What the commandos were to the armies of the United Nations is a fine illustration of what our colporteurs and our literature are to the Advent Movement. They prepare the way for the Movement to advance into territory hitherto controlled and dominated by the great arch-enemy just as the commandos prepared the way for the main armies of the United Nations to march to victory. Our noble colporteurs carry many different

> kinds of weapons and are prepared for any emergency. Some of the small weapons are among the most effective too. For instance let us compare the tracts they use to the hand-grenades used by the commandos. What powerful little things they are, and so effective that for a colporeur to be without a good supply of them is discouraging to say the least.

Here is an example of how efficiently and thoroughly they do their work. One of our valiant soldiers of the cross had not been provided with an adequate supply of these tract-grenades and having but one left loaned it to a man instead of giving it to him and asked that it be returned to him in two weeks time. 

Have We Finished What We Have Begun?

Here in the British West Indies Union we have a difficult time trying to keep up with the opening providences of God. His spirit has been at work calling out men and women from the world of sin at such a rate that we have been unable to build churches fast enough to provide spiritual homes for them in which to worship. Consequently we find ourselves with many unfinished church buildings throughout our field. We believe that we have come to the time when God would have us venture out by faith in a supreme effort to finish many of these projects that were commenced years ago but remain uncompleted. We believe that God will honour any sacrifice that we may make in accomplishing this task and that whatever we put into this work will come back many fold.

There was a time in Israel's history when the Lord told them that they suffered temporal loss because they failed to finish the house of God. He chided them for living ".n ceiled houses while this house lieth waste" (Haggai 1:4).

Because they had failed to shoulder the responsibility of church completion the Lord declared: "Ye have sown much, and bring in little; but ye have not enough; ye drink, but ye are not filled with drink; ye clothe you, but there is none warm; and he that earneth wages earneth wages to put it into a bag with holes." (Haggai 1:6)

Of this experience the Servant of the Lord says: "The lack of temporal prosperity was the result of the neglect to put God's interest first..... Had the Israelites honoured God, had they shown Him due respect and courtesy by making the building of His house their first work, they would have invited His presence and blessing." P. K. p. 574.

The people responded to this God-given challenge and as a result the Lord was with them

One Of Our Greatest Needs In The B. W. I. Union — With Suggestions As To How We May Meet It.

In Psalm 1:22 we find these words of David "I was glad when they said unto me let us go into the house of the Lord." What an expression of joy entered the heart of this servant of God each time that he entered God's house of worship. He knew that He was going to meet God there.

So it should be with all of God's people when we enter into His house to meet with Him and worship. Especially will this be true when we look around and see that our place of worship is neat, clean, furnished and fully completed.

Many of God's houses in Jamaica where His people meet with Him from week to week have never been fully completed. What a sad pity that as we enter into these places of worship we find them in this unfinished condition. Some of these churches have been repaired several times and many others are badly in need of repairs. Quite a number have been under construction for more than a decade and a half. Brethren and sisters of the British West Indies Union, God is not pleased with this. I think David's joy would have been greatly lessened had the house to which he referred remained unfinished for a long period of time.

Let us read Haggai 1:2-8. Are we among those who are saying this is not the time to arise and build? No. I believe that you all will agree with me that the Lord is telling us to "arise, build, and furnish My houses". Let us remember that what we have failed to do in times of prosperity we will have to do in times of adversity.

If your church is still unfinished and you are finding it difficult to secure means to complete the work, the British West Indies Union Committee and the committee of your local field invite you to join with us in one of the following

Church Building Briefs From Around The Union.

Morant Boy (E, Ja.) is coming along fine. A beautiful floor and rostrum with baptistry has recently been finished. The walls must be rendered inside and painted on the outside before it will be fully finished. Elder H. E. Nembhard is doing fine with this project.

Port Morant (E, Ja.) is just purchasing a fine plot for their permanent church home. Seaforth (E. Ja.) and Annotto Bay (E. Ja.) are doing the same thing.

The Palm (E. Ja.) church is going to make a fine substantial building when it is completed The roof is on and soon work will be resumed in getting the walls up and the floor in.

