#### SHORT TIME LOANS:

Whereas, The treasurer of the General Conference is authorized by the By-Laws to carry a reserve fund equal to one fourth the regular annual appropriations, to tide over a possible financial depression, said reserve fund to be held in cash and readily convertible securities; and,

Whereas, Because of shrinkage of income during the present prolonged financial depression throughout the world it is necessary either to sell some securities in a depressed market or to secure a short-time loan,

VOTED, That the treasurer in counsel with the officers be authorized to secure such temporary loans, not to exceed an aggregate of \$250,000, as will tide over during the next few months, it being understood that securities may be used if necessary as collateral.

#### FURTHER PROSPECTIVE CUT IN BUDGET:

The treasurer presented a comparative statement of the General Conference income, showing the estimate made at the Autumn Council, for 1932, the actual receipts for 1931, and the present estimate of income for 1932, based on the receipts of the first two months of the year. The present estimate will leave a shortage for 1932 of \$488,525.32. It therefore seems inevitable that a further cut in appropriations will be necessary.

VOTED, That we recommend to the coming Spring Meeting of the Committee that a further cut be made in the budget,
the Spring Meeting to determine the percentage; and that in
the meantime the treasurer be asked to notify the field that
a further cut is inevitable.

The committee which was appointed to edit the manuscript prepared by J.L.McElhany for a Church Manual, reported their work completed and the manuscript now in the hands of the printers. They submitted a suggestive preface to the booklet, and it was-

VOTED, That the preface as read be adopted for inclusion in the Church manual over the signature of the General Conference Committee.

# SABBATH SCHOOL LESSONS FOR GREAT BRITAIN:

Request was presented from the Northern European Division that they be allowed to print the Sabbath school lessons which are supplied for use in the British Isles, at the Stanborough Press. This request was made in the interests of a saving in expense, and also because of the advantage it was felt it would be to have on the lesson pamphlet the imprint of an English publishing house. It was-

VOTED, That we authorize the Northern European Division to arrange for the publication of the General Conference Sabbath school lessons for Great Britain, at the Stanborough Press, and that the Sabbath School Department be authorized to supply the lesson manuscript.

Inasmuch as the department has experienced considerable difficulty in trying to place students from another discontinued school, the maximum capacity in other schools having already been reached, this request presents a serious problem on which the department sought counsel. While feeling every solicitude for the young people concerned, it was—

VOTED, That the Medical Department be advised to use caution in endeavoring to place these students, so as not to jeopardize the interests of other nurses' training schools in their endeavor to meet the requirements for clinical experience of their own students.

# \$2000 FROM RUSSIAN FUND FOR WORK IN POLAND:

VOTED, That we appropriate to the Northern European Division \$2000 from the Russian fund on deposit in Berlin, to be used for work among the Ukranian-Russians in Eastern Poland, with the understanding that this special appropriation will not increase the Northern European base appropriation.

# THE OPENING MEETINGS

The second business session began promptly at 10:30 A.M., April 24, with C.H. Watson in the chair.

Prayer was offered by J.F. Piper.

#### TREASURER'S REPORT:

The first item of business was a report from the treasurer, Elder J.L.Shaw. This report was made up of the following:

Statement of the Sixty-cent-a-Week Fund for three months, ending March 26, 1932, with a comparative statement for the same three months of 1931, showing a net shrinkage of \$46,208.13, or 12.7%.

Comparative Report of Per Cent of Tithe by Unions and Conferences for three months of 1932 and 1931, showing a net shrinkage of \$26,237.60, or 20.9%.

Statement of the Sustentation Fund, showing overdraft on the fund Jan. 1, 1932, of \$59,515.65, and an estimated overdraft by the end of the year of \$166,567.78, at the present rate of payments and decrease in receipts.

Comparative Statement of General Conference Income, showing estimate given at the Autumn Council for 1932, the actual receipts for 1931, and the present estimate as made by the Treasury March 31, 1932; also a proposed revised 1932 budget based on a 5, 8 or 10 per cent reduction.

Statement of Mission Fund Receipts for the year ending December 31, 1931, by divisions and unions; and a Comparative Statement of Mission Funds by divisions for twelve months, January 1 to December 31, for the years 1930 and 1931. The decrease in mission funds in divisions outside of North America was \$64,568.62 while in North America the decrease was \$338,146.72, making a total of \$402,715.34. These statements showed that the foreign divisions are now giving about one third of all the funds raised for missions.

A graph was displayed, revealing the downward trend in the General Conference income, and the fact that the reserve fund which the treasurer is authorized by the Constitution to carry is rapidly being depleted. The figures given clearly indicated that a further cut must be made if the budget is to be balanced. It was-

VOTED, That these statements be referred to the Finance Committee for study and recommendation.

#### EXHIBIT AT CHICAGO EXPOSITION:

The Director of the Social Science Division of the International Exposition which is to be held in Chicago in 1933 has urged us to participate in this exhibit, stating that no religious exhibit would be complete without the Seventh-day Adventists participating. After a brief discussion it was--

VOTED, To refer to the Finance Committee the question as to whether or not we should plan under present financial conditions to have a denominational exhibit at the Chicago Exposition in 1933.

# MEMORIAL FROM ATLANTIC UNION COLLEGE:

Attention was called to the fact that the Atlantic Union Conference and Atlantic Union College had appealed from the action of the last Autumn Council changing the status of Atlantic Union College. The Minority Committee had taken action recommending that the Spring Meeting study the possibility of a reconsideration of the question at the next Autumn Council, and authorizing the College pending this reconsideration to continue for another year in its present status.

VOTED, That we approve of the action of the Minority Committee, and refer this question to the Autumn Council for reconsideration.

This reconsideration calls for a re-survey of the College, since the basis of the appeal is a conviction that not all the vital facts were known when the recommendation to change the status of the school was made. It was therefore,

VOTED, That a commission be appointed to re-survey Atlantic Union College as a basis for the reconsideration of the status of the school.

