### Conference Proceedings.

Report of the Ninth Meeting of the Conference Held Thursday, 3:00 p. m.

After singing, prayer was offered by Dr. Otis.

Minutes of last meeting read and approved.

Elder Haughey then made a few remarks concerning the question under discussion at the last meeting and said he hoped some of the laymen who had served on auditing committees would give their advice.

Brother Root spoke in favor of the recommendation and moved that we support it as already made. This was seconded.

Dr. Otis thought some of our lay members not understanding the situation, might not be suitable ones to sit on such a committee, and mentioned his own financial condition for the consideration of the conference.

Several others spoke to this question after which a rising vote of the conference was taken which was unanimously in favor.

Elder Haughey then suggested that as this was a unanimous vote, it would be hardly just for any member present to go away and put dissatisfaction into any ones mind. He also made some further remarks concerning the salaries of the ministers, speaking of the many expenses constantly coming in which must be met.

THAT I have examined the books of the West Michigan Conference for the eleven months ending Nov. 30, 1906, and find them correct and in balance. The cash in the safe, and deposits in two banks agree with the books. The Conference funds have been carefully and consistantly handled, and disbursements have been made only upon orders from the President. Vouchers are on file in the office for the payments of freights and items of general expense in the conduct of the business and the office.

The Chair stated that this report would be printed in the West Michigan Herald.

This report was then unanimously adopted.

Brother Butler then gave a short report of the Cedar Lake Academy-He stated that they had made a few improvements this year. That they had stumped six acres of land at \$28 per acre. In a recent survey the boundries were not found to be where they had been supposed to be and they had therefore paid Capt. Thompson for stumping as many acres more as they had already stumped.

Also some improvements had been made on the Academy buildings amounting to about \$400.00. During the year no donations had come in except a few dollars with which to purchase cows.

They had thought this summer they would be in the best financial condition they had ever been, but owing to the early freeze in October, about half the potato crop and all of the onion crop had been ruined, so that most of the income is now from the tuition of the students, etc.

On account of the crop failure, they were unable to procure the necessary supplies for the schoolroom, to properly equip it, but were not discouraged and hoped to do better next time.

All the running expenses of the school had been paid, but not the debts.

This year the Academy has had the largest enrollment it ever had, there being about 68 students in attendance.

There has been an older class of students and also a better class because of being older.

The work runs from the 7th to the 11th grade, with four teachers.

Brother Tolf then spoke of the self-improvement societies of the school, there is such an organization among both the young men and young women of the school. These societies are doing practical work as far as possible, and also doing considerable literary work preparing themselves for public effort, and he admonished us that the conference need not be surprised if ministers were sent forth from this school.

This report was adopted.

Recess of ten minutes.

After recess we resumed our work.

Elder Heckman offered prayer.

Resolution No. 10 which had been laid on the table was taken up, which reads as follows: Resolved, That as a conference we express our hearty appreciation for the excellent financial management exercised during the past year, and especially commend the conference officers for the liberal way in which they have remembered the needy fields outside our borders in sharing with them the tithe.

This was spoken to by several who voiced the sentiment of the resolution, and expressed their thankfulness that we can enter upon the new year so well equipped financially. The resolution was unanimously carried.

The Committee on Plans presented the resolution that had been referred to them on city mission work which reads as follows: And whereas: The Lord has instructed us (Vol. 7 p. 19) that the greatest help that can be given our people is to teach them to work for God, we therefore,

RECOMMEND, That our ministers who are stationed over the cities, take the oversight of this work of training such laborers as shall engage in city colporter and Bible work, leading them in an aggressive effort to reach unbelievers.

This resolution met with the hearty support of all, and passed without a dissenting vote.

Elder Campbell asked permission to present a resolution out of order, which read as follows: Resolved that as delegates we present to the brethren, sisters and friends of Cedar Lake by a rising vote, an expression of sincere gratitude for the generous hospitality shown us during this session of the conference and we take this opportunity of pledging our hearty support, both moral and financial to the Academy located in their midst.

This was adopted by a rising vote of all present.

Elder Haughey thought this called for a speech from Elder Butler.

Elder Butler expressed the pleasure it gave the Cedar Lake church to entertain the conference, and gave them a cordial invitation to come again.

The time was then given to reports from the field.

Brother Bayley spoke of how he enjoyed his work as clerk and treasurer of the BattleCreek church. There had been an increase in the tithes and offerings of the church during the past year.

Sister DeYoung spoke of her work in Grand Rapids. Several of her readers had accepted the truth. This will encourage her to greater efforts for unbelievers.

Sister Snyder was the next speaker. She has not been engaged in active work for some time on account of failing health, but had labored in Grand Rapids a portion of the time. She had had many precious experiences. Other workers had arranged to carry on the work with interested readers. She said she would ever remember the work and workers of the West Michigan Conference.

Elder Haughey said they were sorry to lose Sister Snyder, but on

account of her health it was best for her to sever her connections with this conference for the present.

Short reports were given by the new workers just taking up the Bible work.

The Executive Committee were authorized to approve of the minutes.

## "Ask Not to be Excused."

From writing a letter to U. S. senators from your state remonstrating against H. R. 16483 known as the Wadsworth Sunday Bill for the District of Columbia. It will be remembered that the bill has already passed the House of Representatives and is now in the hands of the Senate committee for the District of Columbia.

This bill may be acted upon by this committee most any day and recommended favorably to the senate.

It will also be remembered that the Fifty-ninth Congress closes the fourth of March. While we are hoping that the bill will die in the hands of the District of Columbia Senate Committee, it could however in the closing hours of Congress be acted upon and passed very quickly.

It should be understood that statesmen are pleased to know the wishes of their constituents. It has been demonstrated that earnest letters do have a salutary effect upon statesmen by calling their attention to evils underlying any proposed measure or emphasizing the evils of which they may already have a knowledge.

It will be seen that should any action on the bill be deferred until the last day or two of Congress nearly every Seventh-day Adventist in the United States would have time to write a short and pointed but courteous letter to the senators from his respective state making a most earnest protest against the proposed Sunday bill for the Dis-
