AUDITOR'S STATEMENT.

Otsego, Mich. Feb. 2, 1908. Executive Com. West Mich. Conf. Elder A. G. Haughey, Pres: This is to certify:

That I have examined the books of your treasurer for the time from December 1, 1906 to December 31, 1907, and find them neatly and correctly kept with ledger in balance. I checked as usual from bank stubs, receipt stubs and original correspondence to the office having a money consideration, and found nothing in the files not correctly entered upon the books. The cash in the office, and the deposits at the First State, Savings Bank, of Otsego and the West End Branch of City Bank, of Battle Creek, Michigan, agree exactly with the amounts called for by the books. The work appears to have been conscientiously performed.

## Conference Statistics.

During the year 1907 the West Michigan Conference has had a pay roll of sixty-seven, eight of whom were laborers outside the conference.

Those working in West Michigan held tent meetings as follows: Two at Wayland; two at Buchanan, three at Battle Creek; two at Grand Haven; two at Sullivan; one each at Quincy, Grand Ledge, Lowell, and Two Rivers—fifteen in all.

One general camp-meeting was held at Hastings in August; and a Workers' Council was held in Battle Creek in October. General meetings were conducted with fourteen churches; 3,772 public meetings were held; 272 baptisms. Four churches were organized: Grand Haven, May 18, eleven members; Buchanan, October 5, twenty one members; Union City, October 25, ten members; Albion, February 8, 1908, twenty-one members—total sixty-three.

In 1906 we had twenty church schools, with an enrollment of 400; in 1907, twenty schools, with an enrollment of 415—a gain of 15. The present enrollment at Cedar Lake is 63.

There has been no gain in the number of Sabbath-schools. Eighty-six were reported at the last session of the conference. There has been a loss in actual membership of 95, and an increase in donations to missions of \$615.33.

There were fourteen Young People's Societies reported previously, and sixteen at the present time.

Our donations to missions in 1906 were \$20,105.77; and in 1907, \$21,208.40—an increase of \$1,102.63. Our tithe in 1906 was \$35,482.67; in 1907, \$34,369.83—a decrease of \$1,122.84. Total receipts of 1906 were \$55,588.44; while the total receipts of 1907 were \$55,578.23—a decrease of \$10.21.

The total book sales of 1907 were \$6,484.24. Five students earned scholarships: three at Cedar Lake, and two at Berrien Springs.
