## REPORT OF WESTERN CANADIAN UNION CONFERENCE TO GENERAL CONFERENCE ASSEMBLED AT WASHINGTON, D.C.

The Western Canadian Union was organized in October, 1907, and was admitted to the General Conference at its quadrennial session in 1909. Its territory embraces the four western conferences of Canada: British Columbia, Alberta, Saskatchewan and Manitoba; having in addition all that portion of Ontario lying west of Port Arthur. The entire area covers a little more than a million square miles.

The population is about 1,700,000, composed of English, German, French, Scandinavian, Russian, Polish, Roumanian, Bohemian, Galician, Chinese, Japanese, Native Indians, and many other nationalities. The area being one million square miles and the population 1,700,000, it will be observed that the average is a little less than two persons to the square mile.

The chief industries within the Union territory are farming, stock-raising, dairying, fruit-raising, mining and lumbering.

Since the Message entered this field our brethren have been struggling to place the work on a permanent basis as rapidly as possible. The first year the Union was organized we received \$7,500 in appropriations from the General Conference, there not being a local conference within our territory that was self-supporting. The Lord blessed the efforts of our brethren, however, and year by year they were able to diminish the appropriation. One conference after another declared itself self-supporting, until at the beginning of 1913 we were able to inform the General Conference that we would not ask for further appropriations.

Last year the total number of laborers in our field was as follows:

We have 48 churches and two companies, with a total membership of 1304, isolated Sabbath-keepers 497, making a total of 1801 Sabbath-keepers. There are 68 Sabbath-schools; total membership, 1,659. Our total Sabbath-school contributions for 1912 were \$5,914.02.

We have two academies within our Union; one is located at Pitt Meadows, B.C., and is known as the Manson Academy, having an enrolment this year of about 50; the other is known as the Alberta Industrial Academy, and is located at Lacombe, Alberta. The enrolment of this school this year

reached 160. These academies are doing splendid work, and good results of each are already being seen in our field. Besides these we have 14 church and family schools in operation. The total enrolment last year of all our schools was 446. Perhaps the following comparison may better express the real pulse of the work in our field for the period of four years just passed. Comparing the reports at the close of 1908 with those at the close of 1912 the following will be observed:

January 1, 1909, our total membership was 839; January 1, 1913, it was 1304.

Our total Sabbath-keepers then numbered 1159; now the number is 1801.

At that time our annual tithe receipts were \$15,005,01 while for 1912 our tithe amounted to \$36,044.23.

Our tithe per capita at that time was \$12.95; now the tithe per capita is \$20.02.

For the year 1908, our book tract and periodical sales were \$19,421.58, but in 1912 our book tract and periodical sales were \$34,044.23.

Our offerings to missions for 1908 were \$3,984.14; and in 1912 our offerings to missions were \$14,125.05. This does not include the regular percentage of tithe paid regularly by each local conference for missions.

About a year ago we began the publication of a Union paper which we call the Western Canadian Tidings, which paper is proving a blessing to our field. It is an eight-page periodical published biweekly, and now has a circulation of 1,000.

There are many things we would like to tell you about our work in this interesting field, but this report must be brief. In closing it is my duty as well as my great pleasure to deliver the message from our people in Western Canada, that they purpose by the grace of God to remain true to the cause.

## TWO THOUSAND DOLLARS IN 1913.

The Sabbath-school Department of the General Conference has chosen as its financial motto: "A Millions Dollars for Missions in Four Years." This is equal to \$250,000 each year, and means that the Sabbath-schools of the denomination are going to have the privilege of contributing a goodly auount to aid in the proclamation of the gospel.

Last year the total offering for the denomination was \$228,029.24. Saskatchewan helped to the amount of \$1,721.80, and now let us lay our plans to raise, without fail, \$2,000 this year. This is only \$278.20 more than last year. We are one year nearer the end of all things; nearer the coming of that Just One who will usher in a perpetual reign of peace.

Should not this year see us making advancement in all lines? Should we not do more and give more than ever before for the cause of Truth? Our brethren and sisters in Saskatchewan have done well in the past, and now let us all work together for the reaching of our goal in 1913. ## SASKATCHEWAN NOTES

Brethren Krainean and Diminyatz from Rouleau spent a recent Sabbath and Sunday in Regina. Brother Krainean is working for some interested parties among his former friends in the city.

Several students from distant points have arrived in the Province and are being located by the field agent. It is good indeed to see these strong young men scatter to the various parts of the field to work during the vacation.

