath borne our griefs, and carried our sorrows...... And the Lord hath laid on Him the iniquity of us all." Isa. 53:4-6. In taking upon Himself our griefs and sins, He opened to us the door of hope for this world and the next. There are plenty of opportunities for burden-bearing.

"Life is indeed no holiday; therein Are want and woe and sin."

But in any case a few bright, pleasant words will awaken a quick response. The cheerful, sunny sympathy of unselfish love will touch the secret springs of the heart. And every attempt-

"To help to bear the burdens of their care By tender word, and loving look, and prayer,' will make the life a little brighter.

There are burdens of another kind that we must bear in some way, whether we will or not. The kinks and knots of human nature are past understanding, except by Him who "knoweth our frame," and "remembereth that we are dust." These infirmities of temper and disposition cause untold bitterness and heartache, and to meet them in the right spirit, a divine patience is needed. But we do not know "life's hidden forces." If we did—

"Could we but draw back the curtains That surround each other's lives, See the naked heart and spirit. Know what spur the action gives,"

often we should pity and forgive where now we blame.

Deep, tender, impartial sympathy is not natural to the human heart. There are human loves that are "strong as death," and capable of great self-surrender, as the love of a mother. But the strongest love, if it is not refined and quickened by divine grace, may be blind and partial, and fall into serious errors; for it has only human wisdom as its guide. The

results of misguided parental love are too often seen in the marred and deformed characters of the children; dispositions are formed that are a lifelong pain to those who must suffer from them.

In Christ we have an example of ideal love. There was no admixture of selfishness in the pity that led Him to exchange the peace and joy of heaven for the strife and hate and cruelty of earth. And He says to us, "Love one another as I have loved you." When we have this divine love in our hearts, we shall know how to bear "one another's burdens, and so fulfil the law of Christ."—E. J. There will be free literature to hand out to interested ones. Different members of the church will give their time to this excellent missionary enterprise.

Church clerks please be prompt in sending in your quarterly reports to the office. The following churches have not sent in reports for last quarter of 1917 with names and addresses of members: Bowling Green(white), Bowling Green (col.), Locust Branch, and Louisville (Shelby St.)

Bro. M. L. Howard is one of our latest recruits in the colporteur work. His first report shows orders to the amount of \$69.75. We expect Bro. Howard's son, Wayne, will be the next recruit, for he has ordered a prospectus for "Our Day."

Bro. Andy Schroader writes from Drakesboro: "You will no-

tice that on Monday, in eight hours, Brother Page and I secured orders amounting to \$144.00. Eighty-eight dollars of this was secured in about two hours, making an average of \$22 per hour for one man. To God be the praise." They finished their territory there and were unable to get to their new field in time to do more work that week, and this accounts for the few hours reported for the entire week.

Brother Miller sends us the following interesting item from Campbellsburg: "A lady who is a member of the W. C. T. U. told me that she believed in keeping Saturday for the Sabbath, and was trying to keep it. She would not give me an order for 'Daniel and Revelation,' but when I told her about the little book, 'The Christian Sabbath, 'she said, 'O, I want one right now,' and handed me 50 cents for it and gave me an order for 'Best Stories'." Brother Miller further states: "I shall try to boost a little more for Ooltewah from week to week. I hope to soon have my ten 'Cross and Its Shadow' sold and two 'Christ's Object Lessons.'"

The following is a good experience of Bro. M. L. Howard's: "A woman who had a Seventh-day Adventist book which was printed 40 years ago, had been wanting a 'Bible Readings' which was advertised in the old book. She gave me an order and asked many questions."

A letter just received from Bro. R. J. Hyatt, who is working near Bowling Green, gives the following experience: "I was to return to a house, for the man was not there when I first called. I returned and was impressed strongly to stay over night, but the man refused, and I did not think much

An Appeal to My Brethren

I cannot count the times that I have been asked to join in prayer with those in charge of the work in this the Tennessee River Conference for God to raise up workers and send them out with the printed page. I have gladly accepted every request, and just recently one in authority wrote me again asking me to pray with him.

At our institute at Jackson we earnestly prayed. Things looked dark, indeed; but we had the evidence that God was with us. Every week I anxiously look at the report in the WORKER; but sad indeed to see so few whose names are there as having done anything.