## REPORT OF STATISTICAL SECRETARY:

H.E.Rogers, the Statistical Secretary, reported an increase of 31 churches in North America for the year 1931, the number now standing at 2,258, with a membership of 127,787, a gain during the year of 7,227, which is the largest gain the denomination has had for many years. The number baptized was 10,578, being 3,122 more than during the preceding year. The gain in Sabbath school membership was 5,762, the total Sabbath school membership in North America now standing at 130,343.

The latest figures as to membership throughout all divisions in the world field indicate 331,888 members of churches, and 391,948 members of Sabbath schools at the end of the third quarter of 1931. This is a gain of 17,635 church members in nine months. It is anticipated that the final returns for 1931 will show a very large gain for the year.

# ITEMS REFERRED:

The item on the Agenda relative to the term of service for single lady workers in foreign fields was referred to the Autumn Council. A number of other items on the Agenda were briefly discussed and were then referred to the Plans Committee.

#### OTHER DEPARTMENTS:

Items on the Agenda pertaining to the Home Missionary and Missionary Volunteer Departments and the Ministerial Association were also referred to the Plans Committee.

# DENTAL COURSE:

In view of the need of providing every legitimate safeguard for our youth who desire to train for self-supporting missionary service; and,

In view of the fact that our Medical College can not accept all who desire to enter the profession of medicine,

We recommend, That the Minority Committee give sympathetic study to this problem, and explore the feasibility of establishing a school of dentistry in connection with our Medical College, or of making a group arrangement with some standard dental college where our young people can have the safeguards of Christian home life.

# DEPARTMENTAL COUNCILS:

We recommend, That a council of the union Home Missionary secretaries of North America, together with the general Home Missionary secretaries, be held in some central location, May 13 to 17.

We recommend, That a council of the union Missionary Volunteer secretaries of North America, together with the general Missionary Volunteer secretaries, be held just prior to and at the place of the Autumn Council.

#### HEALTH WORK:

Recognizing that present day conditions of want, anxiety, and tension make it more important than ever that health interests be safeguarded; and,

Realizing that the health protection of our people is of first importance in the prevention of disease and premature death, in helping to maintain an earning capacity as well as an ability to give, and in imparting a more normal state of efficiency and enjoyment in general; and,

Whereas, We feel it highly essential that every available factor be utilized to give this work its place in relation to denominational interests.

We recommend, 1. That conference leaders be alert to foster medical work and to seek the advancement of approved methods of medical ministry and health education in every consistent and practical manner.

- 2. That our medical institutions, physicians and nurses, and dietitians give their support to such endeavor wherever and whenever they can do so.
- 3. That our schools, from the elementary to college, make health education a regular part of the required curricula, maintaining the same standard of teaching efficiency in the health subjects as is required in teaching in other departments.
- 4. That we continue to foster the group teaching of lay people in home hygiene and care of the sick so that not only our older members but new members may be acquainted with sound principles of healthful living and what constitutes rational methods of treating the sick.
- 5. That health instruction be recognized as an essential part of the education of new believers, and to this end we utilize balanced health teaching in connection with evangelistic efforts.
- 6. That definite attention be given to the systematic sale and circulation of our health books and journals. We call attention to the fact that this not only offers a means of earning, but of doing real missionary work.

#### COMBINING DEPARTMENTAL LEADERSHIP:

Whereas, The responsibility for raising the major portion of foreign mission funds rests upon the Home Missionary and Sabbath School Departments, and the combination of leader-ship of the two departments under one secretary militates against the successful raising of these funds; therefore,

We recommend, That where one secretary must be chosen to direct the activities of more than one department in a local conference, so far as consistent some other combination be made rather than that of the Sabbath School and Home Missionary Departments.

# PROMOTION OF CHRISTIAN EDUCATION:

Whereas, We have been instructed, "Work as though you were working for your life to save the children from being drowned in the polluting, corrupting influences of the world;" and.

Whereas, Through the same counsel we have been told, "In planning for the education of their children outside the home, parents should realize that it is no longer safe to send them to public schools;" and,

Whereas, The present economic situation makes the education problem an acute one for our churches and parents,

Resolved, That as workers we redouble our efforts to hold before our people the great principles of Christian education by-

- 1. Encouraging the faithful observance of Educational Sabbath in all our churches:
- 2. Keeping Christian education before our people through the columns of our church papers;
- 3. Availing ourselves of the oming camp meeting season as an opportunity for strengthening the faith of our people in these God-given principles;
- 4. Encouraging the organization of Children Ingathering Bands in churches where this organization has not been effected and encouraging increased activity on the part of the bands already organized; and
- 5 A thoroughly organized plan of summer promotion for the soliciting of students on the part of the management of our colleges and academies.

# SYMPATHY TO ABSENT SECRETARIES:

Inasmuch as serious illness has made it impossible for Prof. C.W.Irwin, secretary of the General Conference Department of Education, and Prof. A.W. Spalding, of the Home Commission, to take their accustomed places in our council,

Resolved, That we send our Christian greetings to Brethren Irwin and Spalding, assuring them that their presence and help are missed in this important meeting, and that we are praying for their recovery.

Announcement was made that the evening hour would be devoted to committee work.

Adjourned at 5:30 P.M., with the closing prayer by E.K. Slade.

The devotional service of Tuesday morning, April 26, was conducted by Elder S.A.Ruskjer. Following singing, and prayer by I.H.Evans, Elder Ruskjer spoke. Some of the impressive and helpful thoughts brought out in his talk were:

We must remember the importance of keeping our own hearts warm, of keeping our own hearts clean, of keeping our own hearts full of the message that we take to the world, so that we may inspire the people as we minister to them. We must lead them to see that we have not merely a formal message, but one of life and light, and that it will lift men and women from sin.

Those who must spend a large part of their time serving in committees and on boards should make it their first business to give personal attention to their Christian experience, and make contact with those who are in need of help.

Office assistants and secretary-treasurers must not allow their work to become mechanical, but should regard it as a part of the whole, and ask God's blessing upon it. The giving out of literature, or other personal work, is a splendid method of keeping alive one's own interest and love for the truth.

