HARVEST INGATHERING WORK IN MISSISSIPPI AND LOUISIANA

Leaving Nashville Friday morning, November 5th, I spent much of the day with Brethren Burroughs and Frank, in Birmingham. They gave very encouraging reports of the work, both in the city and throughout the State.

Next, I spent a week among our people in Mississippi. At Amory and Hatley, our people had only made a beginning, but all have now started out with a determination to do their full share. Every believer at Amory went out in a field day and did nicely. With some, it was their first experience, but God always adds His blessing when we make the effort. While Meridian only raised \$26.00 last year, they have this year set their goal for \$350, and already have \$250.00 of it. They not only expect to reach it, but to go away over the top. McDonald too, had made a good beginning, and plans were laid for further work both by the church and church school.

The Jackson Churches had already passed the half-way mark on their goal of \$10.00 per member. Among those who have done especially good work, we should mention May Vem Wright, only ten years of age, who has \$16.58, Sister Miller with \$29.50, and Sister Herrell with \$96.00.

Hattiesburg and Natchez are

already over the top. The Mississippi Conference already has about \$300.00 more in than the total amount raised last year, and the real work seems to be just starting. Surely, with everyone assuming their full responsibility, they will continue their efforts until they go over the top.

Here in Louisiana, I find our people awake to the opportunities, and an earnest campaign in progress. One of our colored isolated sisters took in \$58.00 before she had seen a Harvest Ingathering paper. Her goal was \$60.00, but when the new papers came, she raised it to \$100.00, and already has \$87.85 of it. Shreveport No.2 set their goal for \$200.00, and now have \$195.43 in the treasury. Shreveport No.1 raised only \$174.00 last year, but placed their goal this year at \$560.00, and have \$350.00 of it. Mansfield did not raise anything last year, but this year they set their goal for \$150.00, or about \$16.00 per member. They too have \$108.00.

In New Orleans, two efforts have been in progress. One of these for the white, and the other for the colored. These have somewhat delayed getting started in the Ingathering work, but they are now well organized and at it. The No.1 goal is \$1500.00, and they have \$525.00 of it, while

No.2's goal is \$1000.00, and they have \$250.00 of it. Both churches are supplementing their house to house solicitation by using the boxes on the business streets Saturday nights and on special occasions. If all our people in Louisiana will keep persistently at it, there is no reason why they should not go well over the top.

Reports reaching me from all over our Union indicate that a strong campaign is on, and that excellent results are following each earnest effort put forth. Our prospects for reaching our goal were never brighter. May we not each reconsecrate ourselves to his service, and do our full share in providing the means so much needed for the mission fields just now.

Seventy-five per cent is a passing grade.

Our goal of offerings to missions is \$400.00. Up-to-date, we have reported \$119.65. It will be necessary to get almost \$300.00 in Harvest Ingathering to reach this.

Please send in your name as soon as you have finished the Bible year. Four have reported, but there must be twelve more.

Let us work together to see that our present membership of 169 all become working members, also reporting members.

Shreveport, La.

The Shreveport Church has been doing a splendid work. For the most part, all are wide awake, and alert for souls seeking salvation.

Our local tent effort at Cedar Grove, a suburb of this city, resulted in quite a number taking a stand for the message. Twenty-four new Sabbath keepers attended our first Sabbath meeting.

Some have been baptized, some awaiting baptism, and others studying still further into the truth.

During the past 8 months, our membership has increased from fifty-six to eighty-eight, most of whom have been won to the faith by the faithful and earnest efforts of the brethren of this church. A few more will be baptized next Sabbath.

The Harvest Ingathering has not been neglected. Our goal is \$560.00, \$360.00 of which is now in the treasury. Much of this has been collected by the use of "the boxes," one Sister receiving over \$31.00 in one and a half hours. Several have collected over \$20.00 in a single evening. One of our church school girls raised \$12.83 in a little over an hour. Our teacher, who was sure she could not accomplish anything in Harvest Ingathering, having previously tried and failed, has made her goal (\$10.00) several times over. In a single evening she received \$23.03.

