# A Storm is Coming, Relentless in its Fury

Are We Prepared to Meet it?

The headlines of our daily paper today was ominous indeed: "Field Guns Ring Village in Cyprus"; "Another Town in Congo Falls to Rebel Forces"; "Harlem Erupts in Racial Riot"; "Portuguese Guinea in Rebel Hands"; "U.S. Men Wounded in Vietnam"; Five Indians Killed in Guiana"; Indonesian Guerrillas Routed"; "Border Gun Fight." Violence in Europe, violence in Africa, violence in the Middle East, violence in North America, violence in Asia, violence in South America. The world is filled with violence. These were only the reports of major violence committed on a national scale. Practically all of the rest of the articles on the front page of today's paper dealt with violence on a smaller scale: "Explosion in Billiard Room of City Hotel"; "Reservist Killed in Bulawayo"; "Harari African Shot Dead after Stonings." And today's paper is not unusual in its reports of violence. It is a daily occurrence. God is trying to speak to us.

"In the last days the times will be full of danger. Men will become utterly selfcentred . . . proud and contemptuous . . . they . . . will have no control of themselves . . . treacherous." 2 Tim. 3:1-3 (Phillips). The King James Version describes men in the last days as "fierce" (verse 3).

"Times full of danger." "Treacherous, contemptuous, fierce" men without control of themselves—what a cauldron of hate and violence these inspired words conjure up for those of us living "in the last days". Surely these days are upon us now!

"We are on the very verge of the time of trouble," the servant of the Lord writes. "A power from beneath is leading men. . . . Human beings have confederated with satanic agencies. . . The inhabitants of the world are fast becoming as the inhabitants of the world in Noah's day. . . The powers of Satan are at work. . . The enemy has arranged matters to suit his own purposes. . . . The world (is) filled with violence. . ." Testimonies, vol. 9, pp. 43, 44.

"We are living in the midst of an 'epidemic of crime'... Every day brings fresh revelations of political strife... Every day brings its heart-sickening record of violence..." *Testimonies*, vol. 9, p. 89.

"I was shown the state of the world, that is fast filling up its cup of iniquity. Violence and crime of every description are filling our world." *Testimonies*, vol. 3, p. 471.

3, p. 471. Every Seventh-day Adventist should know what these things mean! "When ye see these things come to pass, know ye that the kingdom of God is nigh at hand." Luke 21:31. Through these headlines and through these events God seeks to speak to His people throughout Trans-Africa.

"I am coming! I am coming soon! I am coming very soon!" He is telling us. Through His Word and through messages from His servant He keeps reminding us of this blessed truth.

Seventh-day Adventists should keep the precious promises of His return fresh and warm in our minds and hearts (read Acts of the Apostles, page 33). Our ministers are admonished to keep the blessed hope frequently "before our own churches." Fundamentals of Education, p. 336.

"Dwell on present truth, on Christ's second coming. The Lord is coming very soon. We have only a little while. . . . Talk the truth. . . ." *Evangelism*, p. 624.

A Friendly Chat With Your Division President.

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ Jesus: Recently I attended the Oranje-Natal Conference Camp-meeting at Harrismith, in the Orange Free State. Brother Arthur Ingle was telling me one of those thrilling stories of God's healing power.

Many years ago Pastor and Mrs. J. W. Palmer were in charge of our Inyazura Mission. Sister Palmer became very ill and developed an extremely abnormal swelling on the hip. Her condition grew worse so Brother Palmer brought her to Salisbury on a bed by goods train. A doctor called regularly but nothing he could do seemed to help the situation. He warned Pastor Palmer that his wife's condition was deteriorating rapidly and that the prognosis was not good.

Pastor Palmer was a man of earnest prayer and he invited brother Ingle to come to the place where they were staying for a season of prayer. After some discussion it was decided that they would follow the instruction of the apostle: "Is any sick among you? Let him call for the elders of the church, and let them pray over him, anointing him with oil in the name of the Lord." James 5:14.

The anointing service was held and the two brethren prayed earnestly that the Lord would restore Sister Palmer to normal health and strength if it would bring glory to His name. At the time no change in her condition was visible. But the next morning when the doctor called he could scarcely believe his eyes. What a change had taken place. The swelling growth had completely disappeared. The affected area was normal.