In evangelistic endeavor, the minister's work is to be not only preaching the gospel from the pulpit, but he must visit the people in their homes, and study their perplexities with them, and pray with them.

In Jer. 17:9, God promises to take away the heart of stone and give in its place a heart of flesh. A heart of tender sympathy, revealed in a word of cheer, a smile, or a glad hand-shake may buoy up the heart of one who is troubled, and encourage him.

What the church needs is love, -- simple, plain, Christian love.

W ith a good testimony meeting the service was brought to a close.

The fifth business session, at 10:30 A.H., April 26, was opened with song, followed by prayer by Elder L.K.Dickson.

#### REPORT FROM THE FINANCE COMMITTEE:

The Finance Committee submitted a partial report, which was adopted as follows:

# EIGHT PER CENT CUT IN APPROPRIATIONS:

Recognizing that changing conditions and the financial depression throughout the world, with consequent serious decline in our income, brings to us unforeseen problems in maintaining our world-wide program; and

In harmony with the provision made by the 1931 Autumn Council that any shortage that may appear in the income of 1932 be apportioned on the pro rata basis; therefore,

We recommend, That an 8 per cent reduction on the annual basis be made on base appropriations for 1932, which when applied to appropriations granted at the 1931 Autumn Council will result as follows to the home and foreign fields:

It is further recommended, That to balance the bud-correction get, after providing for the prospective shortage of make by \$366,810.98 by the contemplated reduction of 8 per cent, the m. \$4.2 amount be made up out of exchange, reserves and surpluses now 6/5/32 found in the division treasuries, so that not more than \$150,000 shall be taken from the General Conference Reserve Fund for 1932.

# "CHRISTIAN RECORD" PAYMENT TO SUSTENTATION FUND:

We recommend, That arrangement be made with the "Christian Record" Board to pay to the Sustentation Fund an amount approximately equal to that required for the sustenance of blind beneficiaries, and other workers formerly connected with the organization; and in addition to this that the Board consider reimbursing the Sustentation Fund for such an amount as has been thus far paid out to said beneficiaries.

#### COMMISSION ON COMEBACK PLAN:

We recommend, That a commission be appointed, of which the treasurer shall be a member, to study and submit a revision of the present comeback plan, to report to the Autumn Council; the commission to be made up of men who are not connected with the institutions which are recipients of the comeback.

# EXHIBIT IN CHICAGO EXPOSITION:

Whereas, We have been invited to place an exhibit in the International Exposition at Chicago, in 1933, which is known as "A Century of Progress,"

We recommend, That the chair appoint a committee of three to give study to this question and report to the Minority Committee for final action.

Named: J.L. Shaw, J.L. McElhany, H.H. Hall.

#### NAVAJO INDIAN WORK:

Resolved, That it is our understanding that the Navajo Indian work and all its interests are under the management of the Southwestern Union Conference, and that all workers connected with the Indian Mission work in that area are under the direction of the union conference committee.

# REPORT FROM THE COMMITTEE ON PLANS:

A further partial report from the Committee on Plans was adopted as follows:

#### FALLEN WORKERS:

We recommend, That there be placed on record, with sincere regret, the loss by death of several workers since we last met in council. Among them we note Elder W.T.Knox, whose efficient service as treasurer of the General Conference will long be remembered; Elder R.A.Underwood, who occupied various positions of leadership for many years; and Elder D.C.Babcock, whose self-sacrificing service in the mission field should stimulate others to follow his godly example. Further, that we authorize the secretary to convey this action to the relatives of these brethren with an expression of our sympathy for them.

#### OSHAWA MISSIONARY COLLEGE:

Whereas, Oshawa Missionary College offers unusual facilities for assisting needy students in defraying their school expenses; and,

Whereas, Experience teaches us that it is highly important for the best interests of the Canadian field that their young people be trained so far as possible in their local institutions; and,

Whereas, Because of economy in school administration and carefulness in financial management during the year 1931-32, the institution will probably operate without loss after its allotted subsidy is applied; and,

Whereas, Because of the smallness of the constituency from which the institution draws students as compared with the size of the plant, the operating losses would probably be greater if its rank were lowered than if it is left with its present status,

We recommend, That Oshawa Missionary College continue to conduct its present limited junior college program, on condition that it operate year by year within its earned income supplemented by its regular subsidy.

### MINISTERIAL READING COURSE FOR 1933:

Whereas, The necessity of a continuous study program for our evangelical workers everywhere is clearly recognized, if there is to be steady intellectual and spiritual growth and efficiency; and,

Whereas, The united study plan for our workers offered through the Ministerial Reading Course in English, and in other languages, is a material aid to this desired end, worthy of the universal support and participation of our workers; and,

Whereas, There will naturally be a tendency among our laborers to restrict expenditures in this year of scarcity of funds and sifting of workers, when even greater efficiency than ever is required; we therefore,

Recommend, That our evangelical workers everywhere be earnestly urged to enroll for the 1933 Ministerial Reading Course, and that we call upon our leaders throughout the world to give their definite moral support and active encouragement to this objective, cooperating in the effort of the Association to provide a helpful course for the forthcoming year.

# HOME STUDY INSTITUTE:

Whereas, The outstanding need of the hour is a vast and rapidly growing army of consecrated men and women who are thoroughly trained in various forms of helpful ministry; and

Whereas, The Home Study Institute opens wide the door of opportunity for such training to all young people who can not attend one of our resident schools, and also to older ones of forward-looking minds; therefore,

Resolved, That we hereby pledge our loyal cooperation in the carrying out of the following plans looking to a larger enrolment of Home Study pupils:

- l. That educational secretaries and superintendents and Missionary Volunteer secretaries be requested to promote the Home Study idea as they travel among our churches and come into touch with young people who should be encouraged to take courses.
- 2. That the Home Missionary Department cooperate strongly with the Home Study Institute in the promotion of the church officers training course and the courses in the giving of Bible readings.

