Why A Tithe Dromotion?

Just as we have individuals of varied personalities in the world, just so there are people of varied interests. There are people who will first turn to the page with the stock market when the morning's paper arrives. There are some who will turn to the comics; others will first hurriedly glance at the sports to see the report on base ball, foot ball or cricket, and some will first think of nothing but a real estate market.

We naturally turn to that in which we have interest or where we have material investments. The Bible rightly states, "For where your wealth is there also will your heart be." — Weymouth's Translation. Today, there are so many objects to divert the mind of the Christian from placing the emphasis where it should be. There are the attractions of sports; the attractions of real estate; the late model cars and of dress. These if not rightly controlled may divert the mind from Heaven. We must be constantly reminded as Israel of old that "we seek a better country." We must place our investments in the bank of Heaven, thus causing us to have a greater interest in Heavenly things.

When in America organized crime is doing 21 million dollars per year business and when to every dollar given to the church crime receives \$9.00, it is time for us to stop and consider as to where our treasures are being diverted.

"It is now that our brethren should be cutting down their possessions instead of increasing them. We are about to move to a better country, even a heavenly. Then let us not be dwellers upon the earth, but be getting things into as compact a compass as possible."

"The time is coming when we cannot sell at any price. The decree will soon go forth prohibiting men to buy or sell of any man save he that hath the mark of the beast." — Counsels on Stewardship, p. 59.

With a deep sense of responsibility as leaders in keeping before our people the necessity of faithfulness, we are devoting this issue of the West Indies Union "Visitor" to Faithfulness in Stewardship. While we know that taxes have been increased, tuition fees, food and clothing, we shall be overwhelmingly surprised to see the blessings of God when we are faithful in placing our investment in the vaults of heaven.

"Honour the Lord with thy substance, and with the first fruits of all thine increase: so shall thy barns be filled with plenty, and thy presses shall burst out with new wine." Prov. 3:9, 10. "There with new wine." Prov. 3:9, 10. "There is that scattereth, and yet increaseth; and there is that withholdeth more than is meet, but it tendeth to poverty. The liberal soul shall be made fat: and he that watereth shall be watered also himself." Prov. 11: 24, 25.

danger of being ensnared by worldliness and coveteousness. They should understand that it is His mercy that multiplies the demands for their means. Objects that call benevolence into action must be placed before them, or they cannot pattern after the character of the greater

"In commissioning His disciples to go 'into all the world, and preach the gospel to every creature." Christ assigned to men the work of extending the knowledge of His grace. But while some go forth to preach. He calls upon others to answer His claims upon them for offerings, with which to support His cause in the earth. He has placed means in the hands of men, that His divine gifts may flow through human channels in doing the work appointed us in saving our fellowmen, This is one of God's ways of exalting man. It is just the work that man needs; for it will stir the deepest sympathies of his heart, and call into exercise the highest capabilities of the mind.

"As we are continually receiving the blessings of God, so are we to be continually giving. When the heavenly Benefactor ceases to give to us, then we may be excused: for we shall have nothing to bestow. God has never left us without evidence of His love, in that He did us good. . . .

Surely goodness and mercy attend us at every step. Not till we wish the infinite Father to cease bestowing His gifts on us, should we impatiently exclaim, IS THERE NO END OF GIVING? Not only should we faithfully render to God our tithes, which He claims as His own, but we should bring a tribute to His treasury as an offering of gratitude. The Lord does not need our offerings, We cannot enrich Him by our gifts. Says the Psalmist; "All things come of Thee, and of Thine own have we given Thee.' Yet God permits us to show our appreciation of His mercies by self-sacrificing efforts to extend the same to others. This is the only way in which it is possible for us to manifest our gratitude and love to God. He has provided no other. R & H., Dec. 6, 1887.

The Blessings of Faithful Stewardship

The principle of Tithing is as fundamental to Adventists as the Sabbath. Nowhere in the scriptures can it be found where God repealed it, or His grace annulled it, or that time has altered it. From Eden God made it "crystal clear" that He is owner over the earth by preserving the right to the tree in the midst of Eden.

Abraham acknowledged Melchizedec as King and Priest by paying to Him his Tithe; so spiritual Israel, the seed of Abraham, by Tithing acknowledge Christ as King and Priest after the order of Melchizedec. Refusal to Tithe is a refusal to own Christ as Priest. Especially in these last days when the judgment is in session every Seventh-day Adventist must surely depend on the heavenly services of our great Advocate. Remember this is a fundamental principle of love. It is not a matter of a legal requirement. Christ's love saves us and our love for His salvation constrains us to sacrifice for His great cause.

When one fails to Tithe he not only robs God, as is pointed out by the prophet Malachi, but he is subjected to a curse and has denied himself the right of the blessings of God. This is a most unfortunate experience for anyone. The servant of the Lord tells us, "I have been shown that many in our churches are robbing God in Tithes and offerings. God will execute upon them just that which he has declared. To the obedient, He will give rich blessings; to the trans-gressor, a curse." Testimonies to Ministers and Gospel Workers. p. 103.

