*Constitution and By-laws
of the
Seventh-day Adventist General Conference.
Constitution.*

ARTICLE I.—NAME.

This organization shall be known as the General Conference of Seventh-day Adventists.

ARTICLE II.—OBJECT.

The object of this Conference shall be to unify and extend the work of the Seventh-day Adventist denomination throughout the world.

ARTICLE III.—MEMBERSHIP.

SECTION 1. This Conference shall be composed of such local Conferences of Seventh-day Adventists as are or may be properly organized, in any part of the world, under the direction of the Executive Committee; provided such Conferences shall have been accepted by vote at a session of the General Conference.

SEC. 2. The legal voters of said Conference shall be such duly accredited delegates from the local Conferences, such members of the General Conference Executive Committee, and such other persons in the employ of the General Conference as shall receive delegates' credentials from the Executive Committee, as are present at any duly convened regular or special Conference session.

SEC. 3. Each local Conference shall be entitled to one delegate in the sessions of this Conference, without regard to numbers, and one additional delegate for every four hundred church members in the Conference. Such delegates shall be elected by the local Conference, or appointed by its Executive Committee.

ARTICLE IV.—OFFICERS.

SECTION 1. The officers of this Conference shall be a President, Recording Secretary, a Corresponding Secretary, an Educational Secretary, a Foreign Mission Secretary, a Treasurer, and an Executive Committee of nine, of which the President shall be one.

SEC. 2. The officers shall be elected at the regular sessions of the Conference, and shall hold their offices for the term of two years, or until their successors are elected and appear to enter upon their duties.

ARTICLE V.—SESSIONS.

SECTION 1. This Conference shall hold a regular session every alternate year, reckoning from 1889, at such date and place as the Executive Committee shall designate by a notice published in the *Advent Review and Sabbath Herald*, at least four weeks before the date of the session.

SEC. 2. —The Executive Committee may call extra sessions, if occasion requires, by a like notice; and the transactions of such sessions shall be equally valid with those of the regular sessions.

ARTICLE VI.—TRUSTEES, COMMITTEES, AND AGENTS.

The legal voters of this Conference shall, at each regular session, elect the Trustees of such corporate bodies as are or may be connected with this organization, according to the State laws governing such corporations; and this Conference shall employ such Committees and Agents as it may deem necessary, according to the By-laws in such cases made and provided.

ARTICLE VII.—BY-LAWS.

The legal voters of this Conference may make By-laws, and amend and repeal them, at any session thereof. The scope of such By-laws may embrace all subjects not inconsistent with this Constitution.

ARTICLE VIII.—AMENDMENTS.

This Constitution may be amended by a three-fourths' vote of the legal voters present at any session; provided that if it is proposed to amend the Constitution at a special session, notice of the proposed amendments shall be given in the call for such special session.

By-laws.

ARTICLE I.—OFFICERS, COMMITTEES, AND AGENTS, — THEIR CREATION AND DUTIES.

PRESIDENT.

SECTION 1. The President shall preside at all meetings of the Conference and of the Executive Committee, and appoint all Committees not otherwise created.

RECORDING SECRETARY.

SEC. 2. The duty of the Recording Secretary shall be to keep a record of the proceedings of all sessions of the Conference, and of the statistics of the denomination.

CORRESPONDING SECRETARY.

SEC. 3. The Corresponding Secretary shall have in charge the general correspondence of the Conference, and shall also be the Secretary of the Executive Committee.

EDUCATIONAL SECRETARY.

SEC. 4. The Educational Secretary shall have the general supervision of the educational work of the denomination. It shall be his duty to visit the different educational institutions; and he may, with the concurrence of the Executive Committee, call Teachers' Institutes, when the circumstances seem to demand. It shall be

his duty to suggest plans and devise means for the development of the educational work of the denomination. He shall also make a report to the General Conference at its sessions, of the progress of the work, and of the general standing of the educational institutions.

FOREIGN MISSION SECRETARY.

SEC. 5. It shall be the duty of the Foreign Mission Secretary to maintain a regular correspondence with superintendents of missions, and with the supervising committees of the foreign mission enterprises under the management of the Foreign Mission Board; to make regular reports of the condition and wants of the missions, to the Board, or to such standing committees as may be created for this purpose by the Board; to communicate the decisions of the Board to its agents in foreign countries; and to report to the Conference at its sessions, the workings of the Board, and the condition, progress, and wants of its foreign missions.

TREASURER.

SEC. 6. It shall be the duty of the Treasurer to receive all money belonging to the Conference, to keep an account of the same, to disburse it by order of the Executive Committee, and to make a full report thereof at all sessions of the Conference.

POWERS OF EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE.

SEC. 7. The Executive Committee shall have full administrative power during the intervals between the sessions of the Conference; it shall take the general supervision of all denominational work, and attend to the proper distribution of the laborers. It shall also give credentials to, or license, such ministers as may be employed in General Conference work; and shall fill for the current term any vacancies that may occur in the offices, boards, committees, or agents, by death, resignation, or otherwise.

COMMITTEES.

SEC. 8. The Chair shall appoint, at each regular session of the Conference, the following Committees, to serve during the session:

1. On Credentials of Delegates;
2. On Nominations;
3. On Resolutions;
4. On Ministerial Credentials and Licenses;
5. On Distribution of Labor;
6. On Education; and such other Committees as the business of the Conference may demand.

AUDITING COMMITTEE.

SEC. 9. At each regular session of the Conference the presiding officer shall appoint, unless otherwise voted, a Standing Committee of six delegates, who shall, with the Executive Committee, constitute a committee for auditing and settling all accounts against the Conference.

FOREIGN MISSION COMMITTEE.

SEC. 10. The Conference shall elect a Foreign Mission Committee of six, whose term of office shall be the same as that of the officers of the General Conference.

FOREIGN MISSION BOARD.

SEC. 11. The Executive Committee and the Foreign Mission Committee shall constitute a Foreign Mission Board of fifteen, for the management of the foreign mission work of this Conference.

