A farm a few miles out from Nashville has been purchased, and upon it the necessary buildings will be erected. It is hoped by this means, after the school is fully equipped, to make it entirely selfsupporting. This plan of school support from the products of the soil is ideal.

Brother Staines has letters of recommendation and endorsement from the officers of the Southern Union Conference, and from Sister White. He has also received the fullest endorsement from the officers of this conference.

To set this enterprise upon its feet, and make it self-supporting, will require a considerable outlay. Here is an opportunity for our schools here in the North to lend a helping hand to a sister institution and thus be doing a form of missionary work which will surely be big with results.

The new institution needs every thing in the way of school and dormitory supplies. I hope all our schools and patrons will take an interest in this work and plan to help.

One branch of manuel training which should be taught in all our schools is sewing. Why could not some time be devoted to this work during the winter months, and each school furnish a quilt or comfortable for this new training school?

I have spoken of this plan to a few of the schools, and teacher and pupils have taken a deep interest in the suggestion.

By faith Abel offered unto God a more excellent sacrifice than Cain, by which he obtained witness that he was righteous. By faith Enoch was translated that he might not see death. By faith Noah prepared the ark for the saving of his house, by the which he condemned the world, and became the heir of the righteousness which is by faith. By faith Abraham went out from his own country not knowing whether he went. By faith he sojourned in the promised land as in a strange country. By faith Sarah, herself, received strength to conceive seed and was delivered of a child when she was past age. By faith Isaac blessed Jacob and Esau concerning things to come. By faith Jacob when he was dying blessed both the sons of Joseph, and worshiped leaning upon the top of his staff.

Thus we see in this eleventh chapter of Hebrews, the faith of Joseph, Moses, Rahab, Gideon, Barak, Samson, Jephtha, David, Samuel, and of the prophets, who through faith subdued kingdoms, wrought righteousness, stopped the mouths of lions and quenched the violence of fire. The weak were made strong, the armies of the aliens were put to flight, the dead were raised, and all manner of diseases were healed by the power of God through faith. By faith Peter walked on the boisterous waves of the sea to go to his Lord. Matt. 14:31.

All these events wrought through faith were pleasing to God, and we read that without faith it is immpossible to please him. Heb. 11:6. # Standard of Attainment For Our Young People.

"Educate, educate, educate" is the Master's word for our young people. Educate for what? To know God and make Him known; To give the Advent Message to all the world in this generation. We have a great work; we must quickly prepare for it.

From every quarter has come a hearty response to the Resolution passed at the Sabbath School and Young People's Convention this summer, that our young people everywhere should qualify themselves to pass an examination in the cardinal truths of the Third Angel's Message, and in denominational history. These are essentials in our education for this work.

During the first week of March 1908 an examination will be given to all our young people who desire it. This examination will be conducted by the Church elder or some one appointed by him, from questions sent out by the Missionary Volunteer Department. The papers will be examined and the Certificates granted by the Missionary Volunteer secretary of each Conference. The examination in Bible doctrines will be based this year on the present series of Sabbath School Lessons,—"A Synopsis of Present Truth," the special Bible Reading Series of the Signs, commencing October 30; and "Our Truth" number of the Instructor. The first we should study; the second and third we should study and circulate.

The Great Second Advent Movement by Elder Loughborough will be the basis for the examination in denominational history.

Let all our young people get ready for this examination, and let our first report of Membership of Attainment be as nearly equal to our Society membership as possible

Every member of the board and the General Conference workers who were present spoke a few words regarding the school and the needs of the field. It was truly stirring to hear those who had been laboring in foreign fields tell their experiences and the great need of workers in general. We all felt that we surely wanted a speedy preparation for the work.

I cannot begin to tell how much I appreciate the generosity of the Young People of West Michigan in sending me here, I only hope and pray that I may meet their expectation and receive a preparation for God's work that I may be instrumental in saving souls."
