FROM THE UNION PRESIDENT C. F. McVagh.

Since my arrival in Calgary, April 29th, I have had the privilege of visiting Lacombe, Didsbury, Edmonton, Acme and Beiseker, besides getting my family settled, and spending some time in the office trying to get a general understanding of the situation and needs of the field. It has been a pleasure to meet with the brethren and sisters of Calgary and the other churches named. In all these places there is much to encourage me, as I see God's providence working for His people. Under God I want to do a faithful part in bringing the light of the Third Angel's Message to all the homes in Western Canada. God in His love has given us so many ways to work that we can all have some part.

Sister Graham just sent me a report of the Home Missionary work reported in the Western Canadian Union for the last two quarters of 1915. It was encouraging indeed, and no doubt would be much more so if all our people had reported the work actually done. When you write missionary letters, send out literature, hold a Bible reading, etc., be sure and report it to your Librarian. Every little helps to encourage

someone else.

Then there are our canvassers scattered all over the field. Dont forget to pray every day for them; also the missionaries in other lands and our own faithful laborers in the Conferences of this Union.

From now until the last of September camp-meetings will be in session somewhere in the Union nearly all the time. Watch the dates and if you cannot go, pray earnestly that a rich blessing may come to each meeting. I hope to see many of our dear people and begin to get acquainted with them at these yearly feasts. We confidently expect to see greater blessings wthan ever before come to God's people in the campmeetings this year. We are nearer the end and a greater earnestness and intensity is taking hold of the people and work.

FOR THE REGIONS BEYOND

I look back with pleasure to the camp-meeting tour the summer of 1915 in Western Canada. At that time there was no thought but that we would be back in India ere this. But we are still here and a little note from the editor reminds me of the promise to send some message to the dear brethren and sisters.

Our trunks were all packed last fall, and we had planned to return to India as soon as possible after the Loma Linda meeting in November. But to that meeting came the calls from the ends of the earth, a fine young person, on the book Things as They Are.

requiring more than \$100,000 to meet the demands for 1916 than for 1915; also the call for 200 new Thus it was impossible to do without a material increase in mission offerings and recruits.

So the brethren asked that I should not return to India for one more year and come to these Eastern States and work in the interest of missions. It was with reluctance that we accepted, but now that several months of the campaign are in the past, I feel that it is good to be even here. I am carrying the call of the mission field right home to the individual churches and feel that it is profitable. In the first place we are adding fuel to the missionary fires, so that they are burning brighter than ever; secondly, we are reaching a large number of our young people who would otherwise give of their strength to building up the work of the world which is about to perish in its own corruption; and thirdly, I am raising a large fund of more than \$50,000 for the equipment of the Training College here in the East, so that our young people may have the training necessary to prepare them for their particular place in the battle. The message had its rise in the East. But the spirit of prophecy said that it must first go West and establish itself, and then before the closing of the work it would return to the East with power. Everything shows that that time is now here. In these large cities, thousands of people have filled the largest theatres and listened eagerly to the light given us concerning these times. Large numbers of young people are coming into the truth. While our colleges in the West are well equipped and now largely out of debt, these institutions here in the East are altogether inadequate. So I feel that I am doing a work for the mission fields as important as though I were out in India itself.

However, soon after the first of the next year we hope to be on our way to India. We pray that the camp-meetings in Western Canada this year may be even more blessed than those last year, and that the Lord will give his Spirit in showers of blessing. The work in India is onward, many are being baptized and there are many open doors unentered for the want of means and workers. Let us each be faithful in the part the Lord assigns us in the accomplishment of GEO. F. ENOCH. this great task.

A WORK THAT PAYS

Here is an extract from a recent letter from one of our missionary volunteer secretaries, which gives in concrete form some of the good results of our missionary volunteer work:

One question is "Mention a way in which the book has helped you." She said, "It has helped me not only to realize the great need in that benighted land, but has made me willing to go if God calls me." I know that she meant it. And to think that our Missionary Volunteer Reading Courses can have such an influence on our young people's hearts! It certainly shows us

that they are worth while.

