# FIRST MEETING GENERAL CONFERENCE COMMITTEE.

#### WINTER SESSION 1895.

Friday, 2:30 P.M., January 25, 1895.

Present: Elders Olsen, Loughborough, Breed, Prescott, Van Horn, and Durland.

The meeting was opened by prayer, in which all the committeemen present at beginning of the meeting, engaged.

The minutes of an informal meeting, October 21, 1894, at which Elders Olsen, Prescott, Van Horn, and Durland were present, were read by the Secretary, and, by motion of Elder Loughborough, were approved.

Elder Olsen made brief remarks covering following points:—

1. Institute Program.——Opening meeting, Friday, February 1,
10:00 A.M., at Tabernacle. Daily devotional exercises, 9:30—
10:00 A.M.; Bible study, 10:00—10: 55 A.M., Ender J.H.

Durland, instructor; subject, The Epistle to the Colossians;
11:05—12:00 M., Health study, Dr.J.H.Kellogg; Presidents'

Council, 3:00 ——4:30 P.M., at Review and Herald chapel;

Bible study, 7:00 —— 9:00 P.M., two lessons, with ten minutes intervening, conducted by Elders W.W.Prescott and A.T.Jones;
the arrangement for evening meetings to be varied from time to time, as occasion may require.

2. Importance of the Council and General Conference. --Our work is making rapid growth. During 1893 and 1894 our
Foreign Mission Board has sent out over sixty adults each
year. Difficult for General Conference to deal with details.
These must receive their due attention in our councils; but
the General Conference must deal with underlying principles,
taking special oversight of our boards, etc.

- 3. Special Work of our Council. --- Important that each General Conference District be studied carefully, with a view of providing for its needs. Inquire concerning: --
  - a. Present condition of each District.
  - b. What changes are necessary.
  - their relations to one another, and to the general
  - d. The men employed; who are suitable for work in foreign fields?
- Appointment of Auditing Committee. --- Great responsibility attached to work of auditing accounts of our workers.

  The distribution of between eighty and ninety thousand dollars is involved in the decisions of this committee. Many times in the past this work has been considerably rushed, has been left to few men, and they have wested while exceedingly weary. To avoid this situation, the committee has been already selected, and Wednesday, 3:00 P.M., January 30, has been appointed for the first meeting of the next session.

The Chairman spoke of the necessity of making necessary arrangements for a committee to take the oversight of the daily devotional exercises, of arrangements for stenographic help during the Institute and Conference, etc.

It was suggested that meetings of the Committee be held at 11:00 --12:30 each day, and by motion of Prof. Prescott, the meeting adjourned to 11:00 A.M., Sunday, January 27.

question of our denominational educational work in its more advanced phases, with a view of special consideration at the coming session of the General Conference.

The Chairman appointed Elders Durland and Robinson.

#### THIRD MEETING GENERAL CONFERENCE COMMITTEE.

Present: Elders Olsen, Loughborough, Van Horm, Prescott, Breed, Durland, and Robinson.

Prayer by Elder J.H.Durland.

The DENOMINATIONAL PUBLISHING WORK was the principal question considered at this meeting.

The following preamble and resolutions passed at the last General Conference, were considered:---

"Whereas, Our periodicals, both in our own and the foreign languages, are strictly denominational in character; are built up, and supported by the denomination, therefore, --

Resolved. That it is the sense of this body that our denominational periodicals should be owned and controlled by the General Conference.

Resolved, That we authorize the General Conference Association to negotiate with the Seventh-day Adventist Publishing Association and the Pacific Press Publishing Co. in regard to the purchase, on a proper, equitable basis, of such periodicals as are now published by them!

It was shown that the publishing work of the denomination was steadily drifting toward the General Conference.

The balance sheets of the General Conference publishing work
the past year show the transaction of quite a large amount
of business, with a respectable profit.

The matter of transfer of the denominational church paper, the REVIEW AND HERALD, to the General Conference, received attention, and it was,---

Moved by Prof. Prescott, and seconded by Elder Loughberough, That it is the opinion of the General Conference Committee that the REVIEW AND HERALD, based on the subscrip- 252 tion list of January 1, 1895, should be purchased by the General Conference, and that the price to be paid should be merely nominal.

Carried.