BOOK COMMITTEE.

SEC. 12. The Conference shall at each regular session elect a Book Committee of thirteen, which shall each year hold at least two meetings at such times and places as will be most convenient for the majority of the members.

It shall be the duty of the Book Committee to labor for the improvement of Seventh-day Adventist denominational literature, (1) by submitting to the authors and publishers judicious criticisms on books already published; (2) by promptly examining all manuscripts submitted to them, and giving advice with reference to their publication.

ARTICLE II.—REPORTS.

SECTION 1. It shall be the duty of the Recording and Corresponding Secretaries of this Conference to furnish such reports as the Executive Committee may require.

SEC. 2. It shall be the duty of all persons employed by this Conference to furnish to the Recording Secretary quarterly and annual reports of all their work and expenditures during such time as they may have been employed.

SEC. 3. It shall be the duty of each local Conference to furnish quarterly to the Recording Secretary of this Conference such statistical reports as the Executive Committee may require.

ARTICLE III.—FUNDS.

The General Conference shall receive first-day offerings, Christmas offerings, donations, and a tenth of the tithes of local Conferences.

The Executive Committee is also authorized to call for donations from local Conferences, churches, or individuals, as the wants of the cause may in their judgment demand.

ARTICLE IV.—ELECTION OF TRUSTEES FOR CORPORATE BODIES.

The Conference shall elect at its regular sessions five Trustees for the General Conference Association of Seventh-day Adventists, a corporation of the city of Battle Creek, Mich., existing under the laws of the State of Michigan.

ARTICLE V.—GOVERNMENT.

All sessions of the Conference shall be governed by the standard parliamentary rules, except as in the By-laws otherwise provided.

BY-LAWS OF THE BOARD OF FOREIGN MISSIONS OF THE SEVENTH DAY ADVENTIST GENERAL CONFERENCE.**ARTICLE I.**

The president of the General Conference shall be chairman of the Board of Foreign Missions, and shall, after each regular election of the Board, appoint, unless otherwise provided for, such standing committees as are created by these By-laws.

ARTICLE II.

SECTION 1. The Foreign Mission Secretary shall be secretary of the Board, and his duties shall be to maintain a regular correspondence with superintendents of missions, and with the supervising committees of the foreign mission enterprises under the management of the Foreign Mission Board; to make regular reports of the condition and wants of the mission, to the Board, or to such standing committees as may be created for this purpose by the Board; to communicate the decisions of the Board to its agents in foreign countries; and to report to the Conference at its sessions, the workings of the Board, and the condition, progress, and wants of its foreign missions.

SEC. 2. The treasurer of the General Conference shall be treasurer of the Foreign Mission Board; and it shall be his duty to receive all money belonging to the Board, and to keep an account of the same, and to disburse it by order of the Board, and to make a full report thereof annually to the Board.

ARTICLE III.

SECTION 1. The Board shall meet semi-annually, at such time and place as may be decided upon by the Board, or appointed by the president.

SEC. 2. Special meetings may be called by the president and secretary when such meetings shall be considered necessary to the interest of the work in foreign fields.

SEC. 3. Seven members of the Board shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business.

ARTICLE IV.

SECTION 1. The standing committees of the Board, for the present, shall be:—

- (a.) A committee of three on Europe and Asia.
- (b.) A committee of three on Africa, South America, Mexico, and the West Indies.
- (c.) A committee of three on Oceanica.
- (d.) A committee of three on the education and qualifications of missionaries.
- (e.) A committee of three on finances. (5) See p. 68
- (f.) A committee of three on appointments and general references.

SEC. 2. The Board may appoint such other committees from time to time as the interests of its work demand.

SEC. 3. It shall be the duty of the committees on different fields to make a careful study of their fields, and to make such recommendations as may seem to them expedient for the interest of the work.

SEC. 4. It shall be the duty of the Committee on the Education and Qualification of Missionaries, to look out those who have a burden for the foreign mission work, and lay out for them a course of study, and encourage and assist them in preparation for missionary work.

SEC. 5. It shall be the duty of the Committee on Finance—

(a.) To devise plans for the raising of funds, and to labor for the execution of the same when approved by the Board.

(b.) To ascertain the state of the treasury at least twice a year, and to report the same to the Board; and to present once a year an estimate of the funds necessary to carry on the work for the succeeding twelve months.

(c.) To consider all applications for expenditure of means outside of the regular appropriations, and to make recommendations relative to the same.

SEC. 6. The Committee on Appointments and General Reference shall nominate persons for appointment by the Board, and take into consideration such miscellaneous matters as do not belong to other standing or special committees.

ARTICLE V.

The Board may appoint advisory committees in different mission fields to take an oversight of the local work, when they consider it to be for the interest of such fields.

ARTICLE VI.

No missionary shall be sent abroad until he has first passed a careful examination by the Committee on Education, as to his educational and spiritual qualifications; also by a competent physician, as to his physical ability for such a work.

Your committee on foreign missions, find—

- That in New Zealand, an efficient preacher is needed, in addition to the laborers already in that field.
- That two additional laborers are greatly needed in Australia.
- That an able and experienced editor is needed in London, and six more Bible workers, and two preachers, for the work in Great Britain.
- That in Germany there is a call for two more preachers; and in Hamburg, four experienced Bible workers; and a ship mission, where who can speak German, Danish, and English.
- That an able corps of canvassers should be sent to France and Italy, as soon as suitable books and tracts are prepared for use in Catholic countries.
- That there is great necessity for books in the French, Italian-Spanish, Portuguese, Bohemian, and German languages, especially edited for use in Catholic countries, aiming to dispel the darkness of superstition, and to reveal the beauties of God's word; and that special attention should be given to the preparation of works for South America.
- That more preachers are needed in Sweden, and experienced workers to connect with the publishing house in Christiania.
- That a Dutch minister is needed in South Africa, also a company of trained health missionaries.
- That South America offers many promising fields for canvassers who can speak two or more of the following languages; namely, French, Spanish, German, Italian, and English.
- That the West Indies is a promising field for a minister, a Bible worker, and one or two canvassers.
- Your Committee finds itself quite unable to secure laborers for the greater number and the most important of these positions, without taking men from their places whose loss would seem to be an irreparable injury to the work in which they are now engaged. We therefore recommend: —

1. That greater efforts be put forth for the education and training of laborers for foreign missions: (a.) By encouraging suitable persons to attend the German, French, and Scandinavian branches of the Ministers' Bible School, in Battle Creek; (b.) By the holding of three or four months' Institutes, for the instruction of large classes of Bible workers and colporters, in such places as London, Hamburg, Basel, Christiania, Stockholm, Copenhagen, Cape Town, Melbourne, and other central points.