Dignum Mt. (E. Ja.) has been struggling along and doing well with what they have had to work. The uprights now support the roof but the walls and floor still remain to be done.

Work at Port Maria (E. Ja.) has been moving along nicely. A fine reinforced concrete building is going up in this Parish capital that will be a real credit to the cause of God. The stone laying was held Thursday, September 19. Elder Stockhausen is leading out in a strong programme of church completion in his district.

The believers in *Enfield (E. Ja.)* have done outstanding service in their church building work. They have kept on the job unfalteringly. There seems little likelihood that they will fail to have the building ready for dedication December 22 as planned.

It is hoped that on the same day *Broad*gate (E. Ja.) will also be ready for dedication. The believers are working faithfully and have a very fine completed edifice in prospect.

Jackson (E. Ja.) is practically complete. The brethren are still debating the advisability of adding on a vestry before dedication. Blue Hole (E. Ja.) also in Pastor Laing's district, is almost finished. It is hoped it will be ready for dedication before the year ends.

Williamsfield (E. Ja.) hopes to be ready for a Stone Laying service late in November as (Continued on page 4)

in a special way (Haggai 1:13) and they succeeded in their endeavour.

Now, brethren and sisters, shall we not heed this lesson? Is the church in which you worship unfinished and undedicated to the glory of God? Then let us do something about it! Let us not rest satisfied while God's house "lieth waste."

It is the studied programme of the Missions of the British West Indies Union to concentrate in a strong manner the last three months of this year on a church completion programme that will finish up and prepare for dedication a large number of buildings that have remained unfinished for years. To lead out in this important work the Union Committee has appointed Elder E. E. Parchment, our Union Field Secretary, a builder and administrator of wide experience. Elder Parchment is already on the job visiting in both the East and the West Jamaica Missions in the interest of church completion. If your church is nearing the stage where it can be completed with a little help from the Mission, Elder Parchment will do his best to spend some time with you in planning to this end. If you would like Brother Parchment's help and counsel, write to your Mission President and put in your request for such a visit.

plans for raising funds for church completion.

1. Invest for Church Construction. In rural areas where such a scheme would be practical, join together as a group of . church members and select a plot of land that can be set aside for God for one year. On this plot plant yam, sweet potatoes, or any other vegetables or grains that might bring good returns. As a Church group care for these crops carefully and prayerfully asking God for a good harvest. Market the produce and give the profits to the church building project. This plan is patterned somewhat after the Sabbath School Investment Plan and should prove a great blessing to our church construction and completion programme. Where it is not practical for the church as a whole to band together in such a programme, let the individual believer invest something for God in his own garden plot and give the proceeds to the church completion fund.

2. Programmes are functions that still provide funds for church buildings. Have you had such a programme recently? If not, why not plan on your church board to harness the talents of your believers for such a worthy project?

3. Solicitation by cards among friends and neighbours in the district may be carried out when done in counsel with the Mission officers and committee. Why not get in touch with your Mission President and seek his cooperation?

4. The Missions and the Union will help what they can with these church completion schemes. They will provide the last £15-0-0 to finish your building and prepare it for dedication. When you have reached this stage, be sure and write the Mission office for this amount. The Missions are helping beyond this amount in as many projects as possible. With so many buildings under construction we cannot do as much as we should like, but if we all do our best we will get many churches finished and dedicated before 1946 closes.

May God help us all as we join together in following out His instructions to "Arise, build and furnish My houses."

does *Woodford* (E.Ja.) in Brother Davis's district.

Two other churches in Brother Davis's district figure in the church building programme, *Florence Hill* (*E. Ja.*) and *Castleton* (*E. Ja.*) both of which should be completed and ready for dedication before the year closes.

Brown's Town (E. Ja.) has advanced rapidly, having set a record of being constructed within one, year. Their dedication is planned for November 10.

Brittonville (W. Ja.) so as not to be outdone, are planning to put on their coat of paint and be ready for the same date with Brown's Town for their dedication.

Wakefield (W. Ja.) have their windows all ready to be put in. They then plan to put on the finishing touches and be prepared for dedication on November 24.

