AN ADDITIONAL NICKEL A WEEK FOR MISSIONS:

The treasurer set before the Committee the facts
 in regard to the very serious shortage in our mission funds,
 and presented the report of a small committee which had given
 study to the problem of what can be done. This report as
 amended was adopted as follows:

Whereas, During the depression of the last two years our people have responded even to the point of sacrifice in providing funds to maintain strongly the work in the world field, making possible the continued proclamation of the message in many tongues, resulting in a rich harvest of souls; and,

Whereas, During recent months there has been a marked shrinkage of income to the General Conference in this hour of need when unprecedented openings for the proclamation of the message are everywhere significantly manifest; and,

Whereas, A small added donation if given weekly, even so small an increase as five cents a week per member, might carry us through the present financial crisis,

Resolved, 1. a. That we ask all our people everywhere to arise to the present need by giving weekly such increase of offering as they are able.

b. That in North America we ask everyone to give through the Sabbath school an additional offering of at least five cents,--a nickel a week,--to help bridge the present crisis.

c. That we ask the Sabbath School Department to promote strongly in every Sabbath school the idea of the added offering of a nickel a week, or more, for missions.

d. That the financial needs of the General Conference be clearly set forth at each union session, and every delegate attending these sessions be asked to endorse and strongly promote the plan of an increase of five cents, or more, for missions, through the Sabbath school.

e. That we seek to emphasize through our periodicals, the Review and Herald, the Ministry, the Church Officers' Gazette, the union papers and special leaflets, the need and possibilities of systematic giving, and call upon our people to give an increased offering of at least five cents a week per member through the Sabbath school, in order to bridge the present crisis.

Further resolved, That we earnestly request our people whom the Lord has blessed with means, to come forward at this time with large special offerings to help save our missions from retrenchment.

RUSSELL JAMES--INDIA:

VOTED, That, responding to the call from the Southern Asia Division, we invite Mr. and Mrs. Russell James to connect with the Vincent Hill school at Mussoorie, India.

SOUTHERN AFRICAN DIVISION--DEPARTMENTAL SECRETARIES:

Word was received from the Southern African Division that Brother W.B.Commin's health is seriously imparied, making it necessary for him to be released from all work, for a time at least. The Division Committee therefore requests that Brother Commin be released from the secretaryship of the Sabbath School Department, and that J.I.Robison be appointed in his place; this makes it necessary for J.I.Robison to be released from the Home Missionary Department, and the request is that L.A.Vixie be appointed in his place.

VOTED, That we appoint J.I.Robison to succeed W.B.Commin as Sabbath School Secretary of the Southern African Division.

VOTED, That we appoint L.A.Vixie to succeed J.I.Robison as Home Missionary Secretary of the Southern African Division.

E.E.FRANKLIN--NEW YORK:

VOTED, That we approve of E.E.Franklin's meeting an appointment in Greater New York January 22 to 24.

J.W.ALLISON TO COLORADO--M.H.YOUNG TO SOUTH TEXAS:

VOTED, To pass on to the Central Union and the Southwestern Union the request received for the exchange of J.W.Allison of Colorado and M.H.Young of South Texas.

MISS IDA ROBINSON--NEW ORLEANS:

PRE-NURSING COURSE:

A series of recommendations looking toward the establishment of a pre-nursing course in our colleges was introduced by the Medical Department, and it was--

VOTED, That these recommendations be referred back to the Medical Department for further study, and with the advice that the Medical and Educational Departments seek counsel from the field concerning this proposition, with a view to its presentation to the Spring Meeting of the Committee.

FUNDS FOR COLORED ACADEMY:

The following outline of plans for raising money from the colored believers for the establishment of the academy for colored youth in the North was presented and adopted:

1. A definite campaign for the raising of \$20,000 from the colored churches, from February 6 to April 2.

2. The individual goal for the colored membership in the North to be placed at \$5.00; in the South, \$3.00.

3. F.L.Peterson to carry on a vigorous correspondence with colored secretaries and preachers for the next few weeks.

4. An itinerary for F.L.Peterson to be arranged to follow up this work in the colored churches.

5. All money is to be passed through the regular channels, the churches to be carefully instructed not to use their tithe or mission offerings for this purpose.

6. J.L.McElhany to write an appeal to be read in the colored churches on February 6.

7. I.H.Evans and F.L.Peterson to write articles for the Review addressed to the colored believers.

8. F.L.Peterson to write an article for the colored believers to appear in the union papers.

9. J.L.McElhany to write to union and local conferences where there are colored members, asking the conferences to encourage the colored preachers and members to get behind this proposition.

BOOK AND BIBLE HOUSE IN KINGSTON, JAMAICA:

The Inter-American Division asked counsel in connection with a request they had received from the Jamaica Conference. Jamaica reported that they are compelled to pay a high rent in the city of Kingston in order to secure proper accommodations for their Book and Bible House. They very much desire a building of their own. They have money to buy the land, and wish to borrow to put up the building. It was--

VOTED, That we advise the Inter-American Division to counsel the Jamaica Conference to defer the building of a Book and Bible House until they have the necessary amount of cash in hand so that they may not involve themselves in debt.

The secretary of the Sustentation Committee reported actions of that committee in meetings held December 7, 11, 18 and 30, and January 13 and 14.

LODI AND OSHAWA:

At the Autumn Council in Omaha the question of the future of the college work at Oshawa Missionary College and of the normal work at Lodi Academy was referred to the Commission on Higher Education, the Commission to report to the General Conference Committee in Washington. The Commission having given consideration to the work of these two schools, submitted the following report, which was adopted:

Lodi Normal Department

Whereas, The Pacific Union Conference Committee has recommended that the normal work now being done at the Lodi Academy be transferred to the colleges doing normal work in the Pacific Union Conference,

We recommend, In harmony with the action of the Pacific Union Conference Committee, that the Normal Department at Lodi Academy be closed at the end of the school year ~~1931-32~~.

Oshawa Missionary College

We recommend, That W.I. Smith, Claude Conard, and H.H. Hall be a committee to investigate the situation regarding the college work now being done at Oshawa Missionary College, and that the question of the educational status of that school be referred to the Spring Meeting of the General Conference Committee.

H.P. EVENS--EXTENSION OF FURLOUGH:

VOTED, That the furlough of H.P. Evens and family be extended to September 10, in order to give Sister Evens a little longer time to recuperate her health before going to Japan, where Brother Evens is to take charge of the Japan publishing house.

ETTA HEWGLEY--CARIBBEAN UNION:

VOTED, That we invite Miss Etta Hewgley, recently returned from South America, to connect with the Inter-American Division, as stenographer-bookkeeper in the Caribbean Union Office.