2. That the Mission Board be instructed to select at as early a date as possible, suitable persons for the places needing laborers, and to send them into the work as rapidly as the amount of funds in the treasury will warrant.

3. That an able corps of translators and book editors be employed to labor under the direction of the Book Committee, to prepare as soon as consistent with good work, an ample supply of books, pamphlets, and tracts, for use in the Catholic countries above mentioned.

To the Board of Foreign Missions:-

First, that the
matter of selecting
a crew be left to
the committee
having charge of
the construction
of the ship.

We, your com-
mittee appointed to present plans with reference
to work on the Missionary Ship, would re-
spectfully submit the following:-

Second, That two ministers, with their wives,
and Brother J. I. Tay, constitute the missionary
force. That one of the ministers shall be a man
of mature judgment and good executive ability,
who shall have charge of the missionary enter-
prise, as superintendent. The other minister
may be a man of less experience, but of strong
constitution, enthusiastic, energetic, and determined.
That Brother Tay shall act as carpenter and sail
maker, having an oversight of keeping in repair
the ship, etc., but to be free from all official
duties when engaged in missionary work.

Third, That the ship sail direct to Pitcairn
where the younger minister and his wife may
be left, while the ship with the superintendent
and other workers from the Island, proceed to
Nor Fork Island, to ascertain what labor is
needed there, and to undertake whatever work
may be required.

After returning to Pitcairn, the mission-
aries will have gained an experience that will
enable them to plan much better than we can do
from our quiet homes thousands of miles away.
A council for future plans should be held
with the superintendent as chairman who should
always be recognized as the presiding officer in
all councils relating to missionary work.

Fourth, The missionary council
should be free to act outside of the general
instructions given them before leaving, and
which will be more definite than can be
embodied in a general plan like this.

(a) A good library of histories, books of travels, lives of missionaries, etc.

(b) With a well-chosen stock of dry-goods, suitable for trade among the Scandinavians.

(c) With a large and carefully selected stock of our religious books in English, German, Dutch, and French, with a few in the Scandinavian languages. Also a good supply of whatever we may have in the Spanish and Portuguese; as well as a large and well-chosen stock of our periodicals in the various languages for free distribution.

Sixth, We suggest that the Superintendent of the missionary forces, the captain of the ship, and Brother J. S. Day constitute a committee for the decision of such matters relative to the course of the ship and its work to be done as this Board may decide to leave to their discretion.

Seventh, We would recommend that the superintendent should assign every member of the force regular lines of study; and that, as far as reasonable, the time of the missions during the passage be diligently employed in fitting themselves for the work in which they are to engage.

On the recommendation that the chairman of this Board shall appoint two others to act with himself in selecting workers to go with the "Pitcairn" on her first trip.

Elder McCay thought that a larger force of workers should go out with the ship. Capt. Aldridge thought that helpers could be found in Pitcairn and Australia.

It was voted, That a copy of the Committee report be furnished to each member, and action on it was deferred until the next meeting.

Advisory Committees in Mission Fields.

1. Whenever the Foreign Mission Board deems it advantageous to its work in any mission field, they may appoint an Advisory Committee, of not less than three, nor more than seven members, of which the superintendent of the mission shall be one, to take a general oversight of the work in that mission.

2. The superintendent of the mission shall be chairman of the committee. A majority of the committee shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business.

3. The committee shall choose of its members, or otherwise, a treasurer, a recording secretary, one or more corresponding secretaries, and as many field secretaries for the superintendence of special lines of work, as the growth of the mission demands. All appointments of the committee shall be subject to the approval of the Board of Foreign Missions.

4. It shall be the duty of each Advisory committee,—(a) To carefully study the field under its care; (b.) To counsel together relative to the best way of advancing the work of the mission; (c) To collect, and submit to the Board, information relative to the necessities of the mission, the efficiency of the several workers employed in it, and the character and number of additional laborers needed; (d) To assist the superintendent in the economical and efficient management of the mission; and to encourage the spirit of liberality and self support.

5. For the consideration of these matters, the

except where large expense would be incurred,
or important work interrupted.

6. At each regular meeting of the
Advisory Committee, the following subjects
should be considered:—
 - (a.) The progress of the works of the
Traveling Preachers, reported by the superintendent
 - (b.) The condition of the Treasury and
the state of the canvassing work, reported by
the Treasurer.

- (c) The condition of the churches; the
Sabbath-schools, and the local tract societies,
reported by the corresponding secretaries.
- (d) Following each report, the subject
introduced should be discussed; and
before the close of the session, plans should be
laid for the advancement of the work in all
its branches.

7. At the first meeting after the close
of the fiscal year of the General Conference, the
committee shall audit the accounts of all persons
employed in, and having claims against the
mission, and then forward them to the General
Conference Auditing Committee, for final
settlement. At the same meeting, the committee
shall prepare a careful estimate of the funds
necessary for the support of the mission for the
 ensuing year, and of the amount of tithes and
contributions that can be expected from that field.

8. The treasurer shall have the custody
of all the property belonging to the General Con-
ference, and of all funds furnished by it for
use in the mission; and he shall disburse the
same, as the Board of Foreign Missions may
direct. He shall also receive all tithes and con-
tributions from those in the field, and pay out
the same on the order of the Advisory Committee.

