THE CONFERENCE TITHES.

No DOUBT the brethren and sisters who pay tithes for the support of the gospel work in our State, want to know the condition of the treasury; and it is right that they be informed.

Owing to the fact that we have had more laborers, and consequently a larger pay roll, for the past year or two than formerly, our funds have not been quite sufficient to meet current expenses, so that at the present writing, Dec. 5, we lack about five hundred dollars of having enough to pay the eighty per cent on laborers' accounts already audited. This is not a very large sum, but we are all anxious that the deficit shall not be increased. We are glad to note the faithfulness which many have shown in paying their tithes promptly, and we have evidence that it tends to their spiritual growth and prosperity; but there must be some among us who have not done all our duty in this regard. We are told in the Testimonies that if all would pay the tithe there would be no lack of means to carry forward the Lord's work. The Lord has promised great blessings to those who bring all the tithes into the storehouse; and would it not be a grand thing to begin the new year. Nineteen Hundred, with our Conference debt all paid, and with our individual record clean in this regard? Will we not all present ourselves as candidates for the blessing that God has promised in Mal. 3:10-12; and while thus proving the Lord, also prove that we love the truth and have faith in his word? EZEKIEL 20:25.

I WISH to present, for careful consideration, a lew suggestive thoughts on this text and its connection.

1. God called upon Israel to leave their idols. Verse 7. This was while they were still in Egypt (Verses 6, 8), "in the midst of the land of Egypt." They were honoring idols.

2. They finally left them and came out of Egypt. Verses 9, 10.

3. Then the Lord gave them his statutes and judgments, "which if a man do, he shall even *live* in them." Verse 11; Lev. 18:5.

4. God's statutes and judgments were "right, . . . and true, and righteous altogether," Ps. 19:8-11; Deut. 4:5-8.

5. When they despised the Lord's statutes and judgments, he "gave them up to statutes that were not good and judgments whereby they should not live." Jewish Version. The way the Lord sends evil is to permit it. Rom. 1:24; 2 Thess. 2:11. He does not originate evil and tempt man with it. James 1:13. Therefore the Jewish translation is correct, as we shall see from parallel texts.

6. These statutes that were *not good* were the statutes of the heathen, of their own wicked kings, and the "statutes of their fathers" in Egypt. They were "the commandments of men." See verse 18; verse 39 ("go"); Ps, 81:10-13; 2 Kings 17:7, 8.

7. Among these "abominations" that God "gave them vp to" was the worship of Moloch, causing the firstborn child to pass through the fire, and worshiping the sun, moon, and stars. Verses 26-32; Amos 5:25, 26; Acts 7:41-43. These things were required by the wicked statutes of the heathen.

8. The Lord had warned Israel against them; and even after they had turned to these "statutes that were not good," he in tender mercy called them back to his commandments and his statutes. Lev. 18:3-5; 2 Kings 17:8, 13-23. Thus God always treats his people before he gives them up to their own desires and calls another people. Israel had no authority to make statutes or to do anything but to obey God. They had no legislative body. Their government was composed only of judicial and executive branches, with the prophets as the mouthpiece of the Lord, who was their true King. (Solomon sat on the throne of the Lord. 1 Chron. 29:23). The Lord himself made their laws. They had no authority to add to or take from. Deut. 4:1.2. Let us learn obedience from the sad result of their disobedience. It is as true to-day as then that "the Lord is our Lawgiver. Isa. 33:22; Jas. 4:12. No human ordinance is of any binding authority to save or condemn us in the judgment. God's word alone is to be the standard in all things. It will furnish to "every good work." To it alone must be our appeal for evidence before the people. It contains every saving truth. This is what made us Seventhday Adventists, and it alone can keep us such. 2 Tim. 3:16, 17; Acts 17:11; Prov. 30:5, 6; Col. 2:20-23; Matt. 15:9, 13; John 12:48; 15:3; Eph. 5:26, 27; Isa 8:20; Jer. 17:5-8; Ps. 1:1-3.

Read carefully each scripture in this article and the chapter in Great Controversy, Volume 4, entitled "The Scriptures a Safeguard."