## THE SIGNS OF THE TIMES.

The Chairman explained that a demand for a low priced missionary paper had arisen, and that the proper way to meet the demand was to issue a first-class paper in large quantities, about 100,000 copies per issue, at perhaps \$1.00 per year single subscription; in clubs of 100 to 500, sixty cents per copy; 500 to 1000, about forty cents per copy, etc. It was shown that our missionary paper should not be a semicharch paper, and that it should be carefully edited, avoiding caustic criticisms, sharp turns in reviews, etc., etc.; but the rather devoting the space of the paper to the proclamation of the gospel as it is in Christ. The tract societies could then handle it much better, and it could be largely circulated by different methods, and by sale of single copies.

The SIGNS OF THE TIMES was represented as the only paper issued by the denomination, that could likely be devoted strictly to missionary purposes, and circulated in the manner above described. It was expressed as desirable that no encouragement be given to the idea of a boom, but that the undertaking should in all respects be placed upon a permanent basis.

Attention was called to the fact that Bro. C.H.Jones was in favor of the proposed changes in the SIGNS extending to General Conference ownership and management of the paper.

It was---

That the matter of the change of the SIGNS OF THE TIMES, and its transference to the General Conference, be further considered at a meeting with the representatives of the Pacific Press and such others as should be present with them, and afterward the question be presented to the Council for consideration.

On motion the meeting adjourned to 11:00 A.M., Monday, January 28.

### FOURTH MEETING GENERAL CONFERENCE COMMITTEE.

Present: Elders Olsen, Loughborough, Van Horn, Prescott,

Prayer by Elder Robinson.

The minutes of the previous meeting were read and approve By request of the Chairman, Elder Van Horn made a report of the work in General Conference Dist. No. 1. The report was given orally. Among the points of interest are the following:---

The spiritual condition of the churches greatly improved.

In MAINE outlook especially encouraging. The Conference just emerging from a heavy debt. Steady advancement in the MARITIME PROVINCES. Excellent work at St. John, New Brunswick

New church building erected at Fitch Bay, QUEBEC, with basement suitable for school purposes. Enrollment of eighteen students at opening of school, with present enrollment nearly thirty. Elder Goodrich desires release from presidency of Conference. No special reason making it necessary.

VERMONT Conference increasing in membership. Special assistance lately given churches. President of Conference well received, but climate in winter not agreeable to his health. Desirable that change of field be made for laborers longest in the Conference.

NEW ENGLAND Conference growing in membership. Much work done for churches. Attention of President given nearly wholly to improvements in Academy buildings, capacity of which will be increased to about 250 pupils. Owing to careful management, improvements will cost less than estimated.

In NEW YORK special attention given to building of meetige houses, the ministers rendering assistance as far as possible. Financial interests of the work carefully managed.

The PENNSYLVANIA Conference denominated a working Conference. More canvassers than any Conference in the District.

Influence of apostasy and wrong course of certain leading man discouraging in its effect. Church in Philadelphia needs assistance.

ATLANTIC Conference. Union prevails. Perhaps financial prosperity more marked than spiritual. Marked changes in plans of organization of work. Danger of complications. Perhaps some changes in management of work desirable. Very important field.

VIRGINIA Conference. Spiritual condition not so good as in most Conferences of District. Left with President to both plan and execute; does not have financial support of those able to assist him. Perhaps better personally for the President to have management of larger Conference.

WEST VIRGINIA. Some financial embarrassment. Some ministers not working in best manner. School meeting fair success, but loss by deaths of late rather discouraging. Tendency to allow President to manage affairs almost exclusively

At conclusion of Elder Van Horn's report, Elder Olsen called attention to certain underlying principles developed. He spoke of the importance of unity in our work, and of the efforts of our pioneers to foster this principle. Nothing so subversive to unity of entire work as "one man rule." To meet the danger, a change of laborers frequently necessary. Sister White has had a great deal of anxiety on this point. The idea of one-man mold must be discouraged everywhere. When a man holding a leading position gets his grip on the work under his charge, the danger point is reached it is then also that the work wears the heaviest upon the Petitions for certain men to continue in certain fields may generally be regarded with suspicion. The teaching of the Testimonies in regard to unity, and the means for acquiring and preserving it, are very explicit. There is a tendency to centralization. There must be diversity in This is an interesting and profitable question to union. study. In this connection the study of the organization of Societies is important. Why was the office of the Tract directors provided for? Was not one very important object of the organization to bring a large number of people into the work, and properly apportion their responsibilities?

