Work in the Southern Union

Since taking up my work in connection with the Southern Union Conference, I have had the opportunity of visiting and assisting the brethren in a number of places. It is a privilege to associate in this way with men who are earnestly striving to build up the cause of God.

We believe it will be repeated in the Jackson church. The work of this conference at times lays heavy burdens on the hearts and shoulders of Elder Elliott and his co-workers. There are many perplexities, but we believe the Lord has placed the responsibility of the work there on the men of his own choosing. With a loyal constituency and all working together, the time will soon come when Mississippi will be one of our strong conferences. The Lord has wonderfully blessed this field in the sale of our literature.

We are glad for the opportunity of making short visits to the Oakwood and Southern Junior Colleges. The work of these schools is developing faster than the resources can be found with which to properly equip them. The coming year will doubtless prove to be the best these schools have ever had. Let us pray that this may be so.

The message is onward through the world and will soon triumph. Let us all unit our efforts in accomplishing triumph in the Southern Union Conference.

The beds which we have to rent will be given you at what they cost us. At present we cannot give price, however, will do the best we can. The Conference has a few cots to rent at 75 cents each so long as they last. Be sure to bring plenty of bedding.

Remember the meeting opens Thursday night, August 26 and we hope all will plan to be there for the first meeting.

Colored Campmeeting Canceled

Owing to our tent effort in the Crescent city which will be in progress August, September and October, forces us to cancel our campmeeting, which was dated for Sept. 24 to Oct. 3. I am pleased to further state, that the Lord has greatly blessed our efforts, within the last two years. A little more than two years ago, I came to New Orleans to take up the work where Elder T. B. Buckner left off. I found about sixty-five active members and a thousand dollars balance due on the church-building. Last June, one year ago, Elder J. H. Lawence conducted a Union tent effort resulting in the baptism of 36 souls at the close of the effort. Then came the follow-up work resulting in the baptism of 28 more souls to swell the number and add to our joy. We had asked the Lord to give us one hundred souls, the influx began at our first baptism and as yet, it has not ceased. We give glory and praise to our heavenly Father, for we know that it was by the operation of His Sp'rit, that this great work was accomplished. The blessings continue to flow from the windows of heaven. Our tithes have increased wonderfully, from about seventy-five dollars per month to nearly four hundred dollars per month.

The aggregate sum raised last year, 1919, in tithes and Sabbath school offering, etc., was \$10,999.98. Our \$1,000 church debt has been paid, and we are still looking to Him from whom all blessings flow.

We have a working church, and we are expecting greater blessing this year. I am yours in the work.

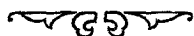
Illinois is already thirty certificates over her Reading Course goal, Georgia has doubled her's and Virginia quadrupled her goal by June 1.

Progress in South America

The first Missionary Volunteer report from Venezuela was received at headquarters May 4, 1920.

A letter from Brazil, under date of May 10, says they are soon to enter upon their first Harvest Ingathering Campaign.

Plans are being laid to publish Missionary Volunteer Society programs in Spanish, German, and Portuguese, beginning with the last quarter of 1920.

South America printed 2,500 Morning Watch Calendars in Spanish last year, but it was not enough, and they plan to print at least 3,500 this year.
