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The King's Business Requires Haste.

We would take this opportunity to urge upon all the importance of making haste in the circulation of the petition remonstrating against the Sunday bills that are now before Congress, for the present session will be a short one, as it must close, by the fourth of March.

There will be only about six weeks at most after the receipt of this issue of your paper before our opportunities to present the petition against these present bills will be over, so it will require special haste to secure the signature to these petitions and to return them in sufficient time for us to send them in to the Legislature, if possible before the bills are acted upon.

The following was said in substance to one of our brethren the other day in a western state, "We will not sign your petition for this concerns only the District of Columbia, but when Congress does anything to interfere with our state laws then we will sign a petition." A good answer to such an argument will be found in the leaflet that accompanies the petition blanks entitled "Sunday Bill Now Before Congress" under a subheading "A District Law an entering wedge." The facts are that the city of Washington is unlike all other cities in the U.S. in that it is not a self governing city, that is, Congress legislates for it.

With this thought in view it will readily be seen that every citizen in this country is directly concerned in any action the Government may take on a question of this character for the District of Columbia; for the National Legislators are representatives of the people from the respective states from which they come, and are pledged to carry out the will of the people in harmony with the Constitution of the U.S. Let it ever be remembered, therefore that when once Congress commits itself to Sunday legislation in the District of Columbia, it then would without doubt take its stand for a National Sunday law.

Those who circulate the petition should be careful to fill in the name of the place and state where it is circulated, in the blank space at the head of the petition and see that each person, signing, signs both petitions, the one addressed to the House and the one addressed to the Senate.

An Important Publication Now Ready.

At a recent meeting of the popular ministers of Washington, D. C., it was decided that on Sunday, Jan. 1, sermons would be preached in all the churches on the Better Observance of the Lord's Day, and this especially in view of the fact that there is now before congress bills to enact Sunday laws for the District of Columbia.

In view of these things, the leading brethren in the city of Washington prepared an "open letter" which was published in the "Washington Post," the most prominent newspaper of the city. This has caused no little comment and the matter is being agitated throughout the city.

Requests have come from Conference Presidents and others in different parts of the field who have seen this article, to have it published in tract form. In consultation with Brethren Spicer, Russell, Thompson, Warren and others, The Review and Herald Publishing Assn. has decided to issue the matter in tract form at once and it is now in the hands of the printers. The price will be $\frac{1}{2}$ cent each; 40 cents per hundred; \$3.75 per thousand.

This tract, while short, is filled with scripture texts and strikes a direct blow at the theories generally advanced by advocates of the first day. After dealing with these, it cites proof of the change of the day, and closes with an appeal to abandon the counterfeit and all that attaches to it, and return to the true Sabbath of the Lord.

This tract ought to be circulated

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by the thousands, especially at this time, when, should the congress of the United States enact Sunday laws, it will thereby establish a dangerous precedent for every state, city and minor corporation. Who will be the minute men at this time? Orders may be sent through the usual channels.

MONTEREY.

The Lord is working for His children here. Where there had some little differences existed, these have been mostly adjusted to the satisfaction of those concerned. One case in particular, one of our brethren who has been passing through some severe trials for about a year, and about whom some very unjust remarks have been made, has made hearty confession to such things as he felt had been wrong on his part, and has the assurance of a full and complete forgiveness on the part of the church, and a restoration to the same confidence and consideration that existed before this trial began.

The work that has been done among us by Elders W. M. Crothers and D. T. Bourdeau of late has been of a very beneficial and encouraging nature, and we shall be glad to receive their visits and counsels again.

There are some items which we draw from the treasurer's annual report which may be of interest to the readers of the "Herald." Only one more than half of the present membership have paid tithes through their own church. We know that there are some absent ones that pay tithes where they are, yet the tithes that have been paid at home have amounted to \$484.25.

Besides this there has passed through the treasurer's hands \$1.50, Weekly offerings, \$10.99, mid-summer offerings, \$8.87, for the work in the South, \$23.71, received in regular weekly collections for the Mission Board, \$21.24, Sabbathschool offerings for Missions, \$73.10, for church expenses, .50, for church poor fund, \$136.95, for churchschool, \$ 56.13, Tract and Missionary fund, \$10.02, for Haskell Home, \$37.95, annual offering .81, for the educational fund, .50, for India, \$8.63, for the work in Washington, \$6.25, for camp-meeting expenses, \$1.00, for International Publishing Association, \$2.28, for Religious liberty, \$11.39, for Oakwood school making a total of \$877.87. The church expense and school funds have only been going through the treasurer's hands the last nine months of the year. Had it been for the entire year it would reach about \$1,000 that this church has paid in different ways for the support of the gospel. May the above provoke unto love and good works. J. B. BUCK.