"What has happened here?", the medical man asked in amazement, "yesterday Mrs. Palmer was critically ill. This morning I can find nothing wrong. Something has happened. What have you done?"

"We prayed and anointed her as the Bible instructs us to do under such circumstances," Pastor Palmer explained simply.

"Well, I don't know anything about such healing—I am only a medical man and I deal with facts but this amazes me. Yesterday Mrs. Palmer was a very ill woman. This morning she is perfectly normal. I cannot understand it."

But Pastors Palmer and Ingle understood it. They knew that the day of miracles was not past. They knew that the Great Physician still lives and still heals as He did two thousand years ago by the blue Sea of Galilee.

The healing of Sister Palmer was not the only such experience the Lord used to encourage the struggling little company of Advent believers in Salisbury during those early days of the work in our city.

Brother and Sister Murray Kitto had been in the truth only a few months when baby Laureen was taken desperately ill. The attending physician said he had done all that was humanly possible to do. He feared the little one could not possibly survive.

A friend of the Kitto's urged them to claim the promise of James 5 on behalf of their little daughter. Elder Ingle, Brother Hipkin and Brother Kitto gathered by baby Laureen's bedside and there pleaded with God for her life. While they were praying the little one cried—she had been too weak to make a sound before this. They clung to the promises of God in faith. The Great Physician heard their earnest petitions and as Brother Kitto wrote me recently "the healing was instantaneous."

The next morning the doctor called and examined his tiny patient. Turning to the parents standing beside him he asked incredulously: "What have you done for the baby since I was here last?"

"Doctor, there was nothing we could do," Brother Kitto replied, "that is humanly speaking there was nothing we could do. But I called our Pastor and we followed the Bible instruction to anoint and pray for the sick. God has done the rest. He has heard our prayers and healed our baby."

"Well, it is certainly a miracle that I cannot understand," the doctor shook his head as he spoke, "I feared that I was coming this morning to sign your baby's death certificate but I find her perfectly well. It is amazing! All traces of the pneumonic condition have disappeared."

It is amazing and wonderful what God can and will do for those who love and trust Him. That tiny miracle baby is alive and well today—a living testimony to the power of a living Christ who still helps and heals as He did two thousand years ago. Many of you know Laureen. Today she is Mrs. Tony Bell, the wife of the Secretary-treasurer of the Southern Rhodesia Field. "The Eternal sustains him on his sick bed, and brings him back to health." Psalm 41:3 (Moffatt).

"God is just as willing to restore the sick to health now as when the Holy Spirit spoke these words through the psalmist. And Christ is the same compassionate physician now that He was during His earthly ministry. In Him there is healing balm for every disease, restoring power for every infirmity. His disciples in this time are to pray for the sick as verily as the disciples of old prayed. And recoveries will follow; for 'the prayer of faith shall save the sick.' We have the Holy Spirit's power, the calm assurance of faith, that can claim God's promise. The Lord's promise, 'They shall lay hands on the sick, and they shall recover' (Mark 16:18), is just as trustworthy now as in the days of the apostles. It presents the privilege of God's children, and our faith should lay hold of all that it embraces. Christ's servants are the channel of His working, and through them he desires to excercise His healing power. It is our work to present the sick and suffering to God in the arms of our faith. We should teach them to believe in the Great Healer." Ministry of Healing, p. 226.

What a blessed Saviour is ours! He heals all of our spiritual ills. He is able to raise us up from the sick bed when we are physically ill!

"Why do we not exercise greater faith in the Divine Physician? As He worked for the man with the palsy, so He will work today for those who come to Him for healing. We have great need of more faith. I am alarmed as I see the lack of faith among our people. We need to come right into the presence of Christ, believing that He will heal our physical and spiritual infirmities." Selected Messages, book 1, p. 83.

What a challenge to our relationship with our living loving Saviour!

# SYSTEMATIC GIVING

Why did God say that the nation of Israel had robbed Him in offerings? Had He not left the decision of how much they would give in offerings, as distinct from tithes, to each individual? It is true that God was much more specific about tithing, but He did not leave them with an "offering plan" that was vague and indefinite. He told them what would please Him in the giving of offerings.