The Chairman asked two question, which he deemed worthy of special consideration: ---

- 1. What position should be taken toward the organization of the Tract Society and its work?
- 2. What attitude should be assumed toward ministers from other denominations, who unite with us, and desire to continue ministerial work?

On motion of Elder Durland, it was moved --That Elder H.P.Holser be invited to attend the meetings of the Committee. Carried.

Prayer by Elder Breed.

Minutes of previous meeting read and accepted.

Elders Loughborough and Durland made outline reports on con-v dition and needs of their respective Districts.

DISTRICT NO. 3.

GENERAL. - Composed of Conferences of Michigan, Ohio, Indiana and Illinois; has 14,000,000 inhabitants, and but 11,000 Sabbath keepers, organized into 290 churches.

MICHIGAN. - Oldest Conference; leading institutions; Battle Creek situated differently than any other church in Conference, somewhat like District of Columbia to United States; if separated from Conference, should be on ground of separation of the tithe; Mission work succeeding quite well in Detroit. The work in Ontario under charge of Michigan Conference, and is succeeding quite well, especially in the canvassing department. Fifteen thousand dollars worth of books sold in Ontario last year, while in Michigan only two thousand sold. Quite good success among churches, and also in most of work done in new fields. Perhaps some changes might be made, but nothing different advised.

ohio.- Work very prosperous; State campmeeting this year started ahead of last year. More tracts distributed in six months than in four years; school at Mt. Vernon very prosperous, and while financial difficulties have arisen, discouragement has not resulted.

The school far more benefit to Conference than the Sanitarium.

Work in Cleveland growing rapidly. Canvassing work making fair progress, and the Sabbath-school interests making special advancements Perfect harmony existing in the Conference. Satisfied with their officers.

INDIANA. - Eld. Starr recently called to another field, necessitating arrangements for new President of the Conference. Eld. J. W. Watt, of Montana, appointed to act in Eld. Starr's place, and appointment has given excellent satisfaction. The cause coming up. Finance, greatly improved; debt on mission buildings being raised. Annual offerings greatly increased by faithful work of the ministers during the week of prayer. Bible work progressing. Church at Indianapolis lately received several additions. Courage of the brethren and sisters good.

ILLINOIS. Difficulty in President of Conference acting as Superintendent of the District. Need a President who will give his time
to work in the State. One third numerical strength of the State in
Chicago, where are found four churches, two English, one Danish,
and one Swedish. Eight different Sabbath-schools in the city.

Minister to labor in the English much needed to locate in Chicago
to devote his whole attention to the work. On the whole, very
encouraging progress being made in Chicago. Over twenty-five
brought in during last three months. Branch Sanitarium at College Place doing a wonderful work among a superior class of people,
far more benefit to the work than the mission formerly conducted
at same place. Work of missionary nurses sent out by Dr. Kellogg
last summer attended with excellent results.

The tithe considerable lower this year than last. Many from whom quite a respectable amount of tithe received in past, have

been thrown out of employment, hence decrease accounted for. Too many laborers for present amount of funds. Elders Decker, Curtis, Scoles, and Merrill, mentioned in the remarks. Sussess of each fair. Bro. and Sister Merrill suitable for other fields, are well adapted to church or new field work. Bro. Scoles and wife, and Bro. Brand and wife might be spared to other fields, especially if Chicago should be supplied with a minister. Bro. Scoles needs the aid of a level-headed assistant; defective in that he does not visit while laboring, etc.

### DISTRICT NO. 4.

GENERAL. - Comprises Conferences of Iowa, Nebraska, South Dakota, Minnesota and Wisconsin, also mission field of Manitoba. Conferences in pretty good condition.

IOWA. Good success in new fields; laborers mostly young men; a help to the State at least in that the development of new laborers has been stimulated. Financial condition of the Conference never so good as at present; tithe increased last year \$2,000, due mostly to working up the matter, and not to increase of income of members. No special changes recommended, unless Eld. Henderson could be b better situated in relation to his family, which still resides in Indiana. Seven new meeting houses greated past year. It was developed that Iowa stood in the lead in this regard.

NEBRASKA.-Churches in better condition than for several years; ministers not so strong as in some States, need help in church work. Excellent church building erected in College View and at just the right time. Eld. Nettleton desires to be changes to South Dakota, which is favored by Dakota. Greatest financial (lepression in history of State, but greatest spiritual interest. Great demand for

labor in some parts, but could not be bestowed. (It was suggested that the General Conference ought to assist in such cases) Eld. Hoopes might be spared to labor in important lines of work in other fields.