In a recent survey the result showed that on the whole the earning power of our people is very small. Comparing this result with the greatly increased standard of living evidenced among us, one must conclude that somewhere along the line there has been some neglect or oversight on our part. It may be we have failed to Tithe the fruits, vegetables, poultry, and dairy products produced on our own farms and which we use for our home consumption. These products are a part of our income and should be Tithed.

FAITHFULNESS IN STEWARDSHIP

"The mission of the church of Christ is to save perishing sinners. It is to make known the love of God to men and to win them to Christ by the efficacy of that love. The principle of the cross of Christ brings all who believe under heavy obligations to deny self, to impart light to others, and to give of their means to extend the light. The principle of worldlings is to get all they can of the perishable things of this life. Selfish love of gain is the ruling principle in their lives. God could have reached His object in saving sinners without the aid of man; but He knew that man could not be happy without acting a part in the great work in which he would be cultivating self-denial and benevolence. The foundation of the plan of salvation was laid in sacrifice." TT, p. 360.

"There are many who have looked upon the Jewish nation as a people to be pitied because they were constantly taxed for the support of their religion; but God, who created man and provided him with all the blessings he enjoys, knew what was for his best good. And through His blessings He made their nine tenths worth more to them than the entire amount without His blessing. Whenever God's people, in any period of the world, have cheerfully and willingly carried out His plan in systematic benevolence and in gifts and their labours just in proportion as they obeyed His requirements. When they acknowledge the claims of God and complied with his requirements, honouring Him with their substance, their barns were filled with plenty. But when they robbed God in tithes and in offerings they were made to realize that they were not robbing Him but themselves, for He limited His blessings to them just in proportion as they limited their offerings to Him." Test., Vol. 3, p. 395. Sad to say that 'among church members there are, alas! many Achans. Many a man comes statedly to church and sits at the table of the Lord, while among his possessions are hidden unlawful gains, the things that God has cursed'. PP, p. 497. "All that is withheld of that which God claims, the tenth of the increase, is recorded in the books of heaven against the withholders, as robbery." TT, p. 373.

Every man is a steward of God. Soon the Great Judge of the earth will say to each of His stewards: 'Give an account of thy stewardship.' May you dear reader, be found a faithful steward.

The tithing system reaches back beyond the days of Moses. Men were required to offer to God gifts for religious purposes before the definite system was given to Moses, even as far back as the days of Adam. In complying with God's requirements, they were to manifest in offerings their appreciation of His mercies and blessings to them. This was continued through successive genera-tions, and was carried out by Abraham, who gave tithes to Melchizedek. The same principle existed in the days of Job. Jacob, when at Bethel, an exile and penniless wanderer, lay down at night, solitary and alone, with a rock for his pillow, and there promised the Lord: 'Of all that Thou shalt give me I will surely give the tenth unto Thee.' Test. vol. 3, p. 393. "God does not compel men to give. He will not have His treasury re-plenished with unwilling offerings. The tithing system is of Divine origin. Great objects are accomplished by it. If one and all would accept it, each would be made a vigilant and faithful treasurer for God, and there would be no want of means with which to carry forward the great work of sounding the last message of warning to the world. The treasury will be full if all adopt this system, and the contributors will not be left the poorer. If this plan of systematic benevolence were adopted by every individual and fully carried out, there would be a constant supply in the treasury. This system of tithing was founded upon a principle which is as enduring as the law of God. It was a blessing to the Jews and also will it be a blessing to those who carry it out to the end of time." The calls keep coming, but should we be weary of giving. Are you? As long as we receive God's blessings we are under bond to return to Him the portion He claims. "God gives man nine tenths, while He claims one tenth for sacred purposes, as He has given man six days for his own work and has reserved and set apart the seventh, day to Himself. For, like the Sabbath, a tenth of the increase is sacred; God has reserved it for Himself. He will carry forward His work upon the earth with

TITHE

What is the meaning of this little word? Here are a few meanings worthy of special note.

The tenth part of one's possessions or income given to the support of the church; a tenth part of one's income consecrated to God. The separation of a certain proportion of the products of one's industry. These meanings are quite vivid.

In Genesis 2:8 we read that the Lord God planted a garden eastward in Eden and there put the man whom he had formed. In this garden the Lord also had the tree of knowledge of good and evil which He commanded should not be touched. Psalm 24:1 states that the earth is the Lord's. Haggai 2:8 mentions that the silver and the gold is the Lord's, everything belongs to Him.

Why did God forbid Adam to touch that special tree? One reason is: He wanted to show his ownership and Adam's faithfulness in stewardship.

God requires:

- That we acknowledge Him as God always.
- That we acknowledge Him as owner of all.

The tithe and the sabbath are closely related. Exodus 20:8-11 states that the sabbath is holy. Leviticus 27:30 mentions that the tithe is holy unto the Lord—both show God's ownership.