They shall submit to the Foreign Mission Board recommendations of those they deem fit to receive ministerial license or credentials, with a statement of their qualifications and Christian experience.

"Whereas, Means expended in these directions in the past have brought most gratifying results; and,—

"Whereas, At the present time but limited provision is made among us for the assistance and education of such persons; therefore,—

"Resolved, That our people raise a liberal fund for this purpose, and that a committee of five be appointed annually by the General Conference Committee to take charge of the raising and disbursement of the same."

Mr. C. White presented some interesting statements with reference to the amount that have been appropriated for the different foreign missions and the amounts that have actually been used in the different fields, showing that some had overdrawn their appropriations and that some had not received their full amount. He also stated that he was called upon to make reports to secretaries of other foreign mission boards, of the amount of money which our Board expended annually in the various foreign fields in which we operate, and that he would like some advice with reference to the basis upon which such reports should be made.

It was voted, That we recommend that reports of the expenditures of means for our foreign mission work be based upon the appropriations made by this Board.

It was also voted, That we recommend the Board to make an extra appropriation of \$2,692.89 for the Central European Mission, and \$1,697.33 for the Scandinavian Mission, to cover the over drafts which they have made beyond their appropriations.

Voted, That W. C. White examine and check all bills against the Foreign Mission Board till the next General Conference.

To the General Conference of Seventh-day Adventists Assembled in Business Session, greeting.

We, the members of the Seventh-day Adventist church of Pitcairn Island, in the South Pacific Ocean, having been regularly organized by ministers holding credentials from your body, do hereby petition to be taken under the watch care of the Seventh-day Adventist General Conference.

The number of persons on the island is one hundred and twenty-seven, including the little children, and eighty-two of these are members of the church, having been baptized according to the gospel commission. We have thoroughly studied the doctrines of the Seventh-day Adventist church, and are fully in harmony with them as far as we understand them now.

Owing to the fact that we seldom have money, and find it difficult to dispose of our products, we are not able to send tithes to you often; but we are in harmony with the tithing system, and will carry it out as far as we are able, and will also make such other donations as we are able, to assist in carrying out the work of the third angel's message. Please to accept of our regards and our love to all the brethren in the Lord.

THE SUPERVISION OF MISSIONS BY LOCAL COMMITTEES.

At the July meeting of the Board of Foreign Missions, the following plans were adopted relative to the appointment and work of Advisory Committees in mission fields:—

1. Whenever the Foreign Mission Board deems it advantageous to its work in any mission field, they may appoint an Advisory Committee, of not less than three, nor more than seven members, of which the superintendent of the mission shall be one, to take a general oversight of the work in that mission.
2. The superintendent of the mission shall be chairman of the Committee. A majority of the Committee shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business.
3. The Committee shall choose of its members, or otherwise, a Treasurer, a Recording Secretary, one or more Corresponding Secretaries, and as many Field Secretaries for the superintendence of special lines of work, as the growth of the mission demands. All appointments of the committees shall be subject to the approval of the Board of Foreign Missions.
4. It shall be the duty of each Advisory Committee, (a) to carefully study the field under its care; (b) to counsel together relative to the best way of advancing the work of the mission; (c) to collect, and submit to the Board, information relative to the necessities of the mission, the efficiency of the several workers employed in it, and the character and number of additional laborers needed; (d) to assist the superintendent in the economical and efficient management of the mission, and to encourage the spirit of liberality and self-support.
5. For the consideration of these matters, the committee should meet as often as once a quarter, except where large expense would be incurred, or important work interrupted.

6. At each regular meeting of the Advisory Committee, the following subjects should be considered:—

- (a) The progress of the work of the traveling preachers, reported by the superintendent.
- (b) The condition of the treasury, and the state of the canvassing work, reported by the treasurer.
- (c) The condition of the churches, the Sabbath-schools, and the local tract societies, reported by the corresponding secretaries.

(d) Following each report, the subject introduced should be discussed; and before the close of the session, plans should be laid for the advancement of the work in all its branches.

7. At the first meeting, after the close of the fiscal year of the General Conference, the Committee shall audit the accounts of all persons employed in and having claim against the mission, and then forward them to the General Conference Auditing Committee for final settlement. At the same meeting the Committee shall prepare a careful estimate of the funds necessary for the support of the mission for the ensuing year, and of the amount of tithes and contributions that can be expected from that field.

8. The Treasurer shall have the custody of all property belonging to the General Conference, and of all funds furnished by it for use in the mission; and he shall disburse the same as the Board of Foreign Missions may direct. He shall also receive all tithes and contributions from those in the field, and pay out the same on the order of the Advisory Committee.

9. The Recording Secretary shall keep a record of the proceedings of all meetings of the Committee, and at the close of each session shall transmit a copy of the minutes of the same to the Board of Foreign Missions.

10. The Corresponding Secretaries in each mission field shall conduct such correspondence with the churches, Sabbath-schools, and local tract societies, as may be directed by the Committee.

11. The committee shall have no authority to purchase or lease real estate, nor to involve the board in any financial enterprise except by vote of the board.

12. The committee may grant colporter's license, subject to the approval of the General Conference. They shall submit to the Foreign Mission Board recommendations of those they deem fit to receive ministerial license or credentials, with a statement of their qualifications and Christian experience. All decisions relative to giving ministerial license, granting credentials, and ordaining ministers, shall be made by the General Conference.

These committees have heretofore been appointed by the Executive Committee of the General Conference, at the close of each annual session. Hereafter the board of Foreign Missions will appoint these local committees annually, at its winter session.

MISSIONARIES ADVISED NOT TO TRADE.

Whereas, We believe that our missionary workers can accomplish more good and exert a more wholesome influence by giving their undivided attention to their legitimate work; and,—

Whereas, The uniting of secular business with missionary work is always detrimental to the latter; therefore,—

Resolved, That we urge upon all who work under the direction of this Board to give their time and attention wholly to the missionary work to the exclusion of all secular business.