Coleyville (W. Ja.) brethren have bestirred themselves with new energy to complete their long-standing unfinished Luilding, and so have employed the aid of the James Brothers, contractors, who are now working steadily so as to be ready for dedication December 1.

Little London (W, Ja.) church has been under construction for the past 23 years, but the brethren there have also caught a new vision and are working steadily toward their goal of celebrating their dedication on December 8.

Sister Gertrude McKenzie, the leader of the Shefield (W. Ja) church, is determined not to be left behind. With the brethren supporting her strongly she has gathered all the necessary materials for completing her church building, and hopes to dedicate it on December 8.

May Pen (W. Ja.) church being on one of the main roads of the island, needs very little introduction. Already much comment is being made regarding the appearance of the building. December 22 is the date set for the dedication of this church.

Encouraged by the visit of Pastor Parchment to all these churches, Troy(W. Ja.) has also decided to complete its building and to have its dedication service on December 29.

We have heard that Vaughansfield, Harry Watch, Amity, White Hill, Jericho, Granville, Mulgrave, Sandy Bay, Petersfield, Cornwall Barracks, and Zion Hill were rolling up their sleeves to finish their building work before January 1. 1947 — What word, brethren?

In the Cayman Islands the Georgetown church lacks only the ceiling before it will be completed for dedication. East End (Caymans) believers are working on plans for a new church home and these should be under way by the time this appears in print.

The first Seventh-day Adventist church in the Turks and Caicos Islands is rising from its foundations foot by foot despite discouraging aircumstances. Brother Nebblet hopes to complete the building at *Blue Hills* before too many months roll by.

San Pedro (British Hondurds) has a very neat little church finished and it is planned that it should be dedicated in October while Elder W. L. Barclay is visiting the colony.

Pastor Colburn writes that "Brother Edwards has almost completed the church building at *Moss Town, Exuma (Baham*as). It is 22 x 40 feet in size and is surely a real credit to the Mission." We believe that the church at *Bluff (Bahamos)* is very nearly finished also.

So from far and near the good news comes rolling in like waves of the sea. Let us not falter in the work of completing our church homes without delay.

CAPPING EXERCISES

Four miles of beds with sick, wounded and dving soldiers! Thirty-eight women under the leadership of one of the world's greatest heroines, worked tirelessly under great adversity to restore these broken men to health again. Before her arrival at the Crimean battlefront the death rate was more than 40% but a few weeks of expert nursing care brought the figure down to 2%. Such was the experience of Florence Nightingale, the founder of modern nursing. Her spirit lives on and all nurses receive from her life the inspiration of a noble profession. Her tiny light which guided her footsteps down those rows of beds has been passed on to the student nurses through the years that have followed.

This inspiring service took place on July 29th at the North Street Temple in the presence of a large congregation. Nine young ladies for the past six months have been learning to put into practice so many of the principles of Florence Nightingale. These young people have passed the tests necessary to fit them for reception into the nursing profession as student nurses. The receiving of the cap, the symbol of the profession, was the occasion for this initiation.

We were very happy to have with us Elder Arthur Roth, Division Missionary Volunteer Leader, and Miss Lora E. Clement, Editor of the Youth's Instructor.

Both leaders in their own style brought to the minds of the students and the friends present the challenge of the hour, the opportunities of service and the necessity of holding high the ideals of the nursing profession.

The ceremony was made impressive when after the caps were pinned by the junior nurses the nine young ladies lit their candles from the lamp of Florence Nightingale, represented by Miss Ivy Sailman, surgical nurse at the hospital and clinic. Following the candle lighting the Florence Nightingale pledge was taken by the students in which they determined by the help of God to maintain the standards of nursing and devote themselves to the welfare of those committed to their care.

A prayer of consecration, "Just Where He Leads me I Will Go", was sung by the group, followed by the school song by the entire student body. The school song was written by Mr. C. R. Munroe and the music by Miss Erline Nation, a junior student. The service was brought to a close with prayer by Pastor R. E. Gibson.

To these young people we wish God's richest blessing and guidance as they continue their studies and training, preparing for wider medical missionary service throughout Jamaica and the British West Indies.