In Deut. 16:10 God said, "Thou shalt keep the feast of weeks unto the Lord thy God with a tribute of a freewill offering of thine hand, which thou shalt give unto the Lord thy God, according as the Lord thy God hath blessed thee. (Italics supplied) In New Testament times the apostle Paul reiterated the same principle in this way, "Upon the first day of the week let every one of you lay by him in store, as God hath prospered him, that there be no gatherings when I come." (1 Cor. 16:2). Christ taught the same principle in these words, "For unto whomsoever much is given, of him shall be much required." (Luke 12:48) But is the amount that we give as offerings to be the result of cold financial figuring? No, never! The person who appreciates what the Lord has done for him, and loves Him, will see the multiplicity of God's blessings much more than the nominal Christian whose heart has not truly been touched by the gospel story.

It is not the niggardly but the "cheerful giver" that God loves. It is not the one who gives "of necessity," under compulsion or "grudgingly," who receives the blessing of God (2 Cor. 9:7). Again it is not the one who gives impulsively, in a hit-and-miss fashion, after all his or her own "needs" have been supplied, who is following God's plan and honouring Him. Yet there are many in the church who are doing so. This is illustrated by the experience of a very sincere young man who once told the writer: "At the beginning of each month I am able to give a reasonable amount in offerings, but towards the end of each month I have very little cash left and can give only a little, if anything at all."

God is a God of order and system and cannot be pleased with "the uncertain gifts of impulse that vary according to the changing feelings of men." *Counsels on Stewardship*, p. 200. The counsel to us is, "on the first day of the week, let every one of you lay by him in store (at home) as God hath prospered him." (1 Cor. 16:2) In harmony with this thought, the messenger of God to the Seventh-day Adventist Church wrote: "He (God) desires us to give regularly and systematically. . . After the tithe is set apart, let gifts and offerings be apportioned as God hath prospered you." *Counsels on Stewardship*, p. 81.

Since God's church cannot be built securely upon erratic giving of offerings, or on an uncertain financial system, much has been said in the Spirit of prophecy writings about systematic giving for the work of God. Here are a few statements that can easily be supplemented by further research.

"The plan of systematic benevolence is pleasing to God." *Testimonies*, vol. 1, p. 190.

"There is order in heaven and God is well pleased with the efforts of His people in trying to move with system and order in His work on earth. . . . God is leading His people in the plan of systematic benevolence." *Testimonies*, vol. 1, p. 191.

#### A Safeguard Against Temptation:

"The plan of systematic benevolence will prove a safeguard to every family against temptations to spend means for needless things, and especially will it prove a blessing to the rich by guarding them from indulging in extravagance. . . . Systematic and liberal giving in accordance with the plan keeps the channel to the heart open. *Testimonies* vol. 3, p. 412.

"Systematic benevolence looks to you as needless. You overlook the fact that it originated with God. . . . This plan He ordained to save confusion, to correct covetousness, avarice, selfishness and idolatry. This system was to cause the burden to rest lightly, yet with due weight upon all." (Italics Supplied) Testimonies, vol. 1, p. 545.

On page 220 of Testimonies, vol. 1, we are told that neither debt, poverty, nor family responsibility is an excuse for not participating in the plan of systematic benevolence. Further, this source points out that families have sometimes been afflicted and without God's blessing because parents have stinted God with small offerings. On the other hand we read "While in poverty many regard systematic giving as a Bible requirement, but when they come into possession of money or property they do not acknowledge God's claim upon them!" Mrs. E. G. White in Review and Herald, December 8, 1896.

## What Ministers Should Do About It:

"This system has been carried out and has worked like magic. It liberally sustains the preachers and the cause. As soon as the preachers ceased their opposition, and stood out of the way, the people heartily responded to the call and prized the system. . . . God is displeased with preachers who now complain, and fail to throw their whole energies into this all-important work." *Testimonies*, vol. 1, p. 376.

