Who Are Real Adventists

"Let him that heareth say come." It is not enough for us to believe that Jesus is soon coming back to the earth. We must also say "come."

There are many ways in which this can be done. But all have received some talent, and to receive the "well done" we must have done something, and been found faithful.

"God calls upon every church member to enter His service. Truth that is not lived. that is not imparted to others, losesits life-giving power, its healing virtue. Everyone must learn to work, and to stand in his place as a burden-bearer. Every addition to the church should be one more agency for the carrying out of the great plan of redemption. The entire church acting as one, blending in perfect union, is to be a living, active missionary agency, moved and controlled by the Holy Spirit." Vol. 8, p. 47.

"Every church should be a training school for Christian workers. Its members should be taught how to give Bible readings, how to conduct and teach Sabbath school classes, how best to help the poor and to care for the sick, how to work for the unconverted. There should be schools of health, cooking schools, and classes in various lines of Christian help work. There should not only be teaching, but actual work under experienced instructors. Let the teachers lead the way in working among the people, and others uniting with them will learn from their example. One example is worth more than many precepts." M. of H., p. 149.

"Every truly converted soul will be intensely desirous to bring others from the darkness of error into the marvelous light of the righteousness of Christ. The great outpouring of the Spirit of God which is to lighten the whole earth with His glory will not come till we have an enlightened people who know by, experience what it means to be laborers together with God." R. H., July 21, 1896.

From the above quotations we learn that the means by which God is to enlighten the world and finish this message is through the church as a whole; that the church can never do its part without careful instruction and training. The following quotations tell us who it is that God expects to give this preparation:

"Ministers should be educators who understand and appreciate the needs of humanity. They should encourage the church members to obtain a practical knowledge of all lines of missionary work, that they may be a blessing to all classes of peopleThey should assist these to organize the working forces of the church.... Practical work accomplish will more than sermons.... The people have had too much sermonizing: but have they been taught how to labor for those for whom Christ died? Has a line of labor been devised and placed before them in such a way that each has seen the necessity of taking part in the work?" Vol. 7, p. 302, 431.

For years many of us as ministers have struggled alone with the problem of giving the message, when God has given us many and valuable talents to help in the work if we would only train them and put them to work. We have often seen a tired mother slaving over the home duties while she left her children to grow up in idleness. If this is wrong in a family it is doubly so in the church. I recently knew a man who was discharged from a position as foreman because he was found repairing a bridge while his men stood around idle. We are told that we are not to leave our converts till they are trained for service. Unfortunately we are many times required to leave an unfinished product. and pass to other fields. The duty of service is just as sacred as Sabbath-keeping, and should be taught just as carefully. Not only should it be taught, but actual experience should be given in working for others. Only as we bind off the work in this way do we fulfill our commission as ministers. It is impossible that any one man in a conference. acting alone as missionary secretary, can take up the unfinished product of other ministers, and lead them all to successful soul-Every worker must winning. do his part. We might as well raise up churches and leave them with no knowledge of any other principle of faith and expect some special agent to come in and finish the work for us. Let us begin and leave behind us from year to year real Adventists, those who hear and are also saying "come." A. N. ALLEN.

The President's Annual Address

Another year has swiftly flown by, and under the divine providence of Our Heavenly Father we are together again to enjoy the annual campmeeting; also to participate in the deliberations of a special session of the Alabama Conference, which has been called for the purpose of transacting such business as may need attention.

Words of Welcome.

This morning as we realize something of the perils surrounding us, the intensity of the hour, and the unsafety of travel in these last days, it affords the Alabama Conference executive committee the greatest of pleasure to welcome here the delegates, the laborers, with our brethren and sisters from the different churches throughout the field, who are assembled at this meeting. To all we extend a most hearty greeting. We appreciate your presence with us. But in this greeting we would in no wise forget the dear ones at home, whose hearts and prayers we know are with us here for success. And as the God of Israel shall draw near to bless us, it should be our earnest prayer daily that the same rich blessings may rest upon them so that we shall share equally at the throne of mercy.

Progress Made During the Past Year

As we take a retrospective view for a moment and note the progress made since last we met, I am sure that all will be ready to unite, both heart and voice, in singing praise to our God from whom all blessings flow. It is simply marvelous, my brethren, the way in which the work has moved forward; however this has not been due to the ability of men, but because God has granted us a measure of His Holy Spirit to help us. Then, too, one special reason why I feel that God has blessed us is because of the warm spirit of unity and harmony which has existed among our earnest workers. We do not say it boastingly, but we do have a loyal band in this field.

It is not my purpose to go into details concerning the work this morning, for the different departments will do this as they report;but I would like to mention a few items of interest.