"I visited a society two or three weeks ago where I was especially struck with the earnest, well-expressed prayers of the young people, several of whom led in prayer. One of my girls who attended camp-meeting last year said to me, "I am so glad that you prevailed upon me to take part in prayer band at camp-meeting, even though I did dread it so every time; if I hadn't become accustomed to it then I don't know what I should have done, for all these new girls looked to me to teach them how to pray to the Lord right, when they came into the truth last fall. And I couldn't have helped them at all if I hadn't gotten a start at camp-meeting." HOW THE SIGNS MAY BE CIRCULATED

Years ago, before we began to publish magazines, a good many Signs weekly were sold from house to house by church members who made a regular business of this work. We believe this plan of circulating the Signs can and should be revived, and that good success will attend it.

The aim of those who take up this work should be to work up a regular round, where they may deliver their papers each week. The worker should therefore take a definite section of territory. He should divide his territory into sections for each day's work, and make a note in his notebook that he will work this section on Monday, the next on Tuesday, and so on. This is important, because when people consent to take a paper each week, they want it on the same day of the week. It is annoying to most people to get their paper on Monday one week, on Friday perhaps the next, and on Wednesday the third week. Therefore the worker should be very particular to call punctually at the appointed time each week, when the people are expecting their papers.

If the paper is refused at your first visit, do not hesitate to call with it the following weeks, unless you are plainly told never to come again. I remember one periodical worker who had no memory for locations, so could not remember who had accepted the paper and who had refused it. She, therefore, called at every house in her territory each week, and when told that she had been informed the week before that the paper was not wanted, she would sweetly apologize for troubling them and explain how it happened. The result was that many who refused at first were won over by her persistent calling and pleasant manner.

Before going out, the paper should be well studied and a few good selling points selected. In these troubled times there are many articles appearing in the Signs that appeal to most thinking men and women.

If this work of selling the Signs is to succeed, the workers must consecrate themselves to God and seek him earnestly in prayer day by day, that he will send his angels before them to prepare the hearts of the people.

The following letters are a few from among many which show that there are people, who want the paper,

living in many parts of the country.

Elkton, Minn., February 14th, 1916. "Find enclosed cheque for \$1.75 for which send me your valuable paper. Last summer I found a copy of it in the Austin depot and was so wonderfully pleased with it that I saved the paper to subscribe for it as soon as I could. I have never read a religious paper that I liked so well. I am not of your belief, I mean an Adventist, but I am redeemed with the same precious blood, Jesus Christ, of whom you preach, and believe in the seriousness of the time we live in."

I got your name through an old friend who told me your paper would make things plain to me. Am anxious to hear from you soon and to get all you can send me to make these things plain to me.'

In looking over my daily record of traveling and visiting during the month of May, I find it reads this

The first church visited during the month was at Rouleau. I was glad to be with our brethren and sisters there once more. Nearly every member is striving to be faithful. On my trip to the Western part of the Province, Pastor Ziprick accompanied me to assist in interpreting into the German language. Brother Ziprick visited at Queen Centre and Swift Current before I joined him at Prussia. We spent several days at the Prussia church. From this place we drove 47 miles south to another German church called Fox Valley. church has almost 70 members. We held several meetings with our people here, and all enjoyed the blessings of the messages presented.

On Monday the 22nd, we drove 40 miles further south to Maple Creek to get the train to Morse from which place we drove about 30 miles to meet with our German church at Queen Centre. We also enjoyed

our labor with our people here.

One of the most encouraging experiences on this journey in the south-western part of Saskatchewan was in finding eleven persons who had become deeply interested in the present truth through reading and personal labor of our people. Several of these were already keeping the Sabbath. These persons were found at different places in our travels. These and other things show that God's spirit is working mightily everywhere. The honest are being sought. everyone of us be so surrendered to God, that we can be used by Him in helping to find those who are look-

ing for the way to the Kingdom.

We are now busy making preparations for the camp-meeting. A large number of our people expect to be present. God has promised a rich blessing for all who come. OUR ANNUAL MEETING

As has already been announced in the *Tidings*, the eleventh annual conference and camp-meeting of the Alberta Conference will be held at Ponoka, July 13-23. A suitable location, richly blessed with the beauty of nature, will be the camp where every believer in Alberta is invited to spend several days in worshipping and offering sacrefice to God. These grounds are situated east of the C.P.R. track and are not far from the banks of the Battle River.