Brother John Betz, of Odessa, made the office a call last week. We are always glad to have our people who come to the city hunt us up and tell us how the battle is going.

Elder C. Sulzle passed through Regina last week on his way to visit some believers at Prussia, in Western Saskatchewan. He had recently been with the company at Dysart, and he reports a good Sabbath-school there, and a growing interest in the truth. He will visit Hodgeville and Roulean before camp-meeting.

Much interest is being manifested among the Servians in Regina. Several more have recently taken their stand, until now a nice Sabbath-school is held each Sabbath in the East Side. Brother Milan Ostoics is laboring very hard for these people, and is seeing fruits of his labors both here and around Rouleau.

We have received a large number of applications for membership in the Conference church. These will be acted on by the conference committee at the camp-meeting. If there are others who have not yet sent in the application, we would suggest that all do so at once, that as many as possible be attended to at the same time.

The Colporteurs' Institute held at McLean closed on the 12th. E. F. Locker will work out from McLean with Practical Guide, Jacob Linkert goes to Waldheim with the same book. Leonard Light has gone to Expanse, and will work in that district with Great Controversy. H. L. English returned to his home at Prince Albert, and will work with magazines there for a time.

Elder J. V. Maas is laboring near Findlater and Sunset. A good order was received from him for a supply of the leaflets, "A Reply" and "Sunday." These are appreciated by our workers, and should be distributed everywhere. We still have a good supply at the office. If you have not seen them send for a free sample.

We are disappointed that more orders have not been received for the mission's number of the Little Friend. Only two orders have been received at this office. Winnie Whipps, of Swift Current, sold her supply in an hour and ordered more. Are there not others who would like to earn some money for missions in this way?

The first colporteur's report for the season came in the evening after the Sabbath. Brother Locker put in three and one-half days with Practical Guide and took 27 orders from 31 exhibitions, amounting to \$131. We trust he will keep this pace up. Practical Guide is in German this year, and this gives a splendid opportunity to carry the message of health to those of this nationality.

Miss Anna Neufeld is working with magazines in the vicinity of Swift Current. She reports the sale of 100 the first day and a half, and orders another supply. Miss Ida Coles is meeting with good success with Temperance Instructor in Saskatoon, Moose Jaw and nearby towns. Her last order was for over 700 copies.

Brother W. L. Manfull was present at the Institute at McLean from the beginning. At its close he called at Regina on his way to Manitoba. He feels that the prospects are good for the best year ever experienced in the book, work in this Union Conference. Lewis Manfull will work in the vicinity of Melfort this season.

## Academic Department

At 7.30 Monday evening, April 12, the seating capacity of the chapel was again taxed to its limit by a large number of patrons and friends, who assembled within its walls for the purpose of enjoying the closing exercises of the Academic Department for the year 1912-13.

This occasion was especially marked by the graduation of one of the senior students, Brother Walter A. Clemensen, who has successfully passed an examination in 12th grade work, the highest class in the academy. The rostrum, walls and pillars of the chapel were prettily decorated in harmony with the occasion, giving a pleasing appearance.

An excellent programme, given below, was rendered by the students. A large part of the evening was devoted to instrumental and vocal music, which speaks highly of the progress being made in voice culture and training in piano and organ. The orations, recitations and readings given by the students contained instructive lessons which were profitable to all present. It is very evident that the institution is meeting with success in its aim to inculcate a knowledge of right principles into the minds of the students. Brother Clemensen, who was called upon by Professor Beardsley, told of his five years of training received in the academy. He emphasized the fact that no man has acquired so much knowledge that he can consider his training

finished, but that a true education begun in this life will continue through the long years of eternity. In conclusion he thanked the teachers for the kindly interest they had taken in his studies and asked for the prayers of all that success might attend him as a laborer in the Master's vineyard.

At the close of the song "Revelation," rendered by Elder Adams, Professor Beardsley presented Brother Clemensen with a diploma, and made a few remarks in which he stated that what had taken place that evening should be an incentive to some others to prepare to take the same step. He said that graduates from our educational institutions were in demand to fill important positions in our work.

In the minds of those present this was the best programme given by the students of this institution. It was a demonstration of the rapid and substantial progress being made by the educational branch of this message in preparing the students to take their positions as qualified laborers in the great harvest field.

## CAMP MEETING INVITATION.

The following from Joel 2: 15, 16 is a most urgent call: "Blow the trumpet in Zion, sanetify a fast, call a solemn assembly.