Will you not, my brother, or sister, take time to consider this

appeal? I am very fearful of your judgment before God and the angels. We cannot doubt the necessity of this work, for this message that has made us a people is a world-wide one, and is to go to every nation, tongue and people.

Neither can we doubt that God has led out in establishing publishing houses to print the literature. He has also with these caused us to build schools and colleges to prepare minds to meet the needs of the hour. Therefore we have most able writers of books, magazines, papers and literature of most every description to place before the people.

We are living in a reading age. The conditions are stirring the people. They are eager to know what these things mean. I find that people are much affected by what they read and hear intelligent people say. Many are wanting scripture reasons for the things that are taking place. This they should have.

We are very thankful for the Publishing House being in our conference. We know it is where God would have it. We also know that it was raised up to do the work of publishing the Third Angel's Message. We have the literature. The people are also ready to listen as never before; but we have not the individuals to carry it to the people and tell them what it is.

At the rate we in this conference are doing the book work, will we not have to ask God to extend the time to our generation, instead of the one referred to by our Lord? Can we do that? Think seriously. Do you want time to continue longer than it will take for God's faithful servants to warn the world? If so, why? What attraction have you? We know that all sin and sinners will be destroyed. God's purpose in our

literature and our service is to give the warning in faith and love so all may repent and live that can be led to repentance. If you wish to be excused from His service, you will just as surely be excused from heaven.

Do not think that God will be mocked. Cain tried that: Esau also and the countless millions; but has God overlooked their work and way? I know as surely as Christ is our mediator before God, that He has sent the Holy Spirit to try to influence many into the service of God in carrying the books, pamphlets, magazines, tracts and papers to the people in this conference who are barely making a living at present and have a troubled conscience because they will not answer the call and go.

As I visit the people I tell them of the world-wide judgment announcement in Revelation 14. I may never see them to talk with them again until probation has closed.

Now, dear brethren, do not think that we are going to continue to pray for you to enter this great work if you will not hearken to God's voice and the pleadings of the Spirit, when you are convinced that you should go, but will not. God will have representatives in this conference who will do His work as He would have it. I know it is not pleasing to God for so much time, money and energy to be spent in trying to get you who know this truth into His work. Soon those who have bought our literature and become convinced through it will covet the privilege (as I did years ago) of carrying it to the people. Then your trouble will be more than now to provide for yourself and family. Do not let this be your experience.

This number, prepared by Eld. G. B. Thompson, is now out. Its theme, "Prophecy Fulfilled and Filling," is treated so as to clearly establish the following five fundamental Bible truths:

- (1) That all Bible prophecies concerning ancient cities, nations and peoples have been accurately fulfilled.
- (2) That the evidence is overwhelming, viewed even from the

fulfillment of prophecy alone, that the Bible is indeed the inspired Word of God.

- (3) That fulfilled prophecy gives full assurance that all those prophecies that are unfulfilled will come to pass as predicted.
- (4) That at least ten great lines of prophecy, already fulfilled in part, terminate in "the time of the end," the day in which we live.
- (5) That the great day of God is at hand.

This number of Present Truth will strongly supplement the first three issues of this year and inspire confidence in all other issues of Present Truth, dealing more minutely with any prophetic theme through its treatment of the subject of Bible prophecy as "the more sure word" God has sent for man's knowledge in the time of the end. It will be helpful to all whether they have read previous numbers of Present Truth or not.

The new 1918 Temperance Instructor, the ratification number, has just come to our office. It bears a message that is, indeed, "meat in due season" for this critical year, during which the die will be cast either for or against national prohibition.

more for temperance reform this year than ever before, and it is greatly needed to annul the influence of the liquor forces.

A real crisis in the temperance movement is at hand, and our opportunity, as a people, to deliver the fatal blow to the nation's greatest enemy has come. Loyalty and true patriotism may be preeminently evident through this work at this time of the nation's greatest need. Let us be loyal in the Temperance campaign this year.

Conservation is the one absorbing subject of the times to win the war, and the Third Angel's Message is so forcefully presented that it leaves but little room for argument, yet without offense.