- 3. That the Medical Department continue to encourage nurses to take further studies through the Institute, and promote the Home Nursing Course among isolated believers, and in those churches where it is not possible to arrange for a class to be conducted by a registered nurse.
- 4. That the Ministerial Association lead out in plans to interest our ministers and Bible workers in advanced courses in Bible, History, New Testament Greek, and other studies suited to their needs.
- 5. That pastors and conference workers generally cooperate with departmental secretaries in their efforts to get in touch with young people and inspire them to devote their spare minutes to study.
- 6. That the Home Study Institute supply these workers with promotion material and helpful suggestions, and that the head of the Institute plan as part of his field work to spend a little time with them in their respective conferences, so that they may become familiar with practical methods of interesting people in home study.
- 7. That the heads of colleges and academies forward to the Home Study Institute the names of young men and women desirous of getting an education who can not afford to attend a resident school, in order that these young people may be encouraged to take some work by correspondence.

Whereas, There are a goodly number of English-speaking young people in Latin America as well as in English-speaking countries outside of North America, who do not enjoy education privileges; therefore,

Resolved, That we request our workers in these countries to encourage such young people to avail themselves of the excellent opportunities offered by the Home Study Institute.

#### WEEK OF PRAYER READINGS:

The following report from the Committee on the Week of Prayer Readings for 1932 was adopted:

Your Committee on Week of Prayer Readings for 1932 (December 10 to 17), would recommend the following program of readings:

Your committee recommend that as far as consistent the readings be confined to approximately two pages of the Review and Herald, from 2500 to 3000 words.

We further recommend, That the following committee be asked to be responsible for providing lessons for the children: Mrs. L.Flora Plummer, H.T.Elliott and C.A.Russell.

#### BIBLE HOUSES:

H.H.Hall presented a summary of the operating statements of the Bible Houses in North America for 1931. Although sales had fallen off by twenty-five per cent over the previous year, the accounts had been closely collected, salaries had been reduced by nearly \$12,000 and liabilities had not been increased. The great need of both the Bible and Publishing houses is that of greater promotion and a resulting increase of sales.

#### THREE HUNDRED THIRTY-FIFTH MEETING

## GENERAL CONFERENCE COMMITTEE

April 26,1932, 7:30 P.M.

\*\*\*

The sixth business session, at 7:30 P.M., April 26, after the opening song and prayer, was devoted to the consideration of Sabbath school interests, particularly the "giving for missions" phase of Sabbath school work. Mrs. Plummer, the

secretary of the Sabbath School Department, appealed earnestly to conference officials and workers to cooperate with the Department in keeping constantly before their members the slogan, "An Nickel a Week or More for Missions." She felt enthusiastic in her conviction that with this cooperation we may expect to receive through the Sabbath schools such a sum as will materially help to wipe out the present deficit in our mission funds. In fact, if the 127,787 church members in North America were each to give only five cents more a week for missions, by the end of the year it would roll up into the magnificant sum of \$332,246.20.

Mrs. Plummer exhibited charts which showed 52.73% of all the money given for missions in North America as coming through the Sabbath schools. Besides the regular weekly offering and the Thirteenth Sabbath Offering, there is the Investment Plan, which in seven years has brought in a total of \$363,293.57, and the Birthday Offering, which shows \$175,517.51 contributed in seven years. With the very simple means employed for promoting these various offerings it would seem that the Sabbath school is the least expensive channel through which to gather funds for foreign missions.

After Mrs. Plummer's interesting presentation of these facts, the council was ready to vote unanimously the adoption of the following recommendations from the Finance Committee:

#### ADDITIONAL WEEKLY S.S. OFFERING:

Whereas, The present income of the General Conference is inadequate for the maintenance of our work already established in the world field, and making it also impossible to take advantage of the unprecedented opportunities for the proclamation of the message which are everywhere manifest; and,

Whereas, A small added offering, if given weekly, even so small an increase as five cents a member, would greatly help to carry us through the present financial crisis and meet world needs.

Resolved, 1. That in North America we ask every one to give through the Sabbath school an additional offering of at least five cents,—a nickel a week,— to help bridge the present crisis.

- 2. That we ask each minister and other worker in the union and local conferences as well as the Sabbath School Department secretary of each conference, to promote strongly in every Sabbath school and church the idea of the added offering of a nickel a week or more, for missions.
- 3. That all our people in divisions outside of North America be requested to arise to the present need by giving weekly through the Sabbath schools an increase of from one to three cents (gold) a week per member.

- 4. That the Sabbath school secretaries of divisions, conferences, and missions, with the executive committees, and all ministers and other workers assist strongly in the promotion of this plan in their respective fields.
- 5. That there be kept constantly before our Sabbath school and church membership not only the seriousness of the present times, but the unparalleled opportunities that await the church of God in every land, opportunities that can be improved only through the gifts and loyal service of the entire church membership.

#### SABBATH SCHOOL INVESTMENT PLAN:

Whereas, The Sabbath School Investment plan has been successful in bringing into the mission treasury during the years 1925 to 1931 inclusive more than \$363,000; and,

Whereas, The plan is so broad that all members, whether living in city, village or rural community, can have a part, the methods of raising investment mission funds being so varied that none need be excused because they cannot find a way, and the money thus raised, as a rule, coming from a little extra exertion, or work, thus increasing the ability of each member to give without detracting from funds which might be given to other enterprises; therefore,

Resolved, That we ask all conference and church workers to endeavor to enlist 100% of the Sabbath school members to "invest" for missions.

#### BIRTHDAY OFFERINGS:

Whereas, The remembrance of one's birthday is sanctioned in the writings of the Spirit of prophecy in these words, "For life, health, food, and clothing, no less than for the hope of eternal life, we are indebted to the Giver of all mercies; and it is due to God to recognize His gifts, and to present our offerings of gratitude to our greatest Benefactor. These birthday gifts are recognized of Heaven;" and,

Whereas, Records show that in the main the birthday gifts through our Sabbath schools come from the younger divisions; therefore,

Resolved, That greater effort be made to induce those who have lived longer and thus enjoyed more of the blessings and mercies of God, to recognize these blessings in a tangible way by bringing a suitable birthday offering to the Sabbath school at some time near their birthday.

