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## **Count Your Blessings**

The year end is an appropriate time for retrospect as well as introspect. In the rush and bustle of our modern life we find so little time to sit alone with our thoughts to count our many blessings. It is time also for us to count our blessings as a church. In so doing we are able to recognize our great indebtedness to our Heavenly Father.

The year 1961 has been an extraordi-nary one in many ways. We have had many hurricanes around us but God has wonderfully preserved our island home. Our sympathy goes out to those of our fellow believers in the Columbian islands and British Honduras who have been deprived of much of their earthly possessions, and we trust that the rehabilitation programme will soon be completed.

During the year a number of attractive church buildings have been completed and dedicated. We think of the Lucea church in Hanover, Asia in South Manchester. Doubtless before the year closes there will be many other buildings completed, and this will mean much to the Seventh-day Adventist work. I should mention that a little church was completed at West End, Grand Bahama where Brother and Sister M. V. Smith are now located. This is one of the newly entered islands of the Bahama group.

Our Centurion Evangelism programme has been a tremendous success. Already there are seven ministers who have qualified to be in the Centurion Band. Our Statistical reports show that we have baptized 679 more souls during the first nine months of this year than for the same period last year. We should register our appreciation to God in enabling the Bahamas Mission to enter two new islands, Abaco and Acklins.

We have enjoyed a rich measure of health among our working staff and there has been no serious accidents among us. God has been very good to His workers who travel by land, by sea and air. This year has seen the organization of a third Conference in Jamaica and before these lines are read, operations will be on the way. With greater privileges we should be conscious of our greater responsibilities to God and to each other. We should pledge ourselves to be more steadfast, and devoted to the principles that have made us what we are as a people. We do not know how much longer we have to proclaim this Message to a lost world, but I wish to invite the ministers and church members to join together in an all out drive to rescue those who are going down into a Christless grave. This is no time for wranglings and dissension among God's people. We must now be fully on the Lord's side.

As we pause to count our blessings, shall we not unitedly pledge to be more faithful to God and to the Advent principles. The servant of the Lord tells us, "The strongest bulwark of vice in our world is not the iniquitious life of the abandoned sinner or the degraded out-cast; it is that life which otherwise appears virtuous, honourable, and noble, but in which one sin is fostered, one vice indulged." -Outline Studies, p. 249.

# West Indies Union News Flashes

\* Pastor Fernon Retzer Sabbath School and Radio Secretary of the Inter-American Division spent a few days in Jamaica conducting Sabbath School Work shops in association with Pastor E. H. Schneider, Union Sabbath School Secretary, and the local Secretaries of the East and West Jamaica Conferences.

\* It was the privilege of the West Indies Union to have Pastor Lionel R. Arthur, Secretary/Treasurer of the British Guiana Mission, intransit from the Division Council Meeting. He spent a few hours at the West Indies College.

• On Sunday, November 26, Pastor H. A. Mills, M.V. and Educational Secretary of the West Indies Union, began a three week revival effort at the Buff Bay Church in Portland.

\* At the recent Inter-American Division Council which convened in Miami, Florida, a request was placed with the General Conference for \$30,000 to provide food, clothing and medicine for the British Honduras Mission. This is in addition to the articles that will be sent from the Disaster and Famine Relief Funds.

During the latter part of October Pastor Glen Maxson, M.V. Secretary of the Inter-American Division, spent some time in the Bahamas. He was guest speaker at the dedication of the West End church in Grand Bahama. He was also present at the Stone-laying service in Nassau for the Centreville Church.

Pastor and Sister E. H. Schneider have responded to an appeal from the Central American Union to bind off an evangelistic effort at Bluefields, Nicaragua, and they will be away for approximately six weeks. He has already reported that 41 souls have been baptized.

On Sabbath, November 25, scores of workers and students visited the territory of West Jamaica Conference promoting Christian Education. This is in preparation for the Educational Festival that took place at West Indies College on Tuesday, December 26.

At present there are 7 ministers in the West Indies Union who have qualified to be Centurions.

\* Brother A. R. Greene has accepted a call from West Jamaica Conference to be Secretary/Treasurer of the re-organized West Jamaica Conference.

\* On Tuesday evening, October 31, members of the Andrews Memorial staff and board members met at the hospital chapel to welcome Dr. & Mrs. Shankel as well as Dr. & Mrs. Rittenhouse back to Jamaica. We hope that they will enjoy a pleasant period of service here in Jamaica.

 The Bahamas Mission has extended an invitation to the Shankel-Rittenhouse musical group to present three concerts in their territory just prior to the Christmas holiday season.

 There were four representatives from the West Indies Union at the recent Division Council meeting that convened in

## Ten Commandments For Parents

1. Thou shalt have no earthly priority interest before thee other than the children God hath given thee.

2. Thou shalt not make unto thee any graven images of land, buildings, cars, business transactions, pleasure plans, or social aspirations other than the constant heart image of thy child growing into the likeness of his Maker.

3. Thou shalt not take the name of thy child's teacher in vain as an excuse for thy own disinterest or lack of Christian desire to fully support those dedicated to sacrificial service in thy child's behalf.

4. Thou shalt remember that each day is to be a "Sabbath day" of dedication of thy child at the altar of family worship, committing his growing and learning experience to the hands of his Maker.

5. Honour those whom thou hast entrusted to be the fathers and mothers of thy children at thy school; speak only kindly of these special "parents" praying for them and 'dealing honestly and sympathetically with them, that their days of service to thy youth and the church may be long and growing in professional and spiritual fruitfulness in the land where thou hast invited them to serve.

6. Thou shalt not kill any avenue of communication between thyself and the school in behalf of the progress of thy child.

7. Thou shalt not adulterate or neutralize the faith of thy child in the teaching and standards of his school.

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8. Thou shalt not steal the valuable study and learning time of thy child by liberal authorization of secular activities.

9. Thou shalt not bear false witness against thy school because thou art not in agreement with the programme of the school, the teacher's methods, or the personality of the principal.

10. Thou shalt not covet the cares of this life that so readily crowd out the most important commission of preparing thy child to be a candidate for eternity, remembering that an important part of this preparation cometh through the Divinely commissioned channel of Christian Education.
