A Challenge to Young People

In last week's WORKER there was printed a letter, sent out from the General Conference council, then being held at Boulder, Colorado, and addressed to "Brethren and Sisters." After reviewing some of the needs of the mission fields, the following words appear which contain a solution of how at least a part of the funds can be raised with which to answer the pressing calls from the far-distant parts of the earth:

"Brethren and sisters, will you not push on with the Harvest Ingathering work with renewed faith and vigor and assurance? We pray God to bless you as you go to the people to ask The cause of Christ gifts. among the millions needs this, and it is to save souls unto eternal life. Your gifts of the year past have been owned by Christ in the saving of thousands of souls in mission fields."

As a young person and one who is interested in that great movement by and for the youth, the Young People's Missionary Volunteer work. I feel that this appeal is addressed to me. I feel that it is addressed to you, voung man or young woman, boy or girl. The money raised, every cent of it, is to go to help other young men and women (no different particularly from you and me) who have said goodbye to fathers and mothers, brothers and sisters, all things dear to them on this earth, and who have "gone out not knowing whither they goeth." Picture these same young people surrounded by deluded, heathen souls with ourstretched arms, asking piteously for the message of Christ which alone can lift them up-a message which will show them something real. something vital to live for, instead of the meaningless humdrum of the past. Visualize these young people who have been doing the work of several and who have been hoping and praying for help. And imagine if you can their heartsickness if they are sent word "The brethren and sisters of the homeland, the young people, the Missionary Volunteers have failed to respond, have refused the challenge."

Those of us here in this country with its many blessings and comforts have a pretty easy time. We think we are very unfortunate if we have to want for any need or necessity. But just how unfortunate are we when compared with our workers in foreign lands? Why, we are blessed many times over. To be convinced of this; it requires only the listening to some stories stories of self-sac= rifice and surrender-told by these workers.

It is a fact that young people

do not have much means at their command. But the letter sent out from the council mentions the Harvest Ingathering work particularly. This does not call for personal funds from us as a people, but we are to raise it as many other organizations are raising money-private solicitation. So there is nothing to limit what the people can do except a lack of enthusiasm. All the Harvest Ingathering money that the young people raise counts on the Missionary Volunteer missions goal, and should be so reported. The mission field for the Southern Union this year is Borneo, the land of headhunters, and the goal is \$1,500. Last year the young people raised \$2,156. What shall we do this year? \$3,000 is suggested, and I believe we all are in favor. Remember what this means,-one-half again as much as last year. Let your individual goal be determined accordingly. Last year I raised \$16. This year I must get \$24.

"Will you not push on with the Harvest Ingathering work with renewed faith and vigor and assurance?" Now, young people, what shall be our answer to this call, this appeal, this challenge for means to help the foreign work? In answer let the volunteers, the Missionary Volunteers, chorus "We will." Louisiana Items

By the accompanying report it will be seen that a very liberal spirit exists this year, as five of the churches are keeping abreast with their quota for the mission fields. This does not mean that they have reached their yearly quota, but the amount due up to the present time. Several remittances came in too late to be entered for the month of October, which amounts will be applied for the month of November. The churches are getting well organized for Harvest Ingathering work, and before the vear closes we hope to see each one slip "over the top." The New Orleans Church No. 2 is to begin a special campaign October 26, and during the past week the Church No. 1 had the week divided up into "Special Field Days'' in which each band took a special interest. The call comes to each one. Are you doing your part?

We met with Church No. 2 at Shreveport Wednesday evenng, October 15th. We found most of them of good courage in the work of the Lord. Brother and Sister Washington are doing a good work with the "Harvest Ingathering" and they have several interested ones, with whom they are reading. We believe that we shall see several embracing the message ere long from their faithful labors.

We spent the Sabbath and Sunday at Frieburg with Bro. Smith and family. They are doing what they can to spread this truth among their neighbors. We had a meeting at their home and several of their neighbors attended the services. We were led to realize, to some extent, how the isolated members rejoice when one of the workers visited them.

We spoke Sunday to the little company at Alexandria. They are all working along the Harvest Ingathering line and Sister Russell, who is nearly seventy years old, has already secured over \$14.00.

No Goal Dollar Day

The young people of the Southern Union are not to have a Goal Dollar Day this year, but they have a golden opportunity to present many "goal dollars" for the work in the needy mission fields. All our boys and girls and all our young people can take the Harvest Ingathering magazine and go to the people and obtain offerings for missions. Many of our M. V.