BOUTH DAKOTA.- In most perplexing situation. Hot winds repeatedly destroyed crops. Some of best churches in State broken up on account of removals. Tithe decreased in a single year from \$2,737, to \$953. In need of more American laborers.

MINNESOTA. - Effected same as Nebraska and Dakota. Slight increase of tithe. Addition of Eld. Victor Thompson to laboring force of Conference, much appreciated by Minnesota brethren. Probably well for Eld. E. A. Curtis to be changed to another field of labor. Ministry on whole rather weak perhaps. President of Conference seems to be doing well. Experience of Eld. F. S. Shrock touched upon. No special advice in case given.

WISCONSIN. - Eld. Underwood appointed President, but resigned on account of sickness; Eld. H. R. Johnson succeeded him, but his management not successful. Eld. O. A. Johnson, President; runs nearly everything into school channels, and principal management of affairs in hands of the President, which is unfavorable to success. Perhaps a change of most of the ministers advisable, but the Pfesident should not be changed.

MANITOBA. Fifty or sisty Sabbath-keepers already in the field. The two laborers sent there last summer, viz., Elds. Falconer, of Michigan, and Foster, of Kansas, are meeting with success. The German work quite important.

Considerable discussion was had over the German work in

general and Eld. H. Shultz's relation to it. Perhaps a change of manager needed. Present Superintendent poor manager of men.

Attention called to recommendation of Eld. Conradi that it might not be best to put the whole work in charge of a single person, but divide the responsibility of the oversight as convenient for the different fields.

It was urged that a better understanding be had in regard to the limits of the authority of those placed in charge of the work based on language characteristics.

On motion meeting adjourned to Wednesday, 11 A.M.

Reading of minutes of previous meeting mamma was waived.

Elder Bredd occupied most of the time of the meeting in giving an oral report of the work in Dist. No. 5. He considered the Conferences of the District separately, beginning with---

ARKANSAS. The President of the Conference doing well. The tithe about \$100.00 less in 1894 than in year before. Times harder this year than last. Elder Martin, an efficient minister, has removed to College Place, Wash. A demand for an efficient minister from one of our most progressive Conferences. The State Agent needs assistance not to be obtained in his own Conference.

MISSOURI. Work making progress. About 300 members added to Conference last year. Excellent work in progress in St. Louis, under labors of Elder A.P.Heacock, lately from Alabama. Twelve recently united with church at St. Louis, and more union prevailing than formerly. A good work accomplished at St. Joseph and Kansas City. Four new church buildings erected. Much fruit as a result of liberal distribution of reading-matter. Good feeling throughout Conference. Some embarrassment, however, on account of unpaid pledges to Union College. This matter probably delayed on account of uncertain doubtful mode of presentation to the Conference On

the start. Not impossible to pay the debt, as sister Conferences have done.

KANSAS. About 900 members added during the year, 700 of whom have embraced the Sabbath, and twenty-one churches have been organized; however, on account of disbanding of five churches, and many removals on account of the severe drouth, the membership and tithe have not correspondingly Five new church buildings have been erected. increased. A very good work has been done in Topeka, Wichita, Winfield, and Kansas City, Kan. The mold of the work in the Conference should be improved. On account of the poor health of the President, a change in the head of the Conference might seem It would be well if new workers could enter the justifiable. Conference from our most progressive Conferences.

OKLAHOMA. Conference organized last autumn, with sixteen churches, and five hundred members. There are now seventeen churches, and one hundred and fifty Sabbath-keepers are not members of the churches. Four meeting-houses have been built. The work at Oklahoma City very encouraging. President of the Conference is well received. Oklahoma is the basis of a strong Conference.

COLORADO. Important improvements lately made in the Conference. Elder Kauble, the new President, succeeding well. About three hundred added to the Conference from new fields. Have no State Agent; canvassing work low. Tithe considerably uincreased, yet financial matters have not greatly improved. Quite a debt at opening of Conference year, already canceled.