The tithe is sacred, reserved by God for Himself. It is to be brought into His treasury to be used to sustain the gospel labourers in His Work. For a long time the Lord has been robbed because there are those who do not realize that the tithe is God's reserved portion. So me have said, 'I will no longer pay my tithe,

for I have no confidence in the way things are managed at the heart of the work.' But will you rob God because you think the management of the work is not right? . . "God's reserved resources are not to be used in a haphazard way. The tithe is the Lord's and those

SPACE AGE CRUSADE

Seventy years ago the Advent Message was preached in Race Course, Clarendon, and the church was organized. Since then, nothing of stirring significance has been accomplished. On the 17th of February, 1963, with fiery passion for the salvation of the lost, Elder H. R. Bennett began a "Space Age" Evangelistic Crusade.

Amidst organized and protracted opposition from the enemy, God's last message of mercy was presented to hundreds of hungry souls for approxi-mately three months in this area.

On Sunday, May 19, nearly 3,000 persons witnessed the solemn surrender of 49 souls to the power of the cross as they were baptized. The candidates led by Pastor Bennett and Sister L. M. Nicholas, Bible Worker, met in the Race Course Church at 7:30 a.m. for roll call, consecration and final instruction.

Guided by a police officer of the motor cycle squad, forty-seven vehicles formed an attractive motorcade with the President's car in front followed by the dis-

A devoted member of one of the large churches in Kingston, Jamaica, took up residence in England four years ago for the purpose of seeking a livelihood. In addition to all of this he paid her fare to and from England for a well earned vacation.

It is her firm belief that he is making up his mind to accept the Advent Message. Indeed it pays to be faithful to God in tithes and offerings. Truly the most powerful argument that we can offer in favour of the truth is a con-

Lay Preachers Activities

During the period June 13—23 several Lay Preachers' Rallies were conducted in West and East Jamaica and a Congress in Central Jamaica, in fulfilment of the promise made at our yearend Rallies, to have mid-year regional meetings, to review the work done for the first six months and to lay plans for the rest of the year. Elder E. J. Edwards of the General Conference Lay Activities Department and Elder B. L. Archbold of the Inter-American Division Lay Activities Department we're with us for these meetings, and their sound and timely instruction proved a source of great inspiration.

In West Jamaica Rallies were conducted at Santa Cruz on June 13 and at Montego Bay June 14 - 16. Beginning with a keynote message by Elder Edwards on Friday evening, the Montego Bay Rally developed momentum as it proceeded. No wonder its highlights was the closing event - a torch-lighting ceremony. Elder Edwards presented and lit a torch, made from a limb of a tree which grew in the yard of the first SDA church in the world, located in New Hampshire. This lighted torch was passed in order from the General Conference Lay Activities Secretary to the Lay Activities Secretary of the Division, Union and local field, the President of the Conference, the district pastor, then a layman who passed down the centre aisle of the church, lighting the candles of those sitting nearest the aisle on either side. Each one in turn lit the torch of the one nearest him until there were approximately 700 burning candles symbolic of the dissemination of the gospel light by "every member evangelism." The entire congregation then united in singing "Let the lower lights be burning." This was very impressive and many, as they meditated, made new and strong resolutions to strive for deeper spirituality in their own lives and to labour more faithfully for souls. During this rally 48 candidates were baptized, all the fruitage of lay efforts, and the Lay Preachers expe-riences, as related at the Symposium on

In East Jamaica, June 18-20, Regional Rallies were held at Port Antonio, Kingston and Morant Bay. Of outstanding interest and inspiration was the Lay Preachers' baptism conducted at Trench Town on Wednesday evening, June 19, in a portable pool in the large unfinished and roofless church building. At the appointed hour, with all lights off except a spotlight focusing on the Lay Preachers of the Trench Town church, they marched up the aisle to their places on the rostrum in true soldier fashion to the music of The Battle Hymn of the Republic. Thirty-five candidates were baptized at that meeting, all the first fruits of the 15 lay efforts launched by the Trench Town church on February 24, 1963. Upwards of 1,000 people were in attendance and over 50 responded to the call made by the Conference President, indicating their intention to unite with the church.

At Spanish Town, the Central Jamaica Lay Activities Congress convened June 21-23. Of great interest and deep significance was the opening scene, when Brother Joseph Mitchell, who has been a lay preacher for 65 years, carried a lighted torch up the aisle and on to the rostrum where he was met by a young lay preacher, Brother Gustavus Planto, to whom he spoke a few words of admonition and handed the torch, indicating the fact that the younger members of the church should now carry on where he had to lay down. Brother Planto, on behalf of the lay workers present, accepted the challenge. During the entire congress emphasis was placed on "every member evangelism". It remains now for us to implement the plans and counsels in every church, thus making this 50th anniversary year of Lay Activities the most outstanding year in soul-winning achievement in the history of the work in Jamaica.
