## CENTURY OF PROGRESS EXHIBIT:

J. L. Shaw, chairman of the Century of Progress exhibit committee, reported progress in the negotiations for a Seventh-day Adventist exhibit at the Exposition this summer. While the arrangements are not yet fully completed, certain necessary plans for carrying forward this work were voted as follows:

1. That the Illinois Conference be requested to release O. O. Bernstein for the duration of the 1934 Century of Progress Exposition, to act as manager of the Seventh-day Adventist exhibit, under the direction and counsel of the General Conference sub-committee on the Century of Progress exhibit, the Illinois Conference to pay his salary.

2. That the Illinois Conference be requested to arrange the work of H. S. Preiner so that he may connect with the exhibit personnel, giving one half his time to this work, the General Conference guaranteeing one half his salary and all necessary expenses incident to his work in connection with the exhibit.

3. That the Home Missionary Department be requested to arrange for E. F. Hackman to give his full time temporarily to matters concerning the exhibit.

4. That H. H. Cobban and E. F. Hackman be authorized to go to Chicago to meet with the full committee on the exhibit, and to attend to such other business as may be necessary in connection with the exhibit.

## MISSIONS EXTENSION FUND:

The following recommendations relative to the Missions Extension Fund were adopted:

Whereas, The Missions Extension Fund has been used of God to greatly extend the publishing, educational and medical work through<sup>out</sup> the world; and,

Whereas, The Autumn Council of 1933 set a goal for the North American Division of \$60,000.00, to be raised through this fund in 1934, leaving it with the Executive Committee to select the projects to be the beneficiaries of the fund,

We recommend, 1. That the individual Missions Extension goal continue to be \$2.00.

2. That conference and institutional workers join in the Extension plan by giving an offering to the Missions Extension Fund equivalent to at least one day's income.

3. That our laymen be encouraged to join the regular workers in dedicating one day's income to the fund.

4. That our books and magazines be sold as one means of securing money for this special offering.

5. That the following mission enterprises to be benefitted by the Missions Extension Fund for 1934 be presented to the North American field, the money to be used in the payment of salaries and operating expenses, it being understood that the amount listed for each enterprise is only approximate, inasmuch as changes may have been made by the committees in the field in order to reduce the operating expenses to the lowest possible amount:
