J L McElhany in the chair. Prayer by Dr. H.W. Miller. Minutes of the previous meeting approved.

VOTED, That we suggest to Brother C.H.Dougherty that we would deem it fair for him to bear the round trip travel expense of hiss Hiday to and from the Philippines, the General Conference being willing to meet the outfitting allowance and her salary during the time of her connection with the work there.

J.D.LORENZ--SALARY CONTINUED:

VOTED, That the treasurer be authorized to continue furlough salary to John D.Lorenz, returned from Inter-America, for another three months.

LAKE GROVE INDIAN MISSION--HOSPITAL:

Letter was read from M.B. Van Kirk, of the Southwestern Union, seeking authorization to let the contract for the building of the hospital-dispensary at the Lake Grove Indian Mission, for which provision has been made through the Extension Fund.

VOTED, That we authorize the Southwestern Union to proceed with the erection of the hospital-dispensary at the Lake Grove Indian Mission.

ALBERT MUNSON-EXTENSION OF FURLOUGH:

VOTED, That in view of health conditions in his family, we extend the furlough of Albert Munson, formerly of the Celebes, for six months, advising him during that time to give very special attention to securing the necessary medical care for his family.

B.M. HEALD--SALARY CONTINUED:

VOTED, That furlough salary to B.E. Heald, returned from Africa, be continued to cover July, August and September.

ANNA D. PAULSON-SOUTHERN CALIFORNIA JR. COLLEGE:

VOTED, To pass on to the Broadview College Board the call from the Pacific Union for Kiss Anna Paulson to connect with the Southern California Junior College as school nurse; but with the counsel from this Committee that Hiss Paulson consider very carefully with the College Board before deciding in favor of this move.

COLORED SCHOOL:

Letter was read from Dr. Cherry and Brother Rowe, of Pittsburgh, describing a property not far from Philadelphia which might possibly be secured for the proposed school for colored youth in the North, and it was VOTED, That J.L.McElhany, C.W.Irwin, W.E. Howell and F.H.Robbins be asked to go to Pennsylvania at once to investigate the proposition.

J.L. McELHANY--OREGON CONFERENCE SESSION:

VOTED, That in case his condition of health justifies his making the trip, J.L. HeElhany respond to the request from the North Pacific Union to attend the Oregon Conference session at Portland.

S.A. WELLMAN AND MISS GINTHER-WEST MICHIGAN:

VOTED, That S.A. Wellman and Miss Rosamond Ginther respond to the invitation from the Lake Union to assist in a Sabbath School rally in the West Michigan Conference, August 28 and 29.

A.W.SPALDING-SUMMER CAMPS:

VOTED, That A.W. Spalding attend the summer camp which is to be held for the juniors of Georgia and Alabama, July 17 to August 3, and the one to be held in the Potomac Conference, August 13 to 31.

C.S.LONGACRE--PHILADELPHIA:

VOTED, That C.S.Longacre respond to the request from the churches in Philadelphia for help in connection with the Sunday law issue in that city.

FAR EASTERN DIVISION -- MEDICAL POLICY:

A revised medical policy which had been worked out by the Far Eastern Division for that field, was presented by Dr. Miller. After thorough discussion, and unanimous agreement to a change in the third recommendation, which Dr. Liller stated was in full harmony with the mind of the Far Eastern Division Committee in drawing up the policy, the policy was approved by the Committee, as follows:

Whereas, We have in the Far Eastern Division great possibilities for the advancement of our message by means of medical missionary work in the establishment of sanitariums, hospitals, dispensaries, and nurses training schools which it is believed can in a short time be self-supporting exclusive of the foreign staffs; and,--

Whereas, At the Division Spring Council of 1924 a working policy was adopted for the establishment of medical centers throughout the Division; and,—

There has been such a phenominal development of our medical missionary work since 1924 as to make it advantageous to revise this working policy adopted at that time; therefore,—

Resolved, That the Home Board be petitioned to allow the Far Eastern Division to substitute the following working policy for the one adopted in 1924:

1. Central Training School for Nurses

- a. That the Shanghai Sanitarium and its clinic-hospital shall be the central training school for nurses for the Far Eastern Division, and that in order to meet the needs of the various languages of the Division, English texts shall be used, and the instruction in the entire training courses shall be given in the English language.
- b. That we maintain for this training school a faculty of sufficient strength to properly qualify head nurses, supervisors, nurses as technicians, as may be required in our hospitals and mission fields.
- c. That the same general plans as operate for the return of students from our academic training schools to the fields from which they came, shall obtain in the return of these nurses to their home fields.

2. The Establishment of Medical Centers

- a. That prior to the undertaking of the establishment of any sanitarium, hospital, or dispensary, complete plans and specifications for erection, and estimated cost of construction and maintenance be laid before the Division Committee for its consideration, and be undertaken only after its approval.
- b. That we encourage and favor the establishment and operation of numerous dispensary-hospitals in various provinces where the need is great, as rapidly as funds can be secured and trained help provided to man the institutions.

3. Establishment of and Additions to Institutions

That where it is proposed to establish an institution, or make any addition or major improvement in connection with any existing institution, involving an expenditure up to G\$5,000, plans of building and finance for such buildings or improvements shall be submitted by the union to the Far Eastern Division Committee, and for an expenditure of over G\$5,000, the consent of the General Conference shall be secured before such buildings or improvements are undertaken.

4. Funds for Building or Improvements

That funds for any building or improvement enterprises shall be in hand for the complete project before entering upon such construction or improvement.

5. Nurses' Training Schools for Union Institutions

That where union mission or union conference sanitariums or hospitals have a bed capacity which requires more attention than can be reasonably given by graduate nurses, and where such institutions have sufficient staffs and facilities to train nurses for their needs, and are able to finance teaching staffs exclusive of the foreign workers, and conduct training schools from their earnings without additional appropriations from the Division, such schools may be established, but only after obtaining the approval of the Division Committee.

6. Uniform Charges

That a uniform basis of charge for medical services to our Seventh-day Adventist foreign workers prevail in all of our Division medical institutions.

Recess was taken to 2 P.M.

On reassembling at two o'clock, the meeting was begun with prayer by H.H.Hall.

He read a letter from Dr. E.H. Cressy, the Vice-Chancellor of the University, setting forth the thought of the Board in inviting such cooperation.

TUBERCULAR UNIT AT DERVER:

The committee which had been appointed in San Francisco to give study to Ir. Porter's suggestion of a tubercular unit in connection with the sanitarium in Denver, reported their views concerning this proposition as follows:

"Your committee appointed by the Executive Jommittee of the General Conference, to give study to the matter of a tubercular unit for Denver, Jolorado, respectfully submits the following:

"We recommend, That we express our sincere appreciation of the generous suggestion on the part of Ir. Henry II. Porter, of Denver, to build a unit of approximately fifty beds for the care of tuberculous patients, the same to be located on the forty-acre tract on which is now located the Porter Sanitarium and Hospital.

"It is our opinion that such an institution is greatly needed and that Colorado provides excellent conditions for such a work.

"However, we are led to believe, from experience and observation both in this and foreign countries, that a unit to care for this class of patients should be located. rather remote from an institution providing for the treatment of non-infectious diseases, on account of an inherent fear of the disease on the part of the general public.

"Furthermore, such an institution presents a peculiar financial problem in the care of this class of sufferers, on account of the protracted nature of their illness which often makes it impossible for them to meet the expense of their care.

"We further recommend. That a committee of seven members be appointed to give sympathetic study to this suggested enterprise, and report to the Autumn Jouncil to be held in October, 1930.

Whereas, It is far better that young people seeking a preparation for Christian work should be trained in their own country.

We recommend, 1. That our young people in the China and Far Eastern Divisions desiring a literary or medical training, seek to secure it in the Orient, rather than to come to America for such training.

