GOD BLESSES HINDU FARMER

Some time ago a Hindu farmer attended an effort conducted in the Indian village of Vilupuram. One day he heard a sermon on tithing and the blessings those receive who pay a faithful tithe. This man owned ricelands that at that particular time were almost ready for the harvest. However, there had been no rain and the sun was scorching the rice plants. It appeared that the crop would be lost. Also the insects had attacked the crop.

After the sermon this gentleman went home and told his son what he had heard. He remarked to him, "We have been giving offerings and paying vows to many of our Hindu gods, expecting them to help us in our present crisis, but nothing has come to answer our petitions. Why don't we give something to this God they are preaching about, and also pay the tithe? We ought to give it a trial." The son agreed and they both went to the meeting the next day and paid a thank offering and titne and made a vow to pay an honest tithe on the crops.

The men returned home and very soon they had an abundant downpour of rain that saved the paddy plants. The man's heart was touched and his faith was strengthened in the God he had heard about at our meeting.

After the paddy was harvested, this man brought in his tithe according to his vow and testified to our workers that God had wrought a great miracle. He had not only given rain but had destroy-ed the insects that were threatening his crop. He had a surprisingly large yield of rice.

THREE MILLION SABBATH SCHOOL MEMBERS

Yes, that is correct! We are now working on our third million in Sabbath school membership mark during the first quarter of 1964. The actual figure as of March 31, 1964, was 2,029,578.

It took us 98 years (1853 to 1951) to reach our first million in Sabbath school members. However, it only took us 12 years (1952 to 1964 to reach our second million.

Now the question is, "How long will it take us to reach our third million?' The answer is up to us. "The time has come when, as never before, Seventhday Adventists are to arise and shine, because their light has come, and the glory of the Lord has risen upon them." **EVANGELISM**, p. 36. "The time is com-ing when there will be as many converted in a day as there were on the day of Pentecost after the disciples had re-ceived the Holy Spirit." Ibid., p. 692. God is ready to do great things for us, if we only have enough faith to accept the challenge and to cooperate fully with Him. "Time is short, and our forces must be organized to do a larger work." CHRISTIAN SERVICE, p. 72.

The following suggestions will help us speedily to increase our membership and thus reach the three-million milestone perhaps by 1970.

First, we should search out every backslider — each one who once wor-shipped with us. We should by kindly interest and actions endeavour to awaken within them once again the "Hope of Christ's Return." We should sympathize with them where possible and pray with them and for them. In every conceivable manner we should woo them back to Christ, and to the Sabbath school and other services of the church. Second, we should seek out the re-

latives of Adventists—those who are al-ready acquainted with our main teachings

There are many thousands of husbands who are sympathetic with the truth because of long intimate association with a faithful Adventist wife. Many of these men have not made a decision to obey God. We should unite our prayers and efforts with those of the wives and do all we can to draw these men to the Sabbath school and church.

Third, there are, perhaps, in North America, nearly a million sons and daughters of Seventh-day Adventists that are out of the Sabbath school and church. Let us search these out and coax them back into the fellowship of the Sabbath school.

Fourth, and this is very important, we should visit our neighbours and gently urge them toward the Sabbath school. "Christ's method alone will give true success in reaching the people. The Saviour mingled with men as one who desired their good. He showed His sympathy for them, ministered to their needs,

TITHE

Bulletin No. 1

Responsibility of Conference Presidents, Pastors, Elders, Deacons, the People as a Body

"Many presidents of State conferences do not attend to that which is their work, -to see that the elders and deacons of the churches do their work in the churches, by seeing that a faithful tithe is brought into the treasury ... Presi-dents of our conferences, do your duty; speak not your words, but a plain, "Thus saith the Lord.' Elders of churches, do your duty. Labour from home to home, that the flock of God shall not be remisin this great matter, which involves such a blessing or such a curse. . . . Every man who bears the message of truth to our churches, must do his duty by warning, educating, rebuking. Any neglect of duly which is a robbery toward God, means a curse upon the delinquent." TM 305-307.

"Let the church appoint pastors and elders who are devoted to the Lord Jesus, and let those men see that officers are chosen who will attend faithfully to the work of gathering in the tithe. If the pastors show that they are not fitted for their charge, if they fail to set before the church the importance of returning to God His own, if they do not see to it that the officers under them are faithful, and that the tithes are brought in, they are in peril. They are neglecting a matter which involves a blessing or a curse to the church. They should be relieved of the responsibility, and other men should be tested and tried. The Lord's messengers should see that His requirements are faithfully discharged by mem-bers of the church." —Supplement to REVIEW AND HERALD, Dec. 1, 1886.

"The Lord will not hold guiltless those who are deficient in doing the work that He requires at their hands, - in seeing that the church is kept wholesome and healthy spiritually, and doing all their duty in allowing no neglect which will bring the threatened curse upon His people. A curse is pronounced upon all who withhold their tithe from God." TM 307.

"The plain, straight testimony must live in the church, or the curse of God will rest upon His people as surely as it did upon ancient Israel because of their sins. God holds His people, as a body, responsible for the sins existing in individuals among them. If the leaders of the church neglect to diligently search out the sins which bring the displeasure of God upon the body, they become responsible for these sins . . . Should a case like Achan's be among us, there are many who would accuse those who might act the part of Joshua in searching out the wrong, of having a wicked, fault-finding spirit. God is not to be trifled with, and His warnings disregarded with impunity by a perverse people." 3T 269, 270.