During the past year our Conference has been greatly strengthened by the addition of nine workers. This gives us at present a very good working force, making twenty white workers altogether. Then, added to our local effort Elder I. M. Martin with his faithful corps of workers who have been working very hard during the past winter and summer in Birmingham. We thank God for these many laborers and we trust that during the coming year others will be added to our number.

Evangelical Work

As we look back over the past few months and view the work carried forward by our Evangelical Department it is a pleasure to note that the work is onward and upward. Shortly after campmeeting last year plans were laid for Elder I. M. Martin. Southern Union Evangelist, to come to Birmingham to conduct a theatre effort. The Lord, indeed, blessed these meetings. and at the present time he is conducting a large tent effort in another section of the city. As a result, the prospects force us to believe that many souls will be added to the church. The Birmingham church is not only growing in membership these days, but is having the very best experience ever enjoyed in her

history. We do appreciate very much the Union sending Brother Martin and his workers down to help us.

At the same time Elder Martin has been carrying on his work, Elder J. H. Lawrence, from the Union Mission Department, has been conducting meetings for the colored people in Birmingham. God has wonderfully blessed his efforts and many souls have taken their stand for Present Truth. Thus the message moves forward in the magic city of the South.

Besides these meetings, Elder O. L. Denslow has been conducting a tent effort in Mobile. Bro. C. T. Burroughs, with his wife, and Miss Kalar have been assisting in this meeting. Though they have had many things to encounter which were not of a pleasant nature, yet under God they have pushed ahead and at present 11 have taken a stand and 15 more souls are keeping the Sabbath. Their aim is to at least raise the membership of the Mobile church to 100 members ere the close of the year.

Then, still another, meeting has been held in Sheffield, Alabama, with Elder O. F. Frank of Birmingham in charge. Brother Wilson has been there since last campmeeting, endeavoring to build up the church. He felt that the field was ripe, so asked for help, which was granted. Plans were then laid for a tent effort. During their effort the laborers found Sheffield quite a difficult field, yet in the face of many obstacles the Lord is giving victory. Misses Edna Ward, Nellie J. Orr, together with Sister Wilson, have assisted in this meeting by doing Bible work. Seven have taken a stand, others are keeping the Sabbath, so the prospects at present are very encouraging for a fruitful harvest.

Now during the first six months of 1919, 101 white people and 91 colored people, a total of 192, have been added to our ranks. We are hopeful that by the end of the present year we will raise our constituency to 1,000 membership. During 1918 we had a net loss in our membership of 67 (20 white and 47 colored), but it is a pleasure to say that for the first six months of this year we have a net increase of 136 precious souls, giving us now a total membership of 826. We feel indeed grateful for this good gain. Other meetings are being planned for as quickly as we can arrange for them. Then in addition to these meetings held since last campmeeting we have organized three churches, which are to be presented to this Conference for acceptance, as follows: One white at Pensacola, Florida: one white church at Citronelle, Alabama, and one colored at Anniston, Alabama.

Financial

In order to carry forward our work, we must have means. This is a very important feature, and it is a pleasure to tell you this morning that God has most wonderfully blessed our treasury the past few months. Had this not been true, we could not have added to our laboring force eight new workers and carried on so many tent efforts. I shall not go into detail, for Brother Marshall will do that in his report; however, I want to mention a few items regarding the financial growth. Our tithe for 1917 was \$12,278.28; for 1918, \$15,322.19, showing a good gain of \$3,042.91 over 1917. Then for the first six months of this year we have received in tithes \$11,571.14, which lacks only \$3,751.05 of being as much as we received during all last year. Therefore we have excellent prospects of making over \$20,000 for 1919. Brethren, we cannot help but praise God for this increase and trust that our people will continue to be loyal and honest in returning to God His own. If everyone would pay an honest tithe, our treasury would not be lacking in funds.

Besides the tithes, our Mission funds are coming nicely. At present we have received \$4,111.-13, putting us nearly out on our Mission quota for the first six months of the year. It looks as if we will reach our goal, but let us not slacken our efforts in the least. The foreign fields cry for help and we must not fail them at this critical hour in the world's history.

Sabbath School

It is a pleasure to tell you that our Sabbath School Department is doing splendid work. There has never been a time when the enthusiasm has been greater in our schools than at the present. There is a kind rivalry among some of the schools and a number are working hard to win the highest points; however, there are still some schools who need to awaken to the need of the hour.

Y. P. M. V. and Educational.

Our Young People's Department has done very well^{*}the past year when we consider the fact that we have had no secretary to devote time to this work; but we have now secured Brother Bradley from Washington, who has come to take charge of the department, and we look for this branch to come rapidly to the front.

During the past year a goodly number of Church and Mission schools have been conducted, there being 7 white and 6 colored, with a total enrollment of 255. We hope that such moves will be made at this Conference as will greatly strengthen and build up