#### OFFERINGS AT CAMP MEETING:

Whereas, In some sections of the field the plan has been followed of taking only one offering on Sabbath during the camp meeting, this offering in some cases being taken in

the Sabbath school and in others at the time of the preaching service; and,

Whereas, The plan of taking the offering only in the Sabbath school results in unduly prolonging the Sabbath school period and at the same time fails to reach with the missions appeal those who do not attend the Sabbath school, but who do attend the preaching service; and,

Whereas, The plan of taking no offering in the Sabbath school results in depriving the Sabbath school of its credit for mission offerings to which it is justly entitled; and,

Whereas, We believe that good rather than harm will result from giving our brethren and sisters opportunity to make offerings to missions in more than one service; therefore

We recommend, That in both the Sabbath school and in the preaching service at our camp meetings, an offering to missions be taken, and that care be used in the Sabbath school that the time taken to promote the mission offering does not encroach upon the time of the review or lesson study, nor prolong the Sabbath school period beyond the usual hour and a quarter.

A number of songs have been composed on the theme of extra giving, and one of these, "Help the Sabbath School Way," was sung to close the meeting. W.P.Elliott pronounced the benediction.

THE DEVOTIONAL MEETING

April 27,1932,9:00 A.M.

In the devotional service of Wednesday morning, April 27, Elder J.F.Piper spoke on The Promises of God and the Nearness of the Coming of the Lord. He started with the text, "Whereby are given unto us exceeding great and precious promises: that by these ye might be partakers of the divine nature, having escaped the corruption that is in the world through lust." 2 Peter 1:4. One of the most precious of the promises, containing perhaps the greatest inspiration is the promise of the return of the Saviour. But we are warned in the 24th of Matthew to be careful lest a time come when we

lose from our consciousness the thought of His return. We read in Acts 7:17: "When the time of the promise drew nigh, which God had sworn to Abraham, the people grew and multiplied in Egygt."

It is singular, nevertheless it is true, that in every case where a promise has been made to the people of earth, and the time of the fulfilment of that promise draws nigh, the people are unprepared. This was true of the Israelites in Egypt and in Babylon. And when the time of the promise drew nigh that Christ should be born in Bethlehem, the priests and leaders, while they were aware of the promise and of the fact that the time was at hand, were indifferent to the event.

Elder Piper asked the question, Are we as alert to preach the coming of the Lord as we once were, or have we become lukewarm and unconcerned about it? There is danger that though we see the signs multiplying all about us, we shall be unmoved by them. The Laodicean message is an evidence that there is danger again of the people of God becoming so contented and satisfied that they are not alert to the things that are so soon to transpire. Shall we not take heed to that warning, and pray for the anointing with the eyesalve that we may indeed see, and that we may discharge the responsibility which God has placed upon us of proclaiming to the world the soon coming of the Saviour?

The service closed with a goodly number of earnest testimonies.

#### THREE HUNDRED THIRTY-SIXTH MEETING

GENERAL CONFERENCE COMMITTEE

April 27, 1932, 10:30 A.M.

\*\*\*

"O, for a Closer Walk with God," was sung to open the seventh business session, at 10:30 A.M., Wednesday, April 27. Prayer was offered by Elder P.E.Brodersen.

The Finance Committee submitted a further partial report, which was adopted as follows:

#### INCREASING MISSION FUNDS:

Whereas, The message proclaimed by Seventh-day Adventists commits us to the task of reaching every "nation, kindred, tongue and people;" and,

Whereas, The Foreign Mission Board is greatly perplexed in carrying forward its world-wide operations because of the decline in foreign mission funds, so that we face

actual retrenchment in our mission work if conditions continue as they are; and,

Whereas, Immediate steps to increase our foreign mission funds are necessary, in order to maintain intact our world-wide work,

We recommend, 1. That special efforts be put forth to raise at least \$100,000 in the Midsummer Offering, each church endeavoring to raise an average of one dollar or more per member; the promotion of this offering to be under the direction of the Secretarial and Treasury offices of the General Conference.

- 2. Believing that those of wealth in our denomination would come to the help of our Mission Board in this time of emergency if they were fully acquainted with the situation, we urge all our pasters and evangelists and conference presidents to personally visit all such, encouraging them to give special offerings to the cause at this time. That those of our people who have during the years succeeded in saving a few hundred dollars be invited to make a special offering during 1932 of \$50, \$100, or more, in addition to their regular offerings.
- Week of Sacrifice offering the largest in our history. We recognize that we face a greater crisis in maintaining our foreign mission program than we did in 1922 when our people so nobly came to the rescue. We therefore urge that strong efforts be put forth by all conference workers to encourage all our people, at home and abroad, to unite with conference and institutional workers in giving one week's salary or income to missions. The promotion of this effort is to rest with the Treasury of the General Conference. That heads of institutions and conferences present this at an early date to all their workers, urging every worker by precept and example to participate in the Week of Sacrifice.
- 4. That a special meeting of all workers in each conference be held as soon as possible for the purpose of acquainting each worker with the serious financial crisis facing the mission fields and placing definitely upon the hearts of pastors, evangelists and others the necessity of having each church do its utmost to raise all General Conference financial goals for missions, and that as far as possible the General Conference Committee arrange for one of its representatives to attend such meetings to give counsel and instruction.
- 5. That we request the Signs of the Times, the Watchman, and the Canadian Watchman magazines to make special appeals to their readers for mission offerings, the publishers to send these gifts to the General Conference to be credited on the Sixty-cent-a-Week Fund for the conference in which the donor lives; and in connection therewith we request the Secretarial and Treasury offices to cooperate by furnishing special material to these periodicals.