An illustration of the enthusiasm and willingness of this church was seen yesterday when we raised \$1500.00 in cash and pledges in about thirty minutes—this for street assessments, church expenses, church improvement, etc.

The enrollment of our church school is 28. It is all that we can accommodate in our present school room, but a building committee is working out an extension, and we hope for several more pupils now in public schools.

We are, at present, arranging for our tabernacle effort, which is to open in about two weeks. The Lord is wonderfully answering prayers in behalf of this effort. We cannot tell it all in

this limited space, but even the selection of our lot came in a direct answer to earnest prayers of the church.

Please do not forget, us when talking to your Father about the finishing of this great work.

Brother W. C. Causey, who is working in Morehouse Parish, begun canvassing for his Christmas delivery, and has set his goal for \$1,000.

We were glad to have Elder Staines with us for a few days. He has been giving us some very valuable help in the Harvest Ingathering campaign during the past week, speaking at the New Orleans No. 1 church Sabbath morning, and the New Orleans No. 2 church in the afternoon. He and brother Christman will visit Shreveport and Mansfield the latter part of this week.

Word has just been received from Brother Washington to the effect that Shreveport No. 2 has already reached their goal of \$200.00, and are striving to reach \$250.00. Their membership is small, but every member has been actively engaged in this campaign, and the Lord has abundantly blessed their efforts.

The ladies' auxiliary, of the New Orleans No. 1 church, conducted a very successful sale of fancy work, November 15th. The proceeds of which are to be applied to the New Church building fund.

Elder A. J. Meiklejohn, of New Orleans No. 1, who has just closed very successful tabernacle effort, is now directing his attention toward the Harvest Ingathering campaign. We are sure, from the enthusiasm and determination manifested on the part of everyone, they will more than reach their goal.

Harvest Ingathering in Louisiana

The Psalmist says; "The people shall be willing in the day of thy power."

It is most encouraging to see the willingness manifested on the part of our people throughout the Conference in the Ingathering work. Sabbath, October 2, it was my privilege to be with our churches at Shreveport. All manifested an unusual interest in this important work. Saturday night, October 2, several sisters went down in the business section with boxes, and received about \$65.00. One Sister, in ninety minutes, received \$22.00.

Last year, in this campaign, Shreveport No. 1 raised \$174.74 in less than one week. This year, they raised more than they did altogether last year.

Parts of a letter from Sister Huntley will be of interest: "I believe you left us on the 8th of October for Mansfield. The day following was Sabbath, and my husband made a call for those who would work with the boxes. Eight went down, and it was Sister Matthews who headed the list with \$23.03."

Sister Matthews is our school teacher at Shreveport. She says that she has only raised 35c Harvest Ingathering money in her life, and was reluctant to go out. But, when she went out the first time, she was so much

encouraged over the results that she has been going ever since.

One Sister, in two hours, received \$30.56 with the box. Sister Huntley further says: "The total sum received that night was \$66.03. The following week they went out again with the boxes, and received \$67.41, making a total of \$133.44 for only two nights. Shreveport, to date has \$340.00 toward their goal of \$560.00.

Brother Washington, from Shreveport No. 2, writes very encouragingly of the work. Their goal is \$200.00, and they have \$135.00 toward their goal already. They hope to "go over the top" by October 31. Sister Moore, of Victoria, a member of that church, has over \$60.00. Surely "Thy people shall be willing in the day of thy power."

October 9th, I met with our faithful company in Mansfield. They set their goal for \$150, or \$16.00 per capita. Some rather hesitated at this large goal, but all doubts vanished after a company of sisters returned with \$108.00 for three hours work. The encouraging feature is that just one of the seven who went out ever had any experience of this kind before. It seems to me that the way the means is coming in this year is most convincing evidence that the Lord is hastily finishing his work in the South.

