The young woman with a smile said, "Father I am helping you to advance your work, not to retard it." Bending over she took from her bag the prospectus for Great Controversy. Three weeks after, the Priest began preaching strange doctrines. months after he was a baptised Seventhday Adventist. A worker was sent into the district and fifty who were once Catholics are now baptized Seventh-day Adventists, as a result of the work done by one humble Colporteur girl and a few copies of the Great Controversy.

A few days ago we visited the home of a wealthy Catholic and as we presented the truth-filled literature tears fell from her eyes as she thought of the possibility of bringing her husband and children to the truth through our literature, The Great Controversy was one of the volumes she purchased and solicited our prayers for the

conversion of the family.

A few minutes later we were seated in a beautiful home, owned also by a Catholic. When she found that the books we were selling were written by the Adventists, she willingly bought, expressing her hope of gaining knowledge.

The next home was owned by a Quaker who was also willing to use funds reserved for paying on her machine to purchase the Bible Speaks and God Speaks to Modern Man, asking for prayer on her behalf and for the Bible Corresponding Course.

Small Craft Makes Rough Crossing

(Taken from the "Tribune", Nassau, Bahamas)

Arriving Monday afternoon in Nassau from Miami, were Pastor H. D. Colburn, President of the Bahamas Mission of Seventh-day Adventists, Pastor T. O. Shaw, Minister in charge of the Nassau Adventist Churches, William W. Nairn, Secretary of the Mission's Welfare Department, and Kenneth Williams, aboard the twenty-five foot Cris Craft cabin cruiser,

Virginia Maine.

The group had gone to Miami earlier to take delivery of the boat which had been sent down from New Jersey by motor transport. After servicing, the quartette got under way with one hundred gallons of fuel, passing the "Small Craft Warning" flag on the channel entrance to Miami at one o'clock Thursday afternoon, setting their course for Bimini which they hoped to reach six hours later. Because of the roughness of the Gulf Stream, they arrived Bimini eleven hours later. Waiting for the condition of the sea to improve, they set out from Bimini Sunday at noon, spending the night near Morgan's Bluff, Andros and reached Nassau at two-thirty Monday atternoon. Due to the constant strong headwinds of fifteen to twenty-five mile winds and rough seas, a total of twenty-eight hours was used up for the crossing from Miami to Nassau.

The trip across proved to her rather inexperienced crew that she was a gallant and brave little ship, pushing ahead as she constantly did through mountainous waves that often threatened to engulf her. Especially did they appreciate her upon reaching Bimini and learning that she had passed over the grave of a much larger ship enroute from Miami to the Fishing Tournament, whose bottom was shattered by the nerciless pounding and sank while still twelve miles off the coast of Bimini only hours before.

Her engine never failed until, within the Nassau Harbour and in the process of docking, it suddenly quit. The gas tank was

empty.

Her original name, "Outamaway", was changed in Miami to the "Virginia Maine" in honour of her donors, Mr. and Mrs. Robert F. Maine of New Jersey, U.S.A. Mr. Maine, who, having learned that such a boat could be used to advantage in this Colony by Bahamas Mission of Seventhday Adventists, kindly made it available as a gift, paying also for its transportation to Miami and for re-painting and servicing it before turning it over to its new owners. Mr. Maine also ordered installed a shipto-shore radio-telephone in order that contact with the Mission's headquarter's could be maintained when its missionaries were making their itineraries among their thirty Churches and Church Schools scattered throughout the Bahamas.

A Message from the Far Eastern Division

AN IDEAL ACADEMY SITE

The new site of the Southern Mindanao Junior Academy is ideally located along the national highway between the towns of Bansalam and Digos, Davao Province. It is situated at Managa, a barrio of Bansalam. Environments in the new location are conducive to getting a Christian education on the part of the students. The new school site has an area of 19.93 hectares (a hectare is equivalent to 10,000 square meters or 2.471 acres) and its soil is well suited to corn, rice sugar cane, and most of the common fruit trees. At present it is farmed by Christian parents whose children are studying in our Academy at Digos, Davao. These temporary tennants receive 70% of their produce. When the Southern Mindanao Junior Academy is transferred to the new academy site, it will be farmed by students on/the 70-30 basis. The academy receives an annual income from corn of around one thousand pesos.

The old academy site in Digos is very small and does not provide healthful environments for our youth, Besides this, the buildings and other school facilities are inadequate to meet the growing needs. There is therefore need for the academy to be transferred to the new site.

The whole project of transferring to the new site will involve an amount of more than U. S. \$75,000,00 for the buildings and school facilities. The Division has set aside a certain amount of money to start the construction of the two dormitories.

Where shall we get the rest of the money to bring this huge project to completion? Shall we not establish an ideal training center for our youth in Southern Mindanao and save them in the kingdom? This is a challenge to all of us who believe in the soon coming of our Saviour, Shall we not give our liberal Thirteenth Sabbath offering at the end of the second quarter of 1957 and save the youth in this section of the world field?
