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### The Work in New Orleans

Sunday night closed the series of meetings that Elder Bunch has been holding in this city. For six weeks the campaign has been on. Meetings have been held every night ex. cept Saturday, and every afternoon except Saturday and Monday. The attendance has been good throughout, several hundred was the average.

Thorough advertising has been done. Elder Bunch has kept good accounts of his meetings in the papers, and as a result of these nearly a hundred people have corresponded with him in regard to the truth, and have asked for literature on different phases of the message. Doubtless a great many have learned the truth in this way who probably never would have learned of it in any other way.

On the last night a call was made for those to hold up their hands who believed that the message that they had heard from night to night was the truth, and nearly every one in the congregation held up their hands. Cards were passed to those who wanted them, and nearly 75 promised to keep the commandments of God and the faith of Jesus. In addition to these there are about one hundred who are studying, many of whom will doubtless take their stand for the truth before long. We are very much pleased to see the way the Lord has worked in this city.

To keep up the interest Elder Bunch and the writer plan to hold meetings twice a week, on Wednesday and Sunday nights for sometime to come. Also special services will be held each week for the instruction of the candidates for baptism.

It may be of interest to know that during the meetings we received \$1,000 in collections, and sold nearly \$100 worth of books. There have been given away nearly 12,000 Present Truth. Some of those who have been attending the meetings have been mailing them out to their friends. People from nearly all walks of life have heard the message in the various ways that it has been given. It is our hope and prayer that eternity will reveal some mighty results from our work here.

### Dear Co-Workers:

This is the first time I have attempted to give you any information through the WORKER. It has come to my mind forcibly in the past few weeks that the members of this Conference, especially the young people, are not taking advantage of the circulating library that is kept in this office.

The library is operated on the plan that will give the loan of books to the members at the lowest possible cost. Upon a written request we mail the book or books requested. They may be kept two consecutive weeks before being returned. The only cost to the one borrowing them is the cost of the postage to return them. A fee of one cent a day on each book is charged if the books are kept out over time. This is not to work a hardship, nor is it to make money; it is merely to keep the books circulating and to permit of as many as possible reading them.
