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## Lake Union Conference Notes.

MARCH 20, 10:30 P. M.

This being the first session of the Conference proper, the assembly engaged in a season of fervent prayer for the spirit and blessing of God to lead in the deliberations.

The list of delegates was read. Elder M. C. Kirkendall, pastor of the 46th Street church, welcomed the delegation in a few well chosen words.

Elder A. Moon responded, weaving into his remarks a short history of the work that has been done in Chicago.

The President's annual address was read, and showed a most encouraging situation.

The Chair was empowered to appoint the necessary committees. He stated that he should call the Lake Union Conference Committee and the General Conference brethren into counsel before making the appointments.

The Treasurer's report was read and copies passed to the delegation. The report was accepted by unanimous vote.

#### 2:30 P. M.

The Chair announced the various committees after which reports were called for from the departments. Committees were as follows:

Committee on Nominations: I. H. Evans, S. E. Wight, C. Mc-Reynolds, C. A. Hansen, A. R. Sandborn, S. D. Hartwell, M. C. Kirkendall, W. A. Young.

Committee on Credentials and Lincenses: Wm. Covert, W. R. Matthews, R. T. Dowsett.

Committee on Distribution of Labor: A. G. Daniells, and the presidents of the local conferences.

Elder A. G. Haughey reported for West Michigan. The statistics have already been published in the Herald. A little more than half of all the funds handled were used outside the Conference. No other reports being ready, adjournment of the conference session was taken until Sunday morning.

At 4 o'clock Elder G. A. Irwin took up the study of the book of Acts, the history of the early church. We do not study the Word as we ought or as much as we ought. This book deals largely with the lives of Peter and Paul, the two extremes. One illiterate, self-

confident, impetuous; the other a learned Pharisee.

At 7:30 p. m. Elder I. H. Evans preached, taking for his text Rev. 14:9-12, the "Third Angel's Message." Every man that takes this message in his heart will take it to others. I believe that every man who goes through to the Kingdom will be a worker in God's cause. We can not all do the same thing but we must all be workers where we are. Every individual has a duty to see that the message goes to China and to every other nation, kindred, tongue and people.

#### SABBATH, MARCH 21.

The pulpits of the several S. D. A. churches were filled by the visiting ministers. At the 46th Street church Elder A. G. Daniells gave a missionary talk to a large audience. In the afternoon all the Missionary Volunteer Societies in the city met at this church and were addressed by Prof. M. E. Kern and Elder A. G. Daniells. In the evening Elder G. A. Irwin spoke to an interested audience, giving special attention to the needs of the great continent of Africa.

# SUNDAY, MARCH 22.

At 9 a. m. the delegates assembled for devotional exercises. The order of business at 10:15 a. m. was the continuation of departmental reports. Elder E. K. Slade spoke for East Michigan, giving statistics that showed a good gain for the two years.

Elder C. A. Hansen gave a very encouraging report of the conditions in North Michigan, and appealed for additional workers for that field.

Statistics and interesting items

in Wisconsin were given by Elder C. McReynolds.

Northern Illinois, through Elder Wm. Covert, brought in a favorable report.

Elder S. E. Wight, while he had only been in the conference for about ten days, reported for Southern Illinois.

At 2:30 p. m. a report of the Indiana Conference was read by Elder W. A. Young, because of the absence of the President, Elder W. J. Stone.

Elder A. G. Daniells expressed the appreciation of the General Conference for the help of this Union Conference in raising their proportion of the \$150,000 Fund.

The Emmanuel Missionary College reported through Elder N. W. Kauble. In spite of some discouragements, on the whole there has been a very good showing the last two years.

At 4:15 p. m. the study of "Church Organization" was taken up with the plan of continuing each afternoon. Two instances were referred to where churches have separated themselves from our organization on the ground that it was a papal outgrowth. The speaker showed how Satan is using his every effort to disorganize the work of the Lord and bring in confusion, but one shall chase a thousand, and two shall put ten thousand to flight.

