THE SIOUX RAPIDS CAMP-MEETING.

THE first service was held Tuesday evening, August 20, Eld. L. F. Starr giving a stirring discourse. FIELD REPORTS.

NEW HAMPTON.

THE work here was begun July 15, and for two weeks was carried on in the German language. But we were pressed to hold some services in English, and now are holding weekly four meetings in English and three in German, with a fair attendance. Bro. E. H. Adams and family were asked to leave Waterloo and come to assist in the English work in this place, and have been here since August 9. We have presented, by the help of the Lord, "The advent message to the world in this generation." Some seem to be deeply interested. In conversation with a minister of the city he said, "Why don't you preach Christ instead of the prophecies?" A dentist, in whose office we were, said, "I have not heard them preach one sermon without preaching Christ." We are thankful for such witness for the truth. "Well," said the minister, "I admit you do more than any others I ever heard." He concluded to preach Christ morefully, taking for his theme the second coming of Christ, and remarked, "You do not need to think I am preaching on this subject simply because the Adventists have come to town and stirred me up.... People tell me how familiar the Adventists seem to be with their Bibles. The reason is they have them all marked up." In conversation with him the day following a sister said, "Bro. --, I want to show you my husband's Bible. You see it has no marks in it." "Well," said he, in great embarrassment, "I mark mine. Your husband must have it marked in his mind." Another minister has invited us to speak in his church Sunday morning, September 8, on the second coming of Christ. We have now reached the Sabbath question, and ere this is read we will have presented its sacred claims upon this people. We have gone over the town four times, and are now having cards printed to give the people another personal invitation to come. HEALTH HINTS.

An unwritten law says that if a man puts his finger in the fire he will get burned. Some may not regard pain as a blessing; yet it is one of the greatest of blessings; for it is a warning that something in the vital economy is wrong, and that it is time to search out the cause of trouble and remedy it. God has never changed, neither does He propose to change our organism in order that we may violate physical law without feeling the effects of violation. By indulging the inclination and appetite, man violates the laws of life and health. If he obeys conscience, man must be controlled by principle in matters of eating, drinking, and dressing. Our bodies seem so commonplace to us that we frequently neglect them, and treat them as a child treats his toy the novelty of which is worn away. Man is apt to think the short time wasted that is required to dash some water on his hands and face in the morning and make a hasty toilet. Yet the machinery of the body is expected to run day and night, stopping only to bolt the material we call food and to snatch a few hours of troubled sleep. Then, when nature rebels at such treatment, and by the agency of pain, calls our attention to the fact, we wonder why kind Providence allows us to get sick. The wonder is that Providence allows us to keep well as long as we do. When we are sufficiently acquainted with nature's laws, and have strength to keep them, we will then have attained to that stage of development where disease can not reach us; for there will be no law broken for which we must pay the penalty.