Resolved, That we express to the managers of our foreign missions, our hearty disapproval of their entering into any outside enterprise, large or small, general or private, without first consulting with the Foreign Mission Board.

A NEGLECTED FIELD.

Whereas, We find in South America a large and promising field in which to sow the seeds of truth; and,—

Whereas, This field has never been entered by our missionaries; therefore,—

We recommend, That the General Conference Committee lay plans for entering that field at an early day; and that mission work in that country be made as nearly self-sustaining as possible. To this end we would recommend that young men and women who have good trades or professions be selected, and encouraged to prepare themselves for that field; also that business men of some capital be selected, and encouraged to go there and establish themselves in business, and form an acquaintance and standing with the people, and a nucleus, or center, from which missionary work can be done.

The following was adopted regarding ship missions and clubs of periodicals for free distribution:—

Whereas, The International Tract Society is not able to continue to supply publications for the ship work in all our missions as heretofore; therefore,—

Resolved, That wherever we have missions established, we will take complete charge of the ship work now being prosecuted, and that we will furnish the necessary publications as far as we are able.

Action of Genl. Conference.

THE RECEIPTS AND EXPENDITURES OF THE BOARD.

Our total receipts for the year ending June 30, 1890, were \$48,589.93. This was \$6,810.94 less than our receipts for the preceding year, and \$11,832.69 less than our expenditures for the same period.

The Board has been greatly embarrassed in its work by scarcity of means, and some important fields which should have been entered during 1890 are left without laborers because we did not deem it advisable to further increase our debts.

Some effort has been made to inform our churches as to the condition of the treasury and the necessities of missions, and to arouse a spirit of sacrifice and liberality in their behalf. The response has been very encouraging. It is our opinion that wherever our ministers have felt a zeal in behalf of the missions, and have presented their claims clearly, and in faith, that the contributions have largely increased. And right here we wish to express the opinion that the future of our foreign missions will be affected more by the earnestness of our ministers in presenting their claims to the churches, than by any other human agency.

If the receipts for the first two quarters of 1891 should be about the same as for the last two quarters of 1890, exclusive of the Christmas offerings, our income for the present fiscal year would be about \$60,000. This amount is far below what is required for our work, and we ask the Conference to give this matter due consideration.

Committee on Finances presented reports as follows:—

To the General Conference Assembled.

BRETHREN: Your Committee on Finances has taken a general survey of the field as far as time and the facilities for obtaining information have permitted. We are happy to be able to say to this Conference, that the financial credit of our institutions is good; and though we have had several enterprises outside of the regular line of our work during the past year, that have called for a considerable outlay of funds, we have, so far, been able to meet all these obligations, and pay our laborers who are in the field, support our foreign work, etc., etc. This is due to the fact that our people throughout the country have shown a liberal spirit in making donations and free-will offerings for the support of the Lord's work.

The continual increase in our work will require an increase in the funds to carry it forward; and while God has blessed the liberal spirit shown by our people in the past, in sacrificing for the advancement of his cause, the needs of the work in the future will call for a continuation of the same spirit of liberality, and we have confidence that they will continue to support the work.

The openings now before us for the work to be done and the demand for institutions to prepare laborers for the great harvest field, are such as will require a larger outlay of funds, in the aggregate, the coming year, than the past.

The report of the treasurer has been read and published. We will only call attention to a few items which it contains, in order to compare them with the same items thus far the present year.

As given, the items for the year ending June 30, 1890, include the amount received for the preceding twelve months; the other column shows the receipts on the same items for the eight months from July 1, 1890, to March 1, 1891.

The total receipts from all sources for the year ending June 30, 1890, was \$76,356.07; for the eight months ending March 1, 1891, it was \$112,516.47.

A comparison of the above-mentioned items, which include the principal sources of our income,—the total receipts of twelve months with eight months,—shows our finances to be in an encouraging condition, which we attribute to the loyalty and devotion of our people to the work which God has given us to do.

Your committee can think of no plans for the raising of funds, which would be better than those already employed. We would recommend that the first-day offerings be continued, and that special efforts be made to secure the more general adoption of the plan by our people. This can be done by continuing to set the matter before them through our periodicals, and by the individual efforts of Conference and tract society officers, ministers, and local elders. We would also recommend a continuation of the Sabbath-school and week of prayer offerings.

A reasonable estimate of funds needed for the support of foreign missions, for the coming year, places the sum at \$80,000. This is considerably more than has been spent on foreign missions in any past year; but it is based on the fact that openings exist for work in countries which have not yet been entered. South America and West Central Africa present the most favorable fields at the present time for an extension of our foreign mission work. To open up a work in these countries will require a considerable outlay of funds. There was also a deficit on last year's account of \$12,000, which must be made up.

We call attention also to the wants of our home institutions. The construction of Union College at Lincoln, Nebraska, which was begun about one year ago, has progressed steadily since that time. The General Conference has advanced \$11,000 on this enterprise. \$22,352.32 has been received from Conferences, and \$12,285.65 cash has been realized on real estate. This, together with some loans which have been negotiated, has served to keep the work going until the present time. But there will have to be a further large outlay of funds before the school can be opened next September. Strong efforts should be made to encourage the States to raise the sums for which they have become responsible, and also to secure assistance from other sources.

The College which you have just voted to build at Walla Walla, Wash., will also require a considerable outlay of funds for the next two years. Both these institutions are needed to educate workers, and should be sustained by our people.

The financial reports of missions and publishing houses in foreign countries are published in the Year Book. Brother A. R. Henry will explain any items in these reports that may not be clear to all.

The Committee on Distribution of Labor recommended, —

That Elder N. S. Porter go to South Africa, and take the superintendency of the South African Mission.