The next big event was the Third Annual Pathfinder Exhibition and Fair, which was held under the distinguished patronage of His Excellency the Governor Sir Ralph Grey. For weeks and months the members of the Pathfinder Clubs were planning for the honourable event. For many days the Guard of Honour was in rigid practice and all day on Sunday, and part of Monday final preparations were made, as booths were readied and last minute touches were placed on exhibits.

Then the hour finally arrived, and at 7:50 p.m., the Guard of Honour under the command of Brother Richard Ranming, took its place on the court, and at 8:00 p.m. His Excellency and Lady Grey arrived. They were met by Elder L. V. McMillan, Director of the Pathfinders, and Elder S. N. McKinney, Acting President of the Bahamas Mission.

In respect to our Queen and Governor, all stood at attention as the National Anthem was played.

Immediately after, the Governor inspected the Guard of Honour made up of Pathfinders a 11 looking exceptionally snar;. For the occasion, After the inspecting of the Guard of Honour, the Governor and party took their seats on the Platform, and addresses were made. Elder L. V. McMillan welcomed the guests, who included the Leader of the Red Cross of the Bahamas, Captain S. C. Penn, captain of the Boys Brigade, and Mr. and Mrs Paul L. Adderly, Elder S. N. McKinney spoke concerning the Pathfinder work in the Bahamas, and Elder D. J. von Pohle told about our work in the Inter-American Division.

Ine Governor then addressed the Pathfinders, and in declaring the Exhibition officially opened he said, "All of you are engaged in the same great work, helping others and thereby finishing the work of the gospel in all the world. That must give you a sense of satisfaction and I wish that your group here will have much success, that you will have lots of fun out of it and that many others will follow in the Path that you have found." The Exhibition being opened, the Governor and other guests were taken to see the exhibits and demonstration booths. What a pleasant sight met our eyes as we entered the auditorium of the Bahamas Junior Academy! The four clubs with the MV Department and the Book and Bible House had their exhibits nicely arranged for display.

There were exhibits in arts and crafts, needlework, collections in coins, stamps, agriculture and nature, The Grants Town Club had the most attractive exhibits. From the exhibits, the Governor proceded to the demonstration booths where some of the features of the Pathfinder Club were demonstrated. Johnson Park demonstrated a "Typical Group Studying the Stars"; Englerston; "Pathfinders Caring for Orphan Children"; Centreville; "First Aid"; and Grants Town, "Care for My Body".

The Outdoor competitions were next, but one of the highlights of the evening took place just before the competitions began.

CONVENTION IN THE BAHAMAS

August 9, 1964 is a day that will long live in the minds of hundreds of the members of our churches of New Providence. On that day the first Convention in the history of the Bahamas Mission was conducted.

Because of the fact that the Dundas Civic Centre was booked right up to the Saturday night before the Convention, the morning of the 9th started very early for us. We were not certain that the hall could be made ready for our opening time on Sunday, but with the help of most of our local elders, deacons, members and workers we were able to sing the opening hymn at 9:30 A.M.

As the meeting opened that morning, there were approximately three hundred people in attendance. Many of these brethren came with their very young children from the very beginning and stayed right through the day.

The first special item of music came to us from the choir of the Johnson Park Church, which is the most recently organized church of the Bahamas Mission. Our hearts were truly thrilled as we watched Brother E. E. Ferment lead this group in a song of praise as that great convocation of Christian fellowship got underway.

Our first speaker for the day was Elder W. U. Campbell, who inspired us all as he powerfully delivered his message on "The might of Mercy". This was followed by a brief survey of the work in the Mission at this time. Then came some very helpful suggestions from the Sabbath School and Home Missionary Departments under the leadership of Pastor N. E. Scavella. Immediately after this, o ur Acting Treasurer, Brother A. B. Marshalleck, graphically portrayed for us the financial picture of our Mission.

Among the very interesting things his statistical report revealed are the following: For the first time the Centreville Church no longer has the highest per capita tithe. This achievement is now the accomplishment of the Englerston Church.

Secondly, that the Englerston Church also has the greatest gain in tithe for the first six months of the year. Thirdly, that the Centreville Church is now the largest church in the Mission with a membership of 238 as compared to 231 for Grants Town.

After lunch, which was served on grounds by our Welfare sisters, the Temperance and Educational activities were highlighted by our Temperance and Educational Secretary, Elder H. A. Roach. Then came the Missionary Volunteer

Then came the Missionary Volunteer hour for which our young people 'noped all through the day. There is no doubt in our minds that the young people were inspired as they were told of the coming Youth Camp by their leader, Elder L. V. McMillan.

Let us hasten to assure you that the Voice of Prophecy and Publishing Departments under the leadership of Mrs H. A. Roach and Elder N. E. Scavella, respectively, received very favourable responses from the many individuals who listened.

The day was brought to a close by a big Evangelistic Rally at which time about five hundred assembled to hear the Word of God. During this meeting an appeal was made for an offering to assist in the purchasing of a new tent for evangelistic purposes and One Hundred and Fifty Pounds was taken up. Elder Campbell led out in this service and when he made his altar call hundreds with their leaves in their hands came forward and gave their hearts anew to God.

We want to register our deep appreciation for the help we received from our many visitors at the Convention. Among those visiting were Elder W. U. Campbell, mentioned above; Mrs. H. S. Walters, who gave us a very profitable talk on Christian Education; Mrs. Jean Stoodly, who spoke to us on the right use of food; and Mrs. A. B. Marshalleck, the wife of our Acting Treasurer.

We are already planning for next year's Convention and we solicit your prayers for the finishing of the work in the Bahamas.
