Forward In Ingathering

N OUR Ingathering campaign last year more than eight thousand individuals signed to take the Bible Correspondense Course. Little did the ingatherers realize as they went from door to door soliciting funds for our world-wide mission work that many individuals contacted would become candidates for the kingdom of God through the Bible Correspondence Course. Little did the ingatherers realize as the wealth of the gentiles flowed into the treasury of the Lord that the Holy Spirit of the Lord was there to impress the donors with the importance of the work before them, instilling in their hearts a desire to have a part in that work. Surely, brethren, this is one of the means that God is using for the fininshing of His work. Have we not reached the zenith of instruments of destruction? Is it possible to make more deadly or more destructive instruments than we have in our hands at the present moment?

Some days must be the last days, and I cannot help but feel that these greatest of destructive weapons indicate that the very days in which we live are the last days. If that is true then one of these Ingathering campaigns is going to be the last. It is within the realm of possibility that this present campaign could be the last, or at least among the last campaigns.

With all these thoughts in mind I would like to urge each one of our brethren to put his heart and soul into this present Ingathering campaign. Let us go forward in gathering the needed funds for the finishing of the work. And, as we go forward let us do so with a prayer in our hearts that the Lord will direct us to the souls that are waiting to be garnered in, that they may become a part of God's remnant people and be ready to meet Him when he cometh to make up His jewels. May the Lord bless you with a large harvest of funds and souls.

Bahamas Ingathering Moves Ahead

Over and over, since launching our 1955 Ingathering programme here in the Bahamas Mission, as we have walked out of offices with sizable cheques in our pockets, we have been reminded of the Gospel Prophet's inspired prediction: "And the wealth (margin) of the Gentiles shall come unto thee." (Isaiah 60:5)

It was particularly true in the case of one "Bay Street" merchant whose business had suffered from a disastrous fire several months ago. (This was perhaps Nassau's greatest fire when the whole city turned out one Sunday afternoon to fight it. Fortunately, that very day some of the ships of the American Navy were in port with modern fire fighting equipment and highly trained personnel, otherwise the disaster no doubt would have been far worse, according to the press reports the next day.) He listened with deep interest as we gave our report. It was a heart-warming experience indeed to hear this man, who had recently lost much of a fortune it had taken a lifetime to acquire, sav: "Gentlemen, I believe in the work of Seventh-day Adventists and you can be assured I'm going to support it." Then he went on to say: "I know what you are thinking. You are doubt-Yess assuming that because of the fire I'll be cutting down my usual gift, but that's where you are wrong! I'm giving the same this year as last year." (His last year's gift was twenty pounds). "And I want you to know that I give this cheerfully and gladly and because I want to

At the end of the second week of the campaign our hard-working Home Misrionary Secretary for the Mission, Brother Lloyd Binns, reported in his bulletin that we had reached the half-way mark in our campaign. He pointed out a number of outstanding accomplishments from various sections of the field. He stated that the Bluff, Eleuthera church had reached the largest per capita; that the Knowles, Cat Island church was the first to go over its goal and that the Grants Town church had turned in the largest amount. He also mentioned that several individuals had passed the £10 figure.

And so the Ingathering campaign moves ahead with God's people enthusiastically pressing for an early victory and a goodly overflow. Truly, the ex-periences coming to all our dear people are serving to strengthen the faith of each one as we see such positive evidences of God's over-ruling providence in going before us and preparing the hearts of men to whom He has given "power to get wealth," making them willing to contribute so much to the humanitarian programme so dear to the heart of each Seventh-day Adventist.

We believe the solemn events transpiring throughout the world is having a sobering effect upon thinking men, and that God's Spirit is leading them to look with favour upon the work committed to our care. We believe too, that such fayour will not last long, and that now is the time when every true believer should go "all out" for God. Our eyes are see. ing what Isaiah said they should see in the inflowing of this "wealth" into God's treasuries. May we all measure up to the challenge of the hour.

I have just returned from a trip to one of the most thriving islands of the Bahamas, Abaco. The most northerly of the group, it has an area of 776 square miles and a population of about 6,000.

Sad to say we have no interest on this island, but our publications are doing a great work; our urgent need is for someone to follow up this work.

During this trip I came in contact with a thrilling experience. I met a family which reminds me of the patriarch Abraham. This family consists of an old man, his wife, eight daughters and three sons. With sons-in-law, daughtersin-law, grand and great-grand children, the total number of this family is 63, all in their own settlement, where they have no policemen, and sell no rum, but have their own church. The father and the eldest son do the work of the priest. At their request I was privileged to study two doctrinal subjects with them: tithe paying and the Sabbath. I had morning and evening worship with them and they seem quite willing, only waiting to have a more perfect knowledge of the truth.

I am convinced that Psalm 18:43, 44 is about to the fulfilled in the lives of these people: "A people whom I have not known shall serve me. As soon as they hear of me, they shall yield obedience (margin) unto me."

I solicit your prayers on behalf of this family and all the other settlements on this island.

He and the believers at Amity have entered the district of Ashton. The interest has grown to such dimensions that it is now impossible for them to carry on. They have sent for help, and Brother Nosworthy, the district pastor, has now gone to their rescue.

INGATHERING. April 2 marks the beginning of our '55 Ingathering campaign. With a zeal to work, courage to labour, and faith for final triumph, our 11,000 believers of West Jamaica are all geared for one of our greatest campaigns ever entered upon by our people in this section of the field. Two thousand individuals in the conference have pledged to raise £2 each. This will mean that 2,000 of the 11,000 members will raise the Ingathering goal, and 9,000 will bring in a tremendous overflow.

It is time for every church leader and home missionary leader to make sure that his church is properly organized. We understand that a number of churches are hoping to be over the goal in the first week, To these churches we lift our hats in admiration and wish them heaven's blessing as they go forth to achieve for the Master. It is of vital importance that we all rally to the call of Ingathering this year.

The girl's dormitory of our beloved West Indian Training College will be started immediately after the campaign. Scores of our girls who have greatly longed to enter the portals of that college will be privileged to do so as soon as this dormitory is completed. Funds are needed to save our youth today.

There are 15 churches that are crying out for the establishment of church schools. We must go to their rescue. We must gather our children out from the worldly schools and place them under Adventist influences.

There are 68 churches under construction throughout the West Jamaica Conference. This means that there are over 5,000 of our believers without proper church accommodation. Funds are needed so that our people will be able to assemble and worship the Lord from week to week.

Apart from these three main needs, there is that wider field of inspiration we receive as a result of our contact with prominent people not of our faith. This is an opportunity for us to tell them of the story of a crucified and soon coming Saviour. As believers for Christ who sense the responsibility of carrying the truth, let us dedicate our lives anew, and with hands and heart go forward to achieve for Christ in this campaign.
