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Report of the West Michigan Seventh-Day Adventist Conference for two Years From Jan. 1, '04 to Jan. 1, '06 to the Third Bienial Session of the Lake Union Conference.

To the delegates assembled in the Third Biennial Sesson of the Lake Union Conference at Berrien Springs, Mich., May 8-18, 1906. Greeting:

"And I, brethren, when I came to you, came not with excellency of speech or of wisdom, declaring unto you the testimony of God. For I determined not to know anything among you save Jesus Christ, and him crucified."

"Be ye therefore followers of God as dear children; and walk in love, as Christ also hath loved us, and hath given himself for us an offering and a sacrifice to God for a sweet smelling savour."

"And be ye kind one to another, tender hearted, forgiving one another, even as God for Christ's sake hath forgiven you."

The Michigan Seventh-day Adventist Conference was organized in 1861. It was sub-divided in August, 1902, at which time the West Michigan Seventh-day Adventist Conference was organized from a part of its territory.

EVANGELICAL DEPARTMENT.

Four general meetings were held within the two-year period, and twenty series of tent meetings; two councils of the ministers, each of which proved to be of great value to this department of our conference work. Two general campmeetings were followed by the baptism of fifty-two persons and their reception into church fellowship. As a result of the twenty series of tent meeting, each tent company has been made to rejoice with from one to eighteen converts to the faith.

This department to our work has very bright prospects before it. The hearts of our young men are being turned toward the ministry. At the present time we have a number of young men doing hearth-tohearth Bible work in our cities. We also have a few young ladies doing faithful city work. my connection with the work in the West Michigan Conference there never have been so many openings for our evangelical workers as at the present time. Surely the harvest is ripe and the laborers few.

EDUCATIONAL DEPARTMENT.

This department of our conference work is well established. The Sabbath-schools have increased in number and influence. Young people's societies have been organized in many places with good results. The church or primary schools have come to stay. We now own a number of primary school buildings. With the churches owning these, it is no longer a question whether they will conduct schools. These primary schools have proved to be of much value to our educational work in general.

We have two well-established schools doing intermediate work,one at Battle Creek, the other at Cedar Lake. The Battle Creek Academy is a school directed by the church. It is therefore a church school doing academic work. It is the best equipped church school of our conference and is doing a quality of work that is unequalled by any other of our church schools

The Cedar Lake School is an intermediate school supported and controlled by the conference. At the last session of the conference the delegates instructed its board of managers to place this school where it would be entirely selfsustaining. Plans have already been inaugarated which will result in placing this school on an independent, self-supporting basis.

MISSIONARY DEPARTMENT.

The workers in this department have not been idle. There has been a steady increase in the distribution of our denominational literature. We have had but very few regular canvassers in the field. We have kept a field agent in active service among the churches during the entire time. Some of the time we have had two men giving themselves to this line of work. Three canvassers' institutes have been held. As a result a few men and women have entered the field as regular canvassers.

As a conference we are blessed with the presence and counsel of a number of aged laborers that we willingly support. There are seven laborers on our pay roll that have reached the advanced age of from seventy-two to eighty years. At the present there are good prospects of our having two more.

We are giving help to the missionary interests of the denomination in both laborers and means.

MEDICAL DEPARTMENT.

Our medical work is growing and gaining influence. We have only one small sanitarium which is under the direct control of the conference. There are at the present time eight persons in our employ devoting all their time to this line of work. There has been a steady growth in the medical work of the conference from the time of its establishment to the present.

LIBERTY DEPARTMENT.

This branch of our conference work as a department is the youngest member of the family, but it is assuming large proportions, as nearly every church in the territory has its Liberty Secretary, and they all stand as minute men ready for service on short notice.

FINANCIAL STATEMENT.

The West Michigan Conference Association has a present worth of \$1500, with \$200 liabilities. The Educational Department has a present worth of \$17,000. This is invested in school property. This department has liabilities amounting to \$500. The Medical Department has a present worth of \$2500, consisting of medical appliances, sanitarium equipments, dormitory furnishings, and accounts. There is no debt upon this department. The Missionary Department has a present worth of \$1400.00. This is vested in books, accounts, and cash. It has no debt. The Evangelical Department has a present worth of \$5,000 vested in tents and equipments, office fixtures,

cash, with no liabilities. The present worth of the various church buildings throughout the conference is \$60,350, with \$6,850 liabilities. Thus it would seem that the total resources of the West Michigan Conference, incorporated and unincorporated, are \$95,300, the total liabilities \$7,550, making the net present worth \$87,750.

STATISTICS.

There are 5,000 Sabbath-keepers in the West Michigan Conference, 77 organized churches, 12 companies, 88 Sabbath-schools with an average attending membership of 2,500, 11 Young People's Societies with a membership of 500, 22 primary and intermediate schools with an average attendance of about 500. We own 48 church buildings and 14 school houses. There are at the present time 14 ordained ministers, 6 licensed ministers, and 24 missionary licentiates on the conference pay roll, 44 in all.

The total earnings of the Medical Department for the two years were \$4,500. The total donations from the Sabbath-schools \$5,156.87. Of this amount \$4,-036.01 was donated to the Haskell Home and to missions. The total tithe paid by the West Michigan churches for the two years was \$65,883.67, over \$8,000 of which was retained by the Battle Creek Sanitarium. The total income of the conference, including tithes, offerings, and donations for the two years was \$83,914.55. Of this sum \$43,751.69 was used within the territory, leaving \$40,162.86 sent to fields outside.

There has been a gradual increase in all lines and departments of the work connected with the West Michigan Conference, for which we praise God and give Him the glory.

A Statement.

In view of the fact that a leaflet entitled "Some History, Some Experiences and Some Facts," prepared by Elder A. T. Jones of Battle Creek, Mich., is being widely circulated throughout this Union Conference, and is, in our judgment, calculated to do great spiritual harm, we deem it proper to make the following statements of our position:

- I. We very deeply regret the unwise course Elder Jones has taken in thus making most serious charges against our General Conference Administration and in attempting to establish the claim that the instruction professedly given through the Spirit of Prophecy is unreliable.
- 2. Our own experience with the administration of General Conference affairs leads us to disagree wholly with the charges preferred by Elder Jones. During our entire connection with the message we have not seen manifest the spirit of domination here alleged; but we have alway had most friendly cooperation and have experienced the fullest freedom in carrying forward our work.
- 3. We have the fullest confidence that Elder Jones' conclusions concerning the testimonies rest upon no sufficient basis and we wish, while most kindly, yet most earnestly protesting against the charges preferred, to also assure our brethren and sisters in the local churches throughout the Lake Union Conference, that they need be in no way disturbed or unsettled by the groundless assertions being circulated among them by means of this leaflet.
- 4. That we take great pleasure in declaring our confidence in the administration of affairs of the General Conference, and to extend to it our most earnest and loyal support in carrying forward and fostering the message in all its phases in the various portions of the wide harvest field.
- 5. That we regard Elder Jones' assertions concerning the unreliability of the testimonies as having no weight when considered in the light of the history of this denomi-

nation, and we deem it a privilege to again express our thankfulness to our heavenly Father for the gift of the Spirit of Prophecy manifest in our midst, and renewed confidence in its integrity, and to pledge greater faithfulness in the future to the instruction which comes to us through this instrumentality.