- 6. That we further request the union conference committees to set aside one page a month in the regular issue of their union papers for the promotion of foreign missions, the material for this to be furnished by the Secretarial office.
- 7. That we request the Review and Herald to continue its strong policy of supporting our foreign mission work, and that we request the Treasury of the General Conference to undertake in a definite way to educate our people through the Review and Herald in the plan and policy of our Foreign Mission Board, and in the progress and operations of our world-wide work.
- 8. That a regular church offering for foreign missions be taken in all our churches every second Sabbath of the month, and that our workers be requested to especially emphasize this offering from month to month.

We have reached the closing days of earth's history. Rapidly fulfilling signs on every hand witness that the coming of Christ is near, even at the doors. Before He comes a world must be warned and a people developed among all nations who keep the commandments of God and the faith of Jesus. Only by hearty consecration and supreme sacrifice on the part of every believer can this work be accomplished. In view of the crisis which confronts us in our missionary operations, the hour for economy and sacrifice, we believe, has fully come.

We therefore recommend, I. That all our members recognize anew their sacred stewardship in being entrusted with their Lord's goods, and that, in harmony with the instructions of the Holy Scriptures, they sacredly guard the tithe of their income, paying it regularly into the Lord's treasury for the support of His work.

- 2. That they seek by economical living and simplicity of life to so bind about their wants that they may be able to give a larger portion of their incomes in freewill offerings for the support of our missions.
- 3. That we ask our conference workers and church officers to carry upon their hearts a special burden in impressing upon our brethren and sisters throughout the field this solemn responsibility of rendering to the Lord His own in tithes and offerings.

Believing that many of our brethren and sisters through out the North American field would be glad to make special gifts to the cause of missions, and so aid in the present emergency if the urgent situation could be set before them; therefore.

Resolved, That we ask the President of the General Conference to address to our church members in the North American Division a personal letter setting forth the crisis which has arisen in our missionary operations, and appealing for donations in the sum of one dollar or more to assist in maintaining our missionaries at their posts in this period of financial stringency, the same to be a donation in addition to their regular gifts to missions.

# COMMISSION TO SURVEY GENERAL CONFERENCE STAFF:

Elder C.H. Watson made a statement relative to the change which has come about in the matter of calls for help from the General Conference staff, sent in by the foreign divisions and the union and local fields in North America. "This change," he said, "comes largely as a result of the financial situation in all the world field. While the fields assure us that the help from the General Conference staff is greatly appreciated, and while it is as greatly needed today as ever, they cannot, because of reduced income, finance conventions and other work with which this help would have to connect in order to make it of value.

"Under these conditions there has grown up a feeling in the field that the headquarters staff of the General Conference is larger than it needs to be at present, and the wish is expressed that the matter be studied and changes made.

"The officers have not felt they could take the initiative in this. The heads of departments, the officers, the field secretaries, and the associates in the departments and in administrative positions are all in their positions by the vote of the delegates in General Conference session. We naturally feel that there is no section of the administrative work that has the right to say that any other section of the work shall be curtailed.

"But we have taken counsel together, the officers, the field secretaries, and the leaders of the departments, concerning this, and have expressed our desire to have this matter considered by the Spring Meeting, feeling that it should be studied, but feeling that if possible it should be studied by a body outside of the administration itself, and that such body should make recommendations that would be considered in a proper way.

We have had two meetings, one between the officers and the union conference presidents, the other between the officers, the union conference presidents and the leaders of the departments of the General Conference, and in these meetings decision was reached to bring the matter before you here in this Spring Meeting, requesting that a Commission be appointed, composed of persons not of the General Conference administrative staff, to study the situation thoroughly and to recommend such action as it feels would be proper. Suggesting, too, that the commission while having the right to bring before the Executive Committee in minority meeting at any time it thought right and proper such recommendations for changes as it felt could be made, and that were clear and possible at any given time, should make its final report to the next Autumn Council, so that the situation as it obtains at the present time would not be changed hastily. The efficiency of the work should be safeguarded in making such changes. The matter thus

would be brought to decision by a body that will be widely representative. The matter of studying the General Gonference headquarters staff is something in which the world ought to be represented, because it is a world staff.

"W hatever is done, we all should set our hearts carefully to avoid a spirit of restlessness coming into the work at the General Conference office. My personal desire is that in approaching this matter it should be understood that every member of the staff is involved. We also think it should be kept well in mind that any study given to the matter will not of necessity mean the elimination of workers from the work. It possibly will mean adjustments only."

VOTED, That the body which has brought in this suggestion, namely, the officers of the General Conference, the heads of departments and the presidents of union conferences, be asked to appoint the Survey Commission called for.

#### THREE HUNDRED THIRTY-SEVENTH MEETING

#### GENERAL CONFERENCE COMMITTEE

April 27, 1932, 7:30 P.M.

\*\*\*\*

The eighth business session was opened with song at 7:30 P.M., Wednesday, April 27, followed by prayer by W.B.Ochs.

The Finance Committee submitted its final report, which was adopted as follows:

# GENERAL CONFERENCE INSTITUTIONS BALANCING THEIR BUDGETS:

Whereas, The Washington Sanitarium, the College of Medical Evangelists, the Oakwood Junior College, and the Broadview College are known as General Conference institutions; and,

Whereas, Some of these institutions are year by year increasing their indebtedness, making the operation of their work still more difficult and perplexing,

We recommend, That we ask these institutions to operate strictly within the limits of their income the same as the mission fields and other institutions; and

That in view of the continued depression everywhere evident, these institutions spare no effort to balance their budgets immediately; and.

That no money be borrowed by them without an understanding with and permission from the General Conference.

#### GENERAL CONFERENCE SALARIES:

We recommend, That as an emergency measure General Conference salaries be cut ten per cent from the present rate as from May 1, 1932, to continue to December 31, 1932, and that this reduction be a guide to the fields in making salary adjustments.

#### WESTERN CANADIAN JUNIOR COLLEGE:

We recommend, That we recognize the present situation which results in the indebtedness on the Western Canadian Junior College as an emergency and grant them from their union comeback funds the amount of interest on the indebtedness for the school year of 1931-32.