TEXAS. No material additions to the membership of the Conference. Perhaps the leading element in many of the churches removed to Keene, where the school is located. The President feels inadequate to the task of managing the Conference. Crops good last year, but on account of circumstances attending relations to school enterprise, no material increase in the tithe. Practically a new force of laborers needed, including a man to act as President of the Conference. They also need a good Bible worker, capable of training others for such work. The Texas school is growing in influence; will have a large patronage not only from the State of Texas, but from Oklahoma, Arkansas, etc. Especially will this be true if the General Conference assists in the establishment of the school, as would seem proper for it to do.

After Elder Breed had closed his remarks, Elder Olsen called attention---

- 1. To the large number of States practically in need of new Presidents.
- 2. To the remarkable success resulting from change of laborers lately made (in the District.)
- 3. To the necessity of taking such action as would result in lowering the price of our books, for the benefit of the canvassing work. He gave no encouragement to the idea that efforts in behalf of the sale of books by the denomination should in any way subside, or that they should be discontinued, but the rather encouraged in every proper manner.
- 4. To the importance of preventing, as far as possible, a contraction of our work, decreasing appropriations, etc., for the extension of of the work. Attention was called, however, to the necessity of endeavoring by every possible means to stop all leaks on account of poor management.

Present: Elders Olsen, Loughborough, Van Horn, Breed, Prescott, Durland, Robinson, and Morrison, and H.P.Holser by invitation.

Prayer by Prof. Prescott.

Minutes previous meeting read and approved.

Elder Morrison gave an outline of the work in Dist. No.6.

GENERAL. The District embraces one-fourth of territory of United States, but population little more than State of Massachusetts. Has three Conferences, California, Upper Columbia, North Pacific; and two mission fields, Montana and Utah. Has a publishing house, two colleges, and a sanitarium. Largely a mining country; sparsely inhabited as compared with extent. Traveling expensive. Country greatly affected by boom influences during good times, and correspondingly embarrassed during late financial depression.

CALIFORNIA CONFERENCE. Comprises California, Arizona, and Nevada. Membership one half that of District. Seventeen ministers; five licentiates; and fifteen Bible workers.

Membership 3192, with gain of 692 last two years. Tithe about \$1000.00 decrease past year; offerings to foreign missions decreased about one-half; but certain mitigating circumstances should be taken into account when considering results. California liberal to foreign mission work in the past. Probably Conference financial interests not guarded as much as would have been proper. PACIFIC PRESS has prospered the past year, perhaps more than for any previous year.

THE HEALTH RETREAT making steady progress; substantial and appropriate buildings erected; more desired by managers, but perhaps no further improvements necessary at present.

HEALDSBURG COLLEGE seems to be prosperous, and an excellent feeling among the people. CANVASSING WORK best in District.

NORTH PACIFIC. Only two ministers actively engaged, on account of Elders Graham and Fulton being called to other fields, and poor health of those remaining. Churches, 41; membership (about) 1400; increase past two years, 250. Tithes and foreign mission offerings greatly decreased. Elder Healey the new Conference President, has labored with great energy, and is well received by the people.

UPPER COLUMBIA. Membership, 1091; ministers, tight; licentiates, seven; canvassers, one; churches, twenty-two; increase in membership last two years, 529; tithes considerably decreased, but not so much as in other Conferences of the District. School prospering nicely. There are thirty students more in attendance this year than at same time last year.

MONTANA. Need of careful organization and instruction.

People nearly all miners by occupation. The minister having work in charge well received, and seems to be doing good work.

UTAH. Place of all places where "saints" are sinners, and sinners "saints;" where Jews are "Gentiles," and Gentitles "Jews." The Mormons have control of everything.

Difficult to get place for meetings. The laborers are Elders Willoughby, and Gardner, of Iowa, and two excellent Bible workers from California. There have been quite a number of additions of late, made to the churches in Ogden and

Salt Lake City . The prospects at present seem reasonably favorable. It requires faithful labor in that field to accomplish results. Public labor is not the most successful, but the house-to-house work seems to be accomplishing the The mormons are well posted in their belief; they are ever ready for debate. The only way to reach them is through a door with which they are not acquainted; and that is by means of the power of the truth of God. It is impossible to accomplish anything through controversy. Facts show that the backbone of Mormonism is practically broken. Mormons are becoming divided on political questions. The immigration to Utah is not so large as formerly. Their numbers are not rapidly increasing.

Elder Morrison gave many interesting incidents connected with his experience in that field the past summer. He spoke encouragingly of the power of the truth of God to reach the people.

After the conclusion of his remarks, Elder Olsen asked:

- 1. How shall arrangements be made for the distribution of labor, and supplying the needs of the different fields?
- 2. As to the questions that should come before the Council, their presentation, etc.

It was ma---

Moved, by Elder Durland, and seconded by Elder Morrison, That the Chairman appoint two committees:

- 1. To study the different fields as to calls for laborers.
- 2. To study the laborers, and their qualifications for filling the positions required in the different fields.

The Chairman appointed the following-named persons to serve on these committees:--

- 1. Elders Prescott, Robinson, and Van Horn.
- 2. Elders Breed, Morrison, and Loughborough.

OUR DENOMINATIONAL BOOK WORK. It was the opinion 1. of those present that there was a demand for lower priced books, a variety of sized books, etc; That the time had not come for the discontinuance to any degree of the regular canvassing work, and that it was important that such ideas should be discouraged wherever met. In the discussion, important considerations were developed with reference to the relation of our publishing houses to each other, to the respective fields they should control, their employment of branch houses, etc. It was considered that the maintenance by our publishing offices of branch houses in the legitimate fields of one another, was an improper thing, always increasing the cost of books. It was the opinion of the committeemen that careful and judicious efforts should be made to remove this and all other hindrances standing in the way of a free ad

and unobstructed sale of our literature. The General Conference, being the parent of all institutions and departments of the work, can, with propriety, exercise itself in assisting to correct abuses of whatever nature that may make their appearance.

It was urged that the members of the General Conference Committee should at this time take a special interest in the canvassing work, and show by their attendance at the meetings of the Canvassers! Institute that they are ready to continue their hearty moral support to this department of the work.

2. OUR DENOMINATIONAL HEALTH WORK. Health principles and health institutions. Proper attitude of leading brethren to both principles and institutions. Need for a patriotism among our leaders and prople in general that will give health principles and institutions a better moral support. Marked increase in number of physicians and institutions the Encouraging considerations as to the spirit of the new physicians entering the work; several under appointment to foreign mission fields. The Chaistian physiaicn's capacity for usefulness in foreign mission fields, greatly in advance of the ordinary minister. "Your committee appointed to consider the interests of the educational work, would submit the following report:--
"After reading at some length the instruction which has been given at various times by the Spirit of Prophecy, during the past three years, upon the subject of education, we recommend:---

- 1. That a more decided effort be made to conduct the work in all our educational institutions with special reference to the work of the denomination, giving the first place to those lines of study which are most directly helpful in developing workers of the highest type, for carrying forward the gospel work committed to this people, making such changes in the present teaching force and courses of study as will bring them into harmony with this suggestion; and that opportunities for manual labor, both as a means of support and of education, be provided for the students as far and as fast as it is practicable.
- 2. That arrangements be made with the Texas Conference to take charge of the school recently established in that State; that a board of managers be elected by the General Conference; that sufficient means be invested to put the school upon a good, strong basis; that such a course of study be introduced as will be in the fullest harmony with the instruction given, and the principles laid down, in the Spirit of Prophecy upon the subject of education; and that the plan of manual labor for students be further developed and carried out.

- 3. That a monthly educational journal (ten numbers per year) be published, as a means of bringing before the schools and the denominational generally, the best plans for educational work, of suggesting to parents definite plans of home education for their children, and of presenting and supervising a regular course of study and reading for the ministers of the denomination.
- 4. That the General Conference Committee consider the propriety of holding a general Teachers! Institute, or Summer Normal School, for the instruction and training og all the teachers of the denomination, in the best methods of carrying out these plans, and for the purpose of developing and arranging the details of courses of study, etc.

Not considered best to locate a school in Lon-

don; but circumstances often favorable for purchasing land in the country on reasonable terms. The principle of resolution 2 favorable for establishing successful school work in England, and considered by him favorable for application in America.

Quite careful consideration was given to each recommendation of the report, after which the motion made at beginning of the meeting was put and---

- 2. That probably Elder Jones could better decide what he would need in the way of an assistant, after his arrival in Europe.
- 3. That it might not be best at this time for Prof.

  Moench to make the trip the to Germany.
- 4. That it would probably be possible for the Committee to arrange for Elder L.R.Conradi to act as translator and assistant for Elder Jones during his contemplated trip.

It was moved that, in view of the above named considerations, the Committee considers it not advisable for Prof.