From the report of the Finance Committee the following is taken: —

Whereas, We believe the plan for increasing the first-day offerings reported by the Committee on Finances last year, is a good one, and should be carried out; therefore, —

5. We recommend the appointment of a committee to carry into effect resolution 1, found on page 48 of the Year Book for 1890, which reads as follows: —

"Resolved, That for the purpose of bringing this matter to the attention of all our people each first day of the week the coming year, and thus leading them to form the habit of systematic giving, a series of fifty-two brief Scripture readings, interspersed with items of interest relating to our foreign missions, be prepared by a committee of five, who shall be appointed by the Chair; and that a small pamphlet containing these readings be furnished free to all families who adopt the plan of first-day offerings, with suggestions that these readings be made the topic at the hour of family devotion on each first-day morning."

6. We recommend, That the Mission Board publish a summary statement quarterly of its receipts and expenditures, and the standing of its funds, also once a year a statement of its appropriations and an apportionment by Conferences, of the amount which accord-

ing to its judgment each Conference should be expected to raise, to make up the amount necessary to carry forward the work of the missions for the year.

The Committee on Foreign Missions presented a report as follows: —

To the General Conference: —

Your Committee on Foreign Missions, find that the field is great, and the laborers are few. Laborers are greatly needed in many places. But as the selection and sending out of missionaries, has been committed to the Board of Foreign Missions, we have made no recommendations, regarding this part of the work.

We find that the receipts of the Mission Board for the year ending June 30, 1890, were nearly \$12,000 less than the expenditures of the Board for the same period; and that the appropriations of the current year are \$68,800 thus calling for the raising of about \$80,000 during the current year.

In view of this, we submit the following resolutions: —

1. Resolved, That we heartily second the plans of the Board of

Foreign Missions to advance our foreign work, and especially their action in appropriating \$68,800 for carrying forward our various missionary enterprises the current year, and hereby pledge our best efforts to arouse everywhere a missionary spirit, and encourage liberal donations through the adopted methods.

Whereas, The weekly offerings for foreign missions are but a small fraction of what they might and should be; and, —

Whereas, This deficiency is not so much due to a lack of willingness to give as to forgetfulness; therefore,

2. Resolved, That the librarians in all our churches be requested to keep a list of those having bibles, and in case they do not report, solicit them in person or by letter to remit their weekly offerings.

3. Resolved, That we urge our church officers to do their utmost to induce all our members to adopt the plan of making weekly offerings for missions.

3. Whereas, In the life of Christ is blended every principle of the true missionary, and the greater portion of his life was spent in manual labor; and, —

Whereas, There are many openings both in home and foreign fields, where certain kinds of business might be successfully carried forward, while exerting an influence in behalf of true Christianity; therefore, —

Resolved, That we recommend devoted, successful business men to seriously consider the propriety of moving to such fields at their own expense, thus forming a nucleus for missionary work.

4. Whereas, The providence of God has opened broad fields for labor in all parts of the world; and, —

Whereas, There are many books and periodicals which present much valuable missionary reading matter."

Resolved, That we recommend to all a prayerful and systematic study of missionary literature, thus becoming acquainted with the opening providences of the Lord, and gaining a preparation for active service in his vineyard.

5. Resolved, That we approve of the organization of Mission Schools in our schools and other institutions, and of other plans adapted to impart instruction in this branch of the work; and that we recommend the better improvement of these opportunities and privileges.

They are mostly Wesleyans. Among them there are many local preachers, who labor without remuneration. Some of these have joined our churches, and could be used to advance our work.

The country to the north has been opened up quite rapidly of late. The railroad is in operation 200 miles north of Kimberly, and opens up a great agricultural district. It is being settled up, and other churches are sending in their missionaries. We ought to send in workers also.

It seems to me that we ought to be doing something for the Haffirs and Qulus also. Sister Lange, of Kimberly has been a Haffir translator for many years.

The Committee on Africa, South America, and the West Indies made the following report, which was adopted after calling in Brother Frank Hutchings and his wife, and interviewing them regarding their plans and their willingness to labor in the Bay Islands and Central America:—

To the Foreign Missions Board:-

Your Committee on Africa, South Amer. Amer. and America, Central America, and the West Indies, held a meeting April 2d at the office of the Secretary of the Board, and voted resolut as follows:—

We gave careful thought to the recent work of Elder D. A. Ball in the West Indies. We found by examining his letters that he held 5-7 meetings on the Island of Barbadoes, sold over \$100 worth of books, left nearly \$3 keeping the Sabbath, and others who are thoughtful cases. Among these were three teachers, four preachers, one doctor, one tailor, and several merchants.

From these he made a short visit to the island of St. Vincent, where he found one very hopeful case and others who are somewhat interested. The next visited Antigua. The first in St. Vincent Sabbath he was there, he held a Sabbath meeting, and there were ten Sabbath-keepers present, some of whom commenced that day to observe the Sabbath for the first time.

He visited Mr. J. Ackerman at English Harbor, on this island, a gentleman with whom we have had an extended and interesting correspondence. He is a native of Switzerland and speaks three languages, and during Elder Ball's stay with him decided to obey the truth.

From there he went to St. Kitts, where he visited Chas. J. Adams, a young & a church and local preacher who is in a position on this island of Nevis in order that he might keep the Sabbath. He is a very promising young man, and one whom Brother Ball thinks ought to be encouraged to fit himself for a laborer in that field. His advice is that we encourage him to canvas, and arrange his territory so he can be in company with Brother Ball and attend his meetings and learn more about the truth and how to present it. This, Mr. Adams is willing to do. He writes that he left six

Sabbath-keepers on the island of St. Kitts.

From there he went to St. Croix, or Santa Cruz as it is sometimes called, from St. Croix where his last letter was written, dated March 1st Santa Cruz 29. He finds some hopeful cases there.

Having thus visited a number of islands where there are interested ones, he expresses it as his opinion that he should return to Antigua, and hold a series of meetings at St. John's, Antigua where he has an offer of the free use of a room that will hold about 200 persons. This offer is extended to him by the father of a young lady who has commenced to keep the Sabbath. This gentleman is an influential man, and both he and his wife are deeply interested in the truth.