In DeRidder, three of us raised nearly \$50.00 in about five hours. One brother, at Bon Ami, has over \$30.00. Good reports are coming in from all the churches, which gives us confidence that our goal will be reached. New Orleans No. 1 and No. 2 are working hard with good results. Two sisters, together, have \$115.00 between them. Let us all pray earnestly for the success of this campaign, thus hastening on the

work of God to a glorious triumph.

In closing read the words of the prophet of God: "To all who are about to take up the special missionary work with the paper prepared for use in the Harvest In-gathering campaign, I would say, be diligent in your efforts, live under the guidance of the Holy Spirit. Add daily to your Christian experience... Search diligently for perishing souls. O! think of that yearning desire Christ has to bring to His fold again those who have gone astray."

Union Conference News Notes

Professor John Thompson left Nashville Wednesday morning to attend the convention of the Missionary Volunteers for the Southeastern, Southwestern, and Southern Unions, which is being held at Memphis, November 25 to December 1.

Elder McElhany spent Sabbath and Sunday, November 20 and 21, with the New Orleans church, and from there went to Jackson, Miss., where he attended a joint committee meeting of the Louisiana and Mississippi Conferences. He then went to Louisville, Kv., where he attended their committee meeting, returning to the office Thursday morning.

Elder V. O. Cole has been ill

for the past few days, but is much better now and able to attend to his regular routine of duties again.

Brother F. L. Harrison has started auditing the books at the Publishing House.

Elder O. R. Staines has just reached the office after a three weeks' trip through the Southern part of the Union in the interest of the Harvest Ingathering work. He reports that he has never seen a time when our people were so generally taking hold of any proposition as they are this year in the Harvest Ingathering campaign. Louisiana and Mississippi each have three churches that are already over the goal of Ten Dollars per member. In fact such a rapid

progress is being made that it is hard to keep up-to-date reports.

Elder Staines reports having attended the opening meeting of our Union effort in Shreveport Sunday night, November 21. The meeting has been well advertised and the attendance was good and of an excellent class of people. The tabernacle is a very neat one and well located.

All of our people should remember our Union force now engaged in this effort. that success may attend them.

Professor W. H. Lewis of the Oakwood Junior College was an office caller Tuesday, November 23.

Elder Lawrence called at the office last week. He reports an excellent interest in the meetings at Paducah.

A leading writer on immigration has recently said: "There are today over 13,500,000 persons in the United States who were born outside of it. There are 18,897,837 who were born in this country, one or both of whose parents were born outside of the United States. That means that 32,000,000, or nearly one-third of the population either were born abroad, or are of foreign parentage."

Thirty-two million souls! A little comparison will help us to realize the vastness of the figures. If these foreigners were taken out of the great cities, where they have settled, and distributed over the western states, they would entirely replace the population of all our territory west of the Mississippi River, including western Canada.

We think of South America as being an immense mission field and our hearts go out in tender sympathy for the millions there in Catholic superstition and darkness. We rejoice to hear of thousands in that neglected continent seeking after truth and accepting it largely through the work of our colporteurs carrying to their homes our literature in the Spanish and Portuguese languages. Yet we have a foreign field within the boundaries of the United States and Canada almost as great in extent of population as the entire field known as the South American Division.

Are those 32,000,000 foreigners at our doors as susceptible to the truth and as hungry for our literature as people across the seas? Experience proves that they are much more approachable here and can be reached without the great sacrifice of health and the heavy outlay of means required to seek out the honest in heart in distant lands. Just as literature is the

chief evangelistic agency in the foreign fields, so too, in the homeland, we must look largely to our consecrated colporteurs to search out the dear foreigner huddled away in a tenement house in the city, or scattered throughout the country territory. Let us thank God that today subscription books and magazines for our colporteurs, and smaller literature for our home missionary workers are available in most of the leading languages of these 32,000,000 precious souls that are looking to us for light and salvation.
