THE 1954 Ingathering campaign is now in the past. It has proven to be the best we have experienced not only in funds collected, but in the splendid contacts made with men of high and low degree.

Many times while working with Elder R. E. Gibson, former president of the Bahamas Mission, our doners have indicated their genuine pleasure in having been able to contribute to our work. As we thanked them for their gifts many times they would say: "We are the ones to thank you for having given us an opportunity to assist in the splendid work you are doing throughout the world." It brought a real pleasure when the personal representative of an individual who is reputed to be one of the richest persons in the world, while waiting for his secretary to bring in the cheque for his signature said: "Your work speaks for itself."

Recently while working with Pastor O. Holness who is charge of the Montego Bay area, and Pastor Harold Fletcher, Home Missionary Secretary of the West Jamaica Conference, in a residential section near Montego Bay, we stepped on the verandah of a palatial home with its magnificent view of the harbour below, but noticed that the good man of the house was fast asleep on his sofa in the drawing room. We decided to visit other homes in that community first and return later but the starting of the car outside awakened him and he called us back. We found that this individual and his wife had been vacationing in Montego Bay for several months and had spent the night before packing to leave early the following morning for England. He was intensely interested in what we were presenting and apologized for having only five pounds to give, but requested our address so that

upon his return to London he could send us a larger gift. He also stated that he had a number of close friends whom he wanted to contact, believing that they too would be greatly interested in the work of Seventh-day Adventists. He asked our permission to use our magazine in his presentation to them.

As we drove away from the house we felt again that the Lord had directed us in contacting this young man who had known so little or nothing, before our visit, about Seventh-day Adventists, and we felt that through him others in his circle of friends would also be brought in contact with the work and beliefs of Seventh-day Adventists.

Another heart-warming experience was our visit to a large sugar estate where the manager cordially invited us in to his spacious office. From the very start he showed unusual interest in our work and beliefs. We learned that his interest had stemmed largely from his favourable impressions regarding the West Indian Training College and from his association with his pilot, our beloved Brother Gardner. (This was not the first time we were finding favour with influential persons in the island through the influence of this pioneer in light aircraft aviation in Jamaica.) We were happy when this manager wrote us a cheque in the amount of five guineas as his personal contribution and more so when he wrote another cheque in the amount of fifty pounds for his company. We were privileged to give this man a Bible study and he assured us that he was greatly interested in what we were doing for Jamaica and throughout the world.

As I worked with Elder R. E. Delafield, president of the East Jamaica Conference and Brother Oswald Gordon, Missionary Volunteer Secretary, I was often aware that Ingathering surely is a programme ordained of God. Over and over again as individuals gave substantial cheques to assist us in our work I was conscious

of the fulfillment of the prophecy of Isaiah 60 where it is stated that in the final hours of human history, when the light of the gospel is to dispel the darkness around the world, that the wealth of the gentiles will literally flow into the treasures of God. We are more so happy for another prophecy in that same chapter which indicates that in connection with the people giving their money to assist us, there will be a "flowing in" of the individuals themselves into the church of Christ.

Yes, the 1954 Ingathering campaign is now a matter of history, but I am sure that all who have had a part in it rejoice with me over the blessings we have received personally and for what it has meant to the continued growth of the kingdom of God.

I spent a week there, and we were able to lay the foundation, put in our door jams and the walls were under way when I was leaving. Since then word has come from Brother Newman that the walls are finished and that they have started to put on the covering for the roofing.

Since my return I made a trip over to the East Jamaica Conference where I found the district pastors going at full blast in their church building campaign. Under the leadership of Elder David McCalla the Yallahs church is on its way to completion, and work is being done on the Bath church. Then over in Elder Neblett's territory we have started work on the Port Antonio church and are making definite plans to complete the Burban church building. Brother Fred White is also working on the Ythanside church.

Brother Herbert Fletcher is working very hard and is making good progress toward the completion of the Annotto Bay church. The brethren, though small in number, are sacrificing and we look forward to its completion not very far in the future. This will be a great credit to our Cause in that little town. Pastor Williams and his congregation are doing a very good job at Comfort Valley. We are looking forward to its completion during the next few months. He is also making definite plans to start the foundation work of the Richmond church at their beautiful spot. The materials are already on hand and they are ready to start.

Brim full of courage is the man Elder Walton, who is now putting on the finishing touches on the Old Harbour church. He is also working hard on remodelling the Williamsfield church. The brethren are of good courage and the work is progressing nicely. At Duxes we found them putting in their windows and gathering material for the doors. At Lluidas Vale the foundation of their building is laid and plans are being made for the construction of that church.

Vitamins — the Sparkle of Youth — II

Although vitamins in themselves do not give energy or building material to the body, yet they are energy and growth "promoters" because they are necessary for proper digestion and use of the food. The Vitamin B Complex is perhaps the most important group of all and there are many vitamins in this group; however, only two are mentioned here.

(1) Vitamin B1 - Thiamin

Functions:

Prevents Beriberi;
Maintains healthy nervous system;
Maintains good appetite and good digestion;
Helps prevent constipation;
Promotes growth.

Sources:

Whole grain cereal, especially in the outer layers;
Brewers Yeast;
Legumes; as beans, peas, peanuts, cashews.

Vitamin B1 is not destroyed by ordinary cooking.

(2) Vitamin B2 (G) - Riboflavin

Functions:

Promotes growth;
Aids digestion.

Sources:

Milk, eggs
Leafy vegetables
Tomatoes
Peanuts, soy beans.

Vitamin B2 is not destroyed by ordinary cooking but is dissolved in the cooking water and if this is thrown away the Vitamin B2 is lost. Eat some whole grains, legumes or nuts every day.