In a personal message to one of the ministers, the servant of God had this to say: "You should have borne a pointed testimony, impressing upon them the necessity of sacrificing, and all doing a part to bear the burden of the cause. You should have brought them up on systematic benevolence. . . . Your indefinite position, and leaving matters so loose and slack has had a bad influence upon the cause there." *Testimonies*, vol. 1, p. 316.

# Does Systematic Benevolence Spoil the Spirit of Freewill Giving?

Someone may ask in all sincerity, "Does not systematic benevolence spoil the spirit of freewill giving?" We answer that it does not, for the individual still decides when and how he or she will give. Instead, he has the satisfaction of giving regularly and of always having something to contribute.

Also by adopting this plan he makes one decision about his offerings instead of many. In the words of Mrs. White, it fulfils "Jehovah's purpose that the Israelites should have a training that would eradicate selfishness, and develop breadth and nobility of character." Prophets and Kings, p. 647.

#### A Good Suggestion:

God taught ancient, and modern Israel, how systematic benevolence operates. "The devotion of a second tithe for the relief of the poor and other benevolent uses, tended to keep fresh before the people the truth of God's ownership of all, and of their opportunity to be channels of blessing." *Education*, p. 44. It is this suggestion of setting aside,

It is this suggestion of setting aside, for offerings, an amount of money equal to our tithe, that is recommended by the Trans-Africa Division Committee.

Many of our church members follow this plan, receive great satisfaction from doing so, and find themselves none the poorer but richly blessed.

In looking over the Tithe and Mission Offerings Comparative Sheet for January 1 - June 30, 1963, I find that no Union shows even one third of its tithe income as mission offering income. Yet God has set before us the goal of making our missions offerings and offerings for local church use as much as our tithe.

Here is a suggestion for dividing the "second tithe" among the usual offerings of the church:

Can Our Members Afford to Follow the Plan of Systematic Benevolence?

They cannot afford not to follow this plan, for by withholding offerings we have become poor. Read Prov. 11:24, 25, and you will learn that "the liberal soul shall be made fat" or prosperous. The servant of God tells us that when they were most generous with the Lord, giving more than twenty-five per cent of their income in tithes and offerings, the children of Israel were most prosperous. Moreover, at such times they enjoyed rich spiritual blessings.

Who can begin to estimate the magnitude of the blessings withheld from the Adventist church today because of our stinginess towards God?

#### Is This Goal Too High?

Take as an example, the three per cent of income suggested above for Sabbathschool offerings. Three years after World War 1, when conditions were still economically difficult in North America, our Sabbath-school offerings rose to 3.4 per cent of our income. For the next thirteen years, up to 1933 which included the depression years of 1929-1933, the amount given as Sabbath-school offerings remained well above three per cent of the total income of the members. In 1934, when conditions began to improve, the percentage of Sabbath-school offerings dropped to 2.8 per cent, and since then it has dropped still further, until it is only 1.4 per cent of income! These figures are for the North American Division. Figures for the Trans-Africa Division are even lower. Is it not a tragedy that, when prosperity increases, our offerings decrease in relation to the amount of tithe paid?

We do not wish to pray for a second recession, but do fervently pray for God's people to accept the plan of systematic benevolence, including that of the "second tithe" for offerings. Under such a plan we know that there will be more funds for the work and, more important, there will be rich showers of blessing descending upon the church.

## Muslims Accept Christ in Indonesia

Marajati Kalitouw opened her eyes wide in wonderment. "Can it be so," she thought, "that this teacher, a former Muslim and son of a hadji (a teacher of Islam who has studied in Mecca), is telling me the truth?"

But there it was, right in the Koran just as the teacher had said—that there is a true Christian group that does not eat unclean foods. A Christian group! In the Koran!

Could it be that her husband, a respected police officer, was justified in worshipping Allah on Saturday instead of on Friday as do all the 80 million faithful Muslims in Indonesia? Was it possible, as he hoped, that if she continued to study with this Christian they might be able to resolve their differences and live happily together? As long as her fanatical zeal for Islam matched his steadfastness for his new found faith in Jesus there could be no reconciliation between them; a divorce seemed imminent.