Moench to accompany Elder Jones in his trip in Germany.

Carried.

- 2. As to opening the Academy: The matter was no t elemented to the brethren in Tennessee, and he and Prof. Prescott did not care to take sole responsibility of opening it, so it was left closed, and will remain so for the remainder of the year.
- 3. As to future of the Academy: Both felt that it was not advisable for the General Conference to take the school off Elder Colcord's hands, although he was anxious for such step to be taken.
- 4. Advised that the financial responsibility and management of the Academy be left where to is, but that the General Conference assist when necessary in furnishing teachers.

Moved by Elder Durland, and se conded by Rider Morrison, that the report of the brethren be accepted, and the suggestions made be adopted as the sense of the Committee. Carried

By request, A.R. Henry made report with reference to the recent visit of himself and Prof. Prescott to the Industrial Sfhell school at Keene, Texas. Favorable impression made. Soil of school land excellent, and easily cultivated, and, all

Thrift and enterprise have so far marked the undertaking.

Prof. Hughes giving good satisfaction, but has too much to do. He and his wife well adapted to the positions they fill.

Excellent order in the Home. The pffer of the General Conference Association has been accepted, it being understood that the streets of Keene were to be duly arranged, and to be fifty feet in width around the campus, fifty feet in width running out from center of campus, and forty feet running out from corners of same, etc. No action taken.

Moved, by Prof. Prescott, and seconfied by Elder Morrison, That, if Bro. Grand Adkins remain in Dist. No. 2 to labor, and if it be thought advisable that he should be ordained, the Committee hereby expresses its approval of such action. Carried.

With reference to ordination of Bro.W.N.Hyatt, of Nebr., recommended at late session of General Conference to labor in Zexas, it was suggested that Elder Durland consult with Elder W. B. White and such members of the Nebraska Conference as convenience would permit, and if thought advisable Bro. Hyatt be ordained before going to Texas.

Prof. Prescott reported particulars of a late visit with Prof. Taggart, of Harriman, Tenn. The school he is conducting has about 250 or 300 students, and doing about same class of general work as done at Battle Creek College?

importance. Our work is extending in all directions. Our laborers are increasing rapidly in number. At the last audit of the Committee over two hundred personal accounts were considered, and perhaps \$100,000.00 were paid out in compensation of labor. Perhaps an additional one hundred laborers will be added during the present biennial term. The development of laborers is becoming a very important consideration. Laborers are needed both for the home and foreign work; and in the consideration of this question, it is well to keep before the people the relation that the medical and educational

departments sustain to our other denominational work. The people should be made familiar with the movements of our missionaries. They ought to be well instructed in regard to plans for extending our work.

Educate from the beginning of the meeting to large views concerning our missionary operations, with the endsavor to have the people appreciate their responsibilities with reference to supporting the work. All our members, ministers, workers, etc., are pledged to the idea of carrying the third angel's message to the ends of the earth. The ideas of the people must not be permitted to become narrowed down to their own local interests, etc., etc.,

"Seek God, believe in him who has infinite resources. If we move wisely, putting our ability into the work, the good hand of God will be upon us. We must push forward the work, not waiting to see the funds in the treasury before we undertake it. God forbid that when his providence summons us to enter the fields white already to hartest, our steps should be retarded by the cry, 'Our treasury is exhausted. We have no means to sustain the workers that are already in the field, and it is impossible for us to enlarge our operations.' "

Carried.

Inasmuch as Brother M.W.Lewis had been recommended to labor in the South, under the direction of the District Superintendent in General Conference territory, it was---

Voted, That he receive Ministerial License from the General Conference.

It was A communication was presented from Elder J.R.Palmer, of Montana, in which the request was made that Brother C.T.Shaffer, of Montana, whould receive Ministerial License from the General Conference.

This led to inquiry from some of the members present, in regard to the relation of the Montana Mission, with its various organizations, to the General Conference. The Chair stated priefly that

the organizations of the Montana Mission field were, as in some of the other mission fields, prematurely made, and were really not legal nor consistent with our present system of organization. He explained that the organization of societies, or associations, election of officers, etc., implied self-government, but such provileges were inconsistent while fields were under the direction and support of the General Conference. He stated that the relations of the mission fields to the General Conference were similar to the relation of territorial to general governments. To illustrate the position further, reference was made to situations of companies of Sabbath-keepers prior to church organization. Before organization they are considered under the care of the Conference, which care is usually represented by the minister or ministers bringing them into the faith. If the minister is to be absent during any of their meetings, it is his duty to appoint some one to take charge of the work in his absence. They cannot legally elect their leader nor any temporary officer, for the right of self-government had not been granted by the Conference to which they belong, and their experience would not warrant any such effort on their part. If the company is taught these prinsiples, a better foundation for work is laid.

