Ghana Remembrance Service

ONE of London's most famous churches was the scene of a special service dedicated to the interests of Ghana, at 11 a.m. on Thursday, March 14th.

The church was St. Martin-in-the-Fields, located in the very hub of the Empire at Trafalgar Square. This is the church which was the centre of the great Advent movement which swept Britain in the early nine-teenth century.

Several hundred Gold Coasters were present, as well as high dignitaries from Britain. Also present were Pastor G. D. King, Brother G. L. Anniss, and the writer. As I sat in a portion of the gallery overlooking the pulpit, together with many West Africans, I was able to look straight down at the most distinguished member of that impressive congregation, the Duke of Gloucester, uncle of Queen Elizabeth. His presence gave added dignity to a fine service.

Ghana's new status as an honoured and independent member of the British Commonwealth, was being celebrated at this time, and prayers were offered for God's blessing upon it. The first Scripture lesson was read by a West African, Rev. E. S. D. Martinson, whose impeccable English and resonant voice made it a real pleasure to listen to the inspired words of 1 Chronicles 16:8-15, 21, 23-36. Mr. Martinson is attached to the High Commissioner's Office in London.

The sermon was preached by the Bishop of Peterborough, and I thought that our members in West Africa would be interested to read a few of the thoughts he expressed. His text was Hebrews 11:8: "By faith Abraham, when he was called to go out into a place which he should after re-

ceive for an inheritance, obeyed."

Gold Coast, he said, was built on faith. A Crown Colony for 83 years, Gold Coast, thanks to the faith of its inhabitants, the missionaries, and the administrators, has developed to its present status. The Christian Church has given to Gold Coast much that has made the present status possible. Despite occasional tensions between Europeans and Africans, deep down they have had faith in each other.

The Bishop reminded us that the very first non-European Christian minister to be ordained since the Protestant Reformation, was a West African from the Gold Coast.

He quoted the words of the famous Admiral Drake; "There must be a beginning,

but the continuing unto the end yields the true glory;" and that, for true success in Ghana's new venture, the people must keep in focus "the city which hath foundations, whose builder and maker is God."

"Material progress does not make a nation," he said. "It is men, not walls, which make a city; and it is only men of faith in God who can successfully lead a people.'

The Bishop continued: "Ghana now has a unique privilege of showing what she can contribute to the good of the world."

A unique service was concluded with the following benediction by the Archbishop of Canterbury:

"Remember. O Lord, what Thou hast wrought in us, and not what we deserve: and as Thou hast called us to Thy service, make us worthy of our calling: through Jesus Christ our Lord, Amen."

As brethren in Christ we look forward to the time which we know to be just ahead, when the Lord will welcome us all into that Heavenly Kingdom where our citizenship truly belongs.

Born—A New Nation

We left Nigeria on the 3rd of March to visit the Gold Coast. Just over a week we spent on local leave when we had to return to our work in Nigeria. We went to visit the Gold Coast, but we returned from Ghana. During our visit a new nation had been born, one of the first African colonies to join the commonwealth of nations.

Accra was in a gay mood and in gay attire. Ghana's national colours; red, yellow and green, were displayed everywhere in banners and flags flying from the roof tops and bunting draped from almost every building in the city. Many good Ghanaians were attired in these colours, with the picture of the Premier and the words Freedom and Justice in hold letters imprinted in the cloth. Joy and laughter, with extreme politeness, was the order of the day.

The festivities were grand, from the fireworks display on the evening of independence to the great morning, the 6th of March, when the Ghana parliament held its first session, yes, and to the colourful Durbar on the following day. Everything was very well planned, taking place at the time appointed with no disturbance and no confusion.

It isn't every day that a new nation is

born and rarely does a new nation begin with such a lack of turmoil and difficulty and with such seeming peace and unity. May the spirit of its beginning long continue. A new born nation as a new born babe will surely have some tumbles and bruises, but we hope that the new Ghana will only be stirred to greater achievements by these. It must now find its place among the nations of the world.

World affairs with its problems must now be met by Ghana as an independent nation and may its strong convictions on Freedom, Justice and Peace be an added influence to help put in practice these high ideals in a world of unrest.

OUTSTRETCHED HANDS

May I introduce to you Domingo, 28, Juanito, 26, and Paz, 22, three children of Mr. and Mrs. Villagomez who live in Camarines Sur, the territory of the Southern Luzon Mission in which the North Philippine Union proposes to build a vocational training school from the Thirteenth Sabbath overflow of the second quarter. We hope that this school will meet the needs of the hundreds of young people who stand with outstretched hands, looking to the leaders of the denomination with the hope in their hearts that somehow they will be provided with Christian education.

Domingo, Juanito and Paz, are typical youth of the Southern Luzon Mission who constantly struggle to secure an education. These three youth with their parents found the advent message in the year 1940. As little by little the message opened their minds which had been steeped in the doctrines of Catholicism since their birth, their hearts responded to the anointing of the Holy Spirit to step out and keep the Sabbath. It was a real struggle to leave a large Catholic church which in the Philippines is always-located right in the very centre of every community. Their friends and neighbours would ask, "What is this that you are doing? How can you leave the Mother church to enter into that small and unknown sect, the 'Sabadistas'?" But like loyal Adventists all around the Seventh-day world, their hearts were moved and they continued to be true to their God. They joined the Seventh-day Adventist people in their community and started to teach their neighbours and friends the new found faith.

They had not been long in the church before they found that Seventh-day Adventists operate a system of schools and colleges where they could be trained for service. They determined in their hearts that they would have a Christian education at any cost.

After finishing the intermediate grades in his home town, Domingo came to Manila and applied at Philippine Union College as a self-supporting student. Juanito came two years later, and his sister, Paz, the next year. There is no school in their mission, and these young people without funds wish

to support themselves while seeking a Christian education. And so they have secured employment in the Manila area and are living together in a small room helping each other in their educational projects. Paz takes care of the laundering of her brothers and cooks for them. They are taking turns in attending the school. One works to support the others, while they go to school, and the next year he drops out and becomes a worker while the brother of the sister attends the academy the next year. They have been working now for nine years for that great prize of Christian education. And still Domingo has more years to go to complete his work. Even though he is 28 years of age, he is not discouraged, and says, "It is worth it to have a Christian education."

These three youth are industrious, conse-

crated and willing to sacrifice in order to obtain a Christian education. There are hundreds of youth like these in the North Philippine Union stretching out their hands to the leaders of the denomination, saying, "Give us only an opportunity. We are willing to work. Our great desire is to have an education in the schools of the prophets."

We appeal to the brethren and sisters of the world field to help us to provide that opportunity which our students so much seek. We have already purchased the land for an academy in the Southern Luzon area. It has a fine location with good rich land. We have already planted over 6,000 citrus trees which will begin to bear fruit in three more years. We have 20,000 pineapple plants, papaya, bananas, and other fruit erops coming on. We have found that the land is well suited for the production of soybeans. This will provide a good crop which is in demand here in the Philippine Islands.

We are attempting to build a school where we can not only give vocational training to our youth but where they can earn a large portion of their way. These students come from rural areas where there is little industry and where their finances are insufficient to pay their way to a school when cash is required.

We are working against great odds to provide these earnest and consecrated Godfearing youth a means of securing Christian education. Will you help us find that way? May God bless you as you dip deeply into your purses on 13th Sabbath.

It was hot, especially as we were hemmed in by scores of people who crowded around us, thus cutting off the little breeze that was blowing. Many present had umbrellas and some held these over our heads to protect us from the direct rays of the sun, for which we were very thankful. It was the 14th of March and the opening day for our dispensary at Erunmu.

Over 400 school children from our Secondary Modern School at Erunmu and our nearby Primary Schools were present, p'us many of the villagers from Erunmu and the surrounding villages. There was great rajoicing as this large crowd gathered to witness the opening of the dispensary, for a long hoped for dream had become a reality.

After Pastor Adeoye had offered a prayer of thanksgiving and had petitioned God for His blessing upon this new venture, a short programme of speeches and music was given. Dr. Donald Petersen gave a short address of encouragement to an appreciative

audience. He came from our hospital at Ile-Ife to officiate at this dispensary opening. When the ceremony had been concluded at almost 12.00 o'clock the Doctor began the most important part of the day's programme, i.e. to care for the sick. Seventy-five patients were examined and treated on this opening day and we trust that many more may be cared for in the days and weeks to come.

Until a few weeks ago we saw no possibility of beginning this new venture. The building had been well prepared for a temporary dispensary, but we had no nurse to send to Enunmu as there are not enough nurses to adequately fill the needs of our hospitals in West Africa. Then Mrs. Makinde, the wife of our District Leader in that area, who was a graduate of our Ife hospital, volunteered to do this work. The Lord had opened the way. As soon as possible the Makindes were moved to Erunmu and the dispensary was opened.

We appreciate the interest of our Medical Staff at Ife in this new project and we sincerely hope that the work of Mrs. Makinde and the visiting doctors will strengthen our soul-winning efforts in that area and that any barrier between our people and others, or any prejudice that still exists, may soon

be broken down.

In Acts chapter 28, the Apostle Paul when entering a strange land, spoke of his joy when greeted by those who loved the Lord, it refreshed him and gave him renew-

ed courage to face the future,

From February 8-17, I was privileged to visit our brethren in the Ivory Coast and to spend three happy days with our French speaking colporteur evangelists in a brief institute. This was followed by a three day Sabbath School Rally, and Workshop, which was attended by local church leaders, including evangelists, Emmanuel Diaova and Jacob Gbessin. The field leader Mr. G. Gutikuist acted as interpreter throughout.

Prior to commencing the institute, two profitable days were spent with Pastor Charpiot and Wild, visiting brethren from the Southern European Division who are on an extended tour of their African Territo-

ries.

Pastor Charpiot conducted the Friday night meeting. This experienced publishing leader, testified of his joy in the Lord, and recalled some wonderful experiences, showing the power of the Holy Spirit working with those who carry the printed page.

The Sabbath day was another spiritual feast. We fellowshipped with our believers of the Ebrie tribe in Begreto church. In order to reach the company we had to cross a wide lagoon in native canoes, virtually

hollowed out trees.

Pastor Wild was the speaker on Sabbath morning, and we were inspired by a challenging message from John 4:34-38. The Ebrie people sang their response, "Lift up a flag among the people", with feeling and determination.

In passing, the beauty of these Ebrie believers worship, in song, was a joy to heart. Even the little children were able to sing their parts, under the capable direction of

a native music director.

During the ensuing institute days, a period was set aside for personal experiences. It was very encouraging to hear how the Lord helped our literature workers to convince people from all stations of life, many of which are Catholics, to buy our message filled literature. Observe the testimony of colporteur Daniel Djike. This young man told of his visit to the G. P. O. in Abidjan,

His enquiries there eventually led him to a departmental office behind the scenes. There he canvassed a hard-boiled civil servant who had just arrived from France. It appeared that this man had spent several years in a Catholic Seminary, training for the priesthood, but had become disillusioned and consequently lost his vision of priestly service.

He severely ridiculed Daniel as he presented Desire of Ages, and condemned the Bible as a book of fables. However Daniel inherited the courage and spirit of the great leader of Israel whose name he bore. He challenged this man to read his Bible and to study the life of Christ again, adding that he would pray for him. Eventually our colporteur turned his attention to other members of the office staff, who being impressed with this unusual visitor, brought copies of Great Controversy and Desire of Ages.

Later Daniel returned to this same office, and was immediately questioned by this difficult civil servant. It appears that he had followed Daniel's advice and restudied his Bible also reading portions of Great Controversy, and Desire of Ages which his fellow staff members had loaned him.

He thanked Daniel for his prayers and eagerly purchased a copy of Great Controversy. Surely the prayers of our modern Daniel had closed the lion's mouth. Daniel asked that we should pray for this French postal worker, that as he studies the message he will be led to join God's remnant people.

Two workers, John Zakkar, and Jacob Gbessin, have seen souls baptized following their faithful seed sowing. In many other cases there are people who are earnestly striving to understand light and truth because of the literature they have bought,