Well, perhaps she should continue to study. It was worth a try, and if she could be convinced from the Koran that Jesus Christ was more than a mere prophet, that He was in truth the Son of God, then she might—well, there was no harm in investigating anyway. But she would remain firm in one stipulation—they must study from the Koran, for was it not the true revelation from Allah?

Faithfully Pastor Burhanuddin visited the home twice each week for studies with Mrs. Marajati Kalitouw. Often it seemed his efforts were doomed to failure, but in faith and with much prayer he persisted. How well he recalled his own attitude toward the truth and the fact that even now he was considered an outcast by the Muslims in Palembang, his home in South Sumatra.

After three months studying concerning the Christ in the Koran, Mrs. Kalitouw was finally willing to compare its teachings with the Bible. Gradually, through the sweet influence of His Holy Spirit, Jesus in all His beauty and holiness was revealed to this dear lady's heart. She longed to be ready to meet Him, and she decided to cast her lot with His church. Now her zeal for Jesus and His truth knew no bounds. The fact that theirs was now a united and happy Christian home was in itself a powerful witness to others. She began to work earnestly for her parents and neighbours.

Before long, Brother Kalitouw now being pensioned from police service, they moved back to their home suburb of Bandung. Each afternoon Sister Marajati could be seen visiting the homes of her neighbours telling them about the true Christian group spoken of in the Koran who do not eat unclean foods. She assured them that this people is even more careful about their diet than the Muslims. Surprised and incredulous at first, for they had never heard of Christians who did not eat unclean foods, her friends refused to listen to this newborn Christian. But Sister Marajati continued to witness for Jesus, and after a while several families gathered every Wednesday evening to hear Pastor Burhanuddin teach them from the Koran as he had done for her.

Soon a lay family from our hospital church in Bandung moved to this community and started a branch Sabbathschool for the group. Since that time two baptisms have taken place. The conversion of each of these new members makes a

wonderful story of the redeeming love of Jesus.

Some weeks ago a man named Ling was employed by Mrs. Marajati. When Friday came Ling went to his employer with the apology: "I am sorry, but it will be impossible for me to come to work tomorrow or any Saturday thereafter."

"Oh, that is perfectly all right," replied Mrs. Marajati. "I was going to tell you that you need not come to work tomorrow, for we do not work on that day either. You see, the seventh day of the week is God's holy day and Seventh-day Adventists neither work nor do business on that day."

Mr. Ling was greatly surprised to hear this. "I thought that no one but my family kept Saturday. The custom has been handed down from father to son for many generations. We have been taught that this is the true holy day of Allah."

Immediately Sister Marajati invited him and his family to attend Sabbath-school and worship services in her home the next day. Since that time he and his wife have been faithful attendants every Sabbath.

Though Muslims' hatred for Christianity and their cruel treatment of all who forsake Islam to embrace Christianity is well known the world around, in Indonesia, greatest of Muslim nations, a new day is dawning. This story is but a sample of how honest people among the Muslims are turning to Jesus Christ and His saving grace as the answer to their souls' needs. Millions are waiting for the gospel light. Many unentered islands are now open to the proclamation of the soon-coming Saviour. In spite of these great opportunities we do not have sufficient workers to take advantage of them. We need three times the number of young ministers we are able to graduate each year from our union college.

Our senior academy in the North Celebes is strategically located to attract the youth of this large area of concentrated membership which is too far removed to permit the majority to attend our college near Bandung. Providing at least two years of college work in this institution will greatly increase the number of ministers and teachers ready to join the ranks of gospel workers each year. But it will take money to provide the increased facilities necessary, and we are a poor people.

Dear friends, we have many needs in this land of opportunity, but this school is one of our most urgent now. We look to you on this 13th Sabbath to lend us a hand. Through your generous gifts you can "Come over . . . and help us." We are sure you will not fail us. **AROUND OUR UNIONS** 

## Another Church in Bujumbura

For years the city of Bujumbura (formerly Usumbura) has lain in darkness as far as this last message to the world is concerned. What a long time has been wasted! But shall we waste more time by weeping about the failures of the past? Work has to be done.

Late in 1963 an evangelistic campaign was conducted in the new church in Bujumbura which nearly filled it to capacity. Over sixty souls were baptized as a result and the attendance rose to beyond the 300 mark. But that was not sufficient.