#### SUSTENTATION FUND SHORTAGE:

We recommend, That the Treasurer, the President, the Vice-presidents, Union Conference Presidents, and H.H. Cobban be a committee to give study to the prospective shortage of

the Sustentation Fund and report to the 1932 Autumn Council.

#### REPORT FROM COMMITTEE ON PLANS:

The following final report from the Committee on Plans was adopted:

#### POSTPONEMENT OF BIBLE CONFERENCE:

Whereas, The European Divisions have requested that because of the financial conditions, the Bible Conference planned for this autumn should be postponed; and,

Whereas, It does not seem advisable to hold the Bible Conference with only a very limited representation from the European Divisions, which are so vitally interested in the success of such a meeting,

Resolved, That this Bible Conference be postponed for the time being.

#### WORLDLY ENCROACHMENTS:

Whereas, The world is forcing its way into the church in some centers by way of worldly pageant, show, comic lecture, theatrical display, cheap musical entertainment, and costly and extravagant church weddings, thus endangering our young people in a particular way, lowering our standards, and blotting out the line of demarcation between the church and the world; therefore,

Resolved, That with humiliation of soul and deeply sensing the fact that we are living in the last hour when the devil has come down in great power, we lovingly and urgently raise the note of warning to our people, both young and old, but especially to our church and institutional leaders, pointing out the danger of the hour in all these and other matters of a worldly trend, seeking for a renewal of the straight testimony of the True Witness, hoping that a revival of primitive godliness may result.

# A SPIRITUAL HARVEST INGATHERING CAMPAIGN:

Whereas, The success of the Harvest Ingathering Campaign depends upon the blessing of God on the consecrated service of workers and church members; we therefore,

Recommend, 1. That a "Harvest Ingathering Consecration "eek" be observed in all our churches in North America immediately preceding the beginning of the campaign, and wherever possible the church meet together for at least two evenings during the week, preferably Wednesday and Friday evenings, to seek God for the preparation necessary to do the work successfully, and to pray for the Spirit of God to impress men of

wealth and the public generally, to give liberally in response to the Harvest Ingathering appeal.

Whereas, The last Autumn Council at Omaha adopted an action providing for a united and intensive Harvest Ingathering Campaign by workers and laity to reach the full Ingathering goal in six weeks' period; therefore,

Resolved, 2. a. That union and local conference committees endeavor to so plan the work of all conference employees as will insure their uninterrupted leadership in churches and districts during the six weeks' campaign period, in a determined effort to raise the official goal of every church.

- b. That every consistent effort necessary be made to enlist every member in active solicitation work to thus secure their individual goals.
- c. That every church systematically cover its Harvest Ingathering territory with missionary literature for a month or six weeks before the opening of the Harvest Ingathering Campaign.

#### SPIRITUAL WORK FOR THE CHURCH:

Whereas, We have been told that just prior to the second coming of Christ a work like that of John the Baptist, calling men everywhere unto repentance with as direct a message as that of John, — "for the kingdom of heaven is at hand,"— is of first importance, and in order to contribute to the spiritual uplift of our people generally,

We recommend to our conferences, 1. That following Christ's method, ministers be sent forth, where possible, two and two among the churches to do a thorough work of revival, by setting forth the advent message in its cardinal features, calling people unto repentance, reconsecration, and rededication of their lives and property, to the quick finishing of the work, and that special efforts be put forth to visit our people in their homes, studying with them their problems, praying with them, and giving them individual spiritual help where it is needed.

- 2. That in view of the blessings promised to those faithful in paying tithes and offerings and the unprecedented need of funds, a special effort be made to get all of our people to pay a faithful tithe, and to resolve to give systematically a definite amount for missions week by week, to the end that our ministerial forces in the home field and our missionaries abroad be held in the field around the world, and the message go forth in greater power and strength.
- 3. That these meetings cover a week or ten days in each church and that announcement of these meetings be sent ahead, calling churches unto prayer for the need of the church and special help for those not of our faith who may attend the meetings.

#### TEMPERANCE WORK:

A series of recommendations on the cause of temperance after considerable discussion was referred to the Executive Committee, and all other items of unfinished business were likewise referred.

#### A SOLEMN CALL TO PRAYER:

A special resolution, "A Solemn Call to Prayer," was presented as follows:

Whereas, We are living in a time of unprecedented world distress, with men's heats failing them for fear; when the tide of sensuality, worldliness, and spiritual declension that is engulfing the world is encroaching upon the church; when the economic situation of the hour has produced the most serious financial crisis in the experience of the remnant church, creating needs utterly beyond all human plans and resources to supply; and frankly-

Recognizing, That the only solution to our problem lies in special help from God commensurate with the need of this crucial hour; therefore,

Resolved, That this Spring Meeting in session assembled issue a solemn call to intercessory prayer, appealing to ministers and laymen, old and young, to humbly supplicate our Heavenly Father for the forgiveness of our sins, for the promised outpouring of the Holy S pirit that true godliness and personal spiritual victory may be ours, and that means may be supplied, not only that there be no retrenchment in our world mission work, but rather that a mighty army of recruits may be sent forth to glean the golden grain from the ripening harvest fields that becken us.

## CLOSING REMARKS OF THE PRESIDENT:

"We have not spent as much time at this council as at those of last year in calling attention to the soul-winning work of the denomination throughout the world during 1931, and yet it has been a remarkable year in soul winning. it is one of the most wonderful that we have ever experienced. I am sure it is in the hearts of all who have participated in this meeting to acknowledge before God the wonderful blessings that He has bestowed upon His ministers and workers as they have endeavored in His name to call men and women to Christ. It would be very fitting if in our prayer, the closing prayer of this Spring Meeting, we acknowledged with thankfulness the goodness of God which has enabled us to reach the successes that have been obtained in soul winning in all parts of the And it would be fitting that we pledge our hearts to the Lord before adjourning this Council and go forth in His name with renewed consecration to greater soul-winning endeavor in the months which are before us. The perplexities of the present will not be permitted by Him to work against His great cause or to retard the work of winning souls, but rather these

hard conditions which we all deplore will no doubt increase the willingness of men and women to hear the message, and to respond to its power.

