THE SEVENTH-DAY ADVENTIST CAMP-MEETING.

TO BE HELD AT DES MOINES, IOWA, MAY
 30 TO JUNE 9, 1901.

THE annual camp-meeting of the Iowa Conference of Seventh-day Adventists will be held at Des Moines, beginning May 30 and continuing until June 9. The camp will be located on Governor's Square, a few blocks southeast from the capitol building, and of easy access by the electric car line.

About three days prior to the regular meeting a worker's meeting will be held to prepare the camp and to attend to much of the detail work, so that all the laborers will be left as free as possible to enter into the spiritual work of the camp-meeting proper.

These annual gatherings are a very

essential factor in the unifying of all phases of the denominational work in the Conference. It is expected that each church will be fully represented by duly accredited delegates. It is also expected that there will be a full attendance from all the churches. At these convocations the various phases of missionary work are considered, and the training of persons to become missionaries will receive considerable attention. It will not be strange if many voluntarily offer to devote their lives to that work. In this connection we mention the work of the colleges, church schools, Sabbath schools, sanitariums, medical missions, and treatment rooms, and the house-to-house

The religious instruction of the camp will be conducted in the English, German, Swedish, and Danish-Norwegian languages. We have been encouraged to announce that the President of the General Conference and the Field Secretary of the General Conference Mission Board will be in attendance. These men have had a wide range of experience in America, Australia, South Africa, and Europe, and therefore come to us thoroughly imbued with the missionary spirit. Able representatives of medical missionary lines will be present to render valuable assistance both to mind and body, and thereby give practical lessons as to the place the medical missionary occupies in the evangelization of the world.

The entire force of ministers, licentiates, and Bible workers of the Iowa Conference are expected to be upon the grounds during the meeting. Every precaution will be taken to keep the grounds neat, clean, and pleasant. The camp-ground will present the appearance of a veritable cotton city, numbering about two hundred tents in all, varying in size from the large pavilion, 80 ft. x

120 ft., down to the common family tents, which are rented for use during the meeting at reasonable rates.

We bespeak for the citizens of Des Moines, and for all in attendance, a religious feast of good things.

SPECIAL services for the public will be held at 11 A. M. and 2:30 and 7:45 P. M.

TENTS will be furnished to those attending the camp-meeting, at the following rates: 12x14, \$2.25; 10x12, \$1.75. Additional charge for fly, \$1.00.

Those wishing to find friends who are camped on the grounds may inquire at the Locating Committee tent. Streets will be laid out regularly and each tent numbered.

ABLE ministers of the German and Scandinavian nationalities will be present, so that the spiritual work of the camp will be carried along simultaneously in all languages.

A SPECIAL effort will be made in behalf of the youth and children. Daily meetings will be held by competent and experienced instructors, in a tent especially provided for that purpose.

THERE will be suitable pavilions for all the preaching services, also family tents for all who wish to camp on the grounds. Every convenience will be provided to make the camp a fair representation of the home life.

For all who wish to avoid the trouble of boarding themselves, liberal, hygienic meals will be furnished at a reasonable rate. There will be a soup counter for those who do not care to take regular meals at the dining tent.

THE Governor's Square is located on East Walnut St., between Fourteenth and Fifteenth Sts. Take the Capitol and Grand Avenue street car, which runs directly to the grounds. The Fair Ground car also runs over the same line.

CALL at the book-stand and examine the large assortment of Bibles and religious literature. Books, pamphlets, and tracts treating upon almost every subject of religious interest, will be displayed, and periodicals given away upon application.

A CORDIAL invitation is extended to all to attend the services. Every attention will be given to visitors and strangers, to make their visit to the camp pleasant and profitable. Elderly people and tired mothers are especially invited to the reception tent.

REDUCED RATES TO CAMP-MEETING.

THE Western Passenger Association has given a rate of one and one-third fare for the round trip, on the certificate plan, to our annual meeting at Des Moines, on the following conditions: Tickets for going passage must be purchased not earlier than May 30, nor later than June 5, purchaser paying full fare to the place of meeting. The purchaser must take a certificate of the agent for each ticket purchased (a receipt from the conductor will not do); and on reaching the camp-ground he must have these certificates signed by the secretary, and stamped by the joint agent who will be on the camp-ground Thursday, June 6. When one hundred such certificates have been so signed and stamped, the holder will be returned at one-third fare, the return limit being June 13. No reduction will be granted where the full fare one way is less than fifty cents. Be careful to get your certificates properly dated, and take a certificate of every agent from whom you buy a ticket.