At 7:30 p. m. Elder N. W. Kauble took for his text II Cor. 5:7. He was more disposed to have a heart to heart talk with the listeners, than to deliver a sermon. When the body of canvassers really "walk by faith" we will see much greater results. I am not going to speak in parable. I would not say what I am going to if I had not learned for myself that these things are actually so. By walking by faith, I mean just what the Bible says, walking by an evidence that is not in sight, that we do not see. That evidence is the Word of God.

We find out that the Lord has

said certain things should be done, then we consider our own feelings and judgment and act accordingly. The Bible says that Abraham went out not knowing whither he went. When we walk by faith we will walk sometimes in paths we do not know. Elder Haskell once said "If the Lord wants me to fill a white man's grave in Africa that is the place I want to be." If we know that God wants us to go in a certain direction that is sufficient.

We have no evidence that Moses knew all the time where God would lead Israel, but he led them. The great danger with human beings is that they will think they are walking by faith when they are walking by sight. We have been told that we should study the history of Israel. Why? Because history repeats itself. I believe that today because of our lack of walking by faith, the work of God is hindered. Why was it that Israel did not go straight across to the promised land? For fear that they would return to Egypt. Every difficulty they met was because of a lack of faith.

The Lord saw that if they came in contact with the enemy they would flee. Don't you believe that if we had had enough faith in God we could have been in the kingdom tonight? I do. I believe that we should have enough faith in God to put laborers in the field when the field needs them.

If God should answer our prayers word for word and literally, we would be surprised many times. It is our privilege to believe God so fully that we will ask no questions when the Lord makes his will clear to us. Millions of the heathen are as bright people as can be found anywhere and our commission is to carry the gospel to them. Isn't it time we were walking by faith?

Did you ever go to a social meeting when you hesitated to speak because you had not lived right during the week? Yes. Then you walked to church by sight and not by faith. When we find nothing in ourselves to recommend us in the sight of Heaven, it is time for us to accept Christ and be led by him.

I have in my mind tonight a picture of the people of God when they are clothed with the Holy Spirit. But it is not until every human ambition has been taken out of the heart. The disciples were so full of ambition as to ask who would have the highest position. When they confessed their faults to one another and their sins to God, then the pentecostal shower descended upon them. never before was so hungry for the power of God as I am tonight. I pray him that our minds and our bodies may be so consecrated that he can increase our faith in such a way that it will be but a short time until we are in the kingdom of God.

## Lake Odessa School.

Last Tuesday night the meetings closed. About fifty were present. Many hearts are tender. During the fourteen meetings over four hundred people have attended. We praise God for the precious souls he has sent to hear the truths of Daniel.

Many all about us are thinking deeply. The law of God and the Sabbath cause much opposition, but we must all remember that the word of God is sharper than any two edged sword.

During the meetings a Disciple minister sent a list of questions to Brother Steele to be answered. Brother Steele consented to go and give a reason for his faith but not to argue on the Word of God. The meeting was held the evening after the Sabbath at a near neighbor's home. When we came they were all anxiously waiting. We felt that everything would work out to God's glory for we had asked him to guide in everything we did and to send His angel before us. As soon as the minister commenced talking we could see that it was only to ridicule Seventh-Day Adventists and start an argument, so never a word was said. He talked for nearly an hour trying to show that the law of God was nailed to the cross. We bore the harsh savings with patience and after distributing some tracts, Brother Steele invited them all to our meeting Tuesday night, as the Two Laws was the study for that night. After the meeting was closed, they asked me to sing. So I sang "What Says the Bible." It seemed as if an angel of God stood there by me while I sang. I felt as never before the value of souls for whom Jesus died. Oh, what a controversy between truth and error.

When people will not take a "Thus saith the Lord" then they are certainly not seeking light and argument will do no good. For some time this minister had been preaching to his congregation against what we have been studying from Daniel. He has asked for no more debates or arguments since.