In February of this year two of the brethren from the union office with a team of African workers, conducted a campaign in the evangelistic tent erected in the section of the town known as Kamenge. Here very little, if anything was known of Seventh-day Adventists, and the territory was untouched.

From the first, the tent was full. As one of the recent converts reported just last Sabbath, he came first because he saw the tent and a lot of people, so he wanted to see what it was all about. As he listened to the sermon, he became interested and came back the next night, and the next, and the next, until he was convinced of the truth and converted. Now he rejoices in the new faith. This experience is typical of many others who came out of curiosity and continuing, became genuinely interested until they found their Saviour and a new way of life.

After six weeks of meetings six nights a week, a baptismal class of over 200 was formed and instructions have continued to be given three nights a week in preparation for baptism. As a result of it all, three baptisms were held in the first Bujumbura church on three consecutive Sabbaths. The first week 29 were baptized, the second week another 29 and the third 26, a part of which were baptized from the first Bujumbura church. The total for the Kamenge campaign was 74. The regular attendance in the new company averages around 200 a week, only a few of whom were members of the church prior to the effort.

As the campaign drew to a close, the matter of a meeting place after the tent should be removed began to loom large and insistent. What to do with this new company was a very important question. They could not be left without a meeting place in a town like this one. So we began a campaign amongst the members of the first church whose building had been built through appropriations. The response was excellent and 15,000 Frs. was pledged by the African believers. The European workers pledged 69,000 Frs. and the West Burundi Field contributed from their Church Development funds, as did the union and the Division. So; all together enough has been raised

to make it possible to put up a shell, at least, for a meeting place. The building will be completed as funds become available.

One encouraging feature of this evangelism is the financial strength that comes to the field as well. The new converts in the cities are better able to support their church. In the month of June, this new company paid into the field office just a little short of double the pastor's salary. Some of the men are members of the police force and others are holding jobs in offices in the town. Many of these men have stood firm for the Sabbath at the risk of losing their jobs. These make strong leaders in the church.

### Your Home Study Institute Mrs. R. H. Pierson

Our Trans-Africa Division Home Study Institute is your institution. This is your opportunity to study at home when local facilities are not available to you. Our Salisbury school is a branch of the Home Study Institute in Washington, D. C. which is in turn the Extension Division of the Associated Colleges of Seventhday Adventists.

On May 10, 1961, the Home Study Institute in Washington was formally admitted into membership of the National University Extension Association of America. From this one can see that our study program is recognized both in our denominational circles and in the accrediting groups of external study in America.

Many workers and members write to us asking if we prepare students for the various government examinations throughout the Division. The answer is No, we are not in a position to specifically prepare students for these examinations. It is not difficult to understand the reason for this. There are seventeen countries in Trans-Africa and many of these countries operate their own particular school systems with their own examinations. Even where several countries follow the same system the number of different examinations is too great for us to seek to meet these needs.

The Home Study Institute does, however, work in close co-operation with our Seventh-day Adventist schools by offering subjects supplementing courses which they offer. If you are planning to work towards a particular certificate or degree it would be well for you to write to the principal or registrar of the school you plan to attend and ascertain which subjects you could take with the Home Study Institute.

Who will profit from the courses offered by our Trans-Africa Home Study Institute? First, of course, those who will be continuing their education in the system with which the world Home Study Institute is affiliated. Parents living in isolated areas with children too small to leave home will be especially helped with the courses offered for the first six standards. Secondly, those who may not be planning to attend a school but desire to improve their general or specialized knowledge through systematic study. Thirdly, some parents who wish their children to study the prescribed government correspondence courses find our Home Study Institute denominational Bible subjects helpful in establishing their children in the Advent message. Many take advantage of the good reading books provided by the H. S. I. with various workbooks for the different standards. We have many children and youth enrolled in the Bible courses at present, but would like to see many more have the advantage of a systematic daily study of the Scriptures.

We also offer a wide range of subjects, beginning with a Pre-School Child course based on the book *Child Guidance*, by Mrs. E. G. White. This is one of our most popular courses. Mothers find the special kindergarten training of pre-school children very helpful. This course also enables the mother to receive two hours of college credit.