As with Churches, so with Conferences: Too great haste in their organization must be avoided. It would be well for the Superintendents of the General Conference Districts to give much attention to the missions in their Conferences, even more attention than to the regular organized Conferences.

Moved by Elder Durland, and seconded by Elder Porter, That the Corresponding Secretary of the General Conference sorrespond with the Superintendent of District No. 6, with reference to granting Ministerial License to Brother C.T.Shaffer, of Montana. Carried.

Brief verbal report was given by the Committee of General Conference Bible Schools. It was ---

Moved by Elder Porter, and seconded by Elder Irwin, That Elder O.A.Olsen be added to this Committee, and that authority be given it to complete the arrangements and take such action as might seem necessary. Carried.

Elder Durland made brief report of arrangements for course of instruction for the General Conference Bible Schools, as follows:---

"This course covers a period of three years of five months each. The studies are arranged in four principal groups according to the following outline. Every student who aims to secure a certificate showing that he has completed the course, is expected to take the Biblical, the Language, and one of the Elective courses. A written examination will be required at least once a month.

- lines of Bible study, viz., the book and the topical. Under the book study the following books will be studied on the exegetical plan: The Gospels, Isaiah, 1st and 2nd Peter, 1st John, Acts, Romans, 1st and 2nd Corinthians, Galatians, and Psalms. Under the topical study will be considered the lines of Prophecies of Daniel, Revelation, and Ezekiel, God's Government, Inspiration, Justification, Sanctification, Regeneration, Christian Growth, The Holy Spirit, Life in Christ, Punishment of Sin, Church Organization, and Church Fellowship, Giftes of the Holy Spirit, Scripture Canon, Everlasting Gospel, etc.
- 2. Language CCourse. Thes Course takes up the principles of the English Language with a view of aiding the student in the correct use of the same in reading, speaking, and writing. The work will be grated so as to meet the needs of both common school and advanced grammar work. German and Scandinavian language classes will be formed, if there are twenty or more desiring to take these studies.
- with this course instruction will be given in the management of the voice in public speaking, hymn reading, and vocal music. Directions will be given in regard to the care of the vocal organs so as to avoid the hoarseness and sore throat, so prevalent among public speakers and singers. All who take this course and who do not pay tuition for the full course will be required to pay \$1.50 per month for this instruction.
- 4. Elective Courses. --- The Courses embrace History, Physical Education, Church Work, Missionary Work, both Home and Foreign, Sabbath-school Work, Ministerial Work, and Canvassers' Work. The instruction in these courses will be given in the form of evening lectures during the school year. Students will be expected to make their choice of these courses at the beginning of the school year, so that arrangements can be made to accommodate all as far as it is possible to do so.

Course in Bible, Language, and one of the Elective Courses, a certificate to that effect will be issued by the Executive Committee of the General Conference. Those who expect to receive this certificate must enter at the beginning of each school year, pass the required examinations, and have an average standing of eighty-five percent."

Various topics were then considered: ----

1. Condition of the Tract Societies: In the course of Elder Olsen's remarks upon the matter, he stated that many of the societies had become business societies instead of missionary

Large amount of business, and with precision and dispatch, yet their prevailing effort and influence should be in the line of the best and most aggressive missionary work, diffusing everywhere among its members true missionary zeal, and leading and directing the way in the adoption of principles and methods assuring success in missionary effort.

- 2. The educational function of the International Tract Society, ety. -- In addition to the other important duties of this Society, mainly in the line of distributing literature, it would seem important that it should exercise the educational function especially in instructing and developing secretaries and Bible workers. It was suggested that the members of the Committee should constantly be on the lookout for persons adapted to the work as missionary secretaries, etc., giving persons thus found encouragement when practical and consistent to take instruction from the International Traft Society.
- 3. Raising of fund for endowed bed for general Conference mission fields in District No. 2. Suggested, That no action be taken at present.
- 4. Selection of additional secretary for the Tract Society office at Chattannoga. No secretary being available, no action was taken.