In addition to all the laborers of the conference and union conference, there will be present to assist in the meetings: Elder E. W. Farnsworth, Vice-president of the Pacific Union Conference; Elder W. W. Eastman, Secretary of the Publishing Department of the North American Division Conference, and Elder G. F. Haffner, of Clinton, Mo. Other laborers from abroad are also expected, but at this writing we can-

Plans are being carried out to accommodate the largest number of our people who have attended gatherings of this nature in the Province. Besides the regular camp-meeting equipment used in former years, the conference has purchased twenty additional family tents. The rent of a tent, including fly, will be \$4.00. A large pavilion, 60x40, has been bought and will serve as an added facility at this meeting.

Let no one remain away for fear of lack of accommodation. Ample provision is being made to care for everyone who comes. Meals will be served at the dining-tent on the cafeteria plan at reasonable prices.

Elder P. P. Adams, assisted by other workers, has been conducting public meetings in Ponoka since the close of school, and reports which have come in indicate a lively interest in the message on the part of many who are attending. God is blessing this effort and we look with confidence for good results from these meetings and the camp-meeting which is to follow. We are living in the last days and persons are responding quickly to the invitation to enter the ark of safety, where abundant shelter can be obtained from the storms without.

As we look over the world today we see everywhere, at home and abroad, the rapid fulfillment of last day prophecies. A SAD ACCIDENT

We are pleased to inform our people that the Canadian Pacific, Canadian Northern and Grand Trunk Pacific Railway Companies have granted the special round trip one-way fare to and from the place of our camp-meeting. Everyone who comes will want to secure a free trip home, but in order to obtain this privilege it is absolutely necessary to comply with the following rules. Study these well so that there will be no misunderstanding when the time comes to carry them out.

- 1. Plan to be at the depot at least fifteen minutes before the arrival of your train, so as to give the agent time to supply you with both ticket and standard form certificate.
 - 2. Purchase a one-way full fare ticket.
- 3. Be sure and ask the agent for a standard form certificate for every ticket purchased. Do not fail to obtain this.
- 4. If you must travel over more than one road be sure and secure standard form certificates for every ticket purchased at the defferent ticket offices.
- 5. On arrival at the grounds do not fail to hand all certificates to F. L. Hommel at the book-tent.

Those who will travel on the C.P.R. from Calgary should bear in mind that the afternoon train for the north is not scheduled to reach Ponoka until the following morning, as it stops overnight at Red Deer.

We would therefore advise those who will travel this way to take the morning train (8.15 a.m.) or the night train (23.55) both of which go through to Ponoka direct. Those travelling on the C.P.R. from Edmonton should notice that the south-bound train now leaves there at 6.00 p.m. We would advise all to acquaint themselves with any changes of time in the arrival and departure of trains so that there will be no mistakes or disappointments in travelling to or from the place of meeting.

Each one should understand the part he is to act, that there may be harmony of plan, and of labor in the combined work of all." Page 32-33.

At both of our camp-meetings we plan to have meetings where instruction will be given to church officers, especially that instruction which relates to the elder and missionary secretary. This will be in harmony with the following paragraph from the same volume: "Properly conducted, the camp-meeting is a school where pastors, elders, and deacons can learn to do a more perfect work for the Master. It was my privilege to go through the hospital with one of these sisters while she called on the patients with flowers and papers. In the consumption ward lay a girl near the point of death. To see this girl who had lived a butterfly life, eager to hear the Bible and Steps to Christ and to hear her plead for our sister to stay with her was touching. Our sister did stay with her most of the time till she died, giving evidence of intelligent trust in God. We visited the invalid ward, and to see the smiling faces that greeted her as she came into the room with her papers was

indeed cheering, and all through the institution this sister and her papers were received as a ray of sunshine. The work is being carried on systematically by members from the different churches.

Papers are also appreciated at the provincial jail. Twice a month Sunday evening meetings are held with about a hundred inmates of the jail. While speaking to the prisoners on a recent Sunday evening, I said that while they were within prison walls, it was possible for them to be more free than many outside who claimed to be free. After the service one of the prisoners found a purse that one of the sisters had left and he immediately returned it to the officer; something that many outside would not have done.