Our range of secondary subjects is quite wide—Bible, Bookkeeping, Biology, Modern Health, English, French, Mathematics, History and Typewriting. Our college courses include: Bible, English, Mathematics, History and Sociology, Accounting, French, Greek, and several educational courses such as Principles of Education, Techniques of Teaching, General Psychology, Adolescent Life and Problems, Administration of the Elementary School. There are a few other courses available which we have not mentioned.

We are here to help our workers, also our members and their children. Hundreds of students from the different countries of our Division have benefited from these courses. Mr. Robert Mziba, the dresser who will be in charge of the dispensary, was present to conduct the guests through the new building. Mr. Mziba was trained at Kendu Hospital and more recently was connected with the Princess Elizabeth Hospital in Dar-es-Salaam.

## The Building of the Riokindo Church

Let me tell you the story of how the members of the Riokindo church in Kisii country, South Kenya Field, built their church. Their first idea was that they should hire themselves out in a large group to go and dig gardens for other people for cash. This they did and got some cash. Then they thought again and had a better idea. "Why work for others? Why not work for ourselves? Let us borrow a large piece of land and cultivate it and sell the crop and give the profit to the fund?" So they went to the chief and said that they wanted him to lend them a large piece of ground, free, so that they could get cash for their church building. He graciously agreed and all the church members were out day after day digging, clearing, planting, cultivating, and, finally, harvesting and selling the crop. By the end of the harvest they had 750 shillings in hand from the sale of the crop.

Now they used this money to pay the men who burnt and made the bricks for them. Then they talked to a Seventh-day Adventist of another church who owned trees. He was willing to sell them his trees at a very low price. Some members went to talk to some Adventist sawyers at some distance away from Riokindo, and they were willing to come and saw the trees into the timbers for the roof. All that the sawyers asked for their work was food and housing during the days that they were sawing the trees.

As the cash came in so the members bought their cement, they hired lorries to bring them sand, they hired bricklayers, and the building began to take shape! Sometimes things seemed to go hard and their cash came to an end. They thought, "How can we ever finish it?" Once when they were feeling a little bit discouraged, not knowing how to go forward any more, some other Seventh-day Adventist churches at a distance heard of their difficulties, and each sent them a gift of 100 shillings. Again their courage soared and they bought the sheet iron for the roof and with the help from the Field, the Union and the Division they finished their church. What rejoicing at the dedication in October, 1963, when the Riokindo church was dedicated.

There is a sequel to this. Their church, they were sure, was large enough for their congregation, but when people around saw that the church was finished they decided they wanted to be church members also and now that big church is already over-crowded.

## Beyond Three Score Years and Ten

His mother was a pioneer member of the old Beaconsfield church and his grandmother is said to have been the first Seventh-day Adventist member in Johannesburg. Sabbath services were held regularly in her home long before there was any church organization or building in Johannesburg.

With the exception of Brother Symons and his son-in-law, A. Bristow (back right), all were born into the Adventist faith. The grandparents of Sister D. R. Symons (left) and the grandparents of Sister J. E. Symons (front centre) were pioneer members of the Rokeby Park church. Pastor Symons served the cause of God for many years, mainly as secretary-treasurer of various organizations within the Division. He has been retired for several years but still takes an active part in all church activities in the Grahamstown church.



Reports from the East African Union indicate that a most successful Five-Day Plan follow-up meeting was held in Nairobi recently. The audience was slightly larger than the largest during the campaign and all of those who gave up smoking are faithfully adhering to the principle. This 100 per cent result is most encouraging, and because of public demand a second Five-Day Plan campaign is scheduled for November.

The Northern Rhodesia Field has a 32 per cent increase in tithe this year above an average for the past three years.

While in Nairobi recently, Pastor R. H. Pierson spent a week doing Harvest Ingathering with the EAU office staff.

Evangelistic work on the Copperbelt, led by M. O. Klaussen, is moving steadily forward. A recent campaign was held in Kitwe but it was found that house-to-house visitation was more effective than public meetings, since the people were hesitant about being out at night because of disturbances. During this campaign 192 decisions for Christ were secured and of this number forty were backsliders reclaimed. The five-member team was well organized, and a large number of those interested has been enrolled in the Bible Correspondence Course.