Your Committee are agreed in advising that he should follow this plan, and concentrate his efforts for a few weeks at St. John's, with the view of raising up a strong company preparatory to the organization of a church.
Advice of Committee to Eld. Ball. As Brother Ball becomes better acquainted with this field, he finds that the plain advice we gave him a few weeks ago was very timely, and that the plans we mapped out for him for visiting these principal islands and becoming acquainted with the interested ones, were wise plans. He seems to be of good courage, and thinks the prospect is good for an excellent work in that field.

Your Committee also considered the Central Amer. Central American and Bay Island field, and Bay Is. to which plans had recently been made to send help should Elder J. Q. Corliss. We find this to be an important field and one which should receive help as soon as consistent. There are about 25-Sabbath-keepers on the island of Ruatan, and as many more at different points in Central America. Your Committee is of the opinion that some young man and his wife who have a good knowledge of the truth, and who are also

capable of giving instruction in the principles of health and hygiene should be selected from this field, and should be sent there to commence with the work and grow up with it.

He would suggest for the favorable consideration of the Board the names of Dr. Hatchins & wife, who, in the mind of the wife suggested Committee, would be desirable persons for Bay Is., & that field, provided they could be secured now, and given a few months for special preparation, so as to go there this fall and begin their work in cool weather.

Your Committee invited Brother P. M. B. Messels to spend some time with us in the consideration of the work in South Africa. He made some suggestions with reference to certain books and tracts which, in his judgment, should be prepared in the Holland suggestion inland. The Secretary of the Board has a reference to memorandum of this list. He also considered with him the question of the property owned in Capetown, and can report progress in the matter of securing a better understanding with Brother Messels in regard to what would be the most advisable course to pursue with this property. This matter was left open for further thought and consideration at a future meeting; hence we are not prepared to submit any definite recommendation in regard to it.

That a book on Health topics, composed principally of selections from the "Household Monitor" and "Sunbeams of Health & Temperance" be prepared and translated into the Spanish language; that it be used as a leader in the Spanish countries, the price to be about \$1.50 Also, that "Prophecies of Jesus" be translated or written in the English and then prepared for and translated into the Spanish.

9. That in view of the difficulties experienced by the London Pacific Press in the publication

of Books, in which part of the printing is done there, and part in America, we advise that preparations be made to do all the work in London as far as possible.

10. That the South African canvassers continue to push the sale of health works till "Patriarchs and Prophets" can be prepared and furnished them in both English and Dutch; and that this be followed with "Bible-readings," according to Brother Morrison's original plan.

11. That D. M. Morrison go again to South Africa as soon as possible, to remain from four to six months, as the circumstances may require.

The motion, That we request L. C. Chadwick to visit if possible, the West Indies, Central America, and South America during the coming fall and winter, in the interests of all branches of our foreign work, was discussed and referred to the committee on Africa, South America, and W. Indies.

Comm. on Oceanica, The Committee on Oceanica presented recommendations which were adopted as follows:

1. That we encourage Elder E. H. Gates to labor in Australasia till after the Australian Conference in November, for the purpose of aiding in the general work in those countries, and to recruit a force of missionaries to labor in the Polynesian Islands.

2. That we advise Elder Gates to select and locate from three to six competent missionaries at the most favorable points on the islands needing missionaries, providing that they can be maintained at from \$200 to \$400 a year. If the cost is larger, let the number selected at first be few.

3. That the Pitcairn make trips as often as once a year to all the islands where we may have missionaries located.

4. That we favor the location of teachers at Pitcairn, to aid in the management of

their school, and to conduct for one or two years, a training school for native missionaries. 5. That the necessity for a printing outfit, a windmill, a sugar-mill, iron piping &c for Pitcairn, be presented to our brethren, and when sufficient funds are contributed for the purpose of these articles, that they be purchased and sent by freight to Tahiti.

6. That Elders Gates and Read be a committee for the selection and preparation of reading matter to be translated into the Polynesian languages.

It was also voted,

1. That we request the Review and Herald to grant us the use of the room now temporarily occupied by the Secretary.

2. That Warren Howell be employed as stenographer, and we recommend that he be paid \$8 per week.

Meeting held Aug 11, 1891

The Board of Foreign Missions met in the office of the Secretary at 3 PM, Aug. 11. All of the members were present except Underwood, Smith, Miller, and Prescott.

Prayer by S. N. Haskell

At the request of the Secretary, the reading of the minutes was waived. The Chairman at the request of the Board gave a brief account of his recent visit to our European Missions.

Eld. Olsen's
report.

In London he found the meetings in progress and well attended. In the Canvassers Convention many resolutions were up for discussion, but after Bro. Morrison arrived, and presented the fundamental principles of the canvassing business, the resolutions were dropped. Some of the agents argued that to succeed they must

conform to many national customs. Some had fallen into the habit of drawing upon the sympathy of the people to secure patronage.

Bro. Morrison proved well that the presentation of work upon its merits was the most successful plan of work; and the record of Bro. Stroupe who although an American with no experience in England has led the whole list of canvassers has proved a refutation of the former argument.

The most urgent demand of our work in Great Britain is for books to supply the canvassers in Great Britain and the colonies.

The Advisory Committee of the British Mission estimate the number of subscription books required to be manufactured and shipped by the London branch of the Pacific Press during the next nine months, to be as follows:-

Total	£ 14,781 - 5 - 0 or \$71,984.68

C. Eldridge suggested that the money invested in books could be turned over once in six months, and that a capital of \$35.00 would therefore be required.

At the close of the London meeting Francis Hape went to Hull, and two Bible workers were to go to Bath.

W^m Hutchinson who has been laboring in Ireland has been in very poor health, and the brethren in Council in London advised him to return to America. In his recent letters he reports better health, and asks to be allowed to remain in Ireland. A petition has been received from thirty two of our

brother in Bandridge and vicinity, asking that he should remain in that field. In Denmark Father Oscar spent but one week.

The matter of special interest there is the great need of a meeting hall in Copenhagen.