From an encouraging letter, recently received, regarding the "Object Lessons" work in Wisconsin, we quote the following: "The churches and members that have done their work faithfully have been made happier and stronger because of the experiences which they have gained. Some have missed a great blessing by withholding themselves from this good work. There are many fields yet waiting for this book, and rich experiences may be gained by those who will go forth with courage and work for them.

"In some localities churches have been organized as the result of work introduced by the sale of 'Object Lessons.' One of our licentiates and his wife selected a new field, and proposed to begin work there by canvassing it thoroughly for 'Christ's Object Lessons.' They disposed of about fifty copies in the neighborhood, and then followed the interest with 'The Signs of the Times,' and this by giving Bible readings. After a time they called the people together, and held meetings with them, until a company of commandment-keepers was developed. Then followed the organization of a church. The brother who went there first writes, 'We now have a beautiful congregation here Our church school is becoming established, and is proving a great blessing to the church. We have a good teacher, and a good work is being done.'

"Success in the 'Object Lessons, work is not confined to those who devote the whole or a large portion of their time to the effort. During the time of the principal 'Object Lessons' campaign, a brother living in one of our cities started out from his home at 11.00 a.m. one day, carrying with him twenty copies of 'Object Lessons' for sale. Although he had no orders to fill, and the territority where he was to work had but recently been canvassed for the book, he told his wife to wait about dinner until he had sold out his stock. He disposed of the entire lot for cash, and got home to eat his dinner at 5 p.m. Another time this brother sold eleven 'Object Lessons' in going from his home to the church, and did not spend much extra time on the way.

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"Another brother, who has learned and accepted the whole truth since the sale of 'Object Lessons' began, has during the last two years endeavored, as far as possible, to devote one day in a week to the sale of our books. He has not been able to find time every week to do this, but he has sold nearly five hundred copies of 'Christ's Ob. ject Lessons,' and has turned over all the money thus obtained to the tract society. He has also sold other of our books to persons who purchased 'Object Lessons' from him. The commission which he gets on all books and papers except 'Object Lessons' he donates to different interests connected with the third angel's message, which call for money. His sales on 'Object Lessons' have averaged fully ten copies a day for each day that he has given to this work. He has often sold as many as twenty copies a day. He writes about the excellent favor with which the books are received, and hundreds of missionary visits which he makes with individuals and families. The work he has done was not to get money for himself, but because he wished to help the Lord's cause, and also desired to save souls. The experience that the Lord gave him in selling 'Object Lessons' has made this brother strong for various lines of missionary and evangelistic work.

Sabbath-school Notes.

"The truly converted laborer in the Sabbath-school will not be moulded after the customs and practices of the world, but will stand in moral independence. He will set an example that will be consistent with his profession, coming out from the world and maintaining a separation from its spirit and fashions."

"If teachers would ever bear in mind that it is the Holy Spirit that must reveal to the soul glimpses of heavenly things, and that as they work in the spirit of Christ, this heavenly agent is impressing the mind with divine truth; if they would ever realize that angels are about them, that they are standing upon holy ground, much more efficient work would be done in the Sabbath-schools."

"Entire consecration of soul must be maintained as much by the teachers and superintendents of the Sabbath-schools as by the ministers in our pulpits, for all alike are engaged in the work of bringing souls to Christ. Each in his place is to work, as did Christ, in the spirit of love, for the erring and impenitent. This is what Christ would see in the Sabbath-school work."

"The Lord calls for young men and women to gird themselves for lifelong, earnest labor in the Sabbath-school work. Spasmodic efforts will not avail to accomplish much good, or to make you successful laborers in the work of God. By patient continuance in well-doing, you are to become laborers together with God."

"Every teacher in the school should feel that he is a missionary for God. He must improve his moments and his ability to obtain a knowledge of the Word of God, that he may impart the same to his scholars. They need freshness of ideas, fresh, wise plans, life, tact, and a spirit in the work."
