The Faith Once Delivered to the Saints.

NUMBER FOUR.

Sermon delivered in the Tabernacle March 23, 1907, By Elder M. N. Campbell.

Following these, came William Miller, once a skeptic, and a man who had no confidence in the Bible, and yet honest in heart. Upon investigating the prophecies, especially, he was profoundly impressed with their remarkable fulfillment. He was deeply interested in the study of history, and as he was led to see how clearly history responds to the voice of prophecy. The man became convicted accepted the Word of God, and became a staunch supporter of the truth. Through him God brought to the attention of the world the truth concerning the soon-coming of Christ, the great Advent message which stirred this world from pole to pole. That message was carried to every missionary station upon earth. Not since the time of the preaching of the apostles was mankind so aroused as they were during the preaching of .William Miller, Other men rose up to preach the same message in different parts of the earth, although they knew nothing about the others. This man was the instrument in bringing to light the truth in regard to Conditional Immortality and the Sleep of the dead. The doctrine of man's natural immortality which Luther once said was "invented to make the popes' pot boil" was the outgrowth of Satan's falsehoods to our first parents. It was upon the acceptance of the belief of the natural immortality of the soul that Satan built up these great systems of heathenism that stand in the world to-day. It is the foundation stone of spiritualism, but we believe with the inspired aposle that "the wages of sin is death, but the gift of God is life eternal through Jesus Christ our Lord." So these great truths were brought to us through William Miller. Then this people whom God used so mightily to stir the world with the First Angel's Message-to that people God gave the light upon the Sabbath question, but they refused it; they refused to advance and God was compelled to raise up another people to carry forward that work; and so there is in the world to day the Seventh Day Adventist people. This people whom I have the honor to represent and who worship in this place, stand for all the truths that have been brought out by all these other reformers. The Seventh Day Adventists believe in the doctrine of Justification by faith as brought out by Martin Luther. They ac-

cept the truth concerning the Lord's Supper and the Simplicity of Worship as brought to us by John Calvin. They accept and practice the form of baptism brought from God's word by the Baptists. They believe and practice the observance of God's Sabbath as brought to us by the Seventh Day Baptists. They believe in the doctrine of God's free Grace as taught by the Methodists. They believe in the near approach of the Lord Jesus Christ as taught by William Miller. They believe in Conditional Immortality according to the gospel of Jesus Christ. They believe in the Unconscious State of the dead and in addition to that God has brought forth and is now teaching to the world the truth upon the Sanctuary question. They accept the Ordinance of Humility and rejoice in the possession of the Spirit of Prophecy and other gifts of the Holy

Now, all these truths that God has sent to the world through these various instrumentalities are now believed and taught by this one people, the Seventh Day Adventists, and this people are "now earnestly contending for the faith that was once delivered to the saints." But we do not stand before the world as having the whole truth, for as time passes on more light comes to us, and if we accept it as readily as we have the other truths which God has sent to us, our path will be as that of the just "which shineth more and more until the perfect day." God has more light for His people, and we believe that before we enter the Kingdom of God, before the coming of the Lord Jesus, still more light and more truth will be revealed to this people. And may God help us to stand in an humble position that our hearts may be ever open to receive the truth that comes.

The Lord Jesus tells us that when he comes again to this earth, faith will be on the wane. "When the Son of man cometh shall he find faith upon the earth?" But

we must reach the time when we shall be willing to risk our lives upon the say so of this Book. God commands His people to contend earnestly for the faith that was delivered to the saints." Satan is putting forth all his efforts to subvert the gospel. May God help us every one, to stand faithful to the truth. It is time to take hold more firmly than ever; to reach up with the arm of faith and clasp the hand reached down to help us; to be rooted and grounded in the gospel.

When the terrible time of trouble, which never was since there was a nation, shall come upon us, it will be well for God's people to be planted on the Rock of God's eternal truth. Earnestly must we contend! Because difficulties come upon us, let us not be discouraged. For as we read in Jer. 12:5—

"If thou hast run with the footmen, and they have wearied thee, then how canst thou contend with the horses? And if in the land of peace, wherein thou trustedst, they wearied thee, then how wilt thou do in the swelling of Jordan?"

My dear friends, let us not be dismayed nor shaken by small troubles or difficulties that come to us now, for this is simply "running with the footmen;" soon we must contend with the horses, and soon thereafter we must enter the swelling of Jordan; so now is the time to learn the lessons of faith; now is the time to be rooted and grounded in the things of the Word, so that when that time comes, it shall find us standing faithful and true to the faith that was once delivered to the saints.