- 2. That the China Division endeavor to arrange with the St. John's University Medical School, of Shanghai,
 for them to so adjust their work as to make it possible for
 Seventh-day Adventist young people to take their medical training
 in that school without being compelled to do work on the Sabbath;
 it being understood that such arrangement will not involve the
 mission fields of the Far East financially.
 - 3. That provision be made by our own organization for proper spiritual supervision of our young people who attend this school.

SABBATH SCHOOL OFFERINGS AND GOALS:

Whereas, Word comes to the General Conference Committee that some portions of our field, in their desire to meet laudable goals set by the Sabbath School Department, have allowed themselves to take from Sabbath school offerings rereived early in a subsequent quarter and count them as having been received in the last quarter, in order to maintain goals, related pennants, etc.,

VOTED, That we invite Dr. H.J. Sturges, of Idaho, to connect with the African Division for medical missionary service in the Central African Union Mission.

CAUTION TO FIELDS RE TAKING ON NEW WORKERS:

Consideration was given by the Committee to the present financial conditions in North America at the present time, and the influence this is having upon the income of the General Conference, and the possible reduction of appropriations to home and foreign fields the coming year.

So far this year there has been a marked shrinkage in the mission receipts of the General Conference, and it seems necessary that the fields should be cautioned about taking on new workers.

VOTED, That we ask the treasurer of the General Conference to advise caution in the expenditure of funds by all divisions receiving appropriations from the General Conference, and advise them not to take on new workers in the fields. In view of the present financial situation, it also seems advisable to hold up all new appointments from America to the mission fields until the Autumn Council. In places where appointments are replacements and would not call for added appropriation for support, such appointments should go forward as usual unless further developments in the field indicate that this would not be advisable.

G.P. GRAGER -- ANTILLIAN UNION:

VOTED, That following his camp neeting work in the Southeastern Union, C.P.Crager spend some time in the Antillian Union Hission, in the interests of the school work in that field.

O.L. TORREY -- MEDICAL REPORTS:

Medical reports were presented and accepted as clesring the way for the return of Mr. and Mrs. C.L. Torrey to India on the expiration of their furlough.

H.H. VOTAW--RUMANIA:

VOTED, That we accede to the request from the Southern European Division, that H.H.Votaw, who is now in Europe, visit Rumania in the interests of the Peligious Liberty work.

COLLITTEE ON HOUSING SUBSIDY:

VOTED, That the Committee on Housing Subsidy be as follows: The available officers, Z.R.Palmer, F.M. Wilcox, H.H.Cobban, C.Conard, N.Z.Town, with J.L.Shaw as chairman.

ORLEY FORD-EXTENSION OF FURLOUGH:

Letter was read from Orley Ford, on furlough from South America, reporting the family in need of medical care and treatment, and suggesting that it might be necessary for them to remain longer than the regular furlough period in the homeland.

VOTED, That we extend the furlough of Orley Ford for a period of three months.

J.H. LICEACHERN-ELDER AND LIRS. HARTWELL:

The Committee gave consideration to a letter from J.H.McZachern relative to his wife's aged parents, Elder and Mrs. Hartwell, accompanying them to the Philippines, and it was-

VOTED, That it is the decided judgment of this Committee that Elder and Mrs. McEachern should be advised not to take their aged parents, Elder and Mrs. Hartwell, with them to the Philippines, in view of their state of health and the conditions they would be subjected to in such a field.

CALP LETING ASSIGNLENTS:

VOTED, That J.S.Longacre be released from the appointment to the Iowa camp meeting, and that he attend the Northern New England meeting over the week end, August 22-24.

VOTED, That G.W.Wells be released from the Central Union camp meetings, and that he attend the love meeting, August 21-31.

VCTED, That J.C. Thompson attend the camp meetings in the Central Union, and following that spend some time in the interests of the Sabbath school work on the Pacific Coast.

VCTED, That F.L.Peterson attend the colored camp meetings in the Southern and Southeastern Unions as can be arranged.