# PERMANENT RETURN OF WORKERS FROM CHINA DIVISION:

Letter was read from the secretary of the China Division, seeking counsel with reference to five workers permanently returning to America. China asked for a cable in reply, but it was agreed that the secretary should write the Division, setting fully before them the conditions and situation in America at the present time, the probability that these men can not be placed in the work, and that they will find it very difficult to get into self-supporting work at this this, and therefore might need to be supported for a considerable period. It was agreed to leave it to the China Division to act as they think best in the light of these facts.

#### PROMOTION OF TEMPERANCE CAMPAIGN:

The following report was presented and adopted regarding the temperance work:

Whereas, We have been admonished by the Spirit of prophecy to support prohibition and temperance by "voice and pen and vote;" and.

Whereas, It is recognized that success in carrying forward a strong program of education and promotion in temperance lines demands that the responsibility for the work head up in some specific person or group.

Resolved, 1. That in order to make effective the series of recommendations passed at the Autumn Council to carry forward an aggressive campaign on temperance, the responsibility of fostering this work rest upon a Temperance Commission consisting of a vice-president of the General Conference as chairman, the secretary of the Religious Liberty Department, the secretary of the Home Missionary Department, the secretary of the Missionary Volunteer Department, the secretary of the Press Bureau, and the secretary of the Publishing Department.

Resolved, 2. That in union and local conferences this work be under the direction of Temperance Commissions consisting of the president, the Religious Liberty, the Home Missionary, and the Missionary Volunteer secretaries.

Resolved, 3. That in order to facilitate contacts and the making of arrangements with other organizations, and to give convenience in correspondence, the work be carried on under the following name: "American Temperance Society of Seventh-day Adventists."

Resolved, 4. That the Commission give special attention to the following lines of work:

a. The selection in each conference of able public speakers who will address mass meetings, public school groups, churches, service club groups, and other organizations, and that wherever possible they make use of the radio.

- b. Encouragement of our evangelists to make temperance lectures a feature of their evangelistic series.
  - c. Temperance rallies at camp meetings.
  - d. Wide publicity through the press.
- e. An intensive campaign to obtain signatures to the following temperance pledge: "I pledge upon my honor that I will abstain from the use of all alcoholic beverages, and encourage others to do the same."
- f. Educational promotion through the Signs of the Times, Life and Health, Watchman Magazine, the Review and Herald, the Youth's Instructor, the Little Friend, our foreign periodicals, and the union conference papers.
- g. Encouraging young people's societies to prepare and render temperance programs in schools, churches, public halls, etc., and to secure signatures to the Temperance Pledge.
  - h. Preparation of lecture outlines and materials for the use of public speakers.

Whereas, There is an unprecedented crisis today in prohibition in America,

Resolved, 5.a. That a special campaign be carried on throughout the summer, or longer if necessary, to meet the present issue.

- b. That in carrying out this campaign, special care be taken to avoid becoming involved in partisan politics.
- c. That petitions to Congress be secured for the maintenance of the Eighteenth Amendment.
- d. That we undertake to circulate at least a million copies of the Temperance Special of the Signs, and two hundred thousand copies of the book Wet or Dry during the present summer campaign.

In connection with the discussion, Elders Fulton and Tait made explanations regarding the Prohibition Special of the Signs of the Times and the fact that the union conferences have been offered a special rate of \$15 per thousand net on orders of a hundred thousand or more. The conferences can dispose of these to the churches for \$17.50 per thousand, thus giving a little margin for carrying the expense.

Elder Evans felt the goal for the circulation of the Signs and the book Wet or Dry was not large enough, but that there should be small leaflets distributed also. He spoke of the remarkable campaign against opium which our people conducted in China, in which we were helped by all denominations and which gave us much favor with the public.

Some fear was expressed that this campaign on temperance might interfere with Harvest Ingathering, but inasmuch as this temperance campaign is to commence at once, it was thought that our people could throw themselves fully into the Harvest Ingathering campaign when the time comes.

#### WABASH VALLEY SANITARIUM:

W. H. Holden made a statement regarding the Wabash Valley Sanitarium. The Lake Union had decided to give this institution a few months! lease in which to come to the point of self-support. But inasmuch as it is running behind a thousand dollars a month, it is their purpose, unless a change comes very soon, to close the institution.

VOTED, That we concur in the decision of the Lake Union to close the Wabash Valley Sanitarium in case it is found impossible to make it pay expenses.

#### WORK OF GEORGE MCCREADY PRICE:

J. L. Shaw spoke of the plan of the work and support of George McCready Price since his return from Europe, the General Conference to allow him to work in the different colleges extending over a period of one to two years in each institution, the General Conference to pay half the salary, and the school the other half.

In response to a question from Elder Brodersen, it was suggested that we would pay half of the moving expense from Berrien Springs to whatever school desires his services.

A recommendation was presented from a sub-committee appointed by the Finance Committee of the Spring Meeting. It was as follows:

"Recommended, That during the time J.W.Christian is seeking employment, we place him temporarily on the Sustentation Fund at a monthly rate of \$57.00, for a period not to exceed one year, payment to begin January 1, 1932."

This called forth a lengthy discussion, in which members of the Committee expressed themselves quite freely. There was very decided opposition to placing Brother Christian on the Fund, even temporarily. Those who were opposed, however, were very willing that something should be done, if possible for Mrs. Christian.

The recommendation being put to a vote, was lost.

It was then moved and seconded, and unanimously

VOTED, That Mrs. J.W.Christian be placed on the Sustentation Fund, the ease to be reviewed at the end of the year, at a monthly rate of \$43.00, retroactive to January 1, 1932.

The above action was taken as an action of the Sustentation Committee, and so recorded, no record being made in the minutes of the General Conference Committee.
