THE SEVENTH-DAY ADVENTIST CAMP-MEETING. TO BE HELD IN AMES, IOWA, MAY 31 TO JUNE 10, 1900.

THE annual camp-meeting of the Iowa Conference of Seventh-Day Ad-

ventists will be held at College Park, Ames, Iowa, May 31-June 10. Ames is but a few miles from the center of the State; and a beautiful shaded park, one mile west of the station, has been offered, free of charge, for the meeting. A street car line runs from the depot along the side of the grounds. Ask to be put off at the camp-grounds, and you will have no trouble. The camp-meeting begins Thursday evening, May 31, and will be preceded by a workers' meeting, be-


ginning May 28. This short meeting before the camp-meeting is especially designed for a preparation of the laborers employed by the Conference, for the most successful spiritual labor during the camp-meeting, also to settle all financial accounts with the laborers for the past year. The Seventh-day Adventists do not depend upon special donations, collections, or assessments, for means to pay their laborers, neither do they uphold the appointing of questionable pleasure gatherings, with the raising of these necessary funds in view. As a people they accept the Bible plan, plainly laid down, both in the Old and New Testaments, of freely returning to the Lord the tithe, or tenth, of their increase. The preparations for the camp-meeting are in the hands of committees, who will arrange every part with a view to size from the large pavilion, 80 ft. x 120 ft., down to the common family tents, which are rented for use during the meetings at reasonable rates.



The Seventh-day Adventists are a strictly temperance people, making health and temperance a part of their faith. SEVENTH-DAY ADVENTISTS.

THERE are two features in the denominational name of this people. They, in harmony with many in nearly all denominations, believe the law of God to be binding upon all in all ages, and that it is unchangeable. Hence they observe the seventh day of the week (Saturday) as the Sabbath. And the term "Adventist" signifies their faith in the near, personal advent, or appearing, of the Saviour, when he comes to this world "with all the holy angels," to reward his faithful children.

They have no faith in setting times, such as days, months, or years, for that event to occur; and a person can not be in harmony with their faith and believe in "time setting." They do believe, however, that the generation now living will not all pass away until our Saviour shall come. This denomination, though arising since 1844, now numbers about fifteen hundred organized churches, with half as many unorganized companies. Their public laborers number about fourteen hundred, in the different departments of ministerial and missionary work.

Their first sale of pamphlets and tracts was in 1854. Since that time they have sold more than ten million dollars worth of books, pamphlets, and tracts. They are printing more than forty-two different papers, besides the Conference State papers, about onehalf of which are in foreign tongues. They are now printing books in thirtyfive different languages. They have

seven large denominational schools located in this county, one in Australia. one in South Africa, and one in Denmark. From an early date in their work the holding of camp-meetings has been established among them. not for notoriety nor display, but for the purpose of earnestly seeking God together and of forming plans for more acceptable service, and as a means of saving sinners and refreshing and strengthening those who know God. The camp-meeting at Ames is appointed with these objects in view. We cordially invite all to meet with us and enjoy this season together.

CONDITIONS OF REDUCED RATES TO THE CAMP-MEETING.

The usual reduction to one and onethird fare for the the round trip, on the certificate plan, has been granted by the Western Passenger Association to those attending our annual Conference and camp-meeting at Ames, May 31—June 10, on the following conditions:—

A receipt must be taken from the ticket agent for each ticket purchased for going passage. No receipt will be honored that bears date before May 31 or later than June 6. No reduction will be made where the local one-way rate is less than fifty cents. Those who will have to travel over more than one line of railway, and so can not buy a through ticket to the place of meeting, must be sure to take a receipt for every ticket purchased, each receipt to cover only one single-trip ticket.

When the above conditions have been complied with, and one hundred or more such certificates have been presented and signed by the secretary of the meeting, and also by the joint agent for the railroads, the holders of such certificates will be returned at one-third fare, not later than three days after the close of the meeting.
