Hasting: Camp-meeting.

FRIDAY, AUGUST 23.

At 10:00 a.m. the time was occupied by an educational meeting in the interests of Emmanuel Missionary College and Cedar Lake Academy. Elder Haughey made a few remarks relative to the relation of the conference to the educational work, also to the three schools they as a conference were called upon to lend their support. Dr. L. J. Otis followed with some very pointed remarks. He said that we could not eat our way to heaven, but it had some thing to do with it. Elder A. G. Haughey read some communications from the Spirit of Prophecy.

The 7:30 hour was occupied by Elder Luther Warren. He based his remarks on Joel 2:1,2. We cannot scare people into heaven, but most people will have to be scared if they ever reach heaven. The day of the Lord is at hand, and the trumpet needs to be blown among those who are looking for a coming Saviour.

SABBATH, AUGUST 24.

This was a good day on the camp. A Sabbath school teacher's meeting was held at 8:00 a.m., and at 9:00 a.m. an interesting Sabbath-school was conducted. Many had come in during the week and the Sabbath school was much larger than it was the first Sabbath. The attendance was 638 and the donations \$58.97.

The 10:30 a, m. hour was occupied by Elder G. B. Thompson. The large pavilion was well filled and the speaker said he always felt very peculiar when he stood before such an audience. There is a great need of the Holy Spirit resting upon us for God has given us a message to give in the closing hours of this world's history. We need to seek meekness that we may be hid in the day of God's anger.

There is a need of Seventh Day Adventists finding the mercy seat if they never have before. God is going to take this message and this people through to the kingdom. Many have left their first love. Some have given up the truth and gone into secular business. There is not that seeking of God among us that there ought to be. We need to repent. There is

a great storm before us, and we need to lay everything on the alter. The thing we need the most is the baptism of the Holy Spirit.

After the discourse, several people went forward and expressed a desire to have a deeper and richer experience in the Christian life.

At 3:00 p. m. Elder A. G. Haughey read some communications from the spirit of prophecy, after which a large number of the campers repaired to the banks of the Thorn River and forty precious souls were buried with their Lord in baptism. Elders W. E. Videto and J. W. Hofstra administered the solemn rite.

Elder S. M. Butler gave a stirring address on the Law of God at 7:30 p. m.

SUNDAY, AUGUST 25.

This was the last great day of the feast. The weather was beautiful. Many interesting meetings were held, and each one increased in interest. The speakers of the day were Elders Haughey, Thompson, Campbell, Videto and Warren. Earnestness characterized each speaker.

Elder Warren gave the closing discourse at 7:30 p. m. A large attentive audience was in the pavilion and a number on the outside. The speaker had a message from God, and he had liberty in giving it.

The fourth annual camp-meeting of the West Michigan Conference is a thing of the past, but we trust the good spirit that was present throughout the meeting will continue with those who were present until Christ comes to make up his jewels.

FAITH.

Having learned what faith is, that it is believing God, believing what the Lord has said, believing it as it is, and that the Lord is capable of revealing his mind to us teaching us how and what to believe, we next inquire,

Whose faith is it?

This is an important point; for we read that there is but "one faith." Eph. 4:5. It is the faith of God, or "the faith of Jesus." Mark 11:22. See margin. Rev. 14:12. Says Paul, "I am crucified with Christ: nevertheless I live; yet not I, but Christ liveth in me:

and the life which I now live in the flesh I live by the faith of the Son of God, who loved me, and gave himself for me." Gal. 2:20.

The Son of God gave himself for us; but for what purpose? "That he might redeem us from all iniquity, and purify unto himself a peculiar people, zealous of good works." Titus 2:14. "For we are his workmanship created in Christ Jesus unto good works which God hath before ordained that we should walk in them." Good works are the works of God. The Jews asked the Son of God what they could do that they might work the works of God. Jesus answered them and said, "This is the work of God, that ye believe on him whom he hath sent." John 6:28, 29. It is God's work to destroy sin and unbelief in the human heart, and plant in the heart cleansed by the power of God, faith and unbounded confidence in every promise that God has made. Unbelief is darkness and sin. Faith is light, power, and strength. Unbelief separates us from God. Faith brings us near to God. "Take heed, brethren, lest there be in any of you an evil heart of unbelief, in departing from the living God." Heb. 3:12.

We can only be made partakers of Christ by holding our confidence steadfast unto the end. It is the faith of Jesus, so called, because it originated with him. The life that he lived here on earth was a life of faith. Never did he speak a word, or perform an act or deed, that was not prompted by the power of the eternal Father, who sent him. Said he, "I do nothing of myself." "The words that I speak are not mine." His was a life of faith and unbounded confidence in him that sent him.

The whole earthly life of Jesus is an infinite demonstration of the depth of his infinite love for a lost and ruined world. Against all the suggestions of unbelief, against all the discouragements and trials that ever beset his pathway, he pressed on with an eye ever single to the

glory of the eternal Father. The clouds often cast thick shadows around his lonely feet, but his hope and trust in his Father never failed.

Faith holds a very conspicuous place among the graces of the Spirit. It furnishes one of the distinctive names of the followers of the Lamb. These followers are distinguished by being called, believers, the faithful, holy brethren, children of light, and by having said of them, that they are in the faith. Their warfare is called the fight of faith: their most important weapon of defense is termed the shield of faith, their fervent and effectual prayer that avails much with God is called the prayer of faith, and the victory that overcome the world is their faith. By faith they stand; by faith they walk, by faith they live; and by faith they will pass from this world of darkness, sin and unbelief to a world of light and glory.

We are just informed that on Monday, the 9th instant, it was deemed necessary to have our dear brother, Elder Isaac D. VanHorn, taken to the State Institution at Kalamazoo, Mich, for those who are mentally unbalanced. Some affection of the brain is supposed to be the cause of this mental disturbance. For some time it has been feared that a complete collapse was at hand. Repeatedly our brother has had fainting spells when he would fall to the floor or ground in a state of unconsciousness. These occasions would be followed by marked general weakness for a time.

Our brother was not inclined to acts of violence except at times: but when his mind was roused to a certain course of action, however unwise and puerile it might seem, it wanted a man of strength to manage him. It is hoped by the family and others that this detention at the asylum may be only of a temporary nature. The oldest son resides at Kalamazoo, and visits his father daily. Thus far the reports are quite favorable concern-

ing the present condition. The wife for some weeks has been very feeble, but at this writing is improving.

Pray for this dear family, pray for our afflicted brother, and for the Zion of God in these days of sorrow.
