THE STATE MEETING.

Ar the time appointed for this important meeting to begin, nearly all of the workers assembled to share in the rich blessings which God has in store for His people at this time. We were impressed that the Lord is guiding His servants, and has a tender care for His people. John in his vision saw in the midst of the golden candlesticks the Son of Man with seven stars in His right hand, and that hand has never been empty. The seven stars which the Son of Man holds in His right hand are the ministers of God. The Lord has always had men who were true and faithful in doing His work in the earth. As the message from the Spirit of Prophecy was read, all could see and know that there had been a departure from right principles and right ways. For a number of years our plans and work have been carried on according to principles adopted by the world. It is necessary, therefore, that God's people cut loose from the world and dwell alone. "The people shall dwell alone, and shall not be reckoned among the nations." Num. 23:9. God manifested His power in the presentation of the truth; many precious rays of light were permitted to shine upon our hearts, and it is safe to say that this was the best workers' meeting ever held in Iowa.

At our closing service, after a discourse on the second coming of our Lord, the Holy Spirit so impressed hearts that a general jubilee and praise meeting was held, in which nearly all of the congregation took part. When a call was made for those who were not free in the Lord, and who desired to become children of God, to make it manifest, ten young people responded. It was a blessed experience for the Nevada church, as well as for all of the workers. We go forth in the name of our God, with renewed courage and strength, to labor with power for the salvation of souls. May the same spirit and power that was manifested at this meeting be witnessed throughout the whole Conference. Brethren and sisters in Iowa, let us arouse; let us take hold of the work of the Lord with the earnestness which characterized God's faithful servants in ages gone by. We can not afford to be found sleeping now. The coming of the Lord draweth nigh; therefore, let us be children of the light and children of the day, watching for our Lord's return.

ORGANIZATION.

"Those who have an unction from on high, will in all their efforts encourage order, discipline, and union of action; then the angels of God can cooperate with them."-"Gospel Workers," p. 157.

Some get the idea when we speak of organizing the work that there must be

a certain amount of machinery and red tape connected with it or it will not prove successful. The sooner they give up this idea the better it will be. Let us try to follow the instruction given below: "The very simplest modes of work should be devised, and set in operation among our churches. members will co operate with such a plan, and perseveringly carry it out. they will reap a rich reward; for their experience will grow brighter, their ability will increase through exercise, and souls will be saved through their efforts." "Plan ways whereby a live interest may be kindled, and train up the young to do what is appointed them.In every church the members should be trained so that they will devote time to the work."-"Home Missionary Work," pp. 11, 16. If this instruction had been beeded long ago, the missionary work in our churches would have been far in advance of where it is to-day. Shall we now walk in the lightb or will we con inue in the same old rut, not making an advanced move, but falling behind year after DELLA WALLACE.

HEALTH HINTS.

HOW TO BE BEAUTIFUL.

It is essential, first of all, to purify the blood by systematic exercise, plenty of fresh air, and a good diet. A portion of each day should be taken for muscular and breathing exercises. Walking is one of the best and cheapest exercises, and deep breathing exercises can be taken at the same time. Walk out and see some of your poor sick neighbors; carry them a word of cheer and good will, and if they are in need devise ways and means whereby they can be helped. Doing these things will cheer our own hearts, and give a light to the eye that is beautiful, because it tells of the soul that is within.

Exercise and fresh air come first, then the skin requires attention. Plenty of water and good soap are necessary for this; and do not be afraid of the cold morning sponge or a dash of cold water over the body; for this awakens into activity all the sluggish cells of the body, and quickens the flow of blood, and our bodies feel like new. Next the diet must have attention. Eat plenty of good, pure food at the proper time, masticating it thoroughly; but do not go to bed ever with a full stomach. Do not be afraid of cold air; for when a person is well clothed, this acts as a tonic.

Neatness is a factor in bringing out the beauty of person, and can not be overlooked; for no matter how fair the face, if the person is attired in slovenly garments, it would not appear beautiful.
