"Wherefore be not unwise, but understanding what the will of the Lord is." Eph. 5:17. Then we are to have our minds renewed by the transforming grace of Christ, "that we may prove what is that good, and acceptable and perfect will of God." Rom. 12:2. But how can we prove a thing, unless we know that thing to be true? How can we prove what God's will is, unless we know what his will is. The Lord has revealed his will to us and it is for us to understand it and know it. It is God's will that we should pray, for he says so. "Watch and pray that ye enter not into temptation:" Matt. 26:41.

God wants his people to be filled with the knowledge of his will in all wisdom and spiritual understanding. Col. 1:9. It is not only his will that we should pray, pray often, pray always, but that our prayers should not always be answered immediately. It is often his will that the answer should be delayed for days, some times for months or even years, prayed three weeks before the ans wer came. Dan. 10:2,7. Elias prayed seven times before his request was granted. IKings 18:42-45. The Lord says, when speaking of the unjust judge before whom the poor widow went to be avenged of her adversary, "And shall not God avenge his own elect, which cry day and night unto him tho he bear long with them? I tell you that he will avenge them speedily. Nevertheless when the Son of man cometh shall he find faith on the earth?" Luke 18:1-8. So according to the testimony given, it is no evidence that because the answer is delayed for a time, that the Lord does not hear, or is not willing to grant our request.

It is likewise God's will that our faith should be tried, for "it is much more precious than gold that perisheth, tho it be tried with fire. might be found unto praise, and honor, and glory at the appearing of Jesus Christ." I Peter 1:7. What trial of faith would there be if all our requests were granted at once? But if delayed for a time that our faith may be tested, we can better appreciate the answer when it comes. It is right to make requests and to press them with earnestness, holding on by faith until the answer comes, be it longer or shorter. The Lord says, "but in everything by prayer and suplication, with thanksgiving let your requests be made known unto God." Phil. 4:6.

We will now consider some of the reasons why prayers are not answered. Asking amiss,-"Ye have not, because ye ask not, ye ask and receive not, because ye ask amiss that ye may consume it upon your lusts." James 4:2,3. When a prayer is sent up to God in this way, it will never be answered. How could we expect the Lord to hear our prayers or grant our request if we ask amiss, or do not ask in faith? It would be impossible. God could not be glorified in so doing, and, besides, it would be an injury to us.

There are still other reasons why prayers are not answered. We read in Psalms 66:18, "If I regard iniquity in my heart, the Lord will not hear me." Again, "behold the Lord's hand is not shortened that it cannot save; neither is his ear heavy that it cannot hear. But your iniquities have separated between you and your God, and your sins have hid his face from you that he will not hear." Isa, 59:1,2.

To regard iniquity is to love it. Iniquity is sin, and if we love our sins, of course, we will not give them up, but will cling to them and they to us, like "the body of death." Rom. 7:24. Sin must be hated, abandoned, given up, and forsaken. When this is done we will come to God as did the poor publican in the temple, and say, "God be merciful to me a sinner," and the Lord will hear our prayer and forgive our sins. Luke 18:13.

There is still another reason why prayer is not answered. The married man is commanded to

'dwell with his wife, giving honor unto her as unto the weaker vessel, and as being heirs together of the grace of life, that our prayers be not hindered." I Peter 3:7. Let any contention come into the family between the husband and wife and it will weaken our faith, and hinder our prayers from being answered; or if one has hardness in his heart toward any living being, his prayers will be hindered. We must forgive as we hope to be forgiven, and it must be from the heart prompted by love if we expect our prayers to be heard and answered. The Lord is willing to hear prayer and to bestow upon his dear people the very choicest of heaven's blessings when they stand right with him.