At the meeting in Norway the Scandinavian brok business was prominently considered. The agents had then rapidly falling into bad habits. They were selling books on the installment plan, and were drawing on the sympathies of the people to secure custom.

But after Bro. Morrison presented the correct principles of the business, they all agreed to abandon the installment plan.

W.H. Stevenson was appointed General Agent for Norway and Denmark, and W. Sandberg, who has charge of the depository in Stockholm, was appointed General Agent for Sweden until an experienced agent from this country can be sent over to take charge of the work in the field.

A general agent should be sent to Sweden in time to conduct a canvass in connection in October.

In Finland there are thousands who speak and read the Swedish language, and it was decided to send canvassers into Finland with our Swedish publications as soon as a leader can be supplied from America.

A very important feature of our work in Scandinavia is the demand for church schools. The laws and customs of these countries are favorable to their establishment. In Scandinavia it is customary for the school teacher to be a religious teacher, and to exert an active influence in religious matters.

We must train young men and women to teach church schools and at the same time to labor in the interests of the

Sabbath School, the Tract Society, and the Church; then the conference can afford to help bear their expenses.

During the past year there have been four in Stockholm and twenty in Copenhagen fitting themselves to be teachers. The expenses of these students in Copenhagen, exclusive of clothing and books, is about \$2.00 a week for each. We are loaning money to most of these students from funds raised for this purpose.

The year just closed has been a prosperous one for the Scandinavian Pub. Association. It has ~~been~~ had a good run of job work. In former years such laborers as Brethren Peterson and County, and Sister Mary Hillesen have been paid from the mission funds. This year they were paid by the publishing association, and with this additional expense, it reports a loss of only \$440.

In Germany there are 168 Sabbath Keepers and these have paid a tithe of over \$700. during the last year.

In Hamburg a larger house is needed for the mission school and the book depository. Letters will be presented describing places that can be secured.

The Mission School in Hamburg will begin this year in January, and in February a French mission school will be opened in Chaux-de-Fonds. After its close, a ship mission will be established in Marseilles.

Another point to be considered concerning the work in Scandinavia is a proposition to erect on the vacant lot near the printing office, two buildings, which can be rented for residences at a considerable profit.

The Secy read the following communication from R. C. Porter and wife, which was referred to the Committee on

Africa and South America :-

To the Foreign Mission Board

Dear Brethren : You will remember that at the last General Conference wife and I were recommended to make South Africa our field of labour. You will also remember that at the last General Conference we did not feel free in the matter on account of our frail constitutions.

Since then we have laid our plans in harmony with the recommendation of the Committee, and have packed our trunks, and are thus far on the road, yet we have had no clear convictions that the Lord was leading in that direction.

The climate in a larger portion of South Africa is such as demands a rugged constitution, in order to labor as we have to do ~~at~~ in our work. Neither of us are very strong. My wife has been troubled more or less with weak lungs since a child. Of late, by careful attention, they have become quite strong; yet on account of the weakness of her lungs in her younger days, her chest capacity is small, and her constitution is consequently weak. Her parents have not been reconciled to her going, feeling confident that she could not stand the climate there.

Taking these things all into consideration, we have not felt clear that our duty lay in that direction. We are willing to go if we can have clear convictions that God calls us to that field.

Hence we ask the Committee to look around and see if some one can be found who will feel free to go. If such an one can be found, who can go soon, we shall feel that it would be better so. If not, we shall feel that God calls us to that field, and shall be ready to go at once. We leave

this as a test of God's leading in the matter, and either way He may direct us humbly say, "Thy will be done."

The resolution at a recent meeting of the Board requesting C.C. Chadwick to visit if possible the West Indies, Central America, S. America, and other fields in the interests of all branches of our foreign work, was referred to this Com. for consideration.

We recommend:

1. We believe a trip to Central America, W. Indies, S. America, S. Africa, West Coast, and England, by some member of the Board in the interests of our general work with a view to assisting all lines of work, and particularly to establish the canvassing work in new fields, would be a very profitable trip.

3. In order for him to make this trip it would be necessary to select someone to take the position of General Canvassing Agent, also a competent person to take his place on the Publication Committee of the G. C. A. and someone to take the work of overseeing the work of the International Tract Society during his absence, and to edit the Stone Missionary.

In view of these facts, we recommend that persons be selected to carry forward the lines of work above referred to, and that Bro. Chadwick be requested to visit these fields as soon as reasonable.

Curdy and arrange for him to go with the brethren mentioned above if satisfactory arrangements can be made.

Present, members of the Board, and Bro. Breed, Wessels and Henry. Prayer by Prof. Miller. Minutes read and approved.

Bro. Wessels, by invitation, introduced the matter of the South African work, stating his feelings with reference to royalties on books, the necessity of caution in establishing a school in Africa, and asking about the relation the cause there sustained to the General Conference as regards tithe etc. He also, asked the Board to take pains to interest itself in the welfare of students there from Africa, in training for future work, and wished to know about the possibilities of putting money into the cause as loans for security.

Bro. Olsen in behalf of the Board gave assurance of the interest which was felt, in the South African Mission, outlined the general relation of the Mission fields to the Gen. Conf., and stated that the custom here was for the state Conferences to pay a tenth of their tithe to the Gen. Conf. Fund. As regards royalties, it was stated that the authors of our denominational works, being sold in foreign fields, had agreed to turn all royalties on such sales into the educational fund for developing

foreign work. The Foreign Mission Board had cautioned careful consideration in the matter of building and Conf. organization. While the Gen. Conf. could not hire money or accept loans to pay out for missionary work, yet there were opportunities where loans at a low rate made it possible to save to the cause by taking up notes given at a higher rate, and also sometimes to release other moneys that might be used in the work.

A letter from a returned Indian Missionary was by vote referred to the Secretary to correspond with the writer, and with the advise of the publication Com. of the Gen. Conf. to select some tract for a trial translation, if deemed advisable.

The Com. on Europe recommended further on matters in its hands as follows:—
