THE PLACE THE SOUTHERN PUBLISHING ASSOCIATION OCCUPIES IN OUR WORK IN THE SOUTH

ANY years ago the servant of the Lord, Mrs. E. G. White, stated that the Lord had revealed to her that a great work would be accomplished in the Southern States before probation closed. Many workers of experience were to be raised up in this field, and many were to come from other parts of the country, to engage in spreading the message. She said that many souls would be won as the result of these efforts. We see this testimony being fulfilled before our very eyes. Thousands of new believers have accepted the truth in this field since 1932 when the Southern and Southeastern Unions were united into what is now known as the Southern Union.

At the close of 1932 the white membership was 9,604, and the colored, 3,185, while at the close of 1940, eight years later, the white membership was 14,962, and the colored, 4,150. This is a gain in combined white and colored memberships for the past eight years of 6,323, or an average net gain per year of 790. Many of our brethren and sisters died during these years, and sorry to say, many gave up the truth. Notwithstanding these losses, the net gain in membership is very encouraging.

Years ago, Sister White said that the Lord had told her the South was to have its own publishing house, where literature for this field could be supplied. She also stated that the establishing of the Publishing House at Nashville was of the Lord. The Southern Publishing Association is one of three General Conference publishing houses, operating in the United States. The Pacific Press, located at Mountain View, near San Francisco, California, is one of the three; the Review and Herald is another, and the Southern Publishing, the third. The Southern Publishing Association plant is to serve the needs of the Southern and Southwestern Union Conferences, which together have a membership of over thirty thousand believers. It would seem that if these thirty thousand members were all actively engaged in the circulation of this message-filled literature, that the Publishing House at Nashville would be compelled to operate its presses night and day.

The printed page is to play a prominent part in the finishing of this work. We have a loyal, capable, hard-working group of workers at the Publishing House, and we should rally to the support of the House in doing everything possible to circulate the literature produced there. Constituency and board meetings were held there, February eleven to thirteen, and actions

were taken that should mark the beginning of a larger use of our message-filled literature.

Every religious movement since the time the printing press was invented, has had religious literature pioneer the advance into unworked fields. In the very beginning of our work, Seventh-day Adventists placed great dependence upon the little Present Truth, Signs of the Times, and other papers as agencies for disseminating the message, and the Review and Herald to hold the believers true to the faith.

We are anxious to see our own publishing house at Nashville do a great work for this Union in literature production in these closing days. The more books and tracts they prepare, that we circulate, the more business they will have, and the more the message will advance. We request your prayers in behalf of the good service that is being rendered by the faithful workers in the Southern Publishing Association plant at Nashville, Tennessee.

The morning rays of the sun had already bathed the graceful palms with silver light, but the scene was marred by the crudeness of the buildings which

were being used as school buildings, dormitories, dining room, and laundry. Crude corrugated iron buildings they were, with gravel floors and thatched ends to keep the rain out. The material for these buildings had been hauled over by truck from the former dry area location at Bartle. The teachers and students had worked day and night hauling this equipment, driving over twelve hundred miles per week, making two trips of about three hundred miles each way, and at the same time carrying on other work. That is what I understood Brother Marshall to say. The girls' dormitory-how different from those beautiful places in which our youth in the homeland spend their school days-old reclaimed bricks for a floor, partitions made of the old boards of the former buildings, corrugated iron roof, make-shift toilet facilities and bath. The boys' building was even worse—a long,

While all this is true, yet there are times when certain schools may have to make adjustments, adopting that form of organization that will enable them to obtain the best results. Organization is simply a means to an end

We should be careful and not have too much machinery. The machinery needed to run one school cannot fit all. Let us use judgment then, in fitting up an organization for the individual Sabbath school, sticking as close to the general plan as is fitting.

Some schools, because of the size, need more officers than others. But whatever the size of the Sabbath school, let's insist that every officer have a clear conception of his duty that intelligent co-operation may be given.

No Sabbath school which has a group of children should let their teacher struggle along in her endeavor to interest and instruct the lambs of the flock without these aids. The Picture Rolls cost one dollar twenty-five cents a quarter, and the Memory Verse cards are five cents a set.

All our Sabbath schools want to make progress in 1941. To do this we will have to equip each school fully with the above mentioned aids. We are confident that each officer will co-operate heartily to build up a more efficient force of workers and that in 1941 many souls will be won for the message.

We hope to have a gain at the end of the year which will make our total enrollment at least five hundred.

The church school will help the parents in this very important work. The church, and the school working with the home, the most important factor, will bring to our children and youth Christ in all His loveliness and the way of salvation. The conference Thirteenth Sabbath offering report for all four quarters of 1940 has just been place on the desk. Based on one dollar per member the following white churches have more than averaged one dollar per quarter for their Thirteenth Sabbath offering of each quarter of 1940. Jackson, Meridian, Selma, Pensacola, and Florence, Alabama. If all the schools would have averaged one dollar there would have come into the missions treasury \$4,958.74. Weekly promotion of the Thirteenth Sabbath brings surprising results.

From the superintendent of the Long Island Sabbath school, Mrs. H. A. Martin, comes the news that every fifth or sixth Sabbath the Sabbath program is in the hands of the young people of the church. These young people are enjoying this experience.

On Sabbath, March 1, a Home Missionary and Sabbath School Convention will be held in the Covington church. Elder C. V. Anderson, president of the conference, and Brother H. E. THE PACK HORSE LIBRARY

Several States in the territory of the Southern Union have, what are called. Pack Horse Libraries, operated under the supervision of the W. P. A. These Pack Horse Libraries are operated in the mountainous and rural sections of the South. Riders carry out into these rural communities, books and magazines of all kinds, loaning them to the people to read. These riders have regular circuits they cover, and it is estimated there are several hundred such libraries. Thousands upon thousands of people are thus benefited by this reading service.

Some of these libraries have been given our books and magazines to be used in this work, and they have expressed deep appreciation for the contributions of such literature. The head of the W. P. A. Pack Horse Libraries in one of the States has been contacted to find out if they could make use of our books and magazines on a larger scale. A most favorable reply was received. Our leaders have been told by some of those in charge of these libraries that periodicals such as the Youth's Instructor, Little Friend, The Watchman, Signs of the Times, The Message Magazine and our health journals are in great demand among the readers. "Bedtime Stories" and our other children's books, as well as most any of our twenty-five cent books are in demand.

What a wonderful opportunity is ours to do missionary work by getting out our books and magazines that are in good condition, and putting them to work, Many thousands of people can be contacted in this way that may otherwise not be reached. Most of us have books and magazines that we have read and that now are stored away somewhere, doing no one any good. Why not get them out and put them to work for Jesus?