Brother Klaussen also reports that the new church building is completed and now filled to its capacity (200) with so many newly converted souls.

Most of our new arrivals are medical personnel. Miss Emma Binder from the United States is located at Mwami Hospital in Northeast Rhodesia, and Miss Veracious LaKay from South Africa is also at Mwami. Miss Lola Hill and Miss Mavis Orr arrived recently from Australia and are at Ankole Hospital in Uganda and Ngoma Hospital in Rwanda respectively.

Dr. Niels B. Jorgensen from the United States has come to spend a short term relieving at Maluti Hospital in Basutoland.

The Thorkild Pedersen family from Denmark have reached Uganda in East Africa where they will be labouring. Brother and Sister H. Dubberstein and family of the Sentinel Publishing Association left Cape Town in July for their furlough in their homeland, Germany.

Pastor C. T. J. Hyde is conducting the Spring Week of Prayer at Helderberg College, using as a motto, My Lord and My God, and as an aim, Higher Ground.

The Cape Conference is only  $\pounds 2,000$  short of their Ingathering goal of  $\pounds 18,500$  at this time of writing. Brethren S. A. Smit and P. J. P. Botha head the list of workers with  $\pounds 1,300$  and  $\pounds 1,200$  on their soliciting cards, and among the lay members, Sister H. Olivier of Langkloof has over  $\pounds 200$  for her labour. These are just a few of the results which have come to hand. All of the conferences and fields in the South African Union are having good success in this year's campaign.

Malamulo Speaks, Vol. 1, No. 1 arrived in the Division Office this past week. It is the official organ of the Malamulo Training Institute and is the successor to Malamulo Tidings. The editor is L. N. Chilukusha, a Form Four student, with S. K. Munthali as deputy editor. The bulletin contains a fine number of contributions from students.

Writing in the GO Bulletin of the Oranje-Natal Conference, the president G. E. Garne emphasizes some new features of their H. I. campaign. One of these is that individual Honour Points will not be listed, as previously. "Our aim is going to be EVERY MEMBER PARTICIPATION rather than individual attainment. Our slogan will be FAITHFUL-NESS, rather than Merit."

# **PIETERSBURG CAMP-MEETING**

In April it was my privilege to attend a most inspiring camp-meeting in Pietersburg, Transvaal, where members from sixteen churches and companies met for their annual convocation. The membership is small and scattered over thousands of square miles. Members came from as far as 175 miles for this three day meeting.

Since this is the fifth year of drought, many of the cattle and sheep had died and most of the crops had failed. Last year the General Conference, the Trans-Africa Division, the South African Union Group II, and the Transvaal Field contributed generously to a famine relief fund. Mapela, with nineteen members, was one of the hardest hit. In this centre where Chief Mabusela's wife is a Seventhday Adventist, a large religious interest was developed, and now thirty-six persons have joined the baptismal class. Among them was the blind mother of the chief, who was baptized at Pietersburg during the camp-meeting. A total of twenty-three were baptized in a beautiful spot in the river near the town.

Pastor Mack Mkasi, the district leader, is giving a strong lead in every department of the work, and Pastor P. Msimang, the president of the Transvaal Field, has given good counsel and guidance. For the encouragement of our members throughout the Division, I am presenting the analysis of the camp-meeting offering. If our members in this drought-stricken area can give such a large offering, there is no excuse for small offerings in any part of our Division.

It is significant that these members spent more on transportation and food in connection with the camp-meeting than they gave in offerings. Thus the large amount spent by these members in transportation, food and offerings indicated a willingness to sacrifice for the help of others and to get spiritual food for their own souls.

Pastor Mkasi told me that when the camp-meeting ended in 1963, he immediately started plans for the 1964 offering. The members followed a definite plan of saving for this offering, thus spreading the burden over the whole year. This meant that the Sabbath-school offering was in no way diminished because of the large camp-meeting offering. This is the kind of spirit that will finish the work throughout Africa.
